FAST ACTION by the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department saved this residence Friday evening at 905 East Ruby, the home of Mrs. Betty Merriman. Damage to the structure's interior was considered minimal, though the automobile in the carport

was a total loss. Fireman Randy Fulbright was treated for heat exhaustion, and a citizen, Chris Cline, was slightly injured when hit by a fire hose as he was assisting firemen battle the blaze.

Former city worker sentenced in court

A former City of Iowa Park employee pled guilty in 78th District court Friday to a charge of Misapplication of Fiduciary Funds.

Tammy Lynn Coats, 37, was sentenced to two years in jail and probation five years, along with making full restitution to the city and also paying all probation fees.

Coats, who had worked the past five years as a clerk in city hall, reportedly had already made full restitution to the city of the \$21,396 she admitted as having taken from utility payments.

Under Texas law, Coats will not have to serve any jail time, unless she violates the terms of her probation period, according to Assistant District Attorney Rick Mahler, who prosecuted the case.

Though she has repaid the city for all funds she allegedly took, she is still liable to repay the city \$4,000, which was the cost of an accounting firm which audited the records.

She was fired from her job after

the shortage was determined and records audited.

Repayment will be at a rate of \$67.52 per month to the city, and that does not include the \$40 monthly fee to the probation department.

Coats admitted her guilt when she took the witness stand in court. She admitted her guilt and requested deferred adjudication probation. She had waived a reading of the indictment, as well forgoing a trial by jury.

City Administrator Mike Price was then called to the witness stand, and Judge Keith Nelson asked him if he had any problem with her request.

Price responded that he opposed the request, explaining, "I would be denied to tell any future employer of information about what she did."

A person's record is wiped clean following a period of deferred adjudication, and would not reflect a conviction. In that case, Price could not legally tell any prospective employer of the charge, should he be asked.

Following all testimony, Judge Nelson pointed out that when money is paid (to a city employee), it becomes government funds.

"I think the witness is old enough to know better," Nelson said just before announcing the sentence.

Accompanying Price to the trial were Deena Perry and Chris Cline. Collins, who was not called for any testimony.

JULY 4TH PERIOD ONLY

Council okays fireworks at lake

Residents can set off their July 4th fireworks through next week at Lake Iowa Park, but that's the only place within the city limits where it is allowed -- at any time.

During its regularly-scheduled business meeting Monday night, the city council approved a resolution authorizing fireworks at the lake, beginning June 24, through July 5.

Other than during that designated time period and location, it is against city ordinance to set off fireworks of any kind within the city limits, and a hefty fine is levied for any violation.

Numerous extra trash containers are being placed at the lake area by the city, in hopes that celebrators will clean up their mess when finished, thus saving taxpayer expense when employees have to do the chore.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business Monday night, the council approved an agreement with the James V. Allred Correctional Facility to provide supplemental fire protection, approved the Nortex 9-1-1 Communications District budget for the next year, authorized the city administrator to advertise for bids to sell two tracts of land, and discussed plans for a sewer lift station on Bell Road.

Also during the general discus-

sion period, Administrator Mike Price announced that Mike Dozier had been promoted to the position of Operations Lieutenant/Detective of the police department, filling a position vacated when Lynn Collins was promoted to Chief of Police.

Council members were told that, because of the construction and materials used to build the prison, only three or four structures on the grounds were subject to ever catching afire.

The parcels of land to be offered through a sealed bid process include a 250x142-foot tract in the floorway on Bell Road, and a 100x142-foot tract at Jackson and Jefferson.

With the installation of a sewer

lift station on Bell Road, near the East Texas intersection, several homes already in the area which do not now receive sewer service could be served, and future development also, aldermen were told.

The early estimate of the installation was said to be \$144,220, including all related costs. However, Mayor Tim Hunter said he felt the estimates were higher than the city would receive through the bidding process.

Council members will meet next Monday, continuing their work on the 1998-99 budget. That meeting is to get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Encouraging attendance purpose of Chamber act

The by-laws of the Chamber of Commerce were amended during Monday's regular meeting of the board of directors with the aim of encouraging more regular participation by members of the board of directors.

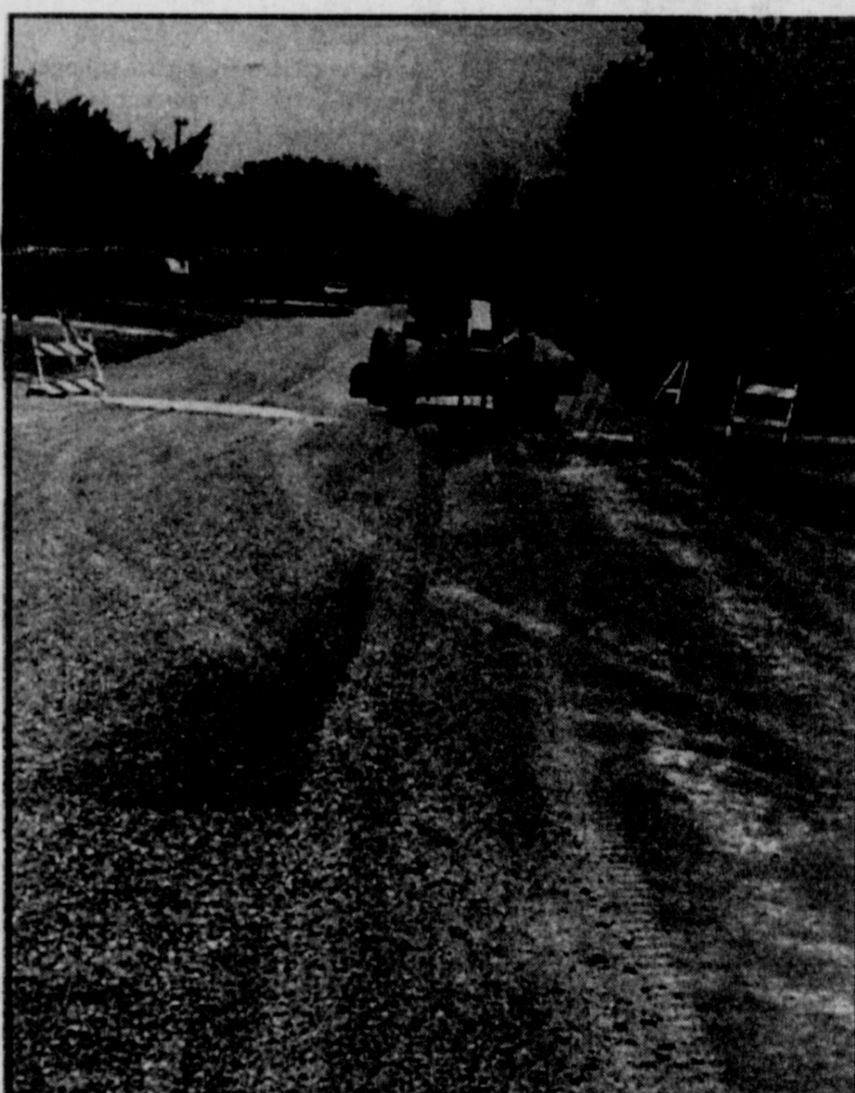
Concern has been expressed at monthly meetings over the past couple

Rehab Center gives vital assistance to premature boy

Life changes -- and sometimes with such speed and trauma that it touches every aspect of our lives. Looking forward to the birth of a child, making special plans, and thinking that all is well was the case of Lisa and Brad Wynn, as they awaited the birth of their son. Their older son, Keith, also held some excitement in anticipating the birth of a new sibling... but there were still three and a half months to go before the big event.

On October 11, 1996, little Ryan Wynn, within only a 45-minute time frame, entered the world. Weighing in at one pound, 13 ounces, he was three and a half months premature. That was the change that suddenly changed the expected to the unexpected, the feelings of anticipation into feelings of fear and concern. Born in a local hospital, the attending physician immediately made arrangements for the baby to be care-lifted to Cook's Children's Hospital in Fort Worth. The prognosis wasn't good; Ryan was not expected to live.

The circumstances threw Lisa and Brad's lives into the need for major adjustments. Even though the baby's life remained questionable for days, which grew into weeks, each day gave more hope. Torn between the responsibilities of home and job here, the family traveled back and forth, with Lisa staying in the Ronald McDonald House a portion of the time. She looks back on that time with only praise for the local medical staff, Cook's staff, and the helpful accommodations at RMH.

It was Christmas Eve with the big and wonderful Christmas surprise, for family and friends, being the homecoming of Little Ryan -- after two and a half months at Cook's. After a time of celebration and thanksgiving, the family started dealing with a new challenge. The doctors assessed Ryan's development as being about three months behind his age.

On August 22, 1997, Ryan's physician referred him to North Texas Rehabilitation Center. Entering the Early Childhood Intervention (ECI)

Program, he began by receiving a complete evaluation of his development, followed by weekly home visits by the staff from the Center.

"The family is wonderful with Ryan; they all work with him. Every week after we finish his therapy, we encourage them to work with him in certain ways -- and when we return the following week, the first thing we see is the improvement which has come through the family's efforts," states Deena Perry, a teacher on his team from the Center.

Because Ryan adores his big brother, "He gets a lot of exercise just following Keith around," reports Lisa. Also, Keith encourages Ryan to "play Nintendo," and the staff states that the exercise holds benefits for the development. "We see the main benefit being the fact that Ryan is imitating," says Perry.

The Center's outreach program to 10 counties not only provides the benefit of therapy and services in the child's natural environment, but when special considerations are needed, the therapists make those available. Ryan's mom worked for about two months after he had reached a certain development, so arrangements were made for the Center staff to go to the home at 5:30 p.m. Family education and improvement in the treatment is considered a major link in the success.

Today, little 20-month-old Ryan Wynn runs everywhere, laughs with pure joy, and has very little work ahead of him before he will be discharged with the status of being within the range of normal development.

Ryan Wynn is only one of about 130 infants under three years of age who are present recipients of the Early Childhood Intervention Program offered through North Texas Rehabilitation Center. "The story of this child's experience is a strong testimony of what early intervention can achieve when there is a developmental problem -- regardless of the cause,"

stated Charlcie Flinn, Supervisor of the ECI Program. "We encourage parents to call the Center and seek professional help if they have any concern about their baby's development," said Flinn.

The ECI Program is offered without charge. Early developmental screening is provided, and for those who show a need, a treatment is implemented. Parents are encouraged to call North Texas Rehabilitation Center and speak to a therapist about developmental concerns in their child at 322-0771.

Local Rotarians attend national convention

Dr. and Mrs. Erwin Soell, Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Todd, and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Johnson, representing the Rotary Club of Iowa Park, were among 19,000 Rotarians and guests from 116 countries, gathered June 14 thru 17, in Indianapolis, Ind. for Rotary International's 89th annual convention.

Participants focused on literacy, poverty and hunger, international humanitarian projects, exchange programs and planning for Rotary's future through plenary sessions, workshops and panel discussions.

Dr. Catherine Hamlin, an Australian surgeon who has worked in Ethiopia 40 years, accepted the Rotary Award for World Understanding, the organization's highest honor. Since opening the Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital with her late husband Reginald in 1975, Hamlin has restored dignity and health to more than 17,000 Ethiopian women, and the thousands of children born to

them, through corrective surgery for "fistulas" or holes in the birth canal.

Journalists from CNN, NBC Nightly News, Voice of America, L.A. Times and ECO Televisa discussed news media trends, why the coverage of "good news" often seems difficult to obtain, and what it takes for a story to make it into the headlines.

In a community beautification effort, more than 1,500 Rotarians attending the convention planted 700 trees, 100 shrubs and 2,000 perennials throughout Indianapolis in one day.

The project, stretching 3.5 miles and covering some 50 city blocks, provided a tangible example of Rotary's Preserve Planet Earth program and honored the city for hosting the convention.

Rotary International began in 1905 in Chicago. Today Rotary has more than 28,000 clubs with 1.2 million members in 159 countries.

VRJC adding new program

Formal approval of a physical therapist expansion program to be offered at VRJC through a distance learning arrangement with Amarillo College has been received from the commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education of the American Physical Therapy Association.

The program will be offered in the fall with most of the courses being taught by Amarillo College instructors via interactive video, with Amarillo and VRJC students participating in learning centers on the two campuses.

The accreditation climaxes a six-month joint effort by the two colleges to establish the program and an even longer quest for VRJC to enter physical therapist training. The program was first proposed by Dr. Jerry Whitt, former dean of VRJC at

Wichita Falls, who developed a program for Wichita Falls, but was unable to obtain start-up cost.

VRJC then received a \$40,000 grant from Wright Brand Foods to establish a distance learning facility on the Vernon campus, which was matched with a \$37,000 grant from the Southwest Center for Advanced Technical Education.

With interactive video capabilities in place, VRJC officials contacted Amarillo College concerning a joint teaching arrangement with the lecture portion of the program to come from Amarillo and a lab to be established in Vernon.

An E. Paul and Helen Buck Waggoner, Inc. Foundation grant of \$30,000 was provided to supply equipment for the new lab.

The entire program takes two years to complete, and graduates must pass a state licensure exam.

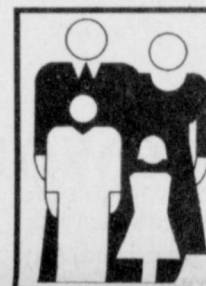
Announce engagement

Hey, folks, make a lot of people happy, especially a particular group of guys, and be careful during the next week with your fireworks.

It's hard to believe that so many people are so thoughtless that they figure any place they can park on a country road to set off their fireworks is the place to do it.

They've done it every year I've been around here. Heck, a country road is a public thoroughfare, and they won't be upsetting anyone with

the noise. And, certainly, firecrackers and roman candles are safe -- no one would sell them if they weren't.

Fact is, many folks who live in a city just don't understand what can happen in the country. They leave their home with all the green and growing lawns, go out to the wide open spaces, and do their thing.

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Q. I live in the Wichita Falls area. I have two dogs and I am already having big problems with ticks. What can I use on the yard and on my animals for control of the ticks?

A. Tick infestations have been heavy this spring in some areas of the county. To adequately get control of these pests you will have to treat the lawn areas where your dogs reside and treat the animals as well.

Treat lawn areas in the mid-morning for best results. This time frame is best because ticks are emerging from protection to find a host. Sunny mornings bring out the largest populations of ticks, therefore, a sunny morning is ideal for yard area treatments.

Yard area treatments include the application of Dursban, Diazinon, Yardex, among other labeled control products.

On-animal treatments will require the use of a control product labeled for use on your particular pet. One of the most effective on-animal treatments available is Frontline (fipronil). This product has given excellent control of both fleas and ticks for up to one month.

It is easy to apply to pets as a spot-on type of application. It also remains on the pet even if the animal goes into water or is bathed. Frontline is available through veterinarian clinics.

It appears that 1998 may be a year for severe insect problems including fleas and ticks. Take action now to protect your pets.

Q. I live in the Wichita County area and would like to know if I can get St. Augustine from seed as opposed to using sod or plugs?

A. St. Augustine is not available as seed. I believe that there may be difficulties in seed collection procedures or the plant may not produce abundant amounts of seed. I have only seen St. Augustine seed one time. The seed was from a Florida origin. Your best bet is to use the readily available sod or plugs from local nurseries.

Q. I live in Wichita Falls and have several peach trees in my yard. The leaves are curled up and purplish colored. What has caused this problem? Could this be herbicide damage?

A. It is very doubtful that this is any type of hormone herbicide spray, although, the leaf curling does resemble that kind of damage. The problem is a disease known as peach leaf curl. This bacterial disease distorts leaves and looks alarming, however, no major tree damage will result. The key time to control peach leaf curl is at leaf drop in the fall of the year. Use a copper fungicide for the application.

Q. We have a very large pine tree in Wichita Falls. Some people have told us that this may be the largest pine in the city. Unfortunately, the tree was struck by lightning during last weekend's severe storms. What kind of damage can we expect on our tree? What can we do to help the tree survive?

A. Lightning strikes can cause a wide variation of tree damage. If the

trunk was actually split by the lightning then the damage is most likely serious. If only the bark was blown off of the tree on one side then the tree may very well pull through.

You can take a heavy knife or chisel and clean and remove any very loose bark on the tree. Carefully examine the tree to make sure that removal is not required to prevent a severely damaged tree from falling onto your house, etc.

You may even want to contact a professional tree care company to examine the pine. For the record, pines are one of the trees that are more likely to be hit by lightning during storms.
