

lawks aiming at playoff slot

You might as well say that the playoffs start Friday night when Iowa Park travels to Bowie to take on the Jackrabbits in the final regular season

And even though the first round of the Class 3A playoffs do not officially get started until the following week, this one will be played just like a playoff game.

The winner will advance to take on the winner of the Clyde-Abilene Wylie game, that will be played Friday night in Clyde, in a Bi-District game the following Friday night while the loser will start basketball practice Monday afternoon.

"It's do or die this Friday night," said head coach Weldon Nelms, who is trying to take his team back to the playoffs for the second straight season. "I think it could be a close game. Both teams are playing well right now and any time you're playing in a must-win game like this one, anything can happen.

"We need to get out to a good start," Nelms added. "I feel like we can continue to do the same things we've been doing in the past few weeks, only do them a little better, and we should be all right. One advantage we might have going for us is that our kids have played in a big game like this in the playoffs last year where Bowie hasn't. They could come out a bit tight, we just need to relax and play football."

The Hawks enter the game off an impressive 53-15 win over Henrietta

while Bowie is coming off a 48-8 win over Jacksboro last week.

Iowa Park stands at 7-2 overall and 3-1 in district play while Bowie is 4-5 overall and 3-1 in district. Both teams' lone district loss came at the hands of Vernon.

The Jackrabbits haven't played well in Bowie, winning only one of the four home games that they've played there. Both of Iowa Park's losses came on the road.

Bowie will be looking to advance to the playoffs for the first time since 1982 under first-year head coach Paul Hurst.

"I think it will be a good match up," Hurst said. "Iowa Park has a real good quarterback, two good running backs and a good defense. Right now, we are doing all those things well too. It might be a good ballgame if we can keep from turning the ball over."

Bowie is averaging 16 points per game offensively for the season, but has jumped it's scoring average up to 26 points per game in district play. The Jackrabbits are allowing 18.9 points per game overall and 17.3 in district play.

The Bowie offense revolves around three players and an offensive line that averages 195-lbs per man.

Aaron Kernek, a 195-lb. senior tailback, is the Rabbits leading rusher. Kernek rushed for 135 yards on 15 carries last week against Jacksboro.

Sophomore quarterback Jeremy Richey threw for 235 yards last week against the Tigers completing 10

passes including a touchdown pass to James Reed.

Richey's favorite target is Thor Thornhill, a 190-lb. senior split end who has hauled in 33 catches for 860 yards including at least six completions in each district game.

"Offensively, they're pretty strong," Nelms said. "Their offensive line is not real flashy, they just get after you and create holes for their backs and keep you off their quarterback in the passing game. Their quarterback is accurate and likes throwing the ball to Thornhill. Kernek is a big strong running back with good speed. He's really come on ever since the Holliday game when they moved him into the I-formation.

"Defensively, they're a real quick aggressive type team that flows to the ball well," Nelms added. "They give you a lot of different looks but basicly they run a 4-3 up front. They've got a couple of big tackles (272 and 260) that are pretty strong. Their free safety is a pretty good ball player for them and their linebackers run to the ball well and make a lot of plays for them."

The Hawks enter the game averaging 28.3 points per game. Iowa Park is averaging 326.7 yards per game with 250.3 of that coming on the ground and 76.4 through the air.

Leading rushers for the Hawks include Brandon Brown, who has gained 645 yards on 118 carries for a 5.4 yard average. Shawn Fulfer has picked up 560 yards on only 73 car-

Yeager has also hit on 50% of his passes, going 44/88 for 688 yards and 5 touchdowns. Michael Swenson leads the team in receiving yards with 182 on six catches for a 30.3 yard average.

Both Yeager and Brown have scored 8 touchdowns for Iowa Park while Fulfer is close behind with 6. Calvin Galliton has reached the end zone 4 times.

If Iowa Park wins Friday night's game against Bowie, the Hawks would get the winner of the Abilene Wylie-Clyde game that will be played in Clyde Friday night. Both teams are 9-0 and both have clinched a playoff spot. Vernon will play the loser of the

One Precinct 3 incumbent was returned to office by voters in Tuesday's general election, but the other incumbent was unseated.

Precinct 3 commissioner Gordon Griffith soundly defeated chal-71.76 percent of the 6,743 votes cast. Griffith is a Democrat, and Ward

Of the total of 40,782 votes cast by Wichita County voters, 2,073 ballots were from voters of the four precincts of the Iowa Park area.

NEWS OF THE Iowa Park GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL SOCIETY

At a called meeting of the Iowa Park Genealogy and Historical Society the election of officers for the upcoming year took place.

The following were elected as the new slate of officers, Fil Spangler, president; Marita Holdsworth, first vice president; John Chapman, second vice-president; Shirley Banks, secretary; Jim Virgin, treasurer; Sandi Koonce, Newsletter.

This past year has been a successful one in terms of genealogical and histoical projects completed and we look forward to another year of even more projects and learning ex-

Societies have always been a good source of genealogical and historical information and this week we will discuss this history.

During his visit to the United States in the early 1830s the French aristocrat, Alexis de Tocueville, was struck by the propensity of the American people to form associations for various causes and of various types. Many of our ancestors belonged to such societies, some even belonged to several associations at the same time.

Like the causes they support, the records of these societies vary in their purpose and content. At their most basic, these records consist of lists of the names of members. Others may also add data on residences, ages, and birth dates.

Perhaps the most valuable membership records for genealogists are kept by lineage societies. These societies require proofs that the prospective member had the proper ancestry to join the society, and thus will keep copies of these proofs on

Access to these membership files by persons who are not members of the society may be restricted, so it is imperative to contact the secretary or archivist of the society about their rules governing access, rather than just demanding copies of everything.

Generally, the records of a society are only found in their archives or main library. To find the address of the society's headquarters, you may want to consult the current edition of the Encyclopedia of Associations or The Hereditary Register of the United States of America.

Those interested in records of the Iowa Park Genealogical and Historical Society should contact the society secretary or attend the regular meetings at Tom Burnett Memorial Library at 2 p.m. on the second Saturday of each month, for further help in their studies.

The next meeting will feature a talk by Paul Bata of Kinko's discussing the availability of special services available to genealogists, as well as new tecniques recently added to Kinko's printing capabilities.







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GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Cooler weather and the approaching winter will require special care for your lawn, landscape and

Follow this garden checklist to keep up with gardening activities through November.

PLANTING

* Plant pansies, ornamental kale and cabbage, and other cool-season color plants for a beautiful landscape all winter long. Local nurseries have greenhouses full of colorful pansies and other cool-season plants. Check it out this weekend.

and plant trees, shrubs and other containerized nursery stock. These plants will have a jump-start next Spring by being planted in the Fall

Fall also allows you the opportunity to select the exact Fall color you want with Fall colored plant material such as Red Oak, Ornamental Pears, Chinese Pistache and oth-

individual tree to tree due to genetic factors. Now is the time to pick the exact tree you desire. * Transplant Spring-flowering

perennials now for best transplant survival rates.

* Select high-quality bulbs from your local garden center now while supplies are plentiful. Remember that tulip and hyacinth bulbs will require a chilling period prior to planting into the landscape. Place these bulbs into the crisper bin of your refrigerator for about 42 days prior to planting.

* Plant acid scarified bluebonnet seed now for spring wildflower color. Many other wildflowers should also be Fall planted. **FERTILIZATION**

*Mix a 3-1-2 ratio quality plant fertilizer into prepared beds prior to installing pansies and other coolseason color annuals. Follow up fer-

tilizations using a water-soluble bedding plant food every six weeks to help these plants look their best.

* Cool-season turfgrasses such as Fescue and rye grasses can be fertilized with a 3-1-2 ratio lawn food this Fall.

PRUNING

* Remove dead limbs on trees which can still be easily identified before trees defoliate.

* Major tree pruning should be done during the winter months.

* Remove very weak limbs on * Fall is the best time to select trees and cable those limbs which may need additional support in the event of ice storms which can cause serious limb breakage. Do this now before a problem arises.

INSECT, WEED, DISEASE CONTROL

* Declining brown areas in St. Augustine which are more or less circular in shape are indicative of the disease Brown Patch. Treat with the fungicide Daconil or hire a pest control operator or professional lawn care company for custom treatments.

* Treat tropicals and house plants before moving them indoors with a registered pesticide for your specific plants to control gungus gnats and other insects that may enter your home with the plants. Soil drenches and foliar sprays may be needed for

* Control peach leaf curl on peach trees with a copper fungicide application at leaf drop this fall. Bordeaux Mix, Kocide and other controls are options.

* Twig girdlers causing limb drop on pecan trees and other trees can be controlled by removing fallen branches from the landscape and treating with a labeled control in late August to October of next year if damage persists. Only partial control is often achieved, but rarely do these pests completely kill a tree.

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


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




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


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TOMMY DUERSON PICKS UP BIG YARDAGE

Hawks pound 'Cats, 53-15

Iowa Park scored early and often Friday night against winless Henrietta as the Hawks cruised to their 7th win of the season as they pounded the Bearcats 53-15 to set up this week's showdown against Bowie for the final playoff spot in district 5-3A.

Bowie's 48-8 win over Jacksboro puts the Jackrabbits at 3-1 in district and puts Iowa Park in a must-win if the Hawks are to return to the Class 3A playoffs for the second consecutive year. Bowie hasn't been to the playoffs since 1982.

It didn't take long for Iowa Park to set the tone in the Henrietta game as the Hawks took the opening kickoff and marched 89 yards in 8 plays to get on the board with 8:25 left in the opening quarter. Brandon Brown scored from 10 yards out to give his team a 6-0 lead. Keith Trammell added the point after to make the score 7-0. Other big plays on the drive included a 17yard pass from Todd Yeager to Brown and a 24-yard pass from Yeager to Chad Wright. Yeager finished the night hitting 7-of-8 for 138 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Shawn Fulfer also had a 29-yard run in the drive.

Henrietta tied the game at 7-7 with 5:07 remaining in the first when Jason Maxwell scored from 31 yards out on a draw

play. Iowa Park quicky answered the score when Yeager took the ensuing kickoff at his own 11 and went untouched 89 yards for a touchdown to make the score 13-7.

Iowa Park's defense then held the Bearcats and forced a punt. The Hawks took over at the Henrietta 41 and 4 plays later scored when Yeager hooked up with tight end Jed Taylor on a 15-yard TD pass with 2:06 left in the first, giving his team a 19-7 lead.

The Hawks followed their 19-point first quarter with a 20-point second quarter. Fulfer had a 49-yard touchdown run with 11:28 left in the second, Yeager scored from 5 yards out with 4:38 remaining and then found the end zone for the third time in the first half when he scrambled 34 yards for a touchdown with 3:19 left in the half.

Iowa Park rolled up 318 yards of offense in the first half while holding Henrietta to only 109.

The third quarter started just like the first half ended with Iowa Park ending up in the end zone. Yeager found Brown in the end zone for an 8-yard touchdown to boost the lead to 46-7 with 6:51 left in the third quarter.

The Bearcats scored with 9:24 left in the game to cut the lead to 46-15 when Steven Magers raced 79 yards for a touch-

Iowa Park ended the scoring with 5:41 left in the game when Calvin Galliton scored from 5 yards out.

The Hawks rushed for a season-high 435 yards as two different players went over

100 yards in the game. Fulfer finished with 106 yards on 12 carries while Tommy Duerson finished with 104 on 11 carries, 10 of those coming in the second half. Duerson also had a pair of touchdown runs called back due to penalties. Yeager added 59 yards on 6 carries, Brown finished with 47 on 7 tries and Galliton finished with 56 yards on 7 carries.

Yeager's only blemish on his passing performance was an interception by J.J. Pierce. Nick Black finished with a pair of catches for 34 yards, Brown had two for 25, and Swenson hauled in a bomb that covered

Henrietta committed three turnovers, a pair of interceptions, one each by Black and Yeager, and a fumble that was covered by Brandon Holley.
