Trustees work on budget without firm numbers

Without firm tax figures, school ers is included in the legislation. board members began work on the 1997-98 budget during a special called meeting Thursday night in the junior high school library.

Despite efforts of administrative personnel in cutting budget requests, the school district apparently will still be short on funding for this year's budget.

Although over \$300,000 has been cut from this year's budget, with the state-mandated teacher's salary increase, which came to \$234,031 locally, the budget is still \$169,374 over expected revenues. Revenue totals were reached using figures that will apply if the statewide constitutional amendment passes on Aug. 9.

If approved, the constitutional amendment would increase the school tax exemption on homesteads from the present maximum of \$5,000 to \$15,000. Also, a pay raise for teach-

Supt. Mike Caplinger said that they are having to work with limited information since everything hinges on whether the amendment passes.

Sharon Powell, the district's business manager, went over the budget figures with board members.

Caplinger was highly complimentary of principals and department heads for their cooperation in making budget cuts. "They understand the financial condition the school district is in and that cuts were necessary," he said.

Cuts include: high school \$81,150; junior high, \$60,452; Bradford Elementary, \$55,783; Kidwell Elementary, \$28,645; athletics, \$68,200; and band, \$19,300. There will also be reductions in student TAAS incentives, student extracurricular meals, teacher stipends for college hours, summer schools, repurchase, and others.

The district discovered it was in financial trouble last year when state funding was cut because of the existing low tax rate.

The Texas Education Agency computes it's payments to school districts on a two-year sliding scale with penalties for wealthier districts that, in their estimation, don't have a high enough tax rate. The more a district taxes, the more state aid it receives. The district has kept its tax rate low over the years, being in the bottom 10 percent of all Texas schools. Now schools are required to tax higher to secure increased state funding, and Iowa Park is being penalized for being a "low tax effort" school district, local officials said.

Iowa Park's tax rate is currently \$1.14. It was pointed out that in order

Caplinger suggested that trustees might want to raise the local tax rate eight-cents this year putting the rate at \$1.22, pointing out that right now there is a window of opportunity in which the district could go eight-cents above the current \$1.14 and not face a rollback election.

> Following a closed session to discuss resignations and employment of personnel, trustees voted to accept the resignation of Wendell Allen, and to employ four new teachers.

Allen, who was I.S.S. and A.E.P. teacher, resigned to accept another position in Archer City.

Evans, who attended Iowa Park

schools and graduated Wichita Falls High School, received a BSIS/English degree from Midwestern State Univ. in 1996. She will be replace Wendell Allen as I.S.S. and A.E.P.

Menasco will fill a coaching position at the junior high, replacing David May who is being moved to the high school. May will fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Jeff Standard. Huff was hired as the new girls' head basketball coach. A graduate of Texas A&M Univ., she has been a teacher and coach at Birdville ISD, and Richland High School.

Earlier in the meeting, Dee Holly, mother of a City View student, appeared before the board. She was requesting that her son be allowed to attend Iowa Park High School under the district's sibling policy.

Keith Fisher, board president, told her that the trustees needed time to discuss the matter, and they would let her know something next week.

City seeks voluntary annexations

Letters to be mailed to property owners adjoining the city limits, but not within the city limits, are being mailed by Administrator Mike Price, soliciting them to seek voluntary annexation.

stopping at the east-bound Magnolia stop sign.

The letters were approved by members of the city council, during their regularly-scheduled meeting Monday evening.

Aldermen had previously been under the impression that such property could be involuntarily annexed, if it were contiguous with the city limits and received city services such as water and/or sewer.

However, the laws governing annexation were researched by city attorney Jay Cantrell, revealing the council's plight.

Council members at a previous meeting had discussed the need of not only better defining the city limits' irregular outline, but also the need of expanding its extraterritorial jurisdiction in view of announced intentions of neighboring Wichita Falls.

Iowa Park operates under a General Law charter, which is different from a Home Rule charter. Specifics of a General Law charter are established in the state constitu-

Because Iowa Park has the population qualifying it to adopt a Home Rule charter, and hasn't, it is not eligible to enact involuntary annexations, Cantrell pointed out.

Additionally, he points out in his letter that water customers living outside the city limits must pay a meter deposit of \$100, while those inside the city pay only \$40.

And, because of discussions by the county commissioners' court, the city's volunteer fire department could possibly stop responding to calls outside the city limits. That would be if the county ceases partial financial funding to the department.

The second letter Price is sending out explains changes in extraterritorial jurisdiction which could be made, if Wichita Falls does expand its city limits closer to Iowa Park.

Price's letter makes the point that Valley Drive, and replace it with a "stop" sign. This was due to numerous accidents and near-accidents reported at that location.

Donations to help fund walking track

Iowa Park Rotary Club became the first organization to make a donation toward construction of a 1.5-mile walking track around Lake Gordon.

John Rentschler, president, announced during Monday night's meeting of the city council that the civic organization was donating \$800 toward the project.

"Like the city, Rotary too is concerned about the quality of life in our community and this project will not only address that issue but also hopefully stimulate our area residents to a healthier lifestyle," Rentschler said.

The following day, members of the Iowa Park Lions Club voted during their meeting to donate \$250 toward funding the project.

Other organizations, and some businesses, in the community also reportedly are planning to make similar donations to help build the concrete walkway, as well as an elevated crossing over the northern end, around the lake.

The city is sending this week a request to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. for a grant to aid in the estimated \$100,000 project. Much of the city's portion, according to Administrator Mike Price, would be "in-kind" contributions, such as labor and equipment. Pouring and finishing of the contract is expected to be done by trustees from the Allred Unit.



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
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- Health Notes Selenium Cuts Cancer Risk

A study published recently in The Journal of the American Medical Association found significant reductions in certain cancers among people using a daily supplement containing 200 mcg. of selenium

for more than four years. The study of over 1300 individuals who had been cured of skin cancer was originally designed to determine the effect of selenium on preventing the development of new skin cancers. While no protective benefit was shown for skin cancer, researchers did find that patients who took daily doses of selenium had 63% fewer cases of prostate cancer, 58% less colon or rectal cancers, and 45% fewer lung cancers than people who took a placebo. Furthermore, the group taking selenium had 50% fewer cancer deaths. Selenium is a mineral found mostly in soil, and vegetables grown in selenium-rich soil have the highest concentration. Selenium is known to preserve the elasticity of body tissues and is important for proper functioning of the immune system.

I was introduced to Singleton in the early 1970s, when he decided he wanted to establish a new, competitive weekly newspaper in Clarendon. Though he had experience working for the Graham Leader, his new paper was to be printed by offset press, and I was asked to show him how to paste up his first edition.

In case the name Singleton hasn't struck a cord of recognition to you as yet, he's the top fella of a corporation which owns, among other properties, the Denver Post, along with a couple of hundred others. And, yeah, he now owns the Graham Leader.

The Clarendon project really never was successful, however.

But he's there in that big old book, along with such names as Rupert Murdoch, Robert Maxwell, The Aga Kahn, Warwick Fairfax, Ralph Ingersoll and Katherine Gra-

Jimmy Bowen will likely mean even less to you, unless you've paid attention to recording labels in the music industry.

Now retired, Bowen was the biggest of the biggies in the industry. But it wasn't during those years that we knew him.

Bowen and another young man from Dumas had become associated with a fellow from Happy, while they were students at West Texas State

They named themselves the Rythum Orchids, and as I recall were the first of the pop groups who accompanied themselves with stringed

I guess I wrote the first article about this newly-organized group, shortly after going to work for the Moore County News. As personal friends and in appreciation for that piece, they sent an orchid for Dolores' pillow when our first daughter was born at the hospital.

Some of you may be old enough to remember their song Party Doll which made the top-selling list nationally. It was so big that they appeared more than once on the nationally-televised Ed Sullivan Show.

Sometimes kids are much more perceptive than we are.

In the mad rush toward technology in our schools, kids are much more aware of what is available through technology than we adults, and some of them know it's not worth

very much. While visiting the California Newspaper Publishers Association last week, I picked up a copy of The Monterey County Herald and ran across a column by a Monterey High School sophomore titled "Comput-

ers can't replace good teaching." "I think people need to realize what it is that they're getting when they spend money on technology for schools," wrote Michael Moewe.

"The Internet pales in comparison to the hype surrounding it. People think that children can think of any topic and pull up a wealth of information on it, but that's not the case.

"The information in a library is what people seem to expect, but nobody has the time to transcribe entire libraries into computers. There is nothing on the Internet that is incredibly beneficial to education, yet we continue to waste money on it."

"Moewe writes that the amount of money spent on computers could be better spent on more traditional forms of education, like better libraries and higher teachers salaries.

"Rarely do computers help people learn. I think a good teacher and books really make a difference.

"I would rather have a huge library at my school than a room full of computers with thousands of dollars worth of programs when the computers are only needed for word processing.

"I'm not saying we should rid ourselves of technology altogether, we just need to buy computers that

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Fourth historical marker to be decicated Sunday

The fourth official Texas historical marker for Iowa Park will be dedicated Sunday.

Unveiling of the marker will be at 2 p.m. at the Masonic Lodge Hall, 700 West Washington.

The dedication will be carried out jointly by members of the Masonic Lodge and Wichita County Historical Commission, culminating a dream of Lodge members which began a year ago.

The general public is invited to attend.

One Hundred Six Years of Lodge History

In 1885 when the Fort Worth and Denver City Railroad passed through, the switch on the line at the present site of Iowa Park was known as Daggett, named in honor of a prominent Tarrant County family.

In 1888 a plat was filed for the town of Iowa Park. Many of the early settlers were busying themselves at the same time getting started a lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons. According to those old pioneers, a town predominately Masonic needed neither a bank, a jail, nor a court house.

In July of 1891 the application for a charter was made to the Grand Lodge of Texas, signed by W.R. Gibson, J.T. Black and J.L. Womack. This application was honored and District Deputy R.L. Underwood first set the lodge to work under dispensation on August 4, 1891. The first meeting after being set to work was held on August 18, 1891. There were 26 charter members. R.D. Hill, the first candidate of the newly formed lodge, was initiated on September 15, 1891. He was raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason on November 10, 1891 while the lodge was still under dispensation from the Grand Lodge of Texas. Iowa Park Lodge No. 713 received its charter on December 11, 1891. On February 8, 1892 Grand Master John Watson proceeded to open a Lodge of Master Masons and to constitute Iowa Park Lodge No. 713 A.F. and A.M. according to the Ancient custom of the

Brother E.A. McCleskey was the first brother to be raised after the lodge was constituted. He was raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason on July 5, 1892. E.A. McCleskey was the first elected mayor of Iowa Park and served as master of the lodge eight times. No other brother has even come close to this record.

In accordance with the custom of early Masonic Lodges, trials to discipline fellow lodge members were often held. One such trial involved the first Tiler of the Iowa Park Lodge, Willie Spencer. He was involved in a disagreement with Frank White about a lady friend. About noon May 4, 1894, shots rang out, several from the pistol of Frank White, and two from Willie Spencer's shot gun. Both men were wounded but Frank White died of his wounds on the following

This shooting brought about the

Spencer was acquitted of charges during the Masonic Trial, but the resulting civil trial convicted Willie Spencer to a term in the state penetentiary. Willie Spencer was pardoned by the Governor in 1898 and sat in lodge again.

On June 29, 1901, members of the Masonic Lodge laid the cornerstone for the new public school which stood until 1916 when the same brick was used to build a new school which faced Cash Street. A public school building was built at W.F. George High School in 1923, with the Iowa Park Lodge again laving the cornerstone. W.A. "Dutch" George, son of the man for whom the school was named, was on hand in 1976 when demolition of the building began and the contents of the cornerstone were placed on display. These contents consisted of copies of weekly newspapers and a letter from the faculty and student body.

The first lodge hall was rented from Kriedler & Windle for a sum of \$2.54 a month and served as a meeting place from August to December 31 of 1891. A second lodge hall was secured for meetings starting January 1, 1892, and was called Birk Hall.Rent there was \$8.33 per month.

The third lodge hall was established when the lodge moved into the upstairs of the First National Bank building on January 25, 1896. A contract was signed on February 2, 1901, to rent the First National Bank upstairs yearly for the sum of \$48.

Work began in 1967 on a building to be owned by the Iowa Park Masonic Lodge. Meetings were held above the bank until March 24, 1969, when members first met in the new building at 700 West Washington. Worshipful Master A.D. Hanna made the last payment on the lodge building note in March, 1973.

Brother Ancil Derward Hanna served as Worshipful Master of Iowa Park Lodge in 1972 and continued his Masonic career, becoming the 1990

Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Texas, the only member of this Lodge to attain that office. He died in a traffic accident on May 5, 1996.

The Lodge has developed a positive interface with the surrounding community through programs such as presentation of the Mirabeau B. Lamar Award of Excellence for Personal Achievement to a deserving high school student for outstanding achievement, whether it be in academic work, overcoming a handicap, citizenship, volunteer work in the community, sports or any other outstanding personal accomplishment. A second Lamar Award may also be presented to a deserving educator. The Community Builder Award, given by the Lodge, has been designed to formally recognize outstanding non-Masons who have distinguished themselves through their service to the community, to the local, state, or national government, to their church of synagogue, or to hu-

Masons have offered their Lodge facility for the purpose of taking official court depositions, and for the purpose of Red Cross blood collection drives, and also participated in the Texas State Adopt-A-Highway litter control program.

A program of free installation and maintenance of smoke detectors to assist older lodge brothers and sisters was another way the lodge served the community. Response was so great, it was immediately expanded to include any senior citizen or handicapped member of the commu-


