## Iowa Park school district

 earns 'recognized' ratinglast week when they were notified that, for the firsst time, Iowa Park High School has received the "Recognized" rating from the Texas Education Agency.
The Junior High School, Bradford Elementary, and Kidwell
Elementary each received an "Acceptable" rating, but the base TAAS scores from these schools were so high, that the entire school district was given a "Recognized" rating.
The ratings are based on student performance on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills test, as well
as school's annual dropout and attendance rates.

In the state's accountability ratings, "Recognized" is second only to "Exemplary," which requires at least 90 percent passing each subject area, one percent dropout rate, and a 94 percent attendance rate.
To be "Recognized," districts and
mpuses have met the "Recognized" campuses have met the "Recognized level performance standards for all base indicatorsand have demonstrated required improvement, where appli-
cable, on TAAS. All campuses in cable, on TAAS. All campuses in "Acceptable" or higher.
A district cannot be rated "Ex-

## Gardening Hints

## By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Q. We live on the northern sid Wichita Falls. Our two year old trees are turning brown at the edges of the leaves. Is this a disease problem or insects?
A. Leaf browning or scorchin at the edge or margins of the leaf are usually indications of moisture stress. Triple digit temperatures of July and August with minimal rainfall levels will always tend to cause marginal caf scorching symptoms as you have described. Regular, deep watering a tainly help reduce the moisture stress and resulting foliage damage Some parts of town received an inch or soof rain this week, however, don't put the garden hoses up. We will all have to pay attention to watering during the
hottest part of the season.

Bermuda in healthy condition en abling the turn to better out compete the sandburs. You can also spot treat the existing sandburs with a postemergent herbicide called MSMA This product will yellow treated areas for a few weeks, but will recover if used according to the label.
Q. How can I control sandburs in a Bermuda lawn area? We are having terrible problems with this
weed. We live at Lake weca. We live at Lake Arrowhea
Estate. A. A. Sandburs are a tough weed to
combat. To effectively control sandburs you will have to use pre-emer gent herbicides, regular fertilizations and watering of the Bermuda, and use of a post-emerge herbicide. Applications of Durflan, or Betasan (preemergent herbicides) put down in spring and again in summer and fall
will help prevent weed seed germi wation. This is referred to as a split application. The spring and summer applications are critical. Regular fertilization of the Bermuda with a quality 3-1-2 ratio lawn food an regular deep watering will keep the
