Election, contracts lead board agenda

Consideration of contracts of key administrators, calling a trustee election, and a report from Supt. Mike Caplinger on how Governor Bush's tax plan might affect needs in the school district are just a few of the agenda items listed for tonight's meeting of the Iowa Park School Board.

The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Junior High School Library.

Contracts for principals, assistant principals, athletic director, counselors and tax collector will be considered as they always are during the February meeting.

Subject to approval by the board, May 3 will be the date set for the trustee election. They will also designate polling places and appoint election judges.

Trustees whose terms are due to expire are Martha Dudley, Larry Dutton, and Bert Williamson.

During the superintendent's report, Caplinger will talk about how the governor's proposed tax plan could affect the Iowa Park School District. Governor Bush's plan would raise the homestead exemption by \$20,000 and cut school property tax rates by 20 cents in every school district.

Caplinger will also give board members an update on progress of the Facility Task Force and discuss a draft of the new Texas Teacher Appraisal System.

Trustees will consider changes in the school calendar to reflect usage of a bad weather day. One bad weather day has been used this year, and it has to be determined when it will be made up before the end of the school year.

In addition to the regular business items, other agenda items include:

Retiring Cryovac president honored

Iowa Park and area residents attended a luncheon Wednesday in honor of Bill Sturgis, who is retiring as executive vice president of Grace Packaging World-Wide.

Sturgis has been closely associated with the Iowa Park facility since the days the company was wooed to locate here by the Iowa Park Industrial Development Corporation.

He told the group, which included numerous executives of Cryovac, that he had never had a moment's regret that Iowa Park had been chosen for the new plant.

His successor, Len Byrne, was introduced to those who attended the event, which was held at the Wichita Falls Country Club.

Among the Iowa Park delega-

tion were Wayne House, Dale Cox, Mike Caplinger, Mike Price and Bob Hamilton.

House presented Sturgis a gift from the IDC, a Mowrey black powder gun, as a gift from the community.

During the presentation, he recalled Sturgis' comment about how he would like such a gift, when he was on hand for a similar presentation to former Cryovac president, Bob Miller.

During House's comments, he said nothing has happened in Iowa Park during the past 55 years that was more positive than Cryovac's decision to build its plant here.

Byrne told the audience that his

delegation had another reason to be in the area. That was to recognize the Iowa Park plant for its continued improvement in safety on the job.

The plant was recognized for having a 29 percent reduction in injuries during the past year, and that was a period following the previous year when the reduction had already been cut some 50 percent.

Another gift, a lead crystal cowboy boot, also was presented to Sturgis, from the Wichita Falls Board of Commerce and Industry.

Sturgis, 62, will retire at the end of March after 36 years with the company.

A 1957 graduate of Clemson Univ., which later named him to its Academy of Distinguished Engi-

neers, he joined Grace in 1960 as a process development engineer in Simpsonville, S.C.

During his career, he has managed manufacturing, technical and marketing functions, and rose to the presidency of Cryovac North America in 1984.

Last July he assumed a role to assist with the integration of the Container and Packaging production lines.

Though he has long held an honored position in the company's Cryovac Hall of Fame, he also was named to the Packaging Education Forum's Hall of Fame.

Sturgis, during his brief talk, often mentioned his close association with the late H.M. Nipper, who was president of the IDC, and how hard he had worked to attract the company to Iowa Park.

City election slated May 3

The city council officially set May 3 for this year's election date, when three alderman posts will be decided.

Two-year terms expire that month for Tracy Fears, Mark Raby and Bob Hamilton.

Monday will be the first day candidates can file, and the deadline for a place on the ballot will be 5 p.m. on Wednesday, Mar. 19.

Early voting in person will begin at city hall April 14, and end April 29. Janice Newman will serve as early voting judge.

In other business addressed during Monday's meeting, the council approved two ordinances and a resolution, and also accepted bids for replacement of water and sewer lines.

Additionally, they approved a list of street projects, an organizational chart for the police depart-

ment, and a policy for filing complaints in municipal court.

No action was taken, however, on a proposal to replace a water line on Coleman Park Road.

The first of two ordinances approved concerns trees in the city. It primarily establishes size and varieties of trees the city will use, but also covers situations such as diseased trees in the city which could affect other trees.

The other ordinance that was approved changed the zoning of three lots facing West Highway west of Glenda, to allow for construction of three-bedroom duplexes.

The Senior Girls Softball league now has its own playing field. The resolution that was approved provides for the league's use of Will Burnett Field for the next 10 years.

Included in a contract between the city and the league is a provision that the field can be used by other groups, but the league has first choice and any others using the facility must also have approval of the city.

Vaughn Weatherly of Wichita Contractors submitted the lowest of five bids to replace water and sewer lines in the 400 block of West Magnolia. That bid was \$15,820, with the highest bid ranging to \$30,100.

Three streets to be rebuilt with asphalt were identified with priori-

ties by the council. They include, in order, 200-300 blocks West Park, 600-700 blocks West Cornelia, and 200-800 blocks South Bond.

A lengthy list of streets to receive slurry coating was referred to the city staff to establish priorities for work, because it included 79 blocks and needed to be cut to 40 or fewer, due to time required to accomplish the work.

The organizational chart for the police department was revised to change the position of detective to an "operations lieutenant," a post currently held by Lynn Collins.

Action taken during the meeting now provides that a citizen wishing to file a complaint in the municipal court system will fill out a form, complete with details, and be signed by a notary public.

The council received a request from Mildred Thompson, with Darrell Jolly serving as her spokesman, to replace a two-inch water line which serves residents on Coleman Park Road, with a six-inch line.

Jolly explained that the owner has subdivided acreage on the north and west sides of that roadway, and a need exists for greater water pressure in the future.

Cook of the Week

The recipes Wanda brought in are some of her personal favorites. She also brought some of the recipes she uses at Bradford. They would be excellent recipes to prepare for family reunions, church suppers, or other large gatherings.

Cornbread Salad

3 cups dry cornbread, crumbled
3 fresh tomatoes, chopped
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 large bell pepper, chopped

1 onion, chopped
5 strips crisply fried bacon, chopped or bacon bits

Mix all ingredients except bacon bits together; add mayonnaise to taste. Sprinkle bacon bits on top for decoration.

Hominy Casserole

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
2 1/2 cups hominy
1 Tbsp. flour
2 Tbsps. chili powder
3 cups canned tomatoes
1 med. onion, chopped
1 cup grated Cheddar cheese
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper

Brown meat in hot fat. Add to-matoes and seasoning. Brown hominy and onion in hot fat. Drain fat off of both. Mix all ingredients together except cheese. Put into greased casserole dish; sprinkle top with cheese. Bake 30 minutes at 300 degrees.

Potato Souffle

Instant mashed potatoes (enough for 4 servings)
1 cup shredded sharp Cheddar cheese
3 eggs, separated
1/4 tsp. salt

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Coat 1 1/2-qt. round casserole dish with butter or margarine. Prepare instant mashed potatoes according to directions. Beat egg whites and salt until soft peaks form. Beat egg yolks slightly; stir egg yolks and cheese into hot mashed potatoes. Carefully fold egg white mixture into casserole. Place casserole in pan of hot water (1-inch deep). Bake until puffed and golden brown (50 to 60 minutes).

Low Calorie French Fries

Cut a medium potato lengthwise into wedges. Brush cut sides with beaten egg whites; sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and oregano. Bake at 425 degrees 25 minutes. Yield: 2 servings @ 45 calories each.

Divinity

2 1/2 cups granulated sugar
1/2 cup light corn syrup
2 egg whites
1 tsp. vanilla

In 2-quart saucepan, combine sugar, corn syrup, 1/4 tsp. salt, and 1/2 cup water. Cook to hard ball stage (260 degrees) stirring only until sugar dissolves. Meanwhile, beat egg whites to stiff peaks. Gradually pour syrup over egg whites, beating at high speed on electric mixer. Add vanilla and beat until candy holds its shape, 4 to 5 minutes. Quickly drop from a teaspoon onto waxed paper.

Double Decker Fudge

2 cups (12 oz. pkg.) Reese's Peanut Butter Chips, divided
4 1/2 cups sugar
1/4 cup butter, melted
1 jar (7 oz.) marshmallow creme
1 1/2 cups (12 oz. can) evaporated milk
1/2 cup cocoa
1/4 cup butter
1 tsp. vanilla

Line a 13x9x2-inch pan with foil. Place 1 cup peanut butter chips in medium bowl; set aside. In second medium bowl, blend 1/4 cup melted butter, cocoa and vanilla until smooth; add 1 cup peanut butter chips. In heavy 4-quart saucepan, combine sugar, marshmallow creme, evaporated milk and 1/4 cup butter.

Cook, stirring constantly, over medium heat until mixture comes to a rolling boil; boil and stir 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Immediately add half of hot mixture to bowl with peanut butter chips only. Pour remainder into cocoa mixture; stir to blend. Beat peanut butter mixture until chips are completely melted; spread evenly in prepared pan. Beat cocoa mixture until

chips are melted and mixture thickens. Spread evenly over top of peanut butter layer. Cool and remove from pan. Remove foil and cut into squares. Store in airtight container in a cool, dry place. Makes about 4 lbs.

New Spice Cake

1/2 qt. granulated sugar
1/2 lb. margarine
1/2 Tbsp. vanilla
1/2 cup egg whites
7/8 lb. all purpose flour
2/3 Tbsp. baking soda
1/2 Tbsp. ground cinnamon
1/4 Tbsp. ground cloves
1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg
1/2 qt. evaporated skim milk

Using a paddle attachment, beat sugar, margarine and vanilla in a mixing bowl until smooth and creamy, about 5 minutes. Add egg white slowly. Mix 1 minute or until blended.

Mix flour, baking soda, and spices together. Add the flour mixture to the creamed mixture, alternately with the lowfat milk. Be careful not to overmix.

Pour 1 gallon of batter into each 12"x20"x2 1/2" lightly greased steam table pan. Bake 25-30 minutes at 350 degrees. When done, cake will spring back when lightly touched.

Makes 25 servings.

Spice Icing

1/2 lb. powdered sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 oz. dry, nonfat milk
1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
1/8 tsp. ground nutmeg
1/8 tsp. ground ginger
1 1/2 oz. margarine
1/8 cup water
1/4 Tbsp. vanilla extract

Combine dry ingredients in a mixing bowl. Using a paddle attachment, mix 1 minute at low speed. Add butter and mix 5 minutes at low speed. Scrape down sides of bowl. Add water slowly and mix 2 minutes at low speed. Scrape down sides of bowl. Add vanilla and mix on medium speed 5 minutes until light and fluffy.

Rolls

1 2/3 oz. active dry yeast
1 1/2 cup water
3 2/3 lbs. all purpose flour
3 1/4 oz. dry, non-fat milk
5 3/4 ozs. granulated sugar
2 Tbsps. salt
7/8 cup soybean oil
1 1/2 cups water

For best results, have all ingredients and utensils at room temperature.

Dissolve dry yeast in warm water. Let stand 4-5 minutes.

Place all dry ingredients in mixer bowl. Using a dough hook, blend on low speed approximately 2 minutes. Add oil and blend on low speed about 2 minutes. Add water and mix on low speed 1 minute. Add dissolved yeast and mix on low speed 2 minutes. Knead dough on medium speed 8 minutes, or until dough is smooth and elastic.

Place dough in warm area (about 90 degrees) for 45-60 minutes. Punch down dough to remove air bubbles.

Form rolls from dough by pinching off 2-oz. pieces and shaping. Place rolls on lightly oiled sheet pans (18"x29"x1") in rows of 10 down and 5 across. Place in a warm area (about 90 degrees) until double in size, 30-50 minutes. Bake in 400 degree oven 18-20 minutes, until lightly browned.

Optional: Brush lightly with melted butter while warm.

Makes 50 servings.

Brownies

1/3 lb. shortening
7/8 lb. granulated sugar
1/4 Tbsp. salt
1/4 Tbsp. vanilla extract
3 1/2 large eggs
1/2 lb. all-purpose flour
3 ozs. cocoa
1/2 Tbsp. baking powder

Cream shortening, sugar, salt and vanilla for 2 minutes on medium speed. Add eggs and beat for 3 minutes on medium speed. Add flour, cocoa and baking powder. Mix 30 seconds on low speed, then mix 1 minute on medium speed. Batter will be very thick.

Spread batter in large cake pan which has been lightly greased. Bake 20-30 minutes at 350 degrees. Do not overbake. Cool. If desired, lightly dust with powdered sugar. Makes 25 servings.

Brownie Icing

1/2 lb. powdered sugar
1 1/2 oz. cocoa
1 1/2 oz. margarine
1/4 cup milk (2% lowfat)
1/8 cup vanilla extract

Beat all ingredients on low speed 5 minutes or until smooth.

Valentine's Day



GARDENING HINTS

Q. I live in Henrietta. I have a very large pecan tree in my landscape. Recently, there was quite a large area around the tree which was trenched to do some repair work. I would like to know what results this will have on the tree and what could be done to help the tree.

A. Trenching around established trees can be detrimental, however, sometimes there are no options when water lines etc. must be repaired.

The extent of damage to your pecan tree depends on how much of the actual feeding root system was destroyed. The fact remains that most of the feeder roots on any tree are at the dripline area of the tree and in the upper 24 inches of soil.

We will see the real story this coming growing season and in the next few years. Limb dieback from the tips of branches back toward the main trunk is usually a signal of root stress.

Proper watering, zinc and nitrogen fertilizer applications, and pruning out dead or decayed wood will be your best options in terms of tree care. Large, established trees tend to show root damage stress slowly over a period of time depending on the extent of root destruction.

Q. Our Red Oak tree in Wichita Falls had a problem with galls on the leaves last year. Is now the time to control the problem?

A. Red Oak and other oaks tend to have problems with these unusual galls that form on the leaves. The proper way to reduce the gall problem is to apply a dormant oil spray during February or early March when temperatures are moderate (between 40 and 70 degrees Fahrenheit for two days) but before the tree has leafed out.

You can hedge your bet by also applying a standard insecticide such as Dursban and Malathion or other properly labeled insecticide at bud swell, and when the leaves first emerge in early spring, and again when the leaves are half grown. The galls are usually harmless, but they do look alarming.

Q. I live in Burkburnett. I ran one of these do-it-yourself soil tests on my landscape and the results indicated that my soil is very acidic. What can I do to adjust the pH of my soil?

A. I would certainly question the validity of the test initially due to the fact that most of our soils in this area are alkaline and not acidic. I would not attempt to adjust the soil pH without a second opinion. Our soil testing lab at Texas A&M will run a routine analysis which includes pH for thirteen dollars. We will take a look at these results and make a comparison.

There are spots in the area where the pH is acidic or low, but generally our soils are alkaline. Soil testing services are available in every county through your local Extension Service office.

Q. We have a large area in our landscape in Iowa Park that is covered with Honeysuckle. How can we get rid of this vine? We have tried using Roundup with little luck.

A. Glyphosate herbicides such as Roundup are excellent grassy weed and non-woody broadleaf weed killers, but fall short of the target on aggressive woody vines and brush problems. You will have to use a broadleaf herbicide or brush killer to effectively eliminate honeysuckle.

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Grecian tour planned

Travelers will then travel to Thessaloniki and Kalambaka, where they will visit Meteora to see the "hanging Monasteries" perched on top of strange rock formations.

June 6, visitors will drive to Piraeus and board a cruiseship for a three-day Aegean Sea cruise. The cruise will sail to Mykonos, the St. Tropez of the Aegean, then sail on to Rhodes, the legendary home of the sun god Apollo.

The ancient colossus of Rhodes, one of the Seven Wonders of the

Ancient World, once dominated the harbor entrance.

The ship will then sail to the Turkish resort of Kusadasi, where tourists will walk the marble streets and see the Temple of Artemis, another wonder of the Ancient World and the Stadium. In Patmos, they will visit the Monastery of St. John, where John received inspiration of the Book of Revelation.

Following a day in Patmos, the cruiseship will journey back to Athens for the balance of the trip.

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
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Police report 3 thefts

Three thefts were reported during the past week to the Iowa Park Police Dept., one of them originating from the same location where another was reported some three weeks previously.

That theft continues under investigation, police said Wednesday.

Officers placed Donald Eugene Miser, 39, under arrest after finding him some two blocks away. But he was not charged with theft, but rather for public intoxication.

Miser was released five hours later after paying a fine of \$132.

Police received a complaint Tuesday afternoon from a woman who alleged someone had taken her checks, and three of them had already been cashed at local businesses.

That case was still under investigation Wednesday, police said.

placement of six fire hydrants along the line's route.

Though that area is not inside the city limits, the existing water line does belong to the city. It was installed by a property owner several years ago, and later donated to the city.

Alderman Hamilton requested any action on the proposal to be studied by the city's attorney, because it entailed expending city money outside the city limits.

During the general discussion period of the meeting, Hamilton asked if the city had the authority to act on substandard buildings, particularly those in the downtown business area.

Specifically, he referred to the structure at 104 West Cash as a "blight" in the business district, and detailed a number of problems which, he said, reflects not only on the city but on neighboring businesses as well.

Mayor Tim Hunter assured the alderman the city had the authority needed to correct such problems, and that it will be exercised.

Hamilton also requested City Administrator Mike Price to secure a copy of a bill filed in the Texas House of Representatives.

He explained that a brief he had read of the bill would, if enacted into law, provide for residents of a city's extraterritorial jurisdiction to vote in elections for municipal elective offices.

Should that be the case, Hamilton said, the city likely would want to adopt a resolution opposing its passage.

We need an 18-hole golf course. Does that statement sound familiar? You've read and heard me utter the same thing over the past 28 years, but I'm not repeating myself this time.

That was a statement made by the mayor of Brady, which is about 1,000 lesser population than Iowa Park.

Mayor Dale Harris was addressing a meeting of the Heart of Texas Golf Association, and, according to a story in the *Brady Herald*, his point was that their nine-hole course needed to be expanded to a full 18 holes.

"If we don't have an 18-hole layout, we'll be losing out to our competitors," he said, pointing out that San Saba, Llano and Lampasas had added nine holes to their courses during the past couple of years.

You may remember that I quoted an article a while back from the *Lampasas Press-Reporter*, quoting owners of three new businesses in that city who said they had opened because they realized what that course expansion meant to trade traffic.

The story out of Brady was timed beautifully for this column, because it just so happened that the same week, the *Nocona News* featured a story concerning that community's city-owned golf course.

Some local golfers may have heard reports that Nocona's course is in trouble, just like Wichita Falls' Weeks Park Course.

After it was announced that a town hall meeting would be held concerning Nocona's situation, 80 people showed up, trying to find a solution to the survival of Indians Oaks Golf Course.

Businessman Steve McNatt said at that meeting, "While only a small percentage of people in Nocona do play golf, it still is an asset to the community. Just like the library down here, I think the percentage of people that use that library is not as great as that which uses the golf course, but both are assets to the community."

Nocona's course was built way back in 1935, and among its problems is the fact that a fine course was built on the lake just north of there.

I make that point with the ob-

ervation that some people who point to problems with trying to get a course here always bring out the fact that there are two public courses over in Wichita Falls.

There's no argument there, but you ought to see how many Wichitans are traveling north to Burkburnett to play, because of management problems at Weeks.

Iowa Park needs a golf course, one of quality and well-managed. It, along with the need of a walking trail, are about the only quality of life facilities not now available to our citizens.

I play golf at Burkburnett's River Creek Course. I honestly cannot remember having ever gone there without seeing someone who lives in Iowa Park who also plays there.

Sure I play golf. I love it. But that's not the only reason I keep on working toward getting one here. I'm not big on walking, but I'm pushing for that walking trail also.

I have no figures on how many residents play golf, but I can assure you it numbers into the hundreds. We consistently have almost 100 playing in the annual All Iowa Park Tournament, which is held on a week day.

And administrative people at Cryovac tell me they are very interested in a course being developed here. Why? Because they recognize the importance of quality of life activities for their employees, and they're soon to have some 1,000 workers at the plant.

It's an adage I've been aware of for many years, "A happy employee is a good worker."

Maybe we could, or should, rephrase that to say a happy citizen of Iowa Park is a good citizen of Iowa Park.

WORTH QUOTING

Ever since I was in college I have heard that possible punishment for a crime does not deter crime. When I was studying at the University of Texas, a series of very liberal professors and teaching assistants drummed that idea into my head.

Once I graduated from the university, the same bit of wisdom was continually reported in the nation's press. Every time the Texas Legislature or the Congress enacts new criminal statutes, some pundit will remark that punishment does not stop crime.

This is especially true when the subject of the death penalty is discussed. The so-called "experts" agree that the possibility of execution does not deter murders.

Although I have heard all the "experts" expound on the reasons, I still have my doubts. Anyone contemplating a criminal act would, I should think, also think about the possible consequences if they are caught and prosecuted, especially anyone thinking about murder.

Over the years I have thought that the "experts" were wrong. But, I just did not have any way of proving how they were wrong.

Now I do, thanks to an unintended visitor to our city -- Allen Eugene Langley. In case you do not remember, Langley was one of the six Iowa convicts who were apprehended in Perryton this summer after they had taken control of a van used to transport them to New Mexico during a prisoner exchange.

Langley is now safely back be-

hind bars in the Iowa prison system, but he helped innocent to escape charges. Last week Langley was found not guilty by a North Lee County jury, according to the Fort Madison Daily Democrat.

During his trial, Langley made an interesting statement. His defense to the escape charge was that he was "just along for the ride" and did not actively participate in overpowering the guards or planning the escape.

In fact, Langley testified that he took every measure to make sure the guards, a husband and wife team -- Ricky and Susan Carter, were not hurt or killed.

The reason? The Texas death penalty law.

Langley told the court that he knew if the two were killed or if Susan Carter was raped while in Texas, "we would be done for."

Then he said, "Texas has done killed more prisoners than anywhere in the union. I was quite concerned with (the guards') safety."

That was from a man who has been convicted of one murder to get to prison and another behind bars. He is currently serving two life sentences, Iowa does not have the death penalty.

If a hardened criminal like Langley is deterred by capital punishment, then the Texas law served a very useful purpose. It kept two people alive. That is probably not the first time that the prospect of punishment has stopped a crime.

Once again a real life story proves the "experts" wrong.

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

Genealogy is continuing to grow in popularity as more persons are participating all the time. A new and effective tool in the search for lost relatives is the Internet's coverage of genealogy.

Just as Internet has been growing in popularity, so it is with Internet's coverage of genealogy. It is said that Internet is growing at a rate of 20 percent per month, and that matches the growth of genealogy on the Internet.

Various groups are working to computerize records of all types of historical information. There is a group that has been working for several years on entering data regarding the Civil War records.

Once all the records for both the Union and the Confederacy have been computerized, they will be available for review at federal Civil War sites on computer terminals there. These records will also be on the Internet for review by persons all over the world.

There are a variety of sites dedicated to aiding the beginning genealogist and providing hints as well as links to other helpful sites. Some of these sites include Everton Publishers (everton.com), the Genealogy Hotlist (genealogysf.com), and the Genealogy Home Page

(ftp.cac.psu.edu/~saw/genealogy.html).

Internet currently has help groups you can contact regarding immigrants from different countries, problems with your research, as well as persons from each of the different surnames. Several good sources for surnames and listings of genealogies are GenServ (soback.kornet.nm.kr/~cmanis) and the GenWeb (sillyg.doit.com).

The GenWeb is a national organization that has been gathering volunteers in each county of the United States. Their volunteers are helping gather genealogy information in their county, as well as entering the found information on Internet.

There are government sites for both the US as well as other countries. The United State National Archives (nara.gov), the Library of Congress (marvel.loc.gov) and the US Census Bureau (census.gov/genealogy) are just a few of the federal agencies available on Internet.

National organizations are working to prepare their vast collections of information for the Internet. Some of the largest and best known are the LDS church (famhistlib@aol.com), the National Daughters of the American Revolution (ultranet.com/~revolt/), and the National Genealogy Society (genealogy.org/~ngs/).

Tuesday a week ago Internet came to the Tom Burnett Memorial Library. The library here in Iowa Park got their grant money and are now online to the world wide Internet web.

The state of Texas as well as the U.S. federal government are working to see that Internet is present in all libraries, schools, hospitals and homes. With this growth of terminals for public use it is becoming easier and easier to use Internet to find one's lost relatives. Come join in the search.

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Baseballers set sights to return to playoffs

Softball team sees action

The Iowa Park Hawk baseball team hit the field this week looking to continue its streak of playoff appearances.

The weather has limited workouts, but head coach David Fuhrman is excited and ready to see what this year's team can do.

"We're ready to go," Fuhrman said. "We've got some holes to fill from last season, but I think we have got some kids coming up that will be able to step in and get the job done."

Returning starters from last year's team include Dusty Crawford, who was named First Team All-District catcher. Joining Crawford as returning starters are Kevin Braziel, Jake Dillard, Chad Wright, and Wayland Stewart.

Coach Fuhrman will be counting on seniors Levi Scholl, Shawn Campbell, Matt Strange and Cody Russell to step in and provide some key playing time.

Jonathan Clubb leads a group of juniors who will also be counted on to play important roles for the Hawks this season, including Michael Swenson, and Todd Yeager.

Sophomore Justin Terry is expected to help in the pitching department as Iowa Park will try to replace Chris Norris, last year's Most Valuable Player in District 5-3A.

"Our pitching right now is unknown," Fuhrman said. "Dusty pitched some for us last year and beat Graham. Terry threw a no-hitter last year as a freshman. We've also got Wayland, Levi, Clubb and Cody that can all pitch. It's just too early to say what our pitching will look like."

"We lost some power from last year," Fuhrman added. "Last year we had some guys that could really drive the ball in the gaps. We also lost some good speed. Hopefully, we'll be able to replace some of that with the kids we've got coming up. Defensively, I

think we'll be alright. That's always been one of our strengths, we play solid defense."

Once again, Iowa Park has to be the early favorite to win the District, especially with the loss of Graham, which moved up to 4A.

"The loss of Graham takes out one of the elite schools in baseball," Fuhrman said. "Vernon and Childress will definitely be in the race and Bowie is a much improved ballclub that could give some teams some trouble. I think the district race could be a real tight one this season."

"One of the things that will help us in district is our non-district schedule," Fuhrman added. "We're going to play a tough non-district schedule. We are the only 3A school that is entered in the Wichita Falls

Invitational. We'll be playing against Rider, Old High, Lawton and some other 4 and 5A schools. Sometimes our record isn't as flashy as some other teams but it helps because you see better pitching and better coaching in the higher levels."

Iowa Park will open play tomorrow at 4 p.m. at Hoskins Field against the Coyotes in a scrimmage, then get started for good Tuesday when the Hawks play host to Hirschi at 4 p.m. Iowa Park will then travel to Graham on Friday to take on the Steers at 4 p.m.

The Hawks will be playing a 100-inning fund-raiser game on Saturday, Feb. 22, starting at 9 a.m. The money raised will go to pay for a new batting cage net and other equipment.

The Iowa Park Lady Hawk softball team took to the field on Tuesday and came away with their first win of the season, beating Archer City 14-8 in the season opener for both teams.

Iowa Park made it to the Area Round of the State playoffs last season, which was the first year Iowa Park had a team. Back this year are all but three players, so this year's team is expected to once again be a factor when the playoffs roll around.

Head coach Larry Beard is returning his entire infield of Jennifer Nicholson at catcher, Shannon Gafford at first, Camie Fisher at second, Geri Merrick at third and Kim Scobee at short. Lori Wiggins returns and will see time in left field while Belinda Terry will play in right. Center field time will be split between Amber Beason, Kasey White and Brandi Butler. Misty Beavers will see time as the DH.

Hawks close regular season with big win

The Iowa Park Hawks wrapped up the regular season with a 69-48 win over Henrietta Tuesday night and now turn their attention to the Class 3A State playoffs which begin next Thursday.

The Hawks will open the playoffs in Graham where they will take on seventh-ranked Breckenridge at 7:30 p.m. Earlier this week, Iowa Park fell 71-57 to Bowie, the eighth-ranked team in Class 3A.

Iowa Park improved to 20-13 overall and finished District 5-3A with an 8-2 record, with both losses coming to Bowie, one of those in overtime.

In Friday night's game at Bowie, Iowa Park jumped out to a 14-10 lead with 2:35 left in the opening period before the Rabbits went on a 11-2 run to close out the quarter with a 21-16 lead. In the run, David Hardison nailed two of his five three-pointers and Cory Whitaker made one of his four long range jumpers.

Iowa Park tied the game at 27-27 with only 19 seconds left in the half, but Whitaker again knocked down a

three-pointer as time expired, giving Bowie a 30-27 halftime advantage.

The Hawks scored the first four points of the third quarter to take a 31-30 lead, but a 10-0 run by Bowie gave the Rabbits a 41-31 lead with 3:32 left in the third quarter.

Iowa Park used a 12-5 run over the final three minutes of the quarter to pull to within 46-43 heading into the final 8 minutes of play.

Bowie pulled away with a 25-14 fourth quarter to improve to 25-5 overall and a perfect 9-0 in district play with only Jacksboro left on the schedule.

Iowa Park fell to 19-13 overall and 3-1 in the second half of district and 7-2 overall in district play.

Bowie was led in scoring by Hardison with 23, Whitaker with 19 and Lee McKinney with 10.

The Hawks were led by Levi Scholl with 18 followed by Nick Black and Chad Wright with 8 each and Shawn Campbell with 6.

Bowie outscored Iowa Park 13-2 from the free throw line as the Rabbits attempted 28 free throws to only 7 for Iowa Park. Bowie also made 10 three-pointers to only 3 for the Hawks.

The Hawks rebounded nicely to close out the regular season with a 21-point victory over Henrietta Tuesday night thanks in part to a big 27-18 advantage in the fourth quarter.

Iowa Park opened the game with a 14-9 first quarter as the Hawks hit on 7-of-13 shots from the floor. Both Black and Campbell each had a pair of baskets in the opening period. Iowa Park limited Henrietta to only 2 field goals in the first quarter as the Bearcats shot only 2-of-10 from the floor.

Shawn Fuller came alive in the

second quarter scoring 6 of Iowa Park's 12 points in the period as the Hawks increased their lead to 26-20 at intermission.

Henrietta started off with the hot hand to start the third quarter, outscoring Iowa Park 7-2 to pull to within 1 at 28-27 with 6:12 left in the period.

The Hawks quickly answered the run with a 14-0 run of their own to put the game away as they raced out to a 42-30 lead after three quarters of play.

It was all Iowa Park in the fourth quarter as the Hawks got their transition game going. Jonathan Horton scored six points in the fourth quarter to go along with three players who scored four points in the period including Scholl, Black and Dillard.

The Hawks finished with three players in double figures including Black with 18, Fuller with 13 and Scholl with 12. Henrietta had only one player reach double figures as Clay Bachman scored 20 for the Bearcats.

Despite the success of his team so far this season, head coach Tim Clark has been less than impressed with the number of fans who are showing up to see his team play.

"We didn't even fill up our side of the stands against Henrietta," Clark said. "I know the game meant nothing, but for a team that has made only two playoff appearances over the last 11 years, I would like to see our fans come out and support us a little more."

Coach Clark is still looking for a warm-up game for this Saturday as his team prepares for next Thursday's Bi-District playoff game against Breckenridge at Graham. Tip off is scheduled for 7:30 p.m.

JV, Frosh end season

Colby Bobbitt led Iowa Park with 12 points followed by John Gray with 10. Johnny Dillard and Clayton Sales each scored 9 points.


The freshmen also lost to Bowie on Friday night, falling 68-63. Iowa Park had to play from behind the entire game after a 27-13 first quarter by Bowie.


