Area telephone code changes soon

their telephone service providers that the three-month transitional dialing period for the new 254 and 940 area codes will begin Sunday, May 25.

The codes will serve the southern and northern regions of the previous 817 area code, while Tarrant County and the immediate Fort Worth region retains the 817 code.

The 940 area code will serve the northern region, including Iowa Park, as well as the cities of Childress, Decatur, Denton, Gainesville, Graham, Mineral Wells and Vernon.

The region served by 940 contains an estimated 352,000 access

The new area codes will not impact 9-1-1 service, long-distance charges or local service rates. They will, however, require some callers to dial 10 digits (the area code plus the seven-digit telephone number) when placing local calls between area

Local calls within the same area code can still be made using the traditional seven-digit dialing pattern. However, when in doubt about whether to use seven or 10 digits, a good rule of thumb is to dial i0 digits -- the area code plus the seven-digit

The transitional dialing period was designed to provide a sufficient amount of time for customers to become accustomed to the new area code and, when appropriate, the 10digit dialing pattern when calling locally from one area code to the

During the transitional period, customers can dial 817 when making calls into the 254 and 940 areas, and their calls will be completed.

For one month after the mandatory period begins next August, customers who use the wrong area code will hear a recorded message that explains the number dialed is either in the 254, 817 or 940 area code. The message also will ask the caller to hang up and dial again using the correct area code.

The 254 area code will serve the southern region, including the cities of Waco, Belton, Breckenridge, Cameron, Gatesville, Glen Rose, Hillsboro, Groesbeck, Marlin and Stephenville.

Retaining the 817 number are Tarrant County and the immediate Fort Worth area, as well as such cities as Grandview, Cleburne, Granbury,

Weatherford, Springtown, Azle, Additionally, Texas businesses Rhome, Grapevine, Euless, Arlington, Mansfield and Alvarado.

All business customers throughout the state are encouraged to contact their private branch exchange (PBX) vendor to ensure that their PBX and other telecommunications equipment are programmed to send and receive calls related to the 254 and 940 area codes, as well as others around the country.

Once the transitional dialing period commences, telephone customers should reprogram residential and business voice dial, speed dial and auto dial services on telephone and fax machines.

Two positions, one on the school week. board and one on the city council, have drawn competition for their respective May 3 elections, according to reports at presstime Wednesday.

Actually, there are three positions on both the school board and city council to be decided in the election, but only two of them have challengers.

Jeff Nolen and Wendell House have filed for one of the school trustee positions, while the other two positions have attracted incumbents Martha Dudley and Larry Dutton.

Two candidates have filed for the same position on the city council since presstime on Wednesday of last

Mark Raby, who currently holds that position, filed yesterday moming. He will be opposed by former alderman Bud Mercer, who filed last

Mercer has served several years as a city alderman, and chose last year not to seek re-election to that post, but instead ran unsuccessfully against Tim Hunter in the mayoral

The other two incumbent aldermen who have filed are unchallenged. They are Bob Hamilton and Tracy

Drawings for positions on the election ballots will be held. The school's drawing will be shortly after 4 p.m. today, while the city's drawing will be at 9:45 a.m. Monday.

The final day to register to vote in either election, for those who have not already registered, will be April

Early voting will begin April 14 and conclude April 29.

Iowa Parkan back in jail

Thomas Cecil Sims, 30, local resident, remains in Wichita County Jail under \$85,000 bond after being arrested and charged with robbery last week.

Friday, Wichita Falls Police detectives arrested Sims at his place of business, City Limits Auto, in Wichita Falls, for an incident that took place Wednesday.

Sgt. Cindy Walker said Sims sold the victim, a 24-year-old WichitaFalls, man, a 1990 Ford Ranger pickup.

The following day, Walker said, Sims found the victim at a business in Wichita Falls and expressed his dissatisfaction with the car deal, and stated he wanted the Ford pickup back. Police allege Sims then pulled the victim from the car and onto the ground and took the truck by physical force.

Bond was set by Justice of the Peace Mike Little. A federal hold was placed on Sims, who is currently on parole for a federal felony conviction in 1995, for theft of a state treasury check and forgery.

Man survives brush with truck

A Wichita Falls man is in satisfactory condition at a Wichita Falls hospital after being hit early Tuesday morning by a trash truck just west of Huntington Lane.

"It was his lucky day," said Dept. of Public Safety Trooper Mike Denk, of the victim Johnny J. Cantu, 23.

Denk said at 4:55 a.m., Iowa Park EMT's and DPS troopers responded to the call, in which a trash truck belonging to Bell Processing struck Cantu, who was walking in the road, and apparently under the

influence of alcohol. Denk said the truck, driven by

Timothy Lane Cook, 33, was west bound on Business 287 just west of Huntington Lane when it struck Cantu who was walking on the right side of the west-bound traffic lane.

According to Denk, Cantu was walking west with his back to traffic and was wearing dark blue clothing. Not seeing Cantu on the roadway, the driver stuck him with the right front bumper of the truck, throwing him on to the right front fender and ejecting him onto a gravel driveway.

Cantu sustained a broken leg and moderate head injuries, but nothing believed to be life threaten-

VARIATIONS include adding dried basil or parsley, or thyme and 1/2 cup diced, seeded tomato when adding beans. Substitute sliced turkey franks for ham or any low-fat frank. CROCK POT VERSION:

Heat veggie mixture 5 minutes in microwave; add seasonings, hot water, beans, and cooked meat to crock pot and cook on low 3-4 hours, OR cook on highl hour. Times will vary with power of crock pot.

This version works well on a busy day when you need to have a meal ready, but don't have time to spare just before meal time. Also, the aroma of crock-pot cooking says "soup's on" when appetites are ready.

Chicken 'N Chilie Soup

2 cups skinless, boneless chicken, cut in small pieces

1 can diced tomatoes with chiles (not Ro-tel tomatoes)

1 large onion, cut in pieces (not diced) 1 cup chopped fresh or frozen spinach 1 cup frozen or canned corn (whole

1 cup fresh or frozen cut okra (rinse in hot water)

1 Tbsp. diced garlic (or to taste) 4 cups hot water

2 tsps. oil (olive or light veggie oil) Heat oil in heavy pan or electric stew/soup pot. Add chicken, okra and onion. Stir just until chicken is no longer pink. Add spinach and corn and cook 5 minutes. (If using frozen vegetables, rinse and squeeze dry with paper towel or let drain on paper towel before adding.) Add tomatoes, undrained. Add garlic, if desired. Add hot water and cook on low 20-25 minutes.

VARIATIONS: Add any of the Mrs. Dash seasonings you like or 1 tsp. chili powder, or substitute chopped broccoli for spinach, or chopped carrots for corn.

CROCK POT VERSION: Cook chicken, okra and onion in oil in pan or covered in microwave 5-7 minutes (depending on power of microwave). Put in crock pot on high and add remaining ingredients and cook 1 hour on high or on low 3-4 hours.

Nortex Gumbo

1 lb. lean ground or diced meat (beef, chicken, turkey, or a combination that equals 1 lb.)

4 cups cut okra (if frozen, rinse in hot each minute.

1 cup julienne cut (from salad pkg.) or diced carrot

1/2 cup celery (optional)

1 large can diced tomatoes 1 Tbsp. chili seasoning (or to taste) 1 Tbsp. minced garlic or 1 tsp. garlic powder (or to taste)

1 Tbsp. lite oil Heat oil in large, heavy skillet, pot, or electric soup/stew pot. Add ground meat(s) and onion; cook until meat changes color.

While meat is cooking, rinse okra, drain, and cook 5 minutes on HIGH in microwave, or steam on stovetop in 1/2 cup water. Add to cooked meat.

Add carrot and celery; cook 10 minutes on low. Add tomatoes and garlic; cook on simmer 20-25 min-

VARIATIONS: Add any lean, smoked sausage, chopped. Use traditional gumbo seasoning instead of chili powder.

T.L.C. Fish Fillets

1 lb. fish fillets Lemon juice

1 cup bread crumbs (make fresh in blender or food processor or use packaged crumbs)

2 egg whites + 1 tsp. water, beaten

1 tsp. Cajun seasoning (Luzanne is a good brand)

Pre-heat oven to 300 degrees Rinse and dry fillets and pour or squeeze lemon juice over fillets. Turn water to boil. Add rinsed broccoli fillets to cover both sides with juice.

Spray baking sheet or large, lowsided dish with light cooking spray or Place fillets 1-inch apart on prepared surface and bake 15-20 minutes. Check for doneness at 15 minutes. DO NOT OVERCOOK. Time varies according to thickness and size of fillets. They are done when tender and the meat flakes easily off fillet. MICROWAVE: Place fillets in microwave safe dish and cook 5-7 minutes. Check for doneness. If needed, cook additional one minute at a time and check doneness after

Serve with steamed or stir-ry 2 cups cut white or yellow sweet veggies or pasta salad, or favorite rice

> Small, pan-size fish can be prepared using this same method.

Lemon-Dash Fillets

1 lb. fish fillets, rinse & dry 1/2 cup lemon juice (fresh or bottled) 1 tsp. Mrs. Dash seasoning (your preference)

Mix juice and seasonings and pour over rinsed and dried fish. Marinate 30 minutes, turning 2 or 3 times. Or marinate 2-3 hours in refrigerator if preparing ahead. Turn 2-3 times. Drain fish.

Prepare baking pan or dish with light cooking spray or 1/4 tsp. light cooking oil. Place fish 1-inch apart on pan or in dish. Bake at 300 degrees 15 minutes. Check for doneness. Fish will be fork-tender, color changed to white and flake easily with fork. If not done, cook additional 5 minutes and check again for doneness. Do not

MICROWAVE: Prepare microwave baking dish. Cook on high 5 minutes and check for doneness. Continue to cook 1 minute and check for doneness until fish is white, tender, and flakes easily with fork. Do not overcook.

Small, pan-sized fish can be prepard the same way, cooking times may vary from fillets.

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Health Notes Hepatitis

Hepatitis is an inflammation of the liver which interferes with the organs ability to process nutrients and neutralize toxins. Infection, drug reactions or overuse of

alcohol can cause hepatitis, but most commonly, a virus causes the inflammation. The result may be a short, flu-like illness or a severe condition leading to liver damage, cirrhosis or liver cancer. Usual symptoms include fatigue, body aches, nausea and loss of appetite. About half the time, jaundice appears a week or two after other symptoms. The severity of the hepatitis determines treatment, which usually emphasizes avoiding alcohol and getting plenty of liquids and rest. At least five types of viral hepatitis have now been identified, and vaccinations are available for hepatitis A and B.



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
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

Legislation is needed

As you are well aware, something needs to be done to salvage the Texas property tax system. Taxes are too high. Public schools need alternative funding sources.

The state's contribution to public education funding has dropped over the years from 75 percent to about 45 percent. Governor George Bush has begun to reverse the trend and has publicly stated he would like to see the state pay 60 percent of the funding for schools. Representative Paul Sadler, chair of the House Select Committee on Revenue and Public Education Funding, wants the state to pick up 80-90 percent of the public education tab.

The governing board of the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) recognized the perennial issue last summer when members adopted as part of the Association's legislative program a statement calling for "restructuring the state's tax system to reduce reliance on school property taxes and to insure adequate state funding of public schools."

The time has come for lawmakers to take action, but there is no consensus now on how to solve this complex problem. No doubt there will be proposals from all sides before the 75th regular session of the Texas Legislature ends in early June. When lawmakers and state leaders consider the merits of each plan, the following principals must be considered:

* Factors that drive up local property taxes (i.e. unfunded mandates, required teacher salaries, inflation) must be recognized and compensated for, in any new plan.

* Any modifications must enhance the system's ability to grow with the economy and state's population.

* A serious effort must be made to fully fund the costs of the new Education Code passed last legislative session.

The locally-elected school board must be able to continue to provide a level of fiscal support that reflects the needs and priorities of its community.

* Replacement of local revenue lost to property tax relief must be dollar for dollar.

* Truth-in-taxation or "roll back" laws must be structured to allow a school district's elected board to adopt the tax rate necessary to provide for enrollment growth, state mandates, and inflation.

Area legislators must act with conviction and courage to do the right thing for Texas.





The contents and provisions of a cured from the office in that state person's will is of great importance in genealogical research as such written instruments contain the names of the survivors who will inherit the estate.

Between the date the will was written and the date of death may be days, months, or several years. During this period, members of the family have died, so an heir's name appearing in the will may not appear in the distribution.

Wills usually contain the first name of the spouse, the names of the children in order of age, also whom the daughters married. The bequeaths of real estate as mentioned in the will are of importance as real estate in another county or state might indicate where the family formerly lived or where the heirs later resided.

Description of the real estate. previous owners, when purchased, locality and to whom bequeathed. should all be noted. The date of purchase of land usually indicated the year of settlement in that locality.

The names of the executers and witnesses often lead to important conclusions. This information might indicate who were the family friends, neighbors, other relatives not mentioned in the will, and so forth.

When a person who possessed property dies without having made a will, the state or local courts have the authority to settle the estate. In many states the probate of the will can and will be delayed for quite some time and as much as half the property of the deceased may be reverted to the state. Returns are filed showing the assets and liabilities of the estate as well as the distribution which includes the names of the heirs.

Since the late 1800s most states require proof of death, giving the date of death. Renunciations are filed when any of the executors named in the will decline to serve.

Certified or photostatic copies of ills, letters and returns can be seresponsible for wills, upon payment of a charge based on the size of the

The contents of wills recorded in county courthouses fill many volumes and are seldom published in book form due to their extent, however, the vital information showing names, dates, heirs and their relationship are occasionally published.

With the recent floods of the north and mid-west it draws to mind the necessity of timely acquisition of such wills, as mother nature from time to time appears bent on the destruction of irreplaceable documents of the past. -----Fil Spangler

Regulations on Childhood Disability Published

Regulations providing guidelines on how the Social Security Administration will apply the new definition of disability for children were published in the Federal Register on Feb.

Welfare reform legislation passed on Aug. 22, 1996, requires that a child's impairment or combination of impairments will be considered disabling if it causes "marked and severe functional limitations."

Letters have been sent to about 263,000 children who may have their cases reviewed under the new guidelines.

For those found not disabled, benefits will not stop before July 1,

Prostrate cancer strikes one in 11

Prostate cancer is in the future of one of every 11 men. For black men, the odds are worse: one in nine.

"The saddest part of those figures is that many men, including many thousands of black men, who die of this cancer could have been saved if the disease had been detected earlier," said Dr. Ronald Morton Jr. of the Baylor Prostate Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"Prostate cancer can spread without pain or other symptoms," Morton said, "which makes it all the more important to get regular examinations."

Possible warning signs, which are even more likely to be symptoms of benign prostatic hyperplasia, in-

- * Difficulty in beginning or maintaining a urinary stream.
- * Frequent urination, especially
- * Weak or interrupted urine flow. * Painful urination or ejacula-
- * Presence of blood or pus in urine or semen.

A doctor can detect prostate cancer by using a combination of physical examination, blood and

urine tests and ultrasound scanning.

A rectal exam can determine if the prostate feels hard, a possible sign of cancer. The procedure, done in a physician's office, is simple, quick and only slightly uncomfortable, Morton said.

A prostate specific antigen, or PSA, test can help make the diagnosis, but a biopsy of the prostate is needed to confirm the presence of cancer. The PSA test is also used to follow the progress of the disease after the patient has been treated.

Annual prostate exams are vital for all men 50 and older, Morton said.

"For black men or any man with a family history of prostate cancer," he said, "the annual exams should start at age 40. This disease takes a heavy toll in the black community, and black men need to protect them-



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

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GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Q. I live in Wichita Falls. We want to prevent the worms from getting into our fruit. We have peaches and plums.

A. That is a popular question at this time of year. The key to preventing the worms (Plum Curculio) from destroying your fruit crop is to apply a control spray at about 75 percent petal fall. This is when the flower petals begin to fall after blooming.

Probably, the easiest product to spray with is one of the home orchard fruit tree sprays which are designed to control disease and insect problems on home fruit tree plantings.

Q. In the past several years, I've spent lots of time and money trying to get my fescue front yard to look decent. It's being overtaken by broadleaf weeds. I've thought about changing to St. Augustine which is doing great in my back yard with hardly any care, but I like having a green front yard during the winter. Enclosed is an advertisement that was in the Wichita Falls newspaper. Will this grass grow in Wichita Falls? The ad says it thrives wherever bluegrass grows. It sounds too good to be true. What do you think?

A. First of all, Bluegrass is not going to hold up in our hot and dry summers in Wichita Falls. Bluegrass is best adapted to the Midwestern states where it thrives. Apparently, the advertisement does not go on to tell the entire truth about the limitations of growing Bluegrass in the Southern states.

You have probably heard it before if it sounds too good to be true then it probably is. You can control broadleaf weeds in your Fescue with a broadleaf herbicide used as a carefully applied spot spray. I realize that you cannot use a pre-emergent herbicide if you are over-seeding fescue on a regular basis. You might be wise to consider how much shade you are having to deal with in your front yard.

Heavily shaded areas are tough places to get even Fescue or St. Augustine established in. In heavily shaded areas (less than four hours of sun), you are better off trying to establish a shade tolerant groundcover such as Asian Jasmine, English Ivy or Mondo grass, among other shade loving plants. Dense shade could be the reason you are having problems getting your fescue lawn to look decent. Good luck.

Q. I am getting ready to buy fruit trees for planting into my landscape. Which varieties of peach trees are the right choice for Wichita Falls? I am only getting to plant a couple of trees.

A. Ranger would have to be a top pick for peach planting. The Ranger peach is an early-ripening variety that has been a good performer in local orchards and landscapes. Other peach varieties on our 1997 recommended fruit list include Sentinel, Harvester, Redglobe, Milam, Majestic, Denman, Loring, Belle of Georgia, Dixiland, Redskin, Jefferson, Frank, Fayette, Ouachita Gold and Bicentennial.
