Car Speed Control **Throughout Texas**

Texas motorists who push too hard on the gas pedal of their cars are going to face the newest scientific device which has been designed to keep them-and othersalive by checking their rate of travel

Homer Garrison jr., director of the department of public safety, announced this week that the highway patrol division has secured three radar speed meters and they will be put into use shortly in selected areas of the state.

Use of the radar machines will be a far cry from the old concept of "speed traps" and the public will be adequately acquainted with their locations.

The machines, said to be more accurate than auto speedometers, will be operated by members of the highway patrol who have been specially schooled in their use.

First public tests of the equipment will be made this week in the Harlingen area and judges, prosecutors and members of the press will be invited to try their hands at beating the machine. Garrison said similar public dem onstrations will be made in other areas before the devices are used to catch speeders.
