

Family of volunteers moving

"We won't be moving until some time in June. Certainly, not until Vicki and I have fulfilled all the commitments we've made here," Fillmore Spangler answered my question, "When will you be moving to San Antonio?"

To me, this says a lot about this couple. But this attitude is typical of the Spanglers. It has been said by several who know them well that the Spanglers are always willing to help. Spangler volunteers his services when he is needed, and he often sees ways he can be of help in many different situations.

This is the second time the Spanglers have lived in this area. They lived in Wichita Falls in the 1970s. He worked at Sheppard Air Force Base in electronics, communications and as registrar. He posesses a variety of skills. At SAFB from 1974-1980 he was Training Manager for the United States Air Force Air Training Command, using various computer systems to forecast, analyze and produce real-time reporting for system users.

He also managed both a batch and an on-line real-time computer

system and supervised eight employees performing data input and software services to meet customer requirements and operation needs.

As training instructor his duties included writing and reviewing plans of instruction, training literature, technical data, preparation of lesson plans, and conducting classroom counseling, supervision training and related counseling, testing and evaluation, and producing audio-visual packages.

Most of the time he taught through a translator. As managerregistrar, Spangler was the only one to meet with the General. He kept him abreast of how many students were in training, how many had been trained, and other details of the training program.

"Actually, mathemetics is my field," Spangler said.

Spangler was reared in San Antonio. He says his wife, Vicki was an "oil field brat". When her family moved to San Antonio, she and Fillmore met in high school. Spangler received the BA

degree from Trinity University in San Antonio, with a major in Mathematics and a minor in

Education in 1968. He then majored in Education and minored in Math and received his Masters degree in Education in 1971.

He took graduate courses at Texas A&M University in Computer Science, and management courses at Midwestern State University while working at SAFB.

Early on in his career, Spangler was a classroom instructor in the San Antonio Independent School District. He taught classes in Algebra, Calculus, pre-Calculus, Geometry, Related Math, and Consumer Math. He served on the curriculum, textbook and computer committees.

Later he was part-time instructor in the math field at College of Mainland in Houston and also at San Antonio Junior College. While at SAFB he served as part-time mathematics instructor in Algebra, and Computer Science at Midwestern State University and part-time mathematics instructor in Algebra, Probability and Statistics at Vernon Regional Junior College.

Spangler left SAFB in 1980 to go into an even more sophisticated and technical work. ..training astronauts. From 1980-1985, he

was Training Requirements Specialist for Ford Aerospace and Communications Corp., at Johnson Space Center in Houston.


He developed training materials and connect training for space shuttle astronauts and flight controllers. He developed training and wrote related workbooks for Strip Chart Recorder equipment, Telemetry Applications, POCC Basis Terminal Operations and Telemetry Operations.

He also taught the operation of digital television equipment, Manual Select and Summary Message Enable keyboards, Opaque televisor, Voice Keyset, POCC and Megadata terminals operations.

1985-1986 Spangler was lead Instructional Designer for McDonnell Douglas Inc. in Houston. There he was lead for a group of eight courseware writers for a health care computer network program.

Duties included development of a training program to train personnel on the Instructional System Development (ISD) process and acted as subject matter expert





Ray Copening

Ray Copening, owner of City Cafe, has kindly agreed to share his favorite steak recipes with the Leader readers this week.

Ray was born in Honey Grove. His father was a Church of Christ minister, and the family lived in several different places while Ray was growing up. He graduated high school in O'Donnell.

Ray retired from the military in 1975, with the last four years spent teaching Military Science and Physical Training at Midwestern State University.

He opened the Iowa Park Dairy Queen in 1975, and took over ownership of City Cafe in 1993.

Ray and his wife Nell are both sports enthusiasts and participate in several athletic activities such as volleyball and golf. They also like to fish and spend a lot of time at their lake cabin.

In this part of the country - Texas in particular - the favorite food of most men (and a lot of women) is chicken fried steak.

So, for those cooks who don't have a tried and true method for preparing this delicacy, the following recipes (in Ray's own words) are for you.

Country-Fried Steak VS.

Chicken-Fried Steak

"This was as Mother's milk to me." My favorite food for any meal on any day is a delicacy that can be done simply or elaborately.

Start with round steak, cut in serving pieces - - in the day's nostalgia, it was "get a dollar's worth of steak." Bring the steak to room temperature, season it with salt, pepper, maybe garlic powder, and flour it. With the edge of a saucer or a meat mallet, beat the flour into the meat and snip the fatty edges. The grease in the iron skillet should be hot. Now introduce the steak to the skillet. Turn

it frequently, and when the steak is luciously browned, remove it to a platter. Pour off the excess grease; add flour, then milk, then salt and pepper for the cream gravy.

I sometimes veer into smothered steak and onions, an equally toothsome idea, simply done by adding lots of thinly sliced onion rings to the first skillet step of frying. Later when the steak approaches doneness, drain off the excess grease and add at least a cupful of water. Cover the skillet and put it on a low heat. Check to see that it is always wet. At serving time, remove the steak and onion to a platter. Make a roux with flour, water and the skillet contents. When smooth, add more water and check to be sure there is adequate seasoning with salt and pepper. You are now flushed with pride, so serve with love.

Chicken-fried steak was not as much a home product in Vernon as it was a restaurant item for banquets.

For this method the steak is done in batter and cooked in deep, hot fat. The steak pieces are dipped in flour after they have been salted and peppered. They they are dipped in egg batter-one egg whipped with one cup milk - and then again in flour.

Place in 400 degree deep fat and when done serve with a basic white sauce or Sauce Bechamel.

Steak in this manner seems perfectly at home with pretty green peas. When we ate out at the Faith Cafe, the Liberty Cafe, or the even older City Cafe, this was a great favorite.

Grilled Stuffed Onions

Take as many onions as you desire and cut each in half. Take out

center, leaving a shell, and put the center to the side.

In bowl, mix desired amount of Cheddar cheese and picante sauce.

Put some of the cheese mixture in each of the onion halves and replace the center. Wrap each half in aluminum foil and grill.



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— Health Notes — **Chromium for Diabetes?**

At a recent meeting of the American Diabetes Association, American and Chinese researchers reported impressive findings on the benefits of chromium in treating type II

diabetes. A four month study of 180 Chinese men and women demonstrated that patients taking chromium showed a significant drop in glycated hemoglobin levels, which are very sensitive indicators of diabetes control. In his presentation, Barry Mennen, M.D. noted that if these results can be replicated in the American population, the findings "could have significant implications for the therapy - and perhaps even the prevention - of adult-onset diabetes

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
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However, caution is urged in interpreting these results. It must be emphasized that chromium is not a cure for diabetes and is not a license to stop taking prescription medications or to indulge in sweets, as some media reports have suggested."

Pretty yards topic of Garden Club program

"Planning, Planting and Attaining that Beautiful Yard You Want," was the subject of a program, presented by Tim Hunter, for the Iowa Park Garden Club.

Hunter, an agronomist at Sheppard Air Force Base, and the current mayor of Iowa Park, stressed using more drought-resistant plants, thereby reducing the use of herbi-

Hunter said that yards have gone through several stages. Beginning with the "Victory Gardens" of the 1940's, to the hybrid grasses of the late 1950's, to the present time of "mixed greens." "If it's green, mow it!" he said. He believes "weeds get a bad rap," and stated that "a weed is nothing but a flower out of place."

He suggested using shrubs outside of windows for security reasons.

For aroma, Hunter encouraged using the original type rose, not the hybrid. He likes Rose of Sharon and Altheas. For aphids on the roses, he suggested spraying them with

dishwashing detergent mixed with





Continued from page 1 in the development of job tasks and learning hierarchies utilizing the ISD Methodology. Development of a training support plan for the Air Force Shuttle Program.

He explained that persons who work at NASA are given to talking in acronyms, because of the long technical terms.

Spangler wrote five books on satellites and several workbooks on Mission Control. He met with engineers from other countries and showed them and the astronauts how to use his developed materials.

Spangler was privy to much top secret information. He also was there at the fatal flight of the Challenger.

From 1986 to 1990 he worked as senior engineer for Link Flight Simulation Corp., in Houston and developed training materials for use by the Air Force in the F-16 aircraft training program, utilizing various software programs, both commercial and locally written to track and organize the training requirements.

The following three years Spangler was Systems Egineering Specialist for Loral Space Information Sytems in Houston

There he evaluated and prioritized equipment replacement, designed alternative training approaches and suggested current technologies to be used, coordinated with customers and prepared technical manuals to document the training materials to support the design effort.

In 1994 he worked for Solvey Polymers of Deer Park as Instructional Designer. He developed training programs for plant person-

nel, as well as reviewed production and training documents produced by other plant personnel. He wrote new operational manuals and produced standardized testing materials for employee certifica-

The Spanglers enjoyed their 14 years that Fillmore worked for NASA. They lived in Clear Lake, about 20 miles from there. Spangler said, "It was a virtual cultural melting pot. There were people living there from many states and countries."

He said thousands apply to become an astronaut, but for many the training is too stressful and many have motion sickness. Not all astronauts are pilots as many think of them. Most of them are scientists, according to Spangler.

Would-be astronauts have to be taught how to use new materials and equipment for training in a simulated environment.

Spangler said all kinds of problems were used in simulation for they astronauts to see how they could handle the situation in flight. Spangler said his job was stressful also. He subscribed to 73 magazines on computers to help him keep up with new technology, in order for him to keep NASA apprised.

Spangler said his wife, who also is a teacher, was Education Director for Friendswood First United Methodist Church, a 2,000member congregation, while they lived at Clear Lake.

But, the Spanglers were ready for a change and came back to this area in 1994 and Spangler returned to the classroom. He

February bad for business

Iowa Park was the hardest hit. Its sales taxes collected on February sales was 19.8 percent lower than the previous year.

The city's rebate check, based

on sales taxes collected in February and reported by businesses filing monthly returns in March, was only \$15,360.45. A year ago the city's check was for \$19,154.32.

Burkburnett's rebate was 8.11 percent lower than in April of last year, Electra was down 7.13 percent and Wichita Falls a minus 3.71 per-

For the year, Iowa Park has received \$85,655.63 in sales tax rebates, down 3.99 percent.

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

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

NEWS OF THE Iowa Park GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The examination of deed books, found in the office of the clerk of a county, is of great importance in the search for family information.

These books constitute a complete record of all conveyances of property within the county from the time it was formed.

A title search as instituted by the purchaser, to determine whether the title was good, often recite the chain of ownership to the original deed from the likes of the Monarchy of England, William Penn, the government of Mexico, etc.

Purchase of land may have been recorded originally in a land office and later in the clerks' office. Photostat copies can be secured which will generally show the locality, give a description of the plot, and name the adjacent landowners.

These original titles are known as Warrantees of Land and are published in many different forms. The purchaser sometimes used fictitious names in order to secure rights to more land than allowed by law to each person.

The deed books preserved in the county courthouses show the date of transfer, names of grantors and grantees and their places of residence, location and description of property.

Previous owner or owners, terms and condition of sale, date recorded, witnesses and the signatures of grantors or their mark, when they were unable to write, might be included. It is important to examine the signature, as often they are different than in the body of the deed, being spelled in another manner or the given names spelled out in full.

Generally two indexes to county deeds are maintained, one for the Grantee and one for the Grantor. The grantee index records the names of tne purchasers in alphabetical order and are valuable in determining when the family first acquired property in that county, which is often the year of their arrival and sometimes the year of marriage.

The grantor index shows the name of those conveying title and the deed included the names of the husband and his spouse, as all persons holding rights in the property were required to sign off such rights.

In the settlement of an estate the signatures of all heirs were required. Where the purchase of a property is of record and there is no record of its transfer the conveyance many have been by Will or the locality may have been in an area included in the formation of a new county.

Three educators from Iowa Park joined more than 1,200 in attendance of the Association of Texas Professional Educators convention Saturday in Austin.

Among the concerns with the bill, as presented to committee, if passed it would freeze teacher salaries two years.

"As many of us are homeowners, we appreciate anything that lawmakers can do to lighten that burden," said Shari Emmons, president of the 80,000-member group. "However, we cannot support tax relief at the expense of teacher salaries."

Convention delegates also passed several resolutions that will be incorporated in the group's legislative agenda for the coming year. Among the positions passed was for the State Board of Educator Certification to require course work in the area of special education for all teacher trainees.

Delegates also debated several other proposals, including whether to seek a mandate that would not allow students to enter kindergarten who were not five years old before June 1. That measure was defeated.



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

GARDENING HINTS

Q. I live in Iowa Park. Is it still time to apply zinc to our pecan trees?

A. Now is an excellent time to begin making foliar spray applications of zinc to young developing pecan leaves. You can actually begin now and make several applications at two-week intervals. Zinc helps pecan trees develop healthy dark green foliage and reduces rosetting of the

Q. My onions planted in early February in Wichita Falls are flowering. What happened and what should I do?

A. Go ahead and harvest your onions as soon as possible. Since they have bolted (flowered) they will not store well. Changes in weather from cold to hot and dry conditions will trigger flowering in onions.

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
