Chamber elects officers; hears Cryovac report

New officers for 1997 were elected and a progress report made on the community's largest employer, during the annual all-membership luncheon held Monday by the Chamber of Commerce.

Dale Cox was elected president, Jeff Nolen, first vice president, and Lesa Bushfield, second vice president.

Directors elected for three-year terms were Cox, Larry Dutton, Bob Hamilton, Janice Newman, O.N. Newman, Robert Palmer, Guy Traylor and Kenneth Via.

Officers elected will be installed at the Chamber's annual banquet in January.

Cox has served previously as president. He also will fulfill the unexpired term of Dr. Derrell Mon-

day, who resigned last month when he moved to Pampa.

"If you want to work with me and help the community grow, then I'll be happy to serve as president," Cox told the audience following the election.

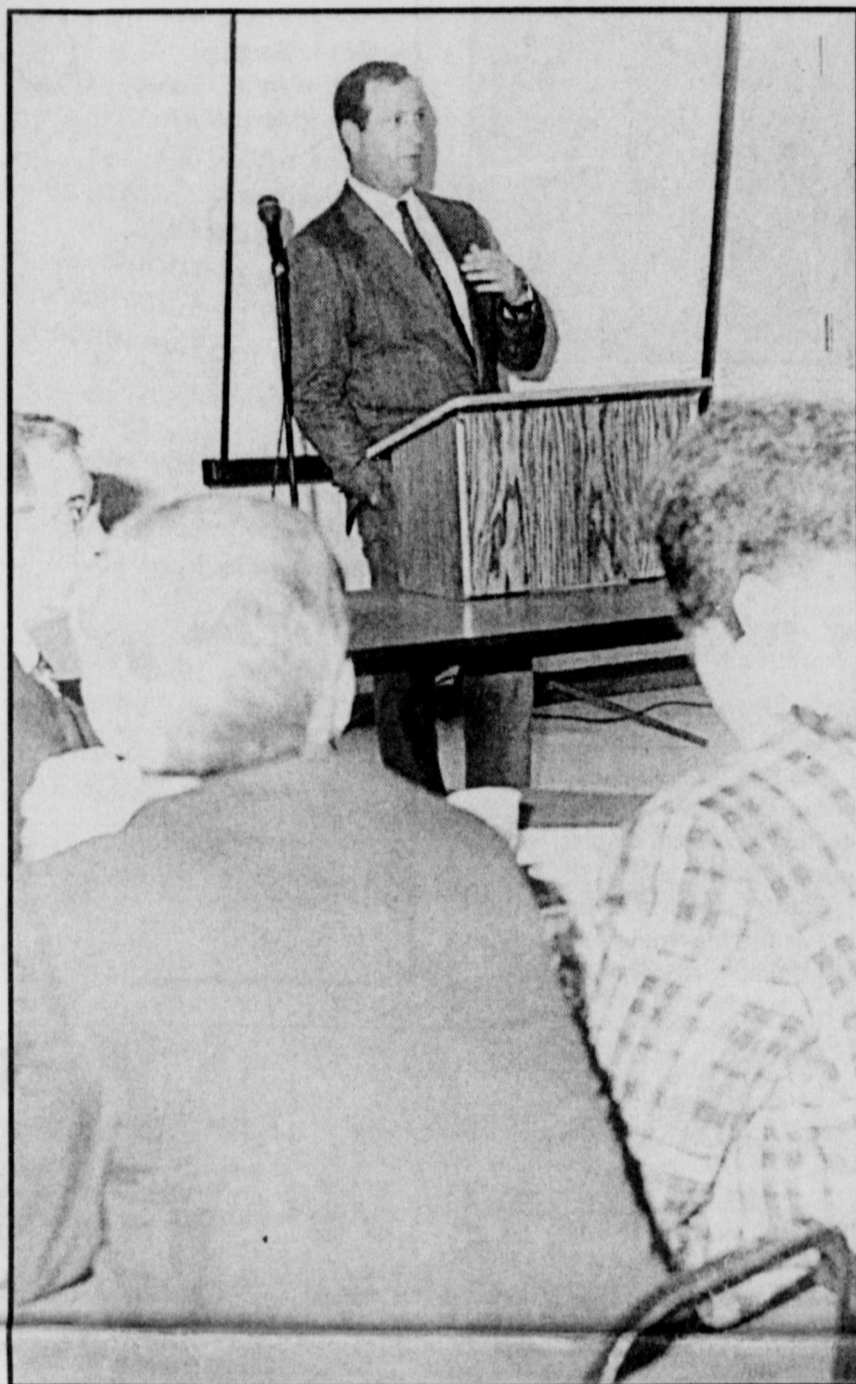
Frank Terlizzi, manager of the Cryovac plant, was the guest speaker for the event.

He reported the plant, located on the southwest edge of the city, currently has 805 employees, and possibly will reach 1,000 within the next two years.

The percentage of employees who reside in Iowa Park is 35, Terlizzi said.

Average age of the 805 employ-

Council discusses golf course issue

About all that resulted from a work session of the city council Monday night, concerning prospects of obtaining a golf course here, was a pledge to continue the effort.

Mayor Tim Hunter said the firm, National Links of America, which had approached the council with alternative methods of financing the development of a course, actually has not completed a course in Texas.

"McAllen is considering the same company's proposal," said

Hunter, "but they said they were waiting to see how we do."

All the council except Mark Raby and Tracy Fears were present for the session, as were five interested residents who wanted to observe.

Alderman Bob Hamilton suggested that the city might make contact with the city of Azle, to learn how that community financed the construction of Cross Timbers

Credit card scam extremely costly to local business

An extraordinary credit card scam has cost an Iowa Park florist and another in Wichita Falls more than \$2,000, according to Iowa Park police.

"The flower fraud," as Detective Lynn Collins has labeled it, began to unfold here Monday, and is now the subject of intensive investigation.

The local florist was called long distance three times by a man who identified himself and explained he operated an advertising agency in Hollywood, Calif.

The caller ordered an expensive box of flowers, and said he also wanted five \$100 bills put inside the card. The box was to be delivered to a hotel in Wichita Falls.

All this was to be put on the man's credit card, which he gave the number over the telephone.

In the meantime, the same man had called the Wichita Falls hotel, making a reservation for his alleged representative, also using the same credit card number.

In the early evening, the man would call the hotel, explain that his representative would not be there, and said he would have a limousine pick up the flower box.

And, as all this was going on, the man called the limousine company, giving them instructions to pick up the box of flowers, keep the flowers and wire the money to him in Hollywood.

The local florist went through this process twice, believing all along that the credit card number being used was valid.

But when the man called a third time, and attempted to give another card after a check on the previously-

used number was reported not valid anymore, the florist called local police.

And during the investigation, it was determined at least one other florist, located in Wichita Falls, had also been hit by the same scam.

The actual owners of the two different card numbers reside in Virginia and New York, police learned.

Another scam, of sorts, was discovered, when the IHS nursing home reported \$281 in long distance telephone calls had been charged to their number.

Upon investigation, it was determined someone had reportedly made three different calls to a 1-900 sex phone number from a pay phone located at another local business.

The caller paid to get the operator, and then gave the number of the business to receive the charges. Police continue investigating that case, which was reported Thursday.

In other cases worked during the past week by local police, a man was arrested for shoplifting at Wal-Mart, after walking into the store bare-headed and attempting to leave wearing a western hat valued at \$21.96.

Felipe Gomez Alvarez, 64, was arrested on a charge of theft under \$50. He paid a fine of \$83.50 and was issued a criminal trespass warning to not enter the business again, according to the police blotter.

Cindy Black Clyburn, 24, was taken into custody Monday after police had been called to escort her from a local business.

Trustees recognize Hawk Band members

High school band members were individually recognized at a meeting of the Iowa Park school board Thursday night.

The junior high school library was packed with band students, parents, school personnel and others for the presentation of certificates to each member of the "Mean Green Marching Machine" band that placed fourth in the State 3-A Marching Contest on Nov. 4.

Band members were called up individually and presented with a certificate by board president Keith Fisher. The band directors, Greg Miller, Ed Hefti, and Norene Tillman, were introduced and received a hearty ovation from the large crowd.

It was pointed out that this is the 15th year in a row the band has received a Division One rating in the District UIL Marching Contest; the band has received 13 sweepstakes awards (marching and concert) in a row; and this is the second time it has gone to the state contest.

Following the awards presentation, band members, at the request of Superintendent Mike Caplinger, entertained the audience with a demonstration of the popular Macarena dance.

During the business portion of the meeting, Dr. Raymond Etheridge, a consultant with Michael W. Marrs Architects, Inc., spoke to the board members on services offered by his firm. He also reviewed the educational facilities they have completed at a relatively low cost per square foot.

In order to look at options to reduce building or renovation costs, the trustees are considering visiting some of the projects Marrs, Inc. has completed around the state.

In his report on compliance with America Disabilities Act (A.D.A.), Assistant Superintendent Robert

Palmer said the project is 75-80 percent complete.

A representative from the Office of Civil Rights in Dallas visited the local campuses recently and approved the district's progress on the initial transition plan and added some additional items. The district has a January, 1997 deadline for completion, and to be in compliance.

Palmer said the junior high gym is the only possible non-completion he could see, but thought it would be acceptable if significant work had been done by January.

Renovations at the gym will include a portable lift for the stairs and replacing the concession stand with restrooms.

Trustees approved the plan for improvements at the gym, with the cost estimated to be \$18,273.

In other action, the board approved:

- * the second reading: Iowa Park CISD Policies Update 52;
- * the audit report by Mathis, West, Huffines & Co.; and
- * the Superintendent Job Description/Appraisal Instrument.

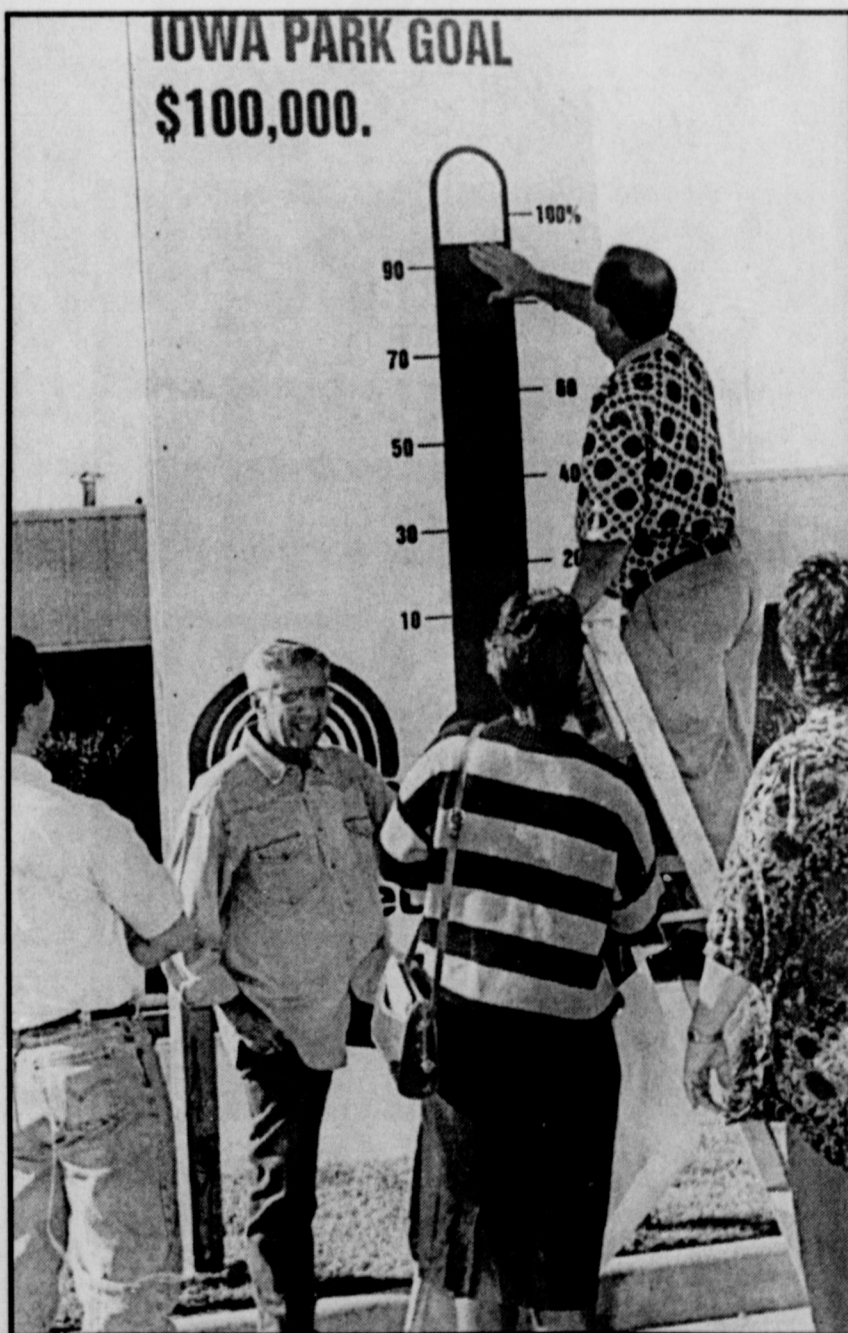
Supt. Caplinger gave a brief report to trustees on the first Facilities Task Force meeting, which took place on Nov. 7, with 35 people attending.

He said the next meeting is scheduled for Nov. 21, in the junior high library.

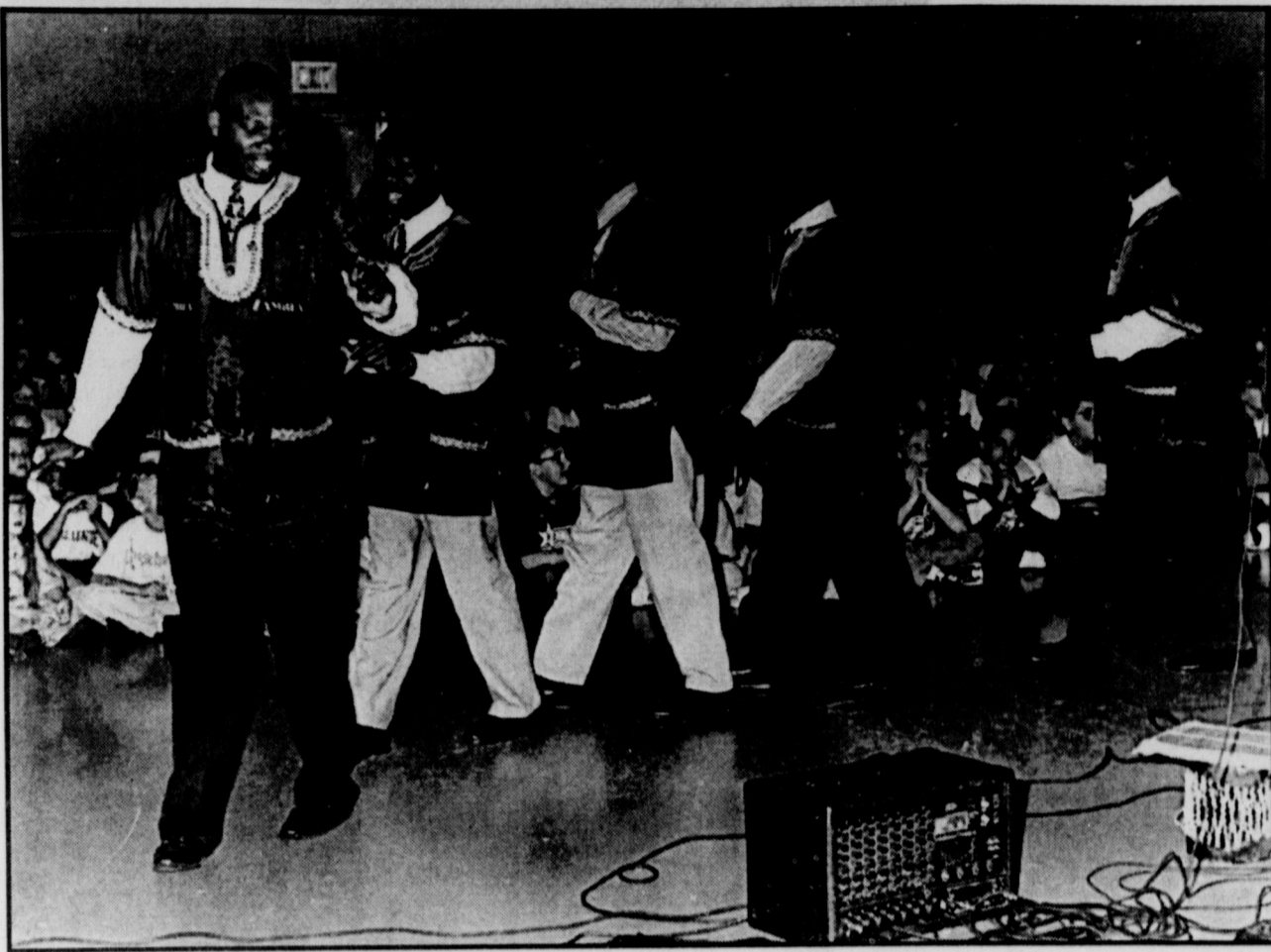
Board Members to meet with Facility Task Force

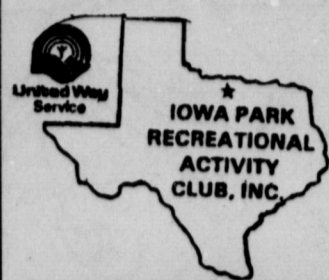

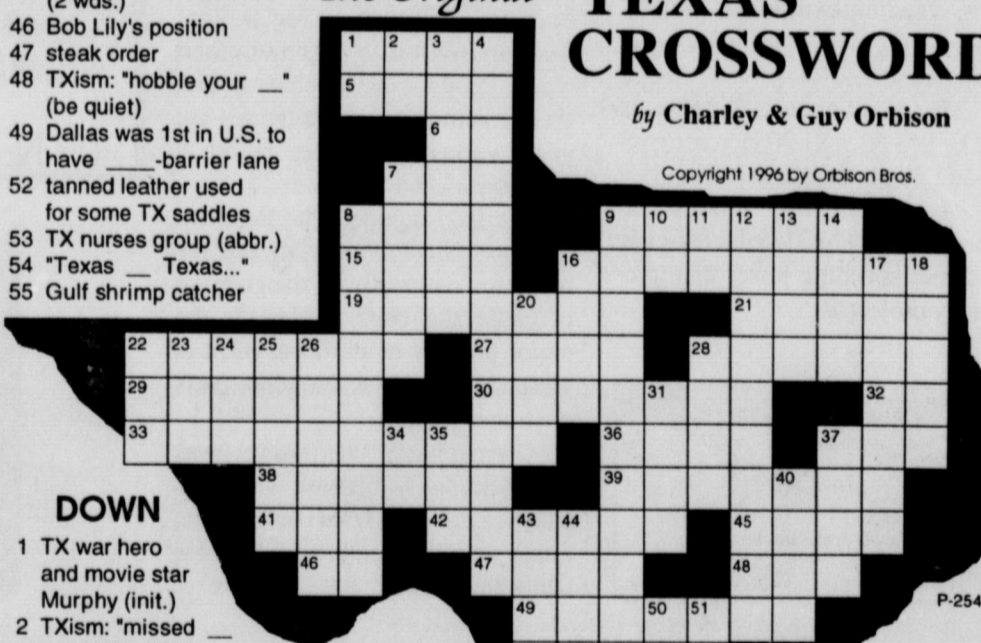

As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



The frequency increases annually, of people gawking or commenting when they see the camera I use for pictures I take for the paper.

"Gosh, where'd you get a camera like that?"

"Hey, that thing really is old, isn't it?"

"Why don't you use a REAL camera?"

And not all those who make the comments are teenagers, either.

Well, folks who don't know, I use a twin-reflex camera that shoots 120mm film. And I fully realize it is not the same shape as all the more-commonly-seen 35mm film cameras in use today.

I choose to use the 120-film camera for a number of reasons.

First of all, in order to change to 35, I would have to replace all my darkroom equipment used to process the film and print photos.

Secondly, I would have to discard two perfectly good cameras so I could buy a new camera which uses 35mm film.

Thirdly, I found years ago that I could work better with 120-size film than 35, because of the difference in size. My eyesight isn't what it was in years past.

And, fourthly, I've been waiting more than five years to change cameras. But when I do, it will be one of the digital cameras which do not require film, chemicals, or anything

having to do with a darkroom. They process directly into computers and then to printers.

No, these 120 cameras I use -- and by the way I purchased this latest pair only about 10 or 12 years ago -- aren't as large as the ones I originally used.

My first work with newspapers included the use of a 4x5 Speed Graphic camera. That camera used a sheet of film that was four inches by five inches in size.

It was heavy, and required much greater knowledge of photography than do these automatic cameras of today.

And that was 40 years ago.

I used a 35mm camera for about a year after that, and even a Poloroid for a brief period. But primarily, the 120 has been the film and camera of my choice the past 35 years.

I first read of the digital camera development some five years ago, and made up my mind that was the way I would turn, whenever they were made available and at a reasonable price.

Associated Press and Kodak announced the development of a fine digital camera, one any newspaper photographer could use and be proud of, a little over a year ago.

But there was a problem. That particular camera, at that time, cost a little over \$50,000!

Good gosh, that single piece of equipment would cost more than all

the cameras, computers, printers, darkroom equipment and desks we have here at the office.

So I did what I thought I needed to do.

I ordered another case of 120 film, a couple of boxes of print paper and chemicals.

And I decided to wait until the camera I can afford, and want to use, hits the market.

But until then, I'll keep lugging this "antiquated" piece of equipment with me whenever I'm on a photo assignment.

Course, which is one of the newest such facilities in the state.

ees is 37; 19 percent are female, 17 percent minority, and the turnover rate of employment is 4.1 percent.

The annual payroll of the local plant is \$32.9-million.

Cryovac has established a minimum education requirement as being a high school graduate, or equivalent.

"We're the best-run plant the company has, because of the employees, not the management, and we're the second-largest plant in the company," said Terlizzi.

The manager emphasized the importance of quality of life, in order for employees to be happy in their work. People who are happy with their community and activities are good workers when they report to their jobs.

Terlizzi quipped that the plant remains extremely busy, despite the reduction nationally in slaughtering of cattle and hogs, explaining the major product of the local plant is plastic bags in which the animal parts are transported.

He explained that business was good, primarily because the company was taking it from competition, rather than the numbers of animals being slaughtered.

MEDICARE COSTS INCREASE FOR 1997

The 1997 increases in the hospital costs payable by Medicare beneficiaries -- the Part A hospital insurance deductible and the Part B medical insurance premium -- were announced this month.

The deductible and the premium are recalculated each year to reflect changes in the costs of health care or changes in Medicare law.

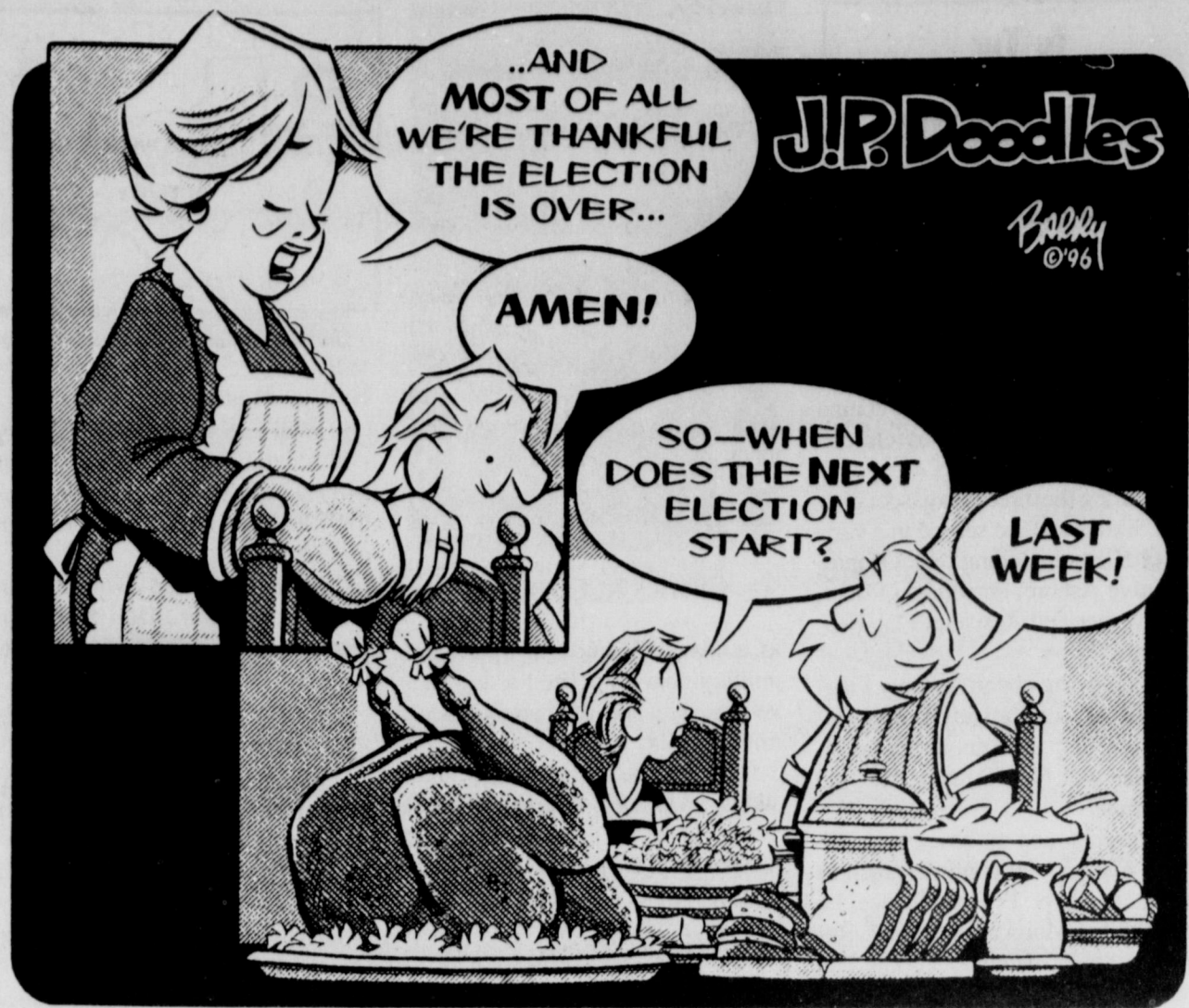
The Part A deductible for beneficiaries admitted to hospitals in 1997 will be \$760, an increase of \$24 over this year's \$736.

The monthly Part B premium will be \$43.80, a \$1.30 increase over the \$42.50 per month in 1996.

These relatively modest increases for 1997 reflect increases in Medicare spending lower than previously projected.

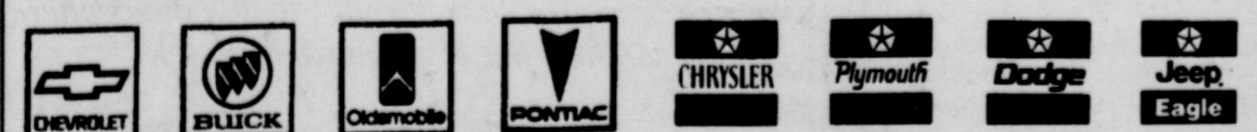

Water conservation is beauty of Xeriscaping

Setting out flowers and other flora in the heat of summer is not such a hot idea, but you can use a Xeriscaping technique any time of the year to prepare your yard for planting--and save water. No matter what the season or where you live, reducing the turf area of your lawn can drastically cut your outdoor watering needs.

"The summer is a good time to plan for fall and spring planting," said Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission compost specialist Bill Carter. "By reducing the turf area of your lawn in the summer, you can cut back on watering almost immediately--which is especially important with the drought--and make way for native plants and mulches that are just as attractive as a thick, lush lawn."

It's estimated that half the water used by homeowners goes to the landscape. By implementing the following Xeriscaping technique, you can drastically reduce your outdoor watering needs and, once you're finished, spend more time enjoying the beauty of your lawn and less time mowing.

1) Scalp the area you want to Xeriscape by going over it with your mower on the lowest blade setting. Lop off what's left of the grass blades with a string edger. Throw the clippings in your compost pile.

2) Cover the scalped area with a layer of mature compost and another

layer of manure.

3) Grab a stack of newspapers from your recycling bin and spread a layer about 15 pages thick onto the manure. This kills most grasses. Some hardy grasses like Bermuda have to be rooted out. They can survive until the paper decomposes and grow through eight or more inches of mulch.

4) Spread a healthy layer of mulch onto the newspaper. Avoid walking on it and puncturing the newspaper layer.

5) Relax for a month or so until the time is right to set out your plants. If you're not interested in planting, you can leave the area covered with mulch year-round.

6) When you're ready to plant in the fall or spring, pin-point the spots where you want your plants to go and scrape back the mulch to the newspaper layer. Be sure to select low water-demand plants. Native or adapted plants generally do better than those brought in from other areas.

7) Slice an "X" into the newspaper, dig an appropriately sized hole, and add water to the plant.

8) Return the soil to the plant base and add more water. For larger plants, shrubs and trees:

Mix the soil you removed with half that amount of compost. Use the mixture to fill in around the plant's roots or root ball. Dig any of the leftover mixture into the top 2 inches

of soil surrounding the plant and add more water. To facilitate root growth, be sure to loosen the soil as far as the plant's "drip line" (the outer reach of its branches) and as deep as the plant's hole.

Replace the newspaper and mulch cover and add a raised ring of mulch that peaks just outside the drip line. Do not pile mulch against the plant's trunk or stem.

9) Water periodically according to your plants' needs. Whatever goes in the ground, you won't be watering near as much as you would a thirsty turf grass.

10) Enjoy lower water bills, less mowing and a beautifully Xeriscaped yard.

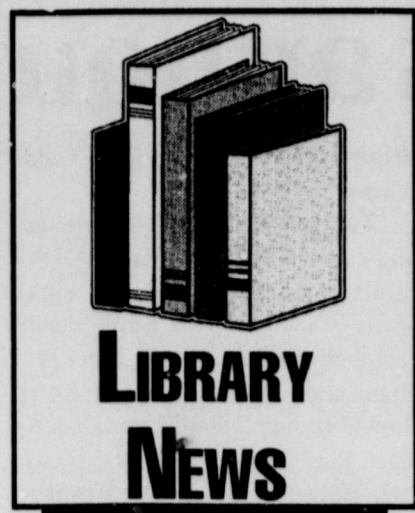

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DESPITE THE HAWKS' GOAL LINE STAND, WYLIE SCORED ITS TOUCHDOWN

Hawks fall in Bi-District

Iowa Park's 1996 season came to an end Friday night at Clark Field in Fort Worth as the Hawks never seemed to get on track, losing 21-6 to Abilene Wylie.

The Hawks finish the season with an 8-3 mark while the Bulldogs remained unbeaten at 11-0 and will advance to play Aledo in the Area round of the playoffs.

The Vernon Lions, the No. 1 ranked team in Class 3A, also won and will advance to play Bridgeport Friday night in Graham.

Iowa Park knew coming into the Wylie game that it wasn't going to be easy to stop the balanced attack of the Bulldogs, and the Hawks also knew that it would take one of their best games of the season to advance.

Neither of the two happened as Wylie took the opening kickoff and marched 81 yards in 15 plays to take a 6-0 lead with 5:55 left in the first quarter. Fullback F. Paul Briscoe carried the ball over on a fourth-and-goal from the one after the Hawk defense had held three times from inside their own five-yard line.

On the Hawks' first possession of the game, quarterback Todd Yeager found a nice hole and picked up nine yards before he fumbled the ball. Shawn Fulfer was in the right spot and recovered to keep the ball in Iowa Park's hands. But on the next play, Fulfer coughed the ball up and this time the Hawks couldn't make the recovery, turning it over to Wylie at the Hawk 39.

Iowa Park's defense came up big as the Hawks held the Bulldogs on downs when Brandon Holley and Jeremiah Love stuffed Jacob Pruitt on a fourth-and-two play from the Iowa Park 30.

That seemed to spark the Hawks' offense as Iowa Park got a pair of big runs from Tommy Duerson and Yeager to move the ball to the Bulldog 22. Duerson ripped off a 24-yarder to move the ball to the Wylie 48, then Yeager rambled 26 yards on a keeper to put the Hawks in striking distance.

But the drive stalled from that point as Iowa Park couldn't get closer than the 19 and on fourth-and-nine, Yeager was sacked for a 9-yard loss turning the ball back over to the Bulldogs at the Iowa Park 30.

But for the second time in a row, the Hawk defense came up with a big play to keep the score 7-0. Yeager intercepted Brady Hall's pass at the Iowa Park 23 with 8:23 left in the first half, which ended an 11-play drive for Wylie.

Iowa Park went four and out on its next possession, punting the ball back to the Bulldogs at the 45.

Wylie made the score 14-0 with 1:36 left in the half when Hall scored from 1-yard out on a fourth-and-goal play after the Hawks had held the Bulldogs three times from inside the five for the second time in the game.

Iowa Park took the second-half kickoff and marched to the Wylie 25 before turning the ball over on downs. Big plays in the drive included a 14-yard run by Brandon Brown and a pair of 10-yard runs by Fulfer.

Wylie took over and moved the ball to the Iowa Park 11 with 5:54 left in the third, with most of the yardage coming on a 42-yard completion from Todd Barnett from Hall. Iowa Park's defense stiffened and forced the Bulldogs to try a 29-yard field goal. Just when the Hawks appeared to have caught a break when the snap bounced back to the holder, Barnett scooped up the ball and outran the Hawk defense to the end zone for a touchdown to give his team a 21-0 lead.

Iowa Park prevented the shutout when Yeager hooked up with Nick Black on a 75-yard bomb with 1:53 left in the game. Black made a nice catch of a ball, which had been tipped, and outran everyone to the end zone for the score to make the final 21-6.
