



CONGRESS Just recently the Congress passed the bill that woul authorize the creation of an Air Force Academy similiar to the Military Academy at West Point, New York, and the Navy Academy at Annapolis, Maryland. The Secretary for Air, Harold E. Talbot has appointed a five man commission which will recommend the site for this new Academy. Members of the Commission are Virgil M. Hancher President of the University of Iowa Merrill C. Meigs, Vice President of the Hearst Corporation, Chicago, Illinois; General Charles A. Lindbergh; General Carl A. Spaats; and Lt. General Hubert R. Harmon, The Air Force has said that the major requirements for the site for the new Academy will be at least 15,000 acres of land which has natural beauty and can be developed as a National monument just as West Point and Annapolis have been; that it must be near a community that has a variety of educational institutions and religious, cultural. and recreational facilities readily accessible to the site; that it must be located in an area that has a mild climate; that a water supply of at least 3,000,000 gallons of water per day be available; that good transportation facilities be at hand as well as public utilities such as electric power, natural gas, or other fuel. The establishment of an Air Force Academy has been seriously considered for Several years. Several Texas sites have been among

The Air Force plans to activate the Academy on a temporary basis at an existing Air Force base just as soon as practicable. The first class of three hundred cadets will be enrolled in July, 1955. The number vacancies that will alocated to each State is proportionate to that Sate's representation in Congress. Texas will be allocated twelve vacancies for the first class. Each member of Congress from Texas will be allowed to make nominations not to exceed ten persons. These nominees then will take competitive examinations for the vacancies, and the appointments will finally be made from the qualified candidates in the order of their merit.

Save the Soil!

There should be some news in the very near future concerning the findings of a water study committee appointed by the governor to study the needs of conserving water in the Texas, both an immediate and a long range program. At the outset, the group began to

find overwhelming evidence that the areas, even though normally very dry, that had a small dam project in the area, had much less trouble combatting drought and floods. The idea, long advanced by Soil Conservation experts, works on the theory that the land and water will both work better for the farmer if kept on his own farm, not in the form of silt against the dam of Lake Texhoma. The idea behind all of this is to have the farmer build small dams and terraces all down the side of the hill insteead of the far south end of Lake Kemp dam, or some other dam. Any one knows what happens to a water table on ground which serves as a run-off incline for the Wichita River, little or big. Many men have advocated, men, by the way who have made their living from the soil for fifty years, the spending of the money required to build huge dams, such as Lake Texhoma, which collects a large percentage of the Counties, to spend this money on the farm and keep the top soil there where a crop can be raised on it. For example, the money spend on a venture such as the Boulder Dam, would build a small dam on every creek and hill in Archer County, complete with terraces even in the front yards. As far as I can tell, no one has ever raised a good crop of wheat or oats on the silt, or topsoil, they jost to Lake Wichita, Kemp, Diversion or Whitney. It would then appear that all the so-called "laboratory idiots". are not found in A and M College, but a few might be found on the board of Army Engineers, advocating the expenditure of millions of dollars of the tax payers money to build a beautiful resort. By no means are all of these engineers blind to the needs of our farmers, but recall what happened to Billy Mitchell and Gen. MacArthur when they did dare to voice their opinions Some of these Engineers were retired in like manner.

Of course, you hear the old how from some resident who fears for the lack of water to keep the lawn green, "You'll stop our water supply!"

An answer to this squawk may be found at Lake Waco, Waco, Texas. An engineer said not long ago that if someone didn't start building dams upstream, the lake would completely fill up with silt, the finest top soil if you please, in ten years and that Lake Waco could not furnish water for the City unless it was dredged out, On another angle of this subject, have you ever watched the gates of a dam being opened to relieve the strain of too much water, too fast after a heavy rain? Of course, you have. That water didn't water many lawns either did it? There is something that you, individually and collectively can do about it. Study the forthcoming propeals and find-ings closely and if there is any merit in this pian of the group let old Senator and Representative hear from you. Don't think they won't listen-they know who put them in office.
