## Retiring Cryovac president honored

Iowa Park and area residents attended a luncheon Wednesday in honor of Bill Sturgis, who is retiring Packaging World-Wide.

Sturgis has been closely associated with the lowa Park facility since the days the company was wooed to locate here by the Iowa Park Industrial Development Corporation. He told the group, which in-
cluded numerous executives of Cryovac, that he had never had moment's regret that Iowa Park had been chosen for the new plant. His successor, Len Byrne, introduced to those who attended the event, which was held at the Wichita Falls Country Club

Among the Iowa Park delega-
tion were Wayne House, Dale Cox,
Mike Caplinger, Mike Price and Bob Mike Capling
Hamilton.

House presented Sturgis a gift from the IDC, a Mowrey black powder gun, as a gift from the community.

During the presentation, he recalled Sturgis' comment about how he would like such a gift, when he was on hand for a similar presenta-
tion toformer Cryovac president Miller.

During House's comments, he said nothing has happened in Iowa Park during the past 55 years that was more posituve than Cryovac's deci-
sion to build its plant here.
Byme told the audience that his
delegation had another reason to be in the area. That was to recognize the improvement in safety on the job The plant was recognized for having a 29 percent reduction in injuries during the past year, and that was a period following the previous year when the reduction had already been cut some 50 percent. Another gift, a lead crystal cowboy boot, also was presented to
Sturgis, from the Wichita Falls Board of Commerce and Industry.

Sturgis, 62 , will retire at the end of March after 36 years with the company.

Shot of alcohol effective in helping heart condition

Timothy Erwin is an athlete and a coach in good physical condition.
He was surprised to discover a heart defect left him out of breath after doing simple tasks like climbing stairs. Not quite as shocked, however, condition could possibly be cured by a shot of alcohol.

Nothing that would make him intoxicated, mind you -- it's a new treatment for an inherited and potentially fatal heart condition that kills hundreds of young people every year. The experimentar treatment is being Houston, and Erwoin receive it.

Doctors inject a small amount of pure alcohol into blood vessels near by an overgrown mymptoms caused heart's pumping chambers.

Erwin, 38, suffers from hypertrophic obstructive cardiomyopathy. This genetic disorder causes the sep tum, a muscle dividing the right and overgrown. Because of the extra muscle, the heart works harder and pumps blood too fast. The bulging musclealsoblocks normal blood flow to the rest of the body.
The new procedure involves a simple injection of 100 percent alcohol (ethanol) to the overgrown tissue, which causes cells in the excess muscle to die and shrink. To do this,
doctorsmustsend a catheter into doccorsmustsend a catheere inno blood
vessels that feed the offending tissue. They then inject the ethanol into these selected blood vessels.
Erwin is the first patient in the United States to receive this treatment. It was developed two years ago by Dr. Ulrich Sigwart, chief of Invasive Cardiology at the Roya Brompton Hospital in London Erwin's tew to Houston to observ
"We hope this treatment will ventually be used instead of opencorrects the heart's rhythm," said Sigwart. "In England, we have successfully performed the treatment in 30 people, ranging in age from 14 years old to 80 years old. It's a nice way to avoid major heart surgery." logist at Methodist and Baylor Co lege of Medicine, performed the procedure on Erwin. He said that not every patient with this condition will qualify for the new procedure.
"It will work only for people whose extra heart tissue is confined to the septum," he said. "And of course the patient
symptoms."

Although doctors have used the rocedure in around 100 patients in Britain and Germany, Methodist is the only center in the United States that can offer it at this time. Patients who receive the treatment in Houston will be monitored for at least two and half years to measure the effective ness of the treatment.
People who have hypertrophic obstructive cardiomyopathy often
have very few symptoms. They can quickly become breathless with minimal exertion, and could have hest pains or even fainting spells.

Dr. Robert Roberts, chief of Cardiology at Methodist and Baylor College of Medicine, said this condition is most often seen in young athletes. "People with this condition make very good athletes, because the

States. Most of them die while play ing football, basketball or other physically demanding sports. Occasionally a professional player will die suddenly, and Roberts said the cause is almost always obstructive cardiomyopathy.

He added that the condition becomes particularly dangerous when becomedehydrated. "That's whymore of these deaths occur in a sport such as football, and in the Southern region of the country," he said. "Taking in a lot of fluids while playing in a sport is important for other aspects of health, but for people who do not
know they have thiscondition itcould know they have th
