Storm pounds area Thursday

Iowa Park shortly before 7 p.m. Thursday, leaving in its wake fallen power lines, broken tree branches, and damage to numerous structures.

While no equipment was available to measure the wind speeds, residents estimated they were between 80 and 90 miles per hour, based

on the horizontal angle of the rain. Sam Hunter reported he measured 3.8 inches in his guage across the street from city hall, and Jimmy Banks, who lives at Bell and FM 367. measured 4.8 inches.

Virgil Woodfin, who regularly reports rainfall measurements, was unable to catch any rain that day, however. His gauge, which is an official U.S. Weather Bureau instrument salvaged from the Experiment

The police radio dispatcher called out at 7:21 p.m. for all emergency personnel, including police, volunteer firemen, and representatives of TU Electric and Southwestern Bell Telephone, to respond to damaged areas.

Their work primarily was to clear roadways of fallen wires and poles, as well as limbs and various types of debris that were blocking roadways.


high winds and heavy rain struck by the high winds. that cause can do so by making de- ing a 60-foot tree being toppled in the 700 block of Coleman.

But the storm uncovered a different problem in the back yard of Sue Gwinn, at 704 E. Pacific.

A long-covered well, over which she had walked and mowed her lawn, apparently had its cover washed into its depths. The opening was about 18 inches in diameter.

No flooding of homes was reported from any point in the city, but gravel was washed onto paved street from alley ways throughout the city, by the rushing water.

Many parts of the city were without electric power for as much as 13 hours. That included the police station, which had to press into service its electric generator in order to continue operating.

moved into Iowa Park that evening knocked out power in portions of the city, including the junior high school where the school board was meeting.

The meeting was moved from the library into the main hall where kerosene lamps were placed on a table for lighting, and some personnel used flashlights.

Rainsoaked members of the powerlifting team and junior high speech team, who had competed in state level competition, were recognized by the board for their accomplishments.

Using a flashlight to read the names, Board President Keith Fisher recognized each team member individually, as well as their coach and

After the votes were canvassed, newly-elected board members Martha Dudley, Larry Dutton, and Wendall House were administered the oath of office.




Health Notes **Latex Allergy**

Allergists are expanding their efforts to alert the public, especially health care workers, about the growing problem of sensitivity to latex rubber. Latex is the milky sap from rubber trees. Proteins

in the latex can cause allergic reactions, especially after repeated exposures. Reactions can range from hives and itching to serious, although rare, instances of anaphylactic shock. The wide-spread use of latex in gloves and other medical devices is believed to have prompted the increased sensitivity, which may affect more than 6% of the population. Powder, which is often placed in latex gloves as a comfort measure, can produce airborne latex particles that may increase the risk of causing sensitization. Powder-free gloves may be better. Latex is also present in many products such as toys, bathing suits, storage bags, condoms, bandages, baby bottle nipples, etc. People who are sensitive to latex may also react to certain foods - such as bananas, avocados, kiwi, and chestnuts.

1 1/2 cups corn meal

2/3 cups flour

2 eggs, beaten

I cup grated cheese Mix all ingredients together real well (except cheese). Put 2 or 3 tablespoons of oil in large iron skillet or 9x13" pan. (I always use skillet.) Heat; remove from heat and pour 1/2 mixture into pan. Add cheese, then top with rest of mixture. Put into 400 degree oven and cook until a golden

I always cook rice when I cook beans, and with the cornbread and a salad, you have a good meal.

Angel Food Cake Delight

I angel food cake (store bought or made from mix). Slice into two layers. Put one layer in large bowl or a punch bowl.

I large pkg, sugar free strawberry jello. Prepare by directions on package and set aside to cool.

On top of the slice of cake, spread I pint of fresh, sliced strawberries, one half of cooled jello, and one half of medium carton of Lite Cool Whip. Top this with other slice of cake. Prick cake top with a fork and pour remaining jello on top of cake. Refrigerate overnight and, before serving, spread with remaining Cool

My Special Herb-Yeast Bread

3 cups white flour

1 1/4 cups wheat flour

2 pkgs. rapid-rise yeast

3 Tbsps. sugar 1 1/2 tsps. salt

3/4 tsp. thyme

3/4 tsp. oregano

1 1/2 tsp. sage 3/4 tsp. basil

3/4 cup milk 1/2 cup water

1/4 cup, plus 1 Tbsp. oleo

1 egg, beaten Additional herbs for garnish if de-

In a large bowl, combine 1 1/2 cups of the flour, sugar, undissolved yeast, salt, and herbs. Heat together milk, water and oleo until warm and oleo is melted. Stir into the dry ingredients, then stir in beaten egg and enough of flour to make a soft dough.

Knead on a lightly floured surface until smooth - about 4 to 6 minutes. Cover and let rest on floured surface 10 minutes. Divide dough into 3 equal pieces and roll each piece into a 30-inch rope. Braid them together and pinch ends together; shape into a round donut. Place on a greased baking sheet (I use my pizza pan or my large iron skillet). Cover and let rise in warm place until doubled in size, around 40 minutes to an hour.

Bake at 350 degrees until done, around 30 to 35 minutes. Cover with aluminum foil the last 10 minutes of baking to prevent excess browning. When done, brush top with melted butter or oleo.

Bicycle safety a must

The arrival of warm weather brings out the bicycle enthusiasts, especially children.

Although riding a bike is a great form of exercise for people of all ages, "safety first" should always be practiced.

According to Dr. John Podgore, department of pediatrics at the University of North Texas Health Science Center at Fort Worth, wearing a helmet decreases the intensity of bicycle-related injuries, in the same way that wearing a seatbelt decreases the intensity of car accidents.

The increasing number of statistics on bicycle accidents is alarming. Approximately 85 percent of head injuries from bicycle-related incidents could have been avoided if the rider had been wearing a bicycle helmet at the time of the crash.

For children, 2,200 of them sustained permanent disabilities from bike injuries that affect their ability to function. Use of bike helmets by children ages four to 15 would prevent 1,200 to 1,700 of these permanently disabling injuries.

Young riders and parents do not appreciate the need of wearing helmets, and although many local cities have passed bicycle helmet laws, helmets are still considered a fashion hazard rather than a safety appliance. Helmets should always be regarded as the primary injury prevention measure for reducing all injuries to riders, Dr. Podgore said.

So who needs helmets? Adults, teenagers, children, toddlers -- yes, even toddlers on their tricycles. A child of any age needs head protection while riding.

"Bring your child and the child's helmet to a pediatrician for advice. A

child's helmet needs to be a certain size, weight, and shape and must be properly ventilated," advises Dr. Podgoe. "The size of a child's head varies in shape and size, so pay close attention to fit -- if the helmet does not fit, it will not be there when you need it."

But will your child wear the helmet?

Yes, explains Dr. Podgore, if other children use them, if the child's parents wear them, and if the teacher at school mentions how beneficial helmets are, your child may decide a helmet is good to wear. And when purchasing one, make sure your child's helmet is a bright color for visibility.

Bicycle riders always need a helmet whenever riding. Dr. Podgore advises, "All cyclists crash eventually, and even a low-speed fall on a bike path can scramble a rider's senses. Take the time to take responsibility for yourself and your children. And enjoy the outdoors with a bike ride that's healthy and safe."

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





I realize the school has had to cut back with the budget, but I also feel that we can't deny this child's right to be able to go to the school of her choice.

It means so very much to me to be able to say that I graduated from Iowa Park school, and that my children will do the same. This little girl has grown up with the kids of Iowa Park. She has played various sports with these kids and wants very much to attend school with her friends. This child's family have lived in Iowa Park for many years. Her father, aunts and uncles have all graduated Iowa

SOCIAL SECURITY'S LONG-RANGE FINANCING **OUTLOOK UNCHANGED**

The Social Security Board of Trustees announced that the Old Age and Survivors Insurance (OASI) and Disability Insurance (DI) Trust Funds, which support benefit payments to nearly 44 million Americans, are in good financial condition, and will remain so well into the next century.

The 1997 report concludes that -- even with no changes in current law -- the combined OASI and DI funds would be able to continue paying benefits for the next 32 years.

Trustees emphasized in the report that it is important to address the issue of Social Security's long-range insolvency within a reasonable period to allow time for phasing in any necessary changes and for workers to adjust their retirement plans to take account of those changes.

At the same time, the Board stressed that there is ample time to discuss and evaluate alternative solutions with deliberation and care.

They stated that the size of the long-range deficit -- 2.23 percent of total payroll -- is such that long-range balance could be restored within the framework of the present Social Security structure.

Bowen pleads guilty

Steven Ray Bowen, 29, of Iowa Park, pled guilty Tuesday morning in 30th District Court to two counts each of intoxication manslaughter and failure to stop and render aid in the 1996 deaths of Jack Witherspoon and Todd Duncan.

According to Jerry Taylor, prosecutor with the Wichita County District Attorney's office, each intoxicated manslaughter charge carries a 20 year maximum sentence, and each failure to stop and render aid charge carries a maximum five year sentence. The sentences will be served concurrently.

Judge Bob Brotherton, also entereda deadly weapon finding, which mandates that at least 50 percent of the sentence be served with no "time off (the sentence) for good behav-

Having served one year in the

Wichita County Jail, Taylor said Bowen will have to serve nine more years in a state penitentiary before he is eligible for parole. Taylor added he believes Bowen will be going to a unit specifically for alcohol abusers.

The plea bargain agreement came one year and three days after Bowen, intoxicated and driving at a high rate of speed, slammed into the back of a pickup truck carrying Duncan, 30, and Witherspoon, 42, just east of Iowa Park on the Old Iowa Park Road.

The two men were ejected from the vehicle and died a short time

According to police reports, following the collision Bowen fled the scene on foot, and was located at a residence several blocks away by a DPS Trooper.
