

Iowa Park's two independent pharmacists are scratching their heads, checking their bank accounts, and contacting an attorney.

But they've both been assured everything will be alright, if they will each just write \$50,000 checks to the U.S. Department of Justice Drug Enforcement Administration.

Both complied, and both were accused in the registered letters that each had filled four prescriptions without the individual doctor's DEA

Should the DEA commence civil action, each violation is subject to a \$25,000 fine, according to the letter.

"Please understand, however, that the list of violations set forth in this letter is not intended to be exhaustive, and if this matter is litigated, further violations may be charged by the United States," the letter threatened.

And it continued, stating, "Our office prefers, when appropriate, to resolve matters without the expense of litigation. Without further investigation, our office will accept \$50,000 (two violations at \$25,000 per each violation) to settle this matter.

Obviously, both Hughes and Martin were extremely upset over their plight.

"We're being treated worse than someone out on the street selling drugs," commented Hughes.

"This is an economic thing," Martin said, adding that the money the DEA expected to get out of its fines from Wichita County pharmacies would finance the DEA office

The physicians on the DEA's list are all in the residency program centered in Wichita Falls. After completing their residency, they then are issued DEA numbers.

A practice of family practice physicians in residency some 20 years here has been for prescriptions issued by them to carry the DEA number of their sponsoring physician or their clinic.

"If I had known I was doing anything illegal, I wouldn't have done it," said Martin. He was echoed by Hughes, who said, "It's been going on for 20 years, and no one knew they were doing anything wrong."

Hughes said the four prescriptions he filled were for cough syrup and pain medicine, for which his gross sales were \$75.

Two of the prescriptions he filled were written by Dr. Fausto Avila, who is on the staff at Park Clinic and now has his own DEA number.

However, all four prescriptions Martin is accused of filling were by Dr. Avila, and all were refills of original prescriptions issued by Dr. Erwin Soell, who was Dr. Avila's

Both pharmacists said they were joining with others in Wichita Falls in obtaining the services of an attorney to fight the allegations of wrong

Neither man said he could afford to pay such a fine, and each added such enormous fines very likely





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

The "Fruit Cocktail Cake" recipe was given to Marge, when she was a teenager, by her Aunt Mary because it is easy to make.

Marge said the zucchini bread freezes well. She said her neighbor had given her a lot of zucchini, so she started making the bread and freezing

Swiss Steak

2 lbs. round steak 1/2 cup flour

Salt Pepper

1 onion, sliced

2 Tbsps. shortening

1 (8 oz.) can tomato sauce Pound flour, salt and pepper into

steak. Brown steak in hot shortening. Add sliced onions and tomato sauce. Cover and cook over very low heat 2

Zucchini Bread

4 eggs

2 cups sugar

3 1/2 cups flour

1 1/2 tsps. baking powder

1 tsp. salt

1 cup oil 1 tsp. cinnamon

3/4 tsp. baking soda

2 cups grated zucchini

1 tsp. vanilla 1/2 cup walnuts

1/2 cup raisins

Beat eggs and sugar together: add oil and mix well. Add the combined dry ingredients to mixture. Then add the zucchini, nuts and raisins.

Pour mixture into 2 greased and floured loaf pans. Bake 55 minutes in preheated 350 degree oven.

Fruit Cocktail Cake

Cream together:

1 1/2 cups sugar 1/2 cup brown sugar

2 eggs

Add 1 medium can of fruit cocktail and beat together.

Then add:

2 heaping cups flour 1/2 tsp. salt

2 tsps. baking soda

Pour batter in 9x12 or 8x12 greased and floured pan. Sprinkle chopped pecans over batter. Bake in 350 degree preheated oven 40-45 minutes.

Icing:

1 stick margarine

1/2 cup canned milk 3/4 cup powdered sugar

Boil together 3 minutes. Spoon over warm cake. Sprinkle 1/2 cup chopped pecans and 1 cup coconut

Stuffed Cabbage

1 1/2 lbs. hamburger meat

1 lb. ground pork 1 1/2 cups minute rice

Salt & pepper

3 cans tomato paste (1 can in meat mixture)

2 cans tomato sauce (1 can in meat mixture)

1 head cabbage

are soft enough to roll.

Mix hamburger meat, pork, rice, salt, pepper, tomato sauce and tomato

paste all together. Roll meat mixture into cabbage leaves and place in a large (5 or 6 quart) pan. Add rest of the tomato sauce and tomato paste with water to

cover the cabbage rolls. Bring to a boil, then lower heat and cook slowly 2 hours.



Before the Promise Keepers "Stand in the Gap" rally in Washington, D.C., the National Organization of Women (NOW) spent a lot of time protesting the Christian men's group. It was the same tired rhetoric that they have used for the past 20 years, but the babblings of the anguished feminists brought back an old memory.

About two decades ago I happened to stumble into a nest of feminists, and lived to tell the tale.

It all started off innocently enough. At the time, I was working in Houston and the company I labored for was in extensive negotiations with a major oil company over a large equipment purchase.

"Oh," was her reply, "they are here for a national NOW convention."

In my ignorance, I had to ask what NOW stood for. The waitress didn't have a clue, so she asked one of the women at the next table. Bad mistake.

The NOW delegate turned and explained in no uncertain terms that they were the National Organization of Women. "This is about female power!" she shouted.

Feeling very much like a couple of Jews at a Nazi rally, my friend and I decided that a strategic retreat was in order. Though we were so low on the corporate feeding chain that we couldn't "oppress" anyone or anything, it was best just to go.

We've lived in West Texas all our life and still marvel at the miracle at 7 p.m. in council chambers. of clouds.

How can something appearing so soft, so fluffy, so billowing carry around so much weight?

Over the years, in both commercial and private planes, we've flownalongside, over, under, through West Texas clouds. We've felt the power, the turbulence, the pull, the strange updrafts and downdrafts, and the almost hypnotic magnetism of racing between two towering cloud formations.

And yet, we've never fathomed how something so gentle, so innocent in appearance, could deliver tons and tons of moisture on parched land. This week, we finally found some

numbers to illustrate what we're talking about. For a cloud to deliver one inch of

rainfall upon one acre, requires 27,154 gallons of water. That's a figure from Dr. Leon

New, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

And with water weighing eight pounds per gallon, that spells out to something in the neighborhood of 217,232 pounds or 10.8 tons of weight that cloud carried to deliver one inch to one acre of land.

How did it do that?

To carry it a bit further, a saddle horse guess would put about 2,500 acres within the city limits of

To deliver a one-inch rainfall upon the city would require clouds to carry and deliver something like 67.8 million gallons or moisture weighing 536 million pounds or 27,154 tons of

Even if you stretch the rain out over a two-hour period, it still would mean the clouds would have to dump roughly 226 tons of water per minute.

We admit we do not understand the mechanics of nature making rain. And the technical explanations leave us high and dry.

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

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

The following questions were received at the Wichita County Extension Office.

Q. I wanted to know when I should prune Wisteria?

A. Wisteria is a spring blooming vine which means that pruning should be accomplished right after the plant has completed blooming in the spring. Winter pruning will remove buds produced during the growing season and eliminate any spring blooms. This is true for all of our spring blooming vines and shrubs.

Q. I read your article recently on holes in someone's yard. I had the same problem a few years ago and it turned out to be an opossum. I had originally thought it was an armadillo. I thought this information might be useful to you.

A. I always like to hear feedback from area gardeners. In most cases this type of digging damage is armadillos, however, I have come across an opossum in the past.

Life trapping is still the best alternative for control within city limits. Thanks for the information.

Q. Our daughter is in the Peace Corp in Africa. She is being bothered by a bat that continues to reside in her dwelling. Is there any chance you could give us some advice to pass on

to her concerning this problem? A. The Bat Information Institution recommends hanging strips of aluminum foil from the ceiling to reduce bat activity. Other options include using a mylar balloon filled with helium. Simply release the balloon in the home. The institute also reports that using dog and cat repellent products often sold at garden centers will give several weeks of

control, but must be re-applied. Q. Ilive in Burkburnett and have a tremendous problem with gophers in my lawn. They have done a great deal of damage. I have heard of electronic devices for gopher control. What kind of results could I expect from an electronic type device?

A. Gophers can be a serious problem in your more sandy soils in the northern portion of Wichita County. I guess this makes for easier digging for the gophers.

Electronic devices for gopher control have not proven effective in university testing. Save your money as many of these devices are very expensive.

Recommended control strategies include using gopher baits injected down into the tunnel system the gophers have created. Use a probe or hollow piece of pipe to deliver the bait into the tunnel. Cover the hole up after you have injected the bait.

Q. I have a large number of tulip bulbs in my crisper bin of the refrigerator. I have held them there for 45 days as you suggested back in fall. Can I go ahead and plant the bulbs

A. Early to mid-December are normally prime times for planting chilled tulip bulbs. Select a location in a well-drained soil with full-sun for best results. You will enjoy the flower display this spring.

Q. I have heard we have a good pecan crop this year in the area. Why does my Burkett pecan tree have almost no pecans this year?

A. Pecan trees are cyclical in their production. One year you may have a bumper crop and then the following year you will have very few pecans. This is the nature of the beast as far as pecans are concerned.

Researchers have made advances with the development of newer cultivars that are less cyclical in terms of production, however, we have never been able to completely get around this dilemma.

Proper irrigation during the growing season, fertilization with nitrogen and zinc applications, and pest control are critical to maintaining healthy pecan trees and beautiful
