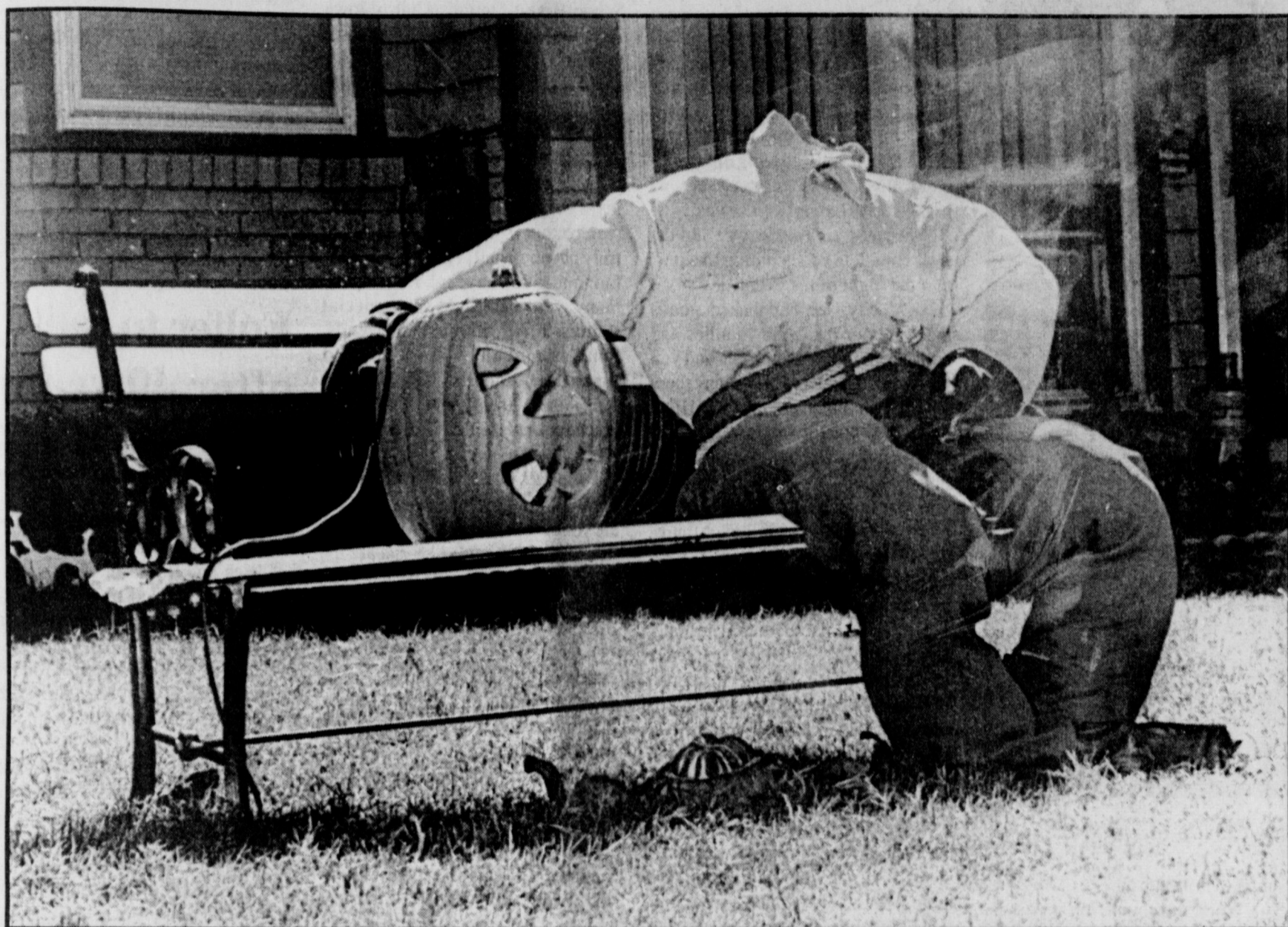

Despite football game, lots of activities for Halloween observers

The pickins might be a little harder to find Friday night, when the youngsters go out trick-or-treating in celebration of Halloween.

Part of their problem will be competition with the varsity Hawk football game, which will be played at Henrietta.

However, there will still be lots of activities going on, to supplant their door-to-door visiting.

The Iowa Park Police Department will hold its annual carnival from 6-9 p.m. both Friday and Saturday, at the girls' softball field on Bell Road.

More than a dozen activities will be available, with ticket prices 25 cents each. And, should weather turn bad, the event will be moved into the junior high gymnasium.

Cornestone Pentecostal Church

of God will host its All Saints Carnival starting at 7 p.m. Friday, at 1201 West Smith.

And, for some easy "pickins," the Volunteer Fire Department will have candy available between 6-9 p.m. Friday, at the Southside Station in the 500 block of South Texowa.

Also handing out candy on Halloween will be the IHS Nursing Home on North Third.

The city council considered the possibility of recommending trick or treaters do their thing Saturday, rather than Friday, because of the football game.

However, because so many different organizations already had their plans set to entertain the youths, and also considering lots of families will not be making the Henrietta trip, they made no recommendation to change.

Hawks heading to Henrietta

Iowa Park got back on the winning track last week with a 48-0 thumping of Jacksboro, following a tough loss to sixth-ranked Vernon the previous week.

The Hawks will be looking to make it two in a row tomorrow night when they travel to Henrietta to take on the Bearcats in a 7:30 contest.

Iowa Park enters the game at 7-1 overall and 2-1 in district play, while Henrietta comes in with a 4-4 record and a 1-2 mark in league play.

The Bearcats' four wins have come against Nocona, Holliday, Callisburg and Jacksboro. Their losses are to fourth-ranked Breckenridge (29-18), Boyd, Bowie and to Childress.

"Henrietta is a much improved football team over where they were last year," said head coach Weldon Nelms. "They've got great speed in the backfield and a very good quarterback and they can score from anywhere on the field. They're a big-play

type team that can hurt you both passing and running the ball."

The Bearcats are led by junior quarterback Jim Walker and by tailback Steven Magers. Walker's two favorite targets when Henrietta goes to the air are split end J.J. Pierce and tight end Zach Parker. Randel Barnard is the fullback and is used mainly as a blocker for Magers.

"Their quarterback is a very good athlete and Magers finished second or third in the state in the 100 last year," said Nelms. "We need to do a good job of keeping them contained or it could be a long night. Their offensive line is not as strong or as big as some of the teams we've played so far, but they mix things up enough to keep you honest. They like to throw the ball to Pierce, who is a big-play receiver. He's one of the best receivers in the district. Their tight end is another good receiver, and they like to throw to their backs out of the backfield too. They will throw the

ball on any down and any distance. They're a better offensive team than they are defensive, which will give our defense a test."

Henrietta started the season off well beating Nocona 40-14 in the opener and then played well in a 29-18 loss to Breckenridge, which is ranked fourth in Class 3A, then rebounded to beat a very good Holliday team 42-28.

The Bearcats also led Bowie 10-7 at the half before being outscored 31-0 in the second half to lose 38-10 in their district opener.

"Henrietta was ahead 10-7 at the half against Bowie, then came out in the second half and turned the ball over a couple of times and just never got back on track," Nelms said. "They also played real well against Holliday. When they get their big plays clicking they can cause any team problems. Our offensive line needs to control the line of scrimmage and we need to move the ball with some

consistency. Their defense is the

School Board to consider facility needs

The Iowa Park School Board will have a special called meeting Monday night to discuss recommendations for facility needs.

The first item on the agenda calls for a closed session to consider a "Disciplinary Matter or Complaint."

When the meeting reopens, trustees will discuss facility needs and recommendations made by the Facility Task Force. They will also review plans for the high school parking area.

The meeting is scheduled to begin at 6 p.m. in the school administration building, 413 East Cash.

City council responds to ETJ extension requests

Iowa Park's extraterritorial jurisdiction (ETJ) grew considerably toward the northeast Monday night, and more is expected to be added next Monday during a called meeting of the city council.

Owners of property northeast of the city have, and continue to request to be officially brought into the Iowa Park ETJ, because of growth from the east by Wichita Falls.

Property owned by Alyce Bondurant and her sister, June, was included in the city's ETJ, as was a tract of land owned by Bert Williamson.

The owners had filed petitions in accordance with state regulations, and the actions were taken by passage of ordinances.

As many as four other tracts could be brought into the city's ETJ during Monday's meeting, providing their petitions are completed in time, al-

dermen were told.

Monday's called meeting is to get underway at 7 p.m., in council chambers.

At issue is the desire of owners to not be included in the Wichita Falls ETJ, which will extend three and one half miles westward next week, upon completion of that city's annexation of land on FM 369 north of US 287.

Owners have privately indicated they do not want to be subjected to the neighboring city's ETJ regulations.

Prior to acting on those ETJ requests, the city held its second and final public hearings on annexations of three tracts of land into the city limits, including the land owned by Highland Cemetery.

The other two annexations included 2.75 acres immediately west of the high school campus, which has

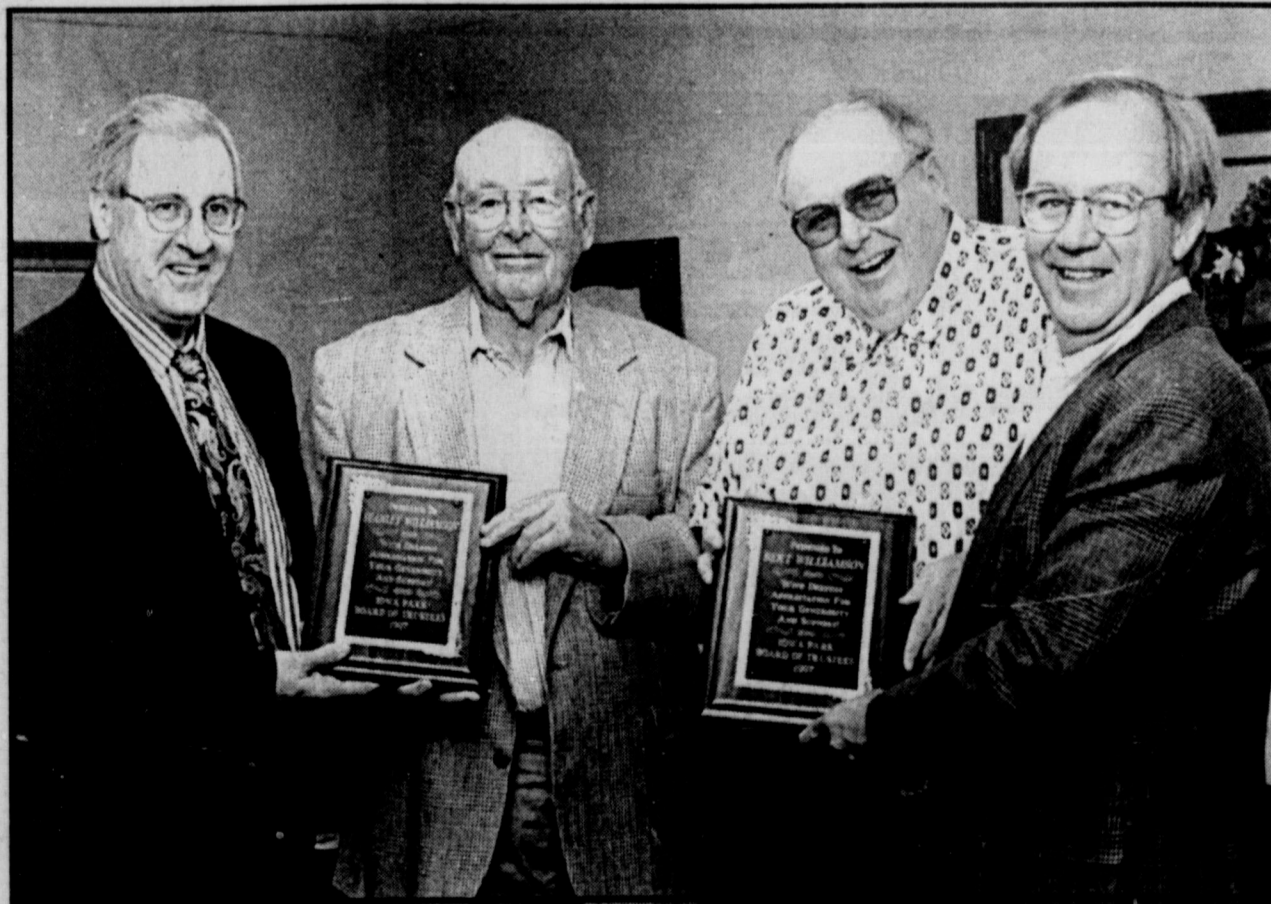
been donated by Bert and Stanley Williamson to the school district, and the home of Mr. and Mrs. Milburn Bates on FM 368 South.

Another ordinance approved by the council officially closes the 75-foot right of way for North Park Ave., including the 900 through 1500 blocks.

Aldermen approved a request from City Administrator Mike Price to purchase three pieces of equipment, all of which were included in this year's budget.

They include a mowing tractor, for \$10,900; a new emergency warning siren for \$14,975, which will be located on North Victoria, and an equipment trailer for \$7,850.

The council approved a proposal to advertise three tracts of land for livestock grazing, including Iowa Park and Buffalo lakes, and property at the wastewater treatment plant.

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Health Notes
ACE Inhibitor Cough

ACE inhibitors (enalapril-Vasotec®, captopril-Capoten®, etc.) are important medications in the treatment of high blood pressure, congestive heart failure, and diabetic kidney disease. However, up to one-third of treated patients develop a dry, nonproductive, persistent cough, which does not respond to "cough syrups." The onset of the cough may be weeks to months after starting the ACE inhibitor, and it usually goes away within days to weeks after stopping the medication. There are no consistently effective treatments for this cough, and if it becomes too excessive to be tolerated, the ACE inhibitor is usually switched to another medication. Yet, for some patients, there is not a suitable alternative. To stop the cough in these patients, the drugs sulindac, indomethacin, cromolyn and theophylline may provide some benefit. However, these medications may have drug interactions or side effects that do not permit their use. Baclofen, a muscle relaxant, may provide an effective alternative.

Club tours River Bend

Hardly an entire week passes that someone doesn't comment on my weight loss.

I don't know whether it's because I've weighed as much as 198, and never under 185, in the years we've lived in Iowa Park, or because there's so much publicity these days concerning how overweight Americans have become.

Well, I'm down to 166 pounds, as of last Sunday morning. Of course, that's without anything but my shorts on, in order to get a really accurate reading.

That's almost exactly what I weighed when Dolores and I married 41 years ago.

Yes, I do eat. But only because I realize I need something in my stomach. I have an appreciation of taste, but not a desire to satisfy that appreciation.

Often I will take a lunch break

from the office, just to be doing something other than working. Other times I eat to be with my wife, when she's fulfilling her desire for food.

There have been periods when I've gone three and four days, having consumed nothing more than a small sandwich, such as a hot link sausage wrapped in a slice of bread.

In years past, I've been known to eat a whopping meal, topped off with half a dozen slices of bread and butter, followed by whatever dessert was available. And then slip in a snack

between regular meals.

Yep, you too can lose weight. But I don't recommend achieving it the same way I have.



Thoughtless drivers

We have lived in Iowa Park for the past 50 yrs. Thirty five of those years on Ruby St. There are no stop or yield signs between Bell Road and Wall St. Not that stop signs mean anything. Crystal Vernon and Garrad Vernon were both named District Alternates with their recipes for "Cranberry Relish" and "Taco Dip," respectively.

Angela Striet of Electra won a blue ribbon for her recipe, "Orange Fruit Soup."

Bo, Crystal and Garrad are the children of Harold and Deaunta Vernon of Kamay, and Angela is the daughter of George Lee and Anita Striet of Electra.

Bo is a senior at Iowa Park High School, and participates in athletics, FFA, and 4-H.

Crystal is a freshman student at IPHS where she competes in cross country running, and is a member of FFA and 4-H.

Garrad is a seventh grader at Iowa Park Junior High School. He is active in athletics, FFA and 4-H.

Angela is a senior at Electra High School and is a member of the band. She is a member of Valley View 4-H, and says one of her favorite hobbies is shopping.

Beef Eaters' Pizza Bo Vernon

- 1 lb. sirloin, cut in 1/8"x2" pieces
- 1/4 tsp. freshly ground pepper
- 2 Tbsp. canola oil, separated
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1 Roma tomato, thinly sliced
- 6 oz. fresh mushrooms, sliced
- 2 scallions, thinly sliced
- 1 small green, red or yellow pepper, seeded and julienne sliced
- 1/4 cup beef bouillon
- 3 Tbsp dry Madeira wine
- 4 oz. Roquefort cheese, separated
- 2 Tbsp. unsalted butter
- 1 Tbsp. fresh parsley, chopped
- 12" thick pizza shell (can use ready-to-eat shell, like "Boboli")

Combine pepper and 1 tablespoon canola oil. Pour over sirloin and set aside. Heat remaining oil in heavy skillet and brown crushed garlic; remove. Sear meat and vegetables in garlic-flavored oil. Remove and reserve. Deglaze skillet with bouillon and Madeira, reduce to approximately 4 tablespoons or until thick and remove from heat. Return meat and vegetables to liquid; combine and allow to soak. Beat 2 ounces Roquefort cheese and butter in small bowl until smooth. Spread over pizza shell. Spoon meat and vegetables mixture over bottom of pizza and top with remaining 2 ounces of cheese and parsley. Bake according to pizza shell instructions. Preparation time: 1 hour including marinating. Cooking time: 10 minutes. Number of servings, 4.

Orange Fruit Soup Angela Striet

- 2 tablespoons Minute Tapioca
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 6 ounces frozen orange juice concentrate
- 1 medium banana
- 2 Kiwi fruits
- 1 1/2 cups water
- Dash of salt
- 1 can (11 ounces) Mandarin oranges, undrained
- 1 cup strawberries

Combine tapioca and water. Let stand for 15 minutes. Cook on high power in microwave for 6 minutes, stirring every 2 minutes. Add sugar, salt and frozen orange juice concentrate. Stir to blend. Cool 15 minutes and stir again. Add Mandarin oranges and juice. Cover and chill. Before serving, peel and slice banana and Kiwi fruit. Slice strawberries. Fold fresh fruits into mixture and serve.

Taco Dip Garred Vernon

- 12 oz. cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
- 2 tsp. chili powder
- 1 1/2 tsp. ground cumin
- 1/8 tsp. ground red pepper
- 1/2 cup salsa
- Crisp salad greens
- 1 cup (4 oz) shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1 cup (4 oz) shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 1/2 cup diced plum tomatoes
- 1/3 cup sliced green onions
- 1/4 cup sliced pitted ripe olives
- 1/4 cup sliced pimiento-stuffed green olives
- Tortilla chips and blue corn chips

Combine cream cheese, sour cream, chili powder, cumin and ground red pepper in large bowl; mix until well blended. Stir in salsa.

Spread dip onto greens-lined 10-inch serving platter.

Top with Cheddar cheese, Monterey Jack cheese, tomatoes, green onions, ripe olives and green olives.

Serve with tortilla chips and blue corn chips.

Cranberry Relish Crystal Vernon

- 1 apple, seeded
- 1 bag cranberries
- 1 orange, seeded
- 1 cup sugar
- Pecans

Chop fruit (leave peel on the orange) and pecans in the food processor until fine. Add sugar. Let set overnight.

Admission is \$1.00 for adults, and children under 12 get in free with a parent.

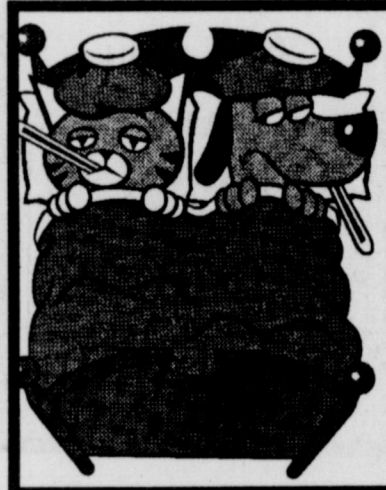

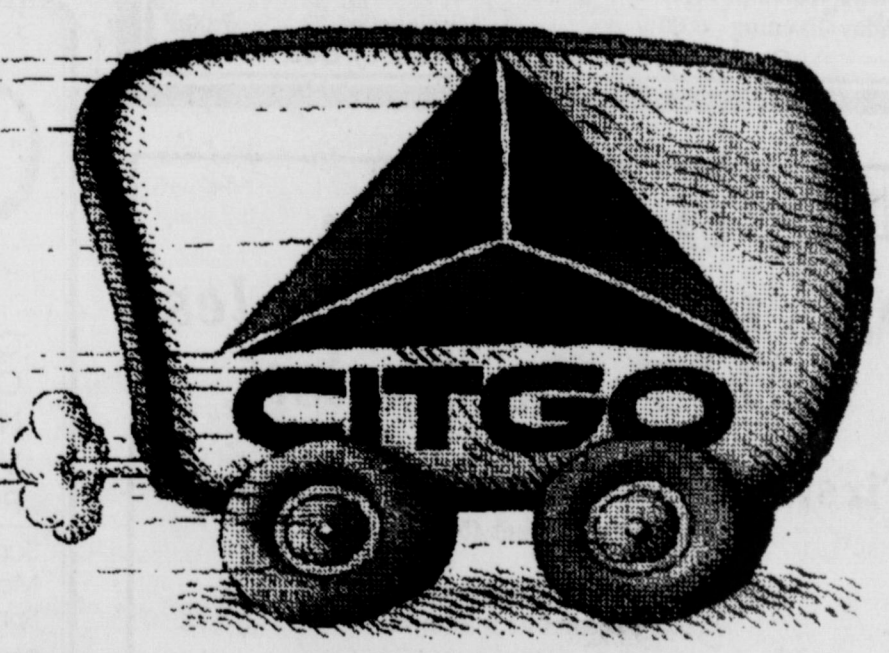
The group meets on the first Tuesday of each month. Their next meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the high school vo-ag building.

Workforce center opening Nov. 6 in Wichita Falls

A one-stop location for job-seekers and employers in the North Texas area will become a reality with the grand opening of the Workforce Center of North Texas on Thursday, Nov. 6.

The center has been open since late September in Suite 100 of the Galaxy Center, at 4309 Jacksboro Highway in Wichita Falls.

Cottle County Judge Billy Gilbert of Paducah will cut the ribbon at 2 p.m. to officially open the center.

Judge Gilbert, who chaired the Nortex Regional Planning Commission executive committee in January 1996, initiated efforts by partner agencies to apply for and receive \$180,000 in One-Stop Career Center grant funds from the United States Department of Labor to the Texas Workforce Commission.

The establishment of a workforce center is a legislative requirement of the North Texas Local Workforce Development Board, which was certified in December 1996 to consolidate workforce development in the 11-county area.

Services include the federally-funded Job Training Partnership Act, food stamp employment and training programs, the Job Opportunities and

Basic Skills program, and Senior Texans Employment Program, in addition to other employment and training services.

Workforce centers allow residents to visit one location to receive information about a variety of services to gain employment.

The Galaxie Center also houses TWC employment services; the adult education learning center, operated by Region Nine Education Service Center; and the Child Care Management Service.

Workforce centers also are planned within the next two years at Vernon and Graham.

The IPGHS will meet Saturday, Nov 1, at 2p.m. at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library. This will be an opportunity to visit the genealogy room. You will be surprised at the material available to help you in your research.

Twenty-six seventh graders at Iowa Park Junior High School have qualified to participate in Duke University's Talent Identification Program (TIP).

To be eligible, students must score within the top three percent on TAAS scores.

Adams, Adam Arredondo, Michelle Behrens, Brent Bennett, Daniel Bess, Taler Boland, Boon Bowling, Tiffany Cusey, Heath Gholson, Clayton Johnson, Charlie Kidd, Heidi Little, Amanda McCreary, Nathan Miller, Zack Newman, Stormi Raines, Shane Rater, Anna Sanchez, Steven Sargent, Erin Shook, Jennifer Thatcher, Erik Torgerson, Jon Moss, Jessica Crosby, Beau Gray, and Tommy Templeman.

The College Board's SAT I: Reasoning Test, and the American College Testing Program's Assessment (ACT), originally designed for college-bound high school students, are used for the TIP Talent Search to measure the verbal, mathematical, and general reasoning ability of highly able seventh graders.

While far too difficult for the average seventh grader, these tests have shown to be helpful in dis-

criminating the abilities of very bright seventh graders scoring at or above the 97th percentile on other age/grade appropriate achievement or aptitude tests.

TIP is a nonprofit educational organization established with the premise that the future of this nation depends upon the fullest development of our best intellectual resources.

The objectives of the program are to identify the very bright among our youngsters at an early age; to facilitate the education of these students; to follow and nurture their talent through the critical middle and

high school years; and to develop an effective research effort to help understand the nature of academically talented adolescents.

This is TIP's eighteenth annual Talent Search which includes 16 southern and midwestern states.

Early in September, applications and information about the Search were sent to district superintendents and gifted coordinators, as well as to principals and guidance counselors of schools in the search region which have a seventh grade.

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Hawks shut out Tigers, 48-0

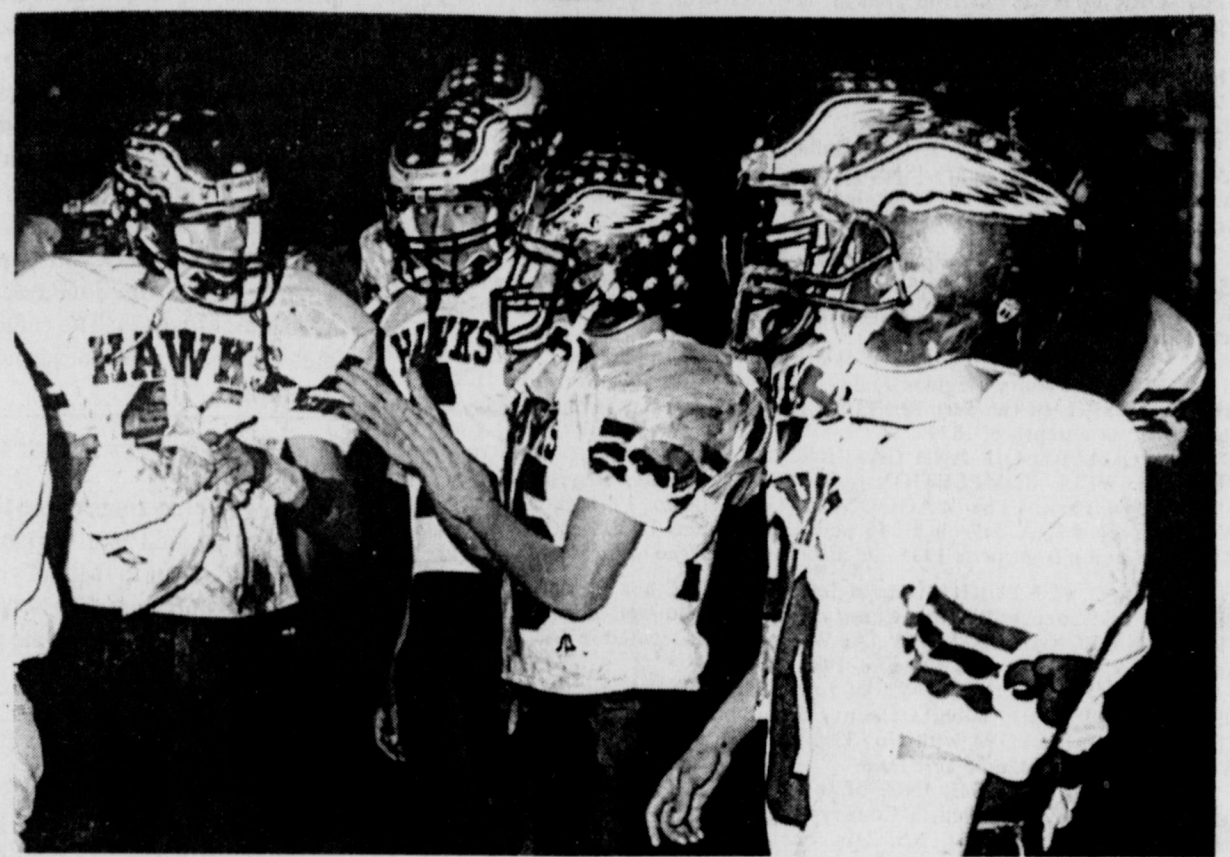
The Jacksboro Tigers had the ball for 62 plays Friday night while Iowa Park managed to run only 30 offensive plays. The results were, the Tigers picked up only 96 total yards of offense and didn't reach the end zone, while the Hawks rolled up 301 yards and scored seven touchdowns.

Playing on a sloppy field, Iowa Park ran its record to 7-1 Friday night in Jacksboro by blanking the Tigers 48-0. The win lifts the Hawks' district mark to 2-1 and leaves them tied for second with Childress and Bowie. Jacksboro lost for the seventh straight time to fall to 1-7 and 0-3 in district play.

The Tigers opened with the ball and after making a first down, moved to their own 39. But when their drive stalled, Jacksboro decided to fake a punt that didn't fool anybody as Toby Catlin and Todd Yeager stopped Chad Collie for a one-yard loss to set the tone for the rest of the game.

Iowa Park took over at the Jacksboro 38 and three plays later, Brandon Brown scored the first of his three touchdowns, this one on a 15-yard run with 7:18 left in the opening period. Brandon McLemore kicked the first of his six extra points to give his team the 7-0 lead. The big play in the drive was a 23-yard run by Calvin Galliton.

The Hawk defense held the Tigers to a three-and-out on their next possession with

Iowa Park taking over at its own 49. This time it took only two plays to get into the end zone, as Galliton rambled 45 yards to bring the score to 14-0 with 4:49 left in the first.

Iowa Park added 20 points in the second quarter, scoring on its first possession as Brown ran in from the three with 9:56 left in the half. Big plays in the drive included a 20-yard reception by Tres Beisch from Yeager and a 19-yard run by Tommy Duerson. Bryan Miller added a 9-yard run in the drive.

Iowa Park's next touchdown came when Jonathan Clubb broke free to block a Tiger punt. The ball rolled into the end zone where Clubb recovered it for the score with 7:23 still showing on the clock.

After the two teams traded fumbles, Iowa park made it 34-0 when Brown scored his third touchdown of the night.

Iowa Park took over at the Jacksboro 49 and three plays later the Hawks were in the end zone. Brown ran for 10 yards on the first play, Michael Swenson ran for seven on the next, then Brown again for the 32-yard touchdown.

The Hawks added a touchdown in the third period when Duerson scored from four yards out with 5:36 remaining in the period.

The drive was set up by another

partially blocked punt by Clubb. Iowa Park took over at the Jacksboro 30 and needed only five plays to score, with Duerson doing most of the damage.

Iowa Park had the ball only three plays in the fourth quarter, but that was enough to score again.

The Hawks gained control at their own 49 and on the second play, Duerson broke free for 46 yards to the Jacksboro five. On the next play, Duerson went in untouched for the score to make the final 48-0.

Leading rushers for Iowa Park included, Duerson with 95 yards on seven carries, Brown with 75 yards on seven carries and Galliton with 72 yards on only three tries. Yeager finished two of three in passing for 26 yards.

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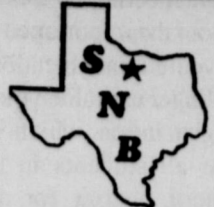

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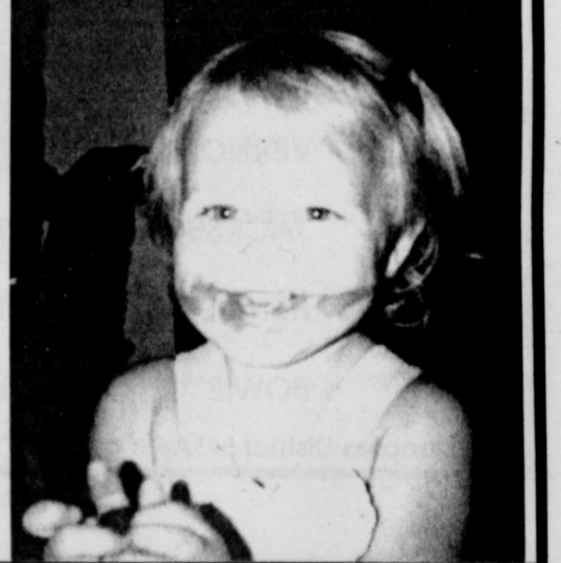
