County sheriff personnel were notified immediately, because the incident had taken place outside the Iowa Park city limits.

The victim, Tami Ferguson, said she had been assaulted within 20 minutes of the call for help.

She said her estranged husband, Steven Nelson Ferguson, 36, of Huffman, had fired a gun into the air and also into the ground, and then put the gun to his head in front of his wife and two young children.

Jackrabbits final hurdle in Hawks' playoff route

As the final regular season game approaches, both Bowie and Iowa Park will be fighting for the runnerup spot in District 5-3A.

It was the same scenario in the final game of the regular season last year when the two teams met in Bowie.

Iowa Park advanced to the playoffs with a 22-11 victory, forcing the Jackrabbits to stay at home, thanks in large part to the heroics of back up quarterback Jake Dillard, who completed an 11-yard pass to Brandon Brown with the game still very much up for grabs.

This year, not only will Bowie have to win the game, the Rabbits must win by 11 points. If they win by 10 or fewer, Iowa Park will still pick up the playoff spot due to a district tie- breaker. The tie-breaker would be between the Hawks, Bowie and Childress. If Iowa Park wins, the Hawks would finish second with a 4-1 mark. If Bowie wins, the three teams mentioned would all finish 3-2 in district. A points system which allows a team to use as many as 14 points in a win or loss would be used to determine the second place team.

Right now, Iowa Park is a plus 14 after beating Childress 19-0. The Bobcats were minus 14 to the Hawks but beat Bowie 21-14 to leave them at to be sucessful. minus 7. Bowie comes into the game at minus 7 as well after the loss to

A Bowie win by 11 would give the Rabbits a plus 4 and would drop Iowa Park to a plus 3.

Did that confuse everybody? The Rabbits come into Friday's 7:30 p.m. kickoff at Hawk Stadium with a 4-5 record overall and are 2-2 in league play. Bowie's five losses are to Graham, Aledo, Holliday, Childress, and Vernon. The Rabbits'

Jeremy Richey is the signal caller for the Rabbits. Richey is a 160-lb. junior quarterback and his favorite targets are Richi and Reggi Trotter and Jason Ratliff, who comes out of the backfield. Ratliff is also the Rabbits' biggest threat in the running

"They like to run the option and try to get their quarterback out wide," said Nelms. "Their offensive line is not very big, but they are quick. All of their receivers catch the ball real well and they run very precise routes."

Their defensive unit is real quick and aggressive and they fly to the football," Nelms said. "They give you a lot of different looks with their linebackers and defensive linemen. 

Health Notes **Interstitial Cystitis**

Interstitial cystitis is a chronic, progressive bladder disease which affects approximately half a million people. primarily women. It can cause intense

pelvic pain and urinary frequency, similar to the symptoms caused by a severe bladder infection. IC is very difficult to diagnose - a urologist must inspect the inner walls of the bladder with a cystoscope. The first oral therapy specifically for treating the discomfort of IC has recently been approved by the FDA. The medication (Elmiron) helps to repair a thin or "leaky" bladder surface, and protect the bladder wall from bacteria or other irritants found in the urine, but it can take up to six months to work. From the number of telephone calls we get here at the office recently, it is clear that we have lots of new readers in the area.

And because of that, I'd like to take this space this week to explain to those folks a few things about our newspaper's policies and practices.

Quite obviously, we are a weekly publication, produced each Thursday. Our paper is printed Wednesday evenings and taken to the post office for delivery to subscribers.

Because we depend on mail delivery of the paper, we sometimes publish Tuesday evening, when there is a postal holiday on Thursday. That, by the way, will happen Thanksgiving, and again on Christmas and New Year's.

Our aim is to cover anything and everything concerning people and situations within the Iowa Park school district. We are not, however, a county or regional coverage publication, and that sometimes frustrates some folks.

We are a community newspaper. If it happens here, or concerns local residents, that's what we want to write about.

Unlike many, many newspapers across the state, we do not charge a price to print stories. That includes births, engagements, obituaries,

family gatherings, non-profit organizations, and things like that.

In the case of birth announcements, whenever the last names of the mother and father are not the same, we do require viewing the birth certificate.

Our regular deadline for news, unless it is late-breaking, is Tuesday afternoon. We cannot guarantee an article will be printed in that week's issue if it comes in on Wednesday, though it might be if time permits.

Our classified advertising deadline is noon on Wednesday (or Tuesday if we are printing a day early). Display advertising (those with borders around them) have a 4 p.m. Tuesday deadline.

We often receive calls from folks wondering where our office is located. We are half a block west of City Hall, on Cash Street, and right next door to City Cafe.

Our normal hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. But like a lot of folks, we like to take an hour, from 12-1, for lunch.

We always welcome any calls or visits concerning possible stories of local interest. Obviously, we cannot always know what's going on, and it helps when folks give us tips.

Often times we receive telephone calls from folks wanting us to start their subscriptions, with the intent or promise to send us a check in the mail.

Our policy, both self-made and also because of postal regulations, we do require all subscriptions to be paid in advance. It's not because we don't trust our subscribers, it's just that small bills are the hardest ones to remember to pay.

Our policy on classified advertising is somewhat similar, but not the same. We gladly take classifieds over the telephone, but we always tell callers that they can save money by coming in a paying for the ad at the time they give us the copy.

All we're doing is passing on the savings of bookkeeping and postage. It's not that we don't trust our clients.

And if we ever make a mistake on an article, we want you to know that we will write a correction in the next issue we publish.

We're human. We're business people. We're community-oriented. We're here to serve.

And it's been that way the past 28-plus-years.






