# Top stories of 1997 reviewed

A review of the top news stories carried by the Leader during 1997 indicates how busy and involved Iowa Park was through the year.

The top stories of the year were as follows:

#### JANUARY

Beautification of the intersection of Johnson Road and West Highway got underway, with a joint project of the high school's Horticulture class and the Texas Highway Dept., as workers installed a planter and base for an electrical information bulletin board. Recipients of special awards presented by the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept. included the Fireman of the Year award to Danny Skinner and Special Service award to Greg Wood. Recipients of the Chamber of Commerce annual awards, presented during the organization's banquet, included: Kenneth Via, Outstanding Citizen; Carlton Hicks, Outstanding Senior Citizen; Pat Cravens, Educator of the year, and Park Clinic, Business of the Year. A winter storm forced closing of classes in Iowa Park schools for the first time in some 10 years. During a meeting of the school board, Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer's letter of retirement effective June 30 was announced. Karen Schell and Silvia Gonzalez were named to the All-State Band. An agreement was reached between the City of Iowa Park and Little League, giving the girls' senior league authorization to use the old Will Burnett Field. Todd Yeager was named Most Valuable Offensive Player and Jeremiah Love Most Valuable Defensive Player for 1996, during the annual football banquet.

#### FEBRUARY

After firemen extinguished a burning 1990 automobile at Lake Buffalo, police determined the vehicle had previously been stolen. The Lady Hawks closed out their basketball season with a 15-16 record. Local and area residents attended a luncheon honoring Bill Sturgis, who was retiring as vice president of Grace Packaging World-Wide. The Hawk basketball team defeated Breckenridge 69-64 in Bi-District, but lost 63-62 to Glen Rose to end the season with a 22-14 record.

Band earned the Sweepstakes Award for the 14th consecutive year.

#### MAY

A connection developed between Iowa Park and the Davis Mountains of West Texas, when Iowa Parkan Jessie Rowe's brother, Joe Rowe and his wife were kidnapped by three armed Republic of Texas separatists, and later were released. Alora Foster and Randi Tigrett were among 30 Class AAA basketball players named to the 1996-97 Academic All-State squad by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches. James Jenkins III of Iowa Park was seriously injured while working as a guard at the Allred Unit when he was attacked by two inmates. Two former office holders were returned to posts by voters in city and school elections; Bud Mercer to the city council and Wendall House to the school board. Iowa Park police recovered \$2,500 worth of computer equipment within an hour after it was reported as stolen from the junior high school. Winds estimated as high as 90 miles per hour inflicted heavy damage to a Billy James Garage structure. Heather Goodwin was named valedictorian and Silvia Gonzalez salutatorian of the senior class. School trustees chose Allen Shewmake to take over transportation and food service for the schools, and continue as tax collector, and also Sharon Powell as the district's business manager. Telephone customers had their area code changed from 817 to 940. Aledo ended the Hawk's baseball season at the Region One Quarterfinal; Iowa Park finished with a 24-5 record.

#### JUNE

A storm that produced winds strong enough to knock over numerous trees in the city, also sent a lightening bolt on a direct hit at the police station, knocking out five computers. Results of the TAAS were announced by Supt. Mike Caplinger: no grade level or subject area fell below the score of 80. Though he was only 20 years of age, Iowa Parkan Casey Moser became a professional minor league umpire in Virginia. Local realtor Tommy Key told the council of his plans to develop an 18-hole golf course on the north side of US 287. Lifelong resident Bennett Brookshire, 33, was pronounced dead after being found alone in his car at Lake Buffalo. Winners of the annual All-Iowa Park Golf Tournament were Wayne Nicholson, Kathy Woods and Leroy Threet Jr. The city council agreed to seek a state grant to finance construction of a walking track around Lake Gordon. An historical marker was dedicated at Colorado and West Park, at the site of Wichita County's first refinery and Texas-Oklahoma Fair.

Some 29 years after local volunteer fireman Earl Virgin Jr. died while on duty, his name was added to the Volunteer Fireman's Monument on the Capitol Historic South Grounds in Austin. School trustees adopted a \$9.3-million budget for 1997-98, and set the tax rate at \$1.25.

#### **SEPTEMBER**

High school principal Richard Davis announced he would retire at the end of the fall semester, having completed 30 years in education. Steve Beckwith was named pastor of First Baptist Church. Carole Venhaus, foreign languages teacher at Iowa Park High, was selected to represent Region Nine in competition for the Outstanding Teacher of the Year in Texas. Valerie Johnson was crowned '97 Homecoming Queen. Dr. Erwin Soell became only the second physician to ever retire from the staff of Park Clinic. A contractor's crew began a project to completely rebuild Victoria Street, from Cash to the Access Road.

#### **OCTOBER**

Joan Robinson announced she was retiring after serving 26 years as secretary of the First United Methodist Church. Bert and Stanley Williamson donated 2.75 acres of land located on the immediate west side of the high school, to the school district. Three Iowa Parkans, Steve and Cy Turner and Tommy Key, were among more than a million who attended a Promise Keeper's rally in Washington, D.C. A crowd estimated at more than 250 participated in the annual KidFish at Lake Gordon. Joe Singer was elected vice chairman of the Nortex Regional Planning Commission. School trustees amended the student dress code, as recommended by the District Dress Code Committee. For the 16th consecutive year, the Hawk Band earned a Division One rating in the UIL marching contest. A special recognition ceremony was held in Hawk Stadium, where more than 6,000 fans had gathered for the annual football game with Vernon, to recognize Robert Wilcox, who was in his 50th year as public address announcer. Sherrie Williams joined the Leader staff as a reporter. Shelly Merchant, who has been with the Iowa Park school district three years, received the Texas Association for Gifted and Talented Advocacy Award. The newly-formed Iowa

#### MARCH

Robert Nolen became the fourth inductee into the Hawk Track Hall of Fame, announced during the annual Iowa Park Lions Club Relays. Following several months of study and meetings, school trustees heard recommendations of the Facility Task Force. Native Iowa Parkan Reesa Robinson Parker was elected president of the Dallas Court Reporters Association. Dr. Greg Ammons was presented the Community Builders Award by the Iowa Park Masonic Lodge. R.L. (Raymond) Good was honored with a birthday party -- his 100th -- on Mar. 29, eventhough the official birth date was to be April 2. The Twenty-Three Study Club and Amity Study Club combined to host the annual convention of Santa Rosa District of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. The Lady Hawk powerlifting team placed second at the state meet, and Amanda Stephens and Melinda Bradshaw earned first-place medals.

### APRIL

A new storm-warning siren was installed on the water tower in the northwest part of the city. Former Iowa Parkan David William Kerr, 35, of Houston was killed in a one-car accident on Bell Road South. The community observed its 18th annual Community-Wide Clean-Up project, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. Two men walked away from their private airplane after they were forced to make a power-off landing in a wheat field on Bell Road, midway between US 287 and Old Iowa Park Road. Wichita County Sheriff's deputies arrested Trevor Pool and another man from Henrietta, both 20, on charges of stealing cattle. Danny Skinner was named Firefighter of the Year at the West Texas District Firemans and Fire Marshalls Association convention. The IPHS girls' softball field finally got some stands for fans when they were moved from the junior high football field, as suggested by junior high students. Melinda Bradshaw and Amanda Stephens earned first places in their respective divisions at the NASA National Powerlifting Meet. The school board approved a proposal to turn over operation of the Bicentennial Swimming Pool to the city, for the first time since the facility was built in 1976. The Lady Hawks bowed out from the state softball playoffs after losing 12-10 to Clyde. The Hawk

#### JULY

The junior high band again sold subscriptions to the Leader, and contributed its commissions, all \$756.80, to benefit the Iowa Park Recreational Activities Center. Vandals used a paintball gun on numerous homes in the southern part of the city, where one home was the bull's eye 20 times. Chamber of Commerce directors named Robert Palmer to fullfill the unexpired term of president, following Dale Cox's resignation when he moved from the city. Jake Dillard was named to the All-State baseball team, and signed to play at Wayland Baptist Univ. in Plainview. Dr. Fausto Avila joined the staff at Park Clinic. Clint Myers was named state winner in Agriculture Entrepreneurship during the state Future Farmers of America convention in Amarillo. Cynthia Pearson, 27, was fired as a guard at Allred Unit following an internal affairs investigation into a charge she had solicited the murder of her husband. The city council began an effort to solicit voluntary annexations of property not inside the city limits. In recognition of its 106th anniversary, the Iowa Park Masonic Lodge received a state historical marker. In response to the city's call for donations to build a 1.5-mile walking track around Lake Gordon, the Rotary club donated \$800 and the Iowa Park Lions Club chipped in \$250.

#### AUGUST

Mike Hendersonwas named manager of the Cryovac plant, succeeding Frank Terlizzi, who was named general operations manager of the Simpsonville, SC manufacturing facility. Iowa Park High School received the "recognized" rating from the Texas Education Agency for the first time, and because of the overall TAAS scores, the entire school district received the same rating. Accompanied by his mother, a young boy turned over a \$100 bill to police which he said he found in the grassy area at Kidwell Elementary. A bronze hawk created by local artist Jack Stevens was obtained by the Athletic Booster Club and installed beneath the scoreboard at Hawk Stadium. The city council adopted a tax rate of \$.68999 per \$100 valuation and a budget for 1997-98 of \$3,163,300. The Iowa Park Police Dept. sponsored a "Night Out Against Crime" at the RAC, complete with musical entertainment and refreshments. A district judge threw out suits filed by former high school athletic director Robert Clensay Continued on page 2



In small towns check with an attorney's office. Some have kept records of wills, probate and other legal papers that required a lawyer for many years.

Court house records are very useful. Property transactions, marriages and divorces are all recorded. We all leave a trail of legal papers.

Park Academic Booster Club held its organizational meeting. Several tracts of land were annexed into the Iowa Park extraterritorial jurisdiction, at the request of the owners. Democrat Aaron Alejandro held a meeting at the RAC to announce his candidacy for Wichita County judge.

#### NOVEMBER

Dozens of county and various law enforcement personnel converged in an area west of the city, after a man threatened suicide, which he did not complete. Jess and Orrilea Ashton began stocking a drive-through safari park with exotic animals on land east of the city off FM 367. The Leader published its second annual "Shop Iowa Park First" edition. The Hawk football team was runner-up to Vernon in Dist. 5-AAA, completed the regular season with a 9-1 record, but fell 21-35 in Bi-District to Breckenridge. New officers of the Chamber of Commerce were elected, including: Robert Palmer, president; Lisa Bushfield, first vice president, and Mike Caplinger, second vice president. Iowa Park native Terri Voyles Penaluna kicked off her campaign to be elected Wichita County Clerk. Local contributions to the United Way Campaign were \$95,235, one percent higher than the previous year. Brandon Negri, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Negri, was graduated from the Texas Department of Public Safety Training Academy, and assigned to work in the Terrell area. The city council accepted the resignation of Ray Smock, who had been the chief of police the past five years.

#### DECEMBER

Stephanie Gideon, a junior at IPHS, was named to the All-Region Choir and advanced into All-State competition. Planning was begun to observe the 100th anniversary of Iowa Park schools. Burlington Northern and Santa Fe Railway company announced its trains would begin passing through the city at 60 miles per hour, as approved by the Federal Railroad Administration. A 40-year-old Iowa Park resident, Charles David Wright, was killed in a one-vehicle accident at US 287 and Bell Road. Bill Robinson announced he would not seek re-election as







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One of my oldest friends in the newspaper profession died Friday, Dec. 19, at St. Luke Hospital in Houston.

James Roberts was editor and publisher of the Andrews County News, and chairman of more than a dozen other community newspapers in Texas and New Mexico, including Vernon and Quanah.

If you look at this page often, you should remember Roberts' fine writings we've carried under the heading of Worth Quoting.

The Roberts family moved to Andrews in 1934, and the move included printing equipment to start the community newspaper.

I almost went to work with James, back in 1958. I went to Andrews in response to an advertisement for a reporter. But I talked with James' father, whom he always referred to as "The Old'un."

I didn't meet James on that trip, because he was working as a substi-

And though I was offered the daily in Portales, N. M., and took it wounded. because it wasn't as much a move

from Olton, where we lived at the time.

Roberts died at the age of 74, following open heart surgery. He had suffered vascular problems over the years, all of which started when he was wounded and captured by the Germans during World War II.

One of my many interesting recollections of James had to do with his being wounded and captured.

Some 30 years later, we were attending one of our numerous press conventions, and it just so happened James and the late publisher of the Hamilton Herald, Bob Miller, began comparing their war experiences.

Miller had been an officer in the Army, and during their discussion, James came to the conclusion that Bob's outfit was the unit which was supposed to have come in support to James' outfit as it was being overrun by the Germans.



Two phone conversations with James Roberts changed my life.

In 1981, when I was about to marry an Andrews teacher, I called and asked him if he needed another newsman. He probably didn't think he did, but he gave me a job anyway, and I spent three years working for him. It wasn't always pleasant trying to keep up with his schedule and work within a family business, but it prepared me for many roles I have played in the years since.

It was James who first encouraged me to write a weekly column, and who rejoiced as I won a few awards he'd been winning since before I was born.

In '87, broke and floundering after starting a paper of my own, I wrote James to ask for a job in case anything opened up in his network of papers. Just a few weeks later, the publisher in Azle and Springtown left to begin his own venture in South Texas. When James called, our con-

#### Supplementation of Cattle

It's funny that even when we do get rain, for some it's not the right type? The recent rains have helped some of the drought-stressed wheat and cool-season grasses on our native pastures

It, however, has not benefited our tank water situation because most of the rain came slow and easy and soaked into the ground before it ran off into our tanks.

I guess if it's not one thing it's another

As producers, you may want to start thinking of some type of supplementation on either wheat or native grass pastures to stretch your forage. The type of supplementation will vary depending on the type of pasture and what type of livestock you're running.


In general, the first thing to think about, in maintaining cattle, is energy. Energy can usually be met by grass or hay, which leaves protein as the next problem.

Protein can be provided by cottonseed meal, alfalfa hay, 20% cubes, and whole cottonseed. Generally, cottonseed cake is 41% protein, alfalfa is 18% protein and of course the cubes are 20% protein.

When estimating how much protein to feed, you can use the following formula: 41% cottonseed cake contains (.41 x 2000 lbs.) 820 pounds of crude protein per ton, so in one pound of cake you would be feeding Al pounds of protein.

The 20% cake would have (.2 x 2000) 4090 pounds of protein per ton and alfalfa would have (.18 x 2000) 360 pounds of protein per ton.

By knowing how to calculate percent protein you can also run cost comparisons between these feeds.



Max Gallaway has some good recommendations for wet and dry cows that are wintered on dry grass or non-legume hay.


Wet cows should be getting 3 to 3.5 pounds of cottonseed meal, :8-10 pounds of alfalfa hay, 6-7 pounds of 20% cubes, and 5-6 pounds of whole haasmonton

Dry cows do not require as much feed to maintain themselves through the winter and can be cut down to 1 to 1.5 pounds of cottonseed meal, 4-5 pounds of alfalfa hay, 3-4 pounds of 20% cubes and 3-4 pounds of whole cottonseed

There is a chemical inside the cottonseed called gossypol. Gossypol is chemical that is toxic to nonruminants (like hogs) and young reminants alike.

If anyone would like to make their own ration and get it analyzed for crude protein, TDN, and any miero or macro-minerals, stop by the office. I have a mix-it program that can calculate any ration, or work on new ones.


