Since Tuesday of last week, local officers have taken 11 persons into custody, for everything from possession of alcohol in a city park to

And in between all those arrests they were checking out numerous reports of fireworks being set off in the city, which is against an existing ordinance, and the theft of posted signs informing visitors to Lake Iowa Park that possession of alcoholic beverages in city parks also violates a city ordinance.

One of those arrested during the week was a 16-year-old male who had been handled each of the previ-

ous two weeks. Police were called at 7:65 p.m. Friday to a disturbance in the 500 block of Rebecca, and arrested the youth for having assaulted his father. The boy was transported two hours later to the county juvenile detention

Last Wednesday afternoon, officers were notified of a situation in which a female was reportedly chasing a male in the street near Fourth and Van Horn.

Police found the couple at a residence in the 900 block of Van Horn, and, based on their actions, asked and received permission to search the house.

Cody Lynn Longley, 18, was later arrested on a charge of possession of marijuana, less than an ounce. He was later transported to the county jail, according to the blotter entry.

When an officer stopped Ronnie Dean Henderson, 22, Sunday evening in the 200 block of West Highway, it was determined his drivers license had been suspended. He was arrested and transported to jail.

Monday morning, officers were called to a residence in the 900 block of South Wall, where a domestic disturbance was reported.

They arrested Andrea Michelle Kaufhold, 20, after determining that she was wanted on an outstanding warrant issued by the Wichita County sheriff's office, for theft by check over \$20.

She was transported to the jail

under a \$1,000 bond. A 34-year-old woman, Melynda Diane Groves, was arrested Tuesday afternoon a Lake Iowa Park on a charge of possession of an alcoholic beverage. She was issued a citation and released, according to the police

Another woman was arrested Tucsday afternoon, but this one was for shoplifting at Food Depot.

Karla Kae Hand, 38, was charged with theft under \$50, and later was released after paying a fine of \$83.50.

All the other arrests during the week were on outstanding warrants.

Meissner was turned over to a DPS trooper to be transported to the county jail.

Pool, lake expect July 4th crowds

Without a doubt, the two most popular places to be tomorrow while celebrating the July 4th holiday will be the Bicentennial Swimming Pool and Lake Iowa Park.

Both places not only offer special activities, but they'll afford a cool respite from the temperature, which is forecast near 100 degrees.

Special drawings for outstand-

ing prizes will be made at the pool, while it is open from 12-noon until 6 The biggest prize will be for a 31-inch color television. Names in

that pot will be those who have purchased family memberships. Those with individual memberships will be eligible for the drawing

of a 19-inch color television set. Other prizes will be determined during the day, using names of other member subscribers, as well as those attending on general admission.

And if you want to set off any type of fireworks, Lake Iowa Park is

Special action by the city council designated the lake area as the only place inside the city limits where fireworks can be ignited, without violating city ordinance.

Those who set off fireworks are encouraged to pick up debris remaining from their display, and put it in any of the extra trash dumpsters which have been placed in the area.

Police are concerned over a number of reports that fireworks have been set off in residential areas of the city, which is a violation of city ordinance.

Additionally, police will be available to issue citations to anyone who has alcoholic beverages at Lake Iowa Park, or any other park inside the city. That also is prohibited by city ordinance.

Incidentally, two signs which were posted at the entrance of Lake Iowa Park, warning against having alcoholic beverages, were reportedly stolen last week.

Trustees approve salary increases

A state-mandated minimum salary schedule for classroom teachers and full-time librarians was approved by the board of trustees during a called

meeting Tuesday of last week. The salary schedule is subject to voter approval of a consitutional amendment required by H.J.R. 4 on Aug. 9, which, if approved by voters would increase the homestead ex-

emption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. Teachers are placed on the new salary schedule according to their cumulative years of experience as of Sept. 1, 1997. Salaries range from \$21,050 for beginning teachers to

\$37,460 for those with 20-plus years of teaching experience. The average increase in the Iowa Park school district is \$1,135.25.

Also approved were 1997-98 salaries for Food Service personnel. With the minimum wage changing to \$5.15 on Sept. 1, all food service personnel will get at least a 10-cent per hour increase, but not more than

Following a brief closed session, trustees approved the hiring of three teachers and an interpreter.

Deloris Beard was hired as high school and junior high choir director. She will fill vacancies left by the resignations of Debi Walters and Donna Brinlee.

Beard, who has taught the last three years at Vernon, also has teaching experience in international and Department of Defense Dependents Schools.

Leigh Segler, who will teach high school math, is a graduate of Midwestern State University. She taught last year at the Hirschi Math-Science Magnet School in Wichita

Another MSU graduate, Lori L. Edmonson, was hired to teach journalism at the high school. Her experience includes teaching classes in English Rhetoric and Composition, tutor for the Foreign Language Department, and computer lab assistant, all at MSU.

Jeanette Box was hired to work at the junior high school as an interpreter for deaf/hearing impaired.

A graduate of Rider High School in Wichita Falls, Box attended MSU two years, and received a diploma in business from Draughon's Business College. She owns a business, At Your Service, which provides services for people with special needs or disabilities, and is an interpreter for deaf and hearing impaired clients.

The only other action taken by the board was to approve a Local District Update to be placed in the district's Policy Manual.

Although a regular meeting of the board is not normally scheduled in July, there is the possibility of a meeting being called to consider the district's depository contract.







— Health Notes — **Congestive Heart Failure**

Congestive heart failure is the most common hospital admission diagnosis and the leading cause of death for persons over age 65. Therefore, it is somewhat surprising that many

persons haven't heard of this condition until they are hospitalized with shortness of breath, weakness, fatigue and collection of fluid in the lungs, feet and ankles. Often, these symptoms are attributed to other health problems such as being overweight. Delaying the treatment of this condition can be life-threatening. With heart failure, the heart can not adequately circulate blood to meet the needs of the body. This condition is primarily due to a weakening of heart fibers involved in the pumping action of the heart. Medicines used to treat congestive (referring to the fluid accumulation that can occur) heart failure eliminate excessive fluid in the lungs and legs and make the heart a more efficient pump.



Apparently Iowa Park isn't the only community where some individuals pick up a little bit of information -- especially if it's about something they know nothing -- and then attempt to criticize for the purpose of getting their point over.

I got a belly full of that when our city council was considering building a golf course.

Just last week, I was reading a copy of the Lampasas Dispatch in which a member of the city council wrote a letter to the editor, responding to allegations made by one of that town's characters.

There were in fact five points made, but I want to quote only two, both of which relate to allegations concerning Lampasas' golf course.

They went like this: Point 2: This is a real winner. Mr. Dehnel states, "City officials obtained a grant of \$1.1 million and a loan of \$3.4 million to build waste-

water treatment plant. Well and good,

but why must the citizens pay for the

loan when the City Council has al-

ready spent close to \$3.5 million on the golf course (and continues to spend money daily for paving of cart trails, etc.)." Really, Curt, did you maintain a straight face when you were writing this paragraph?

Correction: Mr. Dahnel's quotes of a \$1.1 million grant and a \$3.4 million loan are approximately correct (actual figures are \$1.55 million grant and \$3.9 million loan) but Curt, where in the world did you come up with \$3.5 million spent on the golf course?! If we had that kind of money to spend on the golf course, we would have the finest 54-hole golf course in the nation, not just 18 holes! It is a fact the city transferred \$600,000 from the General Reserve Fund (acity fund) to the Golf Course Fund (also a city fund) to complete the building of the course, to be repaid from the golf course revenue to the General Reserve Fund at 6.5 percent interest which is higher interest than the city could get investing in certificates of deposit! And the repayment will be

Secondly, there is not one dime being spent daily on cart trails or "etc.," whatever that is. If you would go out to the golf course and walk around the golf paths, you would see no money is being spent on golf trails. Don't get your shoes muddy! What cart trails have been constructed were paid for with golf course funds budgeted for this purpose.

Point 5: Your quote of 250 member golfers is close (actual 242). One thing you fail to mention is that those 242 member golfers pay \$96,000 annually just for the privilege to play on this golf course. The other point you fail to cover is the thousands of rounds of golf paid for by tourists and out-of-towners who not only spend money at the golf course, but in our motels, restaurants and shops. These people come from all over Texas and beyond.

That fine bit of information was written by E.J. "Jim" Wallace, in case you might know some people who live in the fine city of Lampasas.

It's not uncommon for someone to pick up on only one or two points

New law for water safety BTAT president Mark Reynolds.

The state's largest boating industry group has praised the comprehensive new Texas Water Safety Act of 1997 signed into law by Gov. Bush, calling it a step which not only will make boating in Texas more enjoyable but also a standard nationwide for addressing safety issues.

The Boating Trades Association of Texas, representing boat dealers, manufacturers and their customers across the state, said the passage of HB 966 will make waterways safer by establishing funding and an effective infrastructure and for increased boater education and law enforcement of the state's water safety

House author of the bill was Rep. Keith Oakley (D-Terrell), chairman of the House Public Safety Committee, which was charged with studying water safety during the last legislative interim. Senate sponsor was Sen. Gonzalo Barrientos (D-Austin).

Key provisions of the bill, which go into effect Sept. 1, include the following:

- * Mandatory boater education for violators of the Texas Water Safety Code.
- * Creation of local and state marine safety enforcement officers.
- * Mandatory education for vessel operators born after Sept. 1, 1984.
- Reallocation of fine money collected from violators to assist local entities.
- * Refined requirements for the operation of a vessel livery.
- * Standardized reporting procedures to create a uniform database at TPWD.

"Gov. Bush's signature on this bill culminates more than two years of leadership by Chairman Oakley through the legislative process," said Laney and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and to all co-sponsors of the legislation for their bipartisan support."
