Hawks seek 5th win tomorrow at Seymour

what the Seymour Panthers are going through right now.

The Panthers are currently riding a 14-game losing streak and their next opponent is the 4-0 Hawks, fresh off a 14-6 victory over ninth-ranked Stamford.

The Hawks can remember what it is like to be in that position.

In head coach Weldon Nelms first season at Iowa Park, the Hawks finished the season 0-10 and then lost the first five games to start the next season before getting on a roll, making the playoffs. Since the first 15 games, coach Nelms' record is an impressive 16-5.

Seymour has been out-scored 123-62 for the season, falling to Breckenridge 53-18, to Munday 24-8, to Windthorst 14-6 and to Hamlin 32-30 last week.

But just a few plays have made the difference in snapping the losing streak. The Panthers had very good chances to win their last two games and Iowa Park coaches are not going to let the players look ahead to the

Iowa Park fans and players know district opener next week against Childress, which is also 4-0.

"We definitely don't want to overlook them," said defensive coordinator Bruce Merrill. "We've set some goals for the kids hoping that they would not take them for granted. The seniors that were on varsity when they were sophomores know what it's like to go through a streak like the one Seymour is going through right now. It seems like no matter what you do, something goes wrong that costs you the game. I'm sure they feel like we did, that they should have won several of the close games they've lost."

Iowa Park has won all three meetings between the two teams over the past 29 seasons, including last year's 50-0 blanking. In all Iowa Park has outscored Seymour 110-7 in those

The Hawks are coming into Friday's game averaging 24 points per game while allowing only 41 in four contests.

It's the Hawk defense that has been the brightest point in all four of Iowa Park's wins.

"Defensively, we had another real unit was strong and that we weren't good effort against a very good Stamford team," Merrill said. "Their quarterback, running back and receivers were outstanding. And their offensive line wasn't shabby either. We tried to take advantage of some of their blocking tendencies to free up some of our linebackers and it worked. Jeremiah Love, Brandon Holley, Brad Green, Toby Catlin, Todd Yeager, Chad Wright and Jonathan Clubb all had solid games. Overall it was a great team effort."

"We knew going in that we would have to shut them down," Merrill added. "We knew that their defensive

going to score a bunch of points against them."

The Hawks, like they've done in every game so far, have come out in the second half and have iced the game with long drives.

Iowa Park put the Bulldogs away with a 12-play, 80-yard drive that used up almost half of the third quarter.

"Offensively, I thought we played well in the first quarter," said offensive coordinator Chris Ellis. "I wish we would have scored more points than we did in the first quarter. After

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- Health Notes Pain from Shingles

Herpes zoster (also known as shingles) is caused by the chicken pox virus (varicella zoster) and occurs in people who have had chicken pox, often years later at a time when the immune system has been weakened. The lesions (rash) of

shingles usually last 7-10 days, but in some cases, particularly in the elderly, severe pain at the site may persist for many months or even years. This pain is called "post-herpetic neuralgia." A physician should be seen at the first sign of shingles. If treatment is begun within 72 hours of developing the rash, the chances are better that postherpetic neuralgia may not develop or will be less severe. Conventional therapy usually involves an antiviral drug and an oral steroid. Some researchers claim that vitamin C and bioflavonoids have antiviral activity. Vitamin E and Vitamin B₁₂ may accelerate the healing rate. A cream containing capsaicin, a hot pepper extract, is also frequently used to treat the pain.


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



onion soup 1/4 cup water

3 med. potatoes, peeled and quartered 3 med. carrots, cut into 1-inch chunks 1 med. onion, cut into thin wedges

1 Tbsp. chopped fresh parsley In medium bowl, combine ground beef, bread crumbs, thyme, egg and garlic; mix thoroughly. Shape

into 20 meatballs. In 10-inch skillet over medium heat, in hot oil, cook meatballs until browned on all sides. Pour off fat.

Stir soup and water into skillet. Stir in potatoes, carrots and onions. Heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low. Cover and simmer 30 minutes or until vegetables are tender, adding more water if needed. Garnish with parsley.

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

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

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
