District's building needs on trustees' agenda tonite

School trustees will review recommendations for basic facility needs in the district, and possibly make a decision on which architectural firm to use for the project at their regular meeting this evening.

The board will also call a trustee election, along with designating polling places and appointing election judges. The terms of Jeff Watts and Dennis Yeager are due to expire in May.

A decision will be made on quotes for completion of the addition to the high school parking lot.

The third draft of the 1998-99 school calendar, which has been reviewed by several committees, will be presented to the board to look over and suggest any changes, if necessary. The calendar is scheduled to be adopted at the March board meeting.

Two "Learn and Serve" grants,

applied for by Sheila Gholson, junior high school teacher, will be discussed. One of the matching grants is for use in the school's 100th anniversary celebration, and the other would be used for an on-line internet hook-up to Mrs. Gholson's classroom.

Other items to be acted on by board members include:

- * contract renewals for campus principals, counselor, and directors;
- * Gifted-Talented policy book;
- * participation in the Global Learning and Observations to Ben-

efit the Environment (GLOBE) program for eighth grade students in the 1998-99 school year;

- * participation agreement with Texpool for investment purposes;
- * participation in a consortium with ESC Region IX to submit an application for a Technology Integration in Education (TIE) grant; and
- * proposed girls basketball camp, June 1 - 5.

The meeting is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. in the junior high school library.

No classes after today until Tuesday

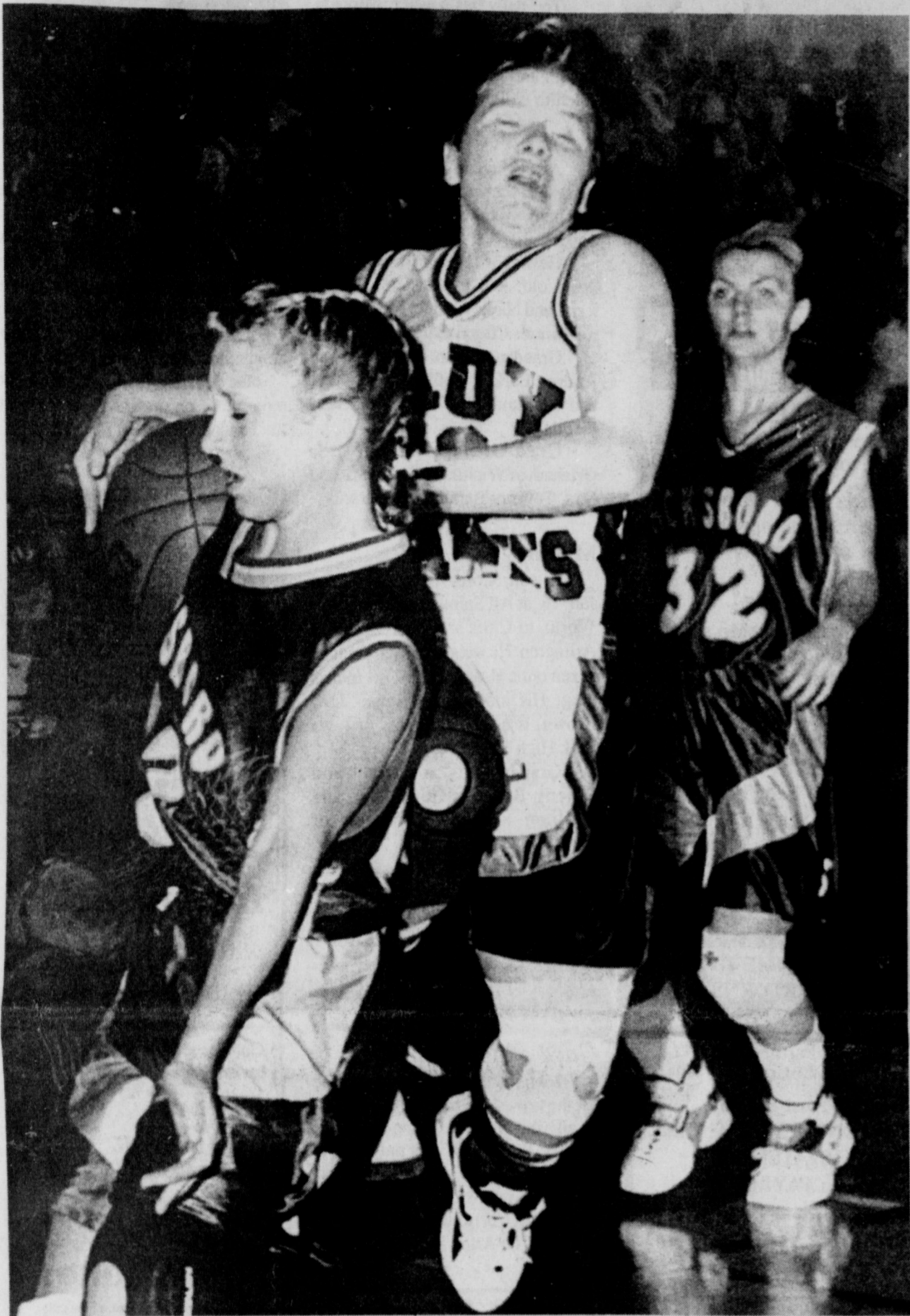
Today is the final day of classes for the fourth six weeks grading period in Iowa Park schools.

Police search for shooter

Iowa Park police are investigating a shooting, believed to have taken place shortly after midnight Tuesday.

While no one was injured in the incident, it was expensive for local residents.

Someone shot three holes into the bottom of the new water tower north of US 287.

The vandal apparently stopped on the access road next to the tower, and fired three rifle shells into the tank.

Police found the three casings on the roadway, and workers with the firm that constructed the tower drained it and found the shells lying on the tank's bottom.

A resident in the area told police he was awakened from sleep by the gun firing about 12:45 a.m.

City Administrator Mike Price estimated approximately 60,000 gallons of water was lost, partly from the three holes and the rest when the crew had to drain the tank.

The holes were repaired Tuesday afternoon and the tank refilled.

OTHER CASES

Police received a complaint from a resident in the 400 block of West Washington, concerning tampering with mail.

A resident said an envelope containing \$600 in cash which had been sent by a relative was taken from the mail box.

Also under investigation is the theft of two cellular telephones from vehicles parked in the same neighborhood.

The first complaint was reported

Sunday and the other on Monday. One vehicle was parked on Park Place and the other on Rita, according to the reports.

Police took Dale Richard Juregens, 34, into custody late Thursday evening, and charged him with driving while intoxicated.

Later, while taking inventory his vehicle, officers reportedly found a marijuana cigarette and paraphenalia.

Juregens' DWI charge was enhanced, because of a previous arrest and conviction, according to the police blotter.

Saturday afternoon, Spike Rodney Schooler, 36, was taken into custody for driving while his license was suspended. He was transported to the county jail.

Thomas Wakefield Jr., 29, was taken into custody Thursday afternoon, on an outstanding warrant issued locally.

The warrant was for having an expired motor vehicle inspection sticker, with a fine of \$121.50. He was later released, after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

Friday afternoon, Melissa Lynn Loyd, 22, was taken into custody on a warrant issued by the Wichita County sheriff's office.

The warrants were for public intoxication, with a fine of \$120, and failure to appear in court, a fine of \$165.

Loyd was transported by a county deputy to the jail in Wichita Falls, according to the police blotter.

Tom Medley, a member of the Texas Storytellers, will be the special speaker for the evening. He will incorporate his unique brand of humor into a story with a moral.

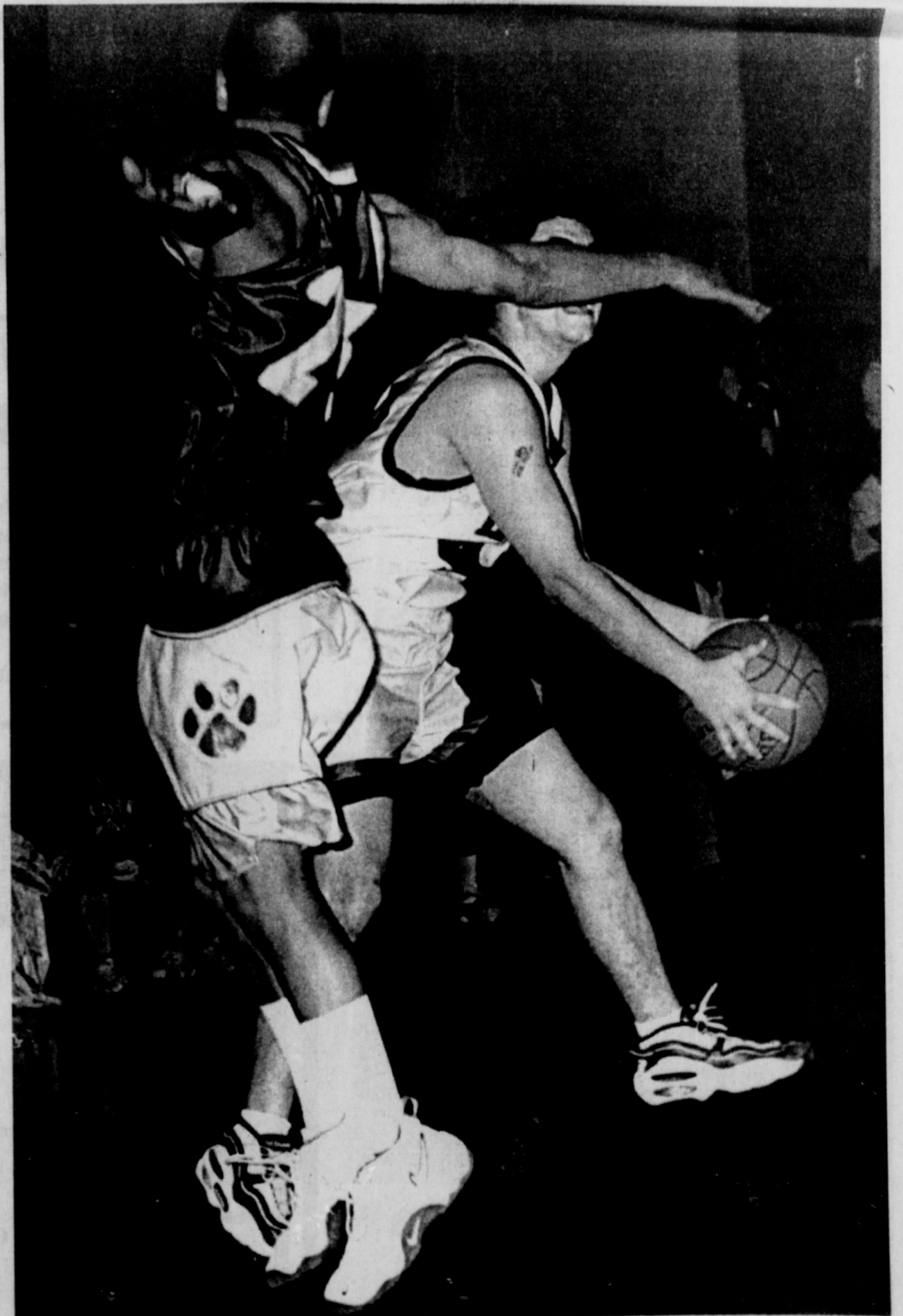

SWEET RECIPES FOR VALENTINES DAY

For those cooks who would like to prepare a special treat or dessert for their families on Valentine's Day, perhaps one of the recipes this week will be just what you are looking for.

Pink Divinity

2 cups sugar
3/4 cup water
1/4 cup light corn syrup
2 egg whites
1 tsp. vanilla extract
3-4 drops red food coloring
3 dozen pecan halves

Combine sugar, water, and corn syrup in a 3-quart saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until sugar dissolves. Cook over high heat, without stirring, until mixture reaches hard ball stage (260 degrees).

Place egg whites (at room temperature) in a large mixing bowl; beat until stiff peaks form. Pour hot sugar mixture in a very thin stream over egg whites while beating constantly at high speed of an electric mixer. Add vanilla and food coloring. Continue beating 3 to 5 minutes or until mixture holds its shape.

Quickly drop mixture by heaping teaspoonfuls onto waxed paper. Press a pecan half on top of each. Cool.

Chocolate Cherry Cake

1 box devil's food cake mix
1 - 21 oz. can cherry pie filling
1 tsp. almond extract
2 eggs, beaten

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour 9x13-inch pan. Combine all ingredients in a large bowl and mix well. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until tester inserted near center of cake comes out clean. Frost while warm.

Frosting:

In a small saucepan, combine 1 cup sugar, 5 tablespoons margarine and 1/3 cup milk. Cook until mixture comes to a boil, stirring constantly. Cook, stirring, 1 minute longer. Remove from heat and add 1 - 6 oz. pkg. semisweet chocolate chips. Stir until smooth.

Stacked Pineapple Upside Down Cake

1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted
2/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1 - 20 oz. can sliced pineapple, drained
2/3 cup maraschino cherries, halved
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1 pkg. yellow cake mix without pudding

Combine butter and brown sugar; spread evenly into 2 greased 9-inch round cakepans. Arrange pineapple slices, cherries, and pecans on top.

Prepare cake mix according to directions. Pour batter into pans. Bake at 350 degrees 30 to 40 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Remove immediately from pans, and cool completely on wire racks.

Stack layers, pineapple side up, on serving plate. Spread warm caramel frosting on sides of cake.

Caramel Frosting:

1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
3 Tbsps. milk
2 cups sifted powdered sugar

Combine butter and brown sugar in a medium saucepan. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly; cook 2 minutes. Add milk and return to a boil. Remove from heat; let stand 5 minutes. Add powdered sugar to mixture, beating until smooth. Makes enough to frost sides of one 2-layer cake.

Peanut Butter - Chocolate Kiss Cookies

1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup peanut butter
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1 egg
2 Tbsps. milk
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 cup sugar
48 chocolate kisses

Cream shortening and peanut butter; gradually add 1/2 cup sugar and brown sugar, beating until light and fluffy. Add egg, milk, and vanilla; beat well.

Combine flour, soda and salt; add to creamed mixture.

Roll dough into 1-inch balls; then roll in 1/4 cup sugar. Place balls 2 inches apart on a lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for 8 minutes. Remove from oven; press a chocolate kiss into the center of each cookie. Return to oven for an additional 2 minutes or until lightly browned. Yield: 4 dozen.

Chocolate-Praline Jumbo Squares

3/4 cup graham cracker crumbs
3/4 cup finely chopped pecans
1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted
1 - 12 oz. jar caramel-flavored topping
3 Tbsps. all-purpose flour
1 cup butter or margarine
4 - 1 oz. squares unsweetened chocolate
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 cup all-purpose flour
4 eggs, beaten
1 tsp. vanilla extract

Combine first 4 ingredients, stirring well. Press crumb mixture into bottom of a greased 9-inch square pan. Bake at 350 degrees 6 to 8 minutes. Cool slightly.

Combine caramel topping and 3 tablespoons four, stirring well. Spread topping on crust to within 1/4-inch from edge of pan. Set aside.

Combine 1 cup butter and unsweetened chocolate in a heavy saucepan; cook over low heat until melted. Stir in sugar and next 3 ingredients. Pour mixture over reserved caramel topping in pan. Bake 50 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool slightly and spread with Chocolate Frosting. Lightly sift powdered sugar over frosting if desired. Garnish with pecan halves and candied cherries, if desired.

Chocolate Frosting:

1 Tbsp. butter or margarine
2 Tbsps. cocoa
2 Tbsps. water
1 cup sifted powdered sugar
1/4 tsp. vanilla extract

Combine first 3 ingredients in a small saucepan and cook over medium heat until mixture thickens. Remove from heat; stir in powdered sugar and vanilla.

The students at Kidwell are jumping at the chance to help fight heart disease and stroke - our nation's No. 1 killer.

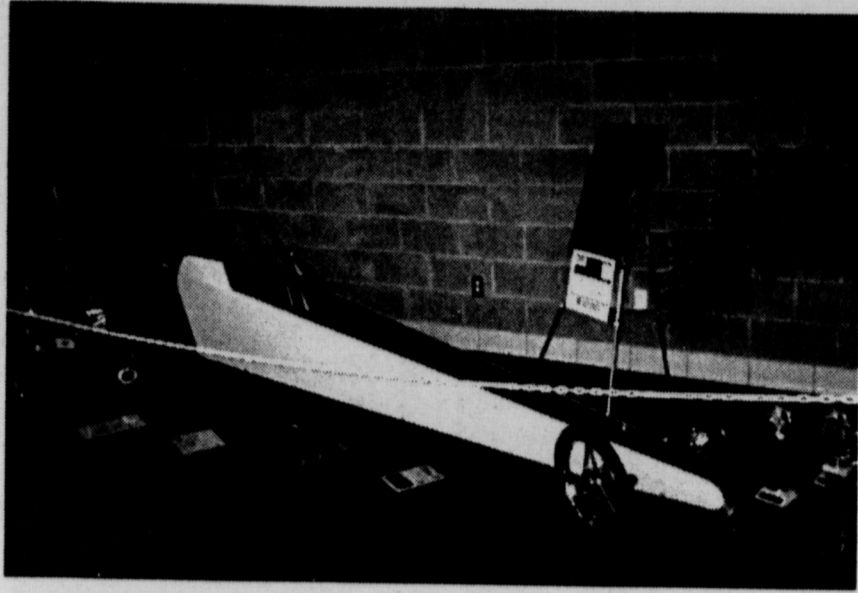
Thursday, Feb. 26, the school will hold its first annual Jump Rope for Heart event.

As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



I am now a victim of age discrimination.

Monday, I received a letter from the Texas Press Association informing me of a photojournalism workshop the organization is sponsoring at Texas Christian University.

Oh, the cost is reasonable. It's free, including tuition, hotel, food and film.

But it's available only to a select few. You've got to bring along your own 35 mm camera.

I don't own a 35 mm camera. Never have, and likely never will.

Oh, I've used 35 mm cameras before. They're great. I trained with one in college, and used another while working on the Hereford Brand.

But, because I do my own darkroom work, I find that smaller film difficult to handle. And besides, I'd have to purchase a different camera, along with a new lens for my darkroom enlarger, and just toss away what I use.

With the exception of that brief time at Hereford, I've been using 120mm cameras 46 years. And with that experience, I'm more comfortable with them.

I get a kick every so often when some youngster looks at my Yashica with amazement and asks how old it is. The one I'm using is only some 15 years old, but to the youths who are better acquainted with 35 mm units, I suppose it does look old.

Actually, I decided some five or six years ago that I was going to change cameras. And I still intend to do it.

My next camera will be one of these new digital units. They're the kind that completely takes you out of the darkroom business, because you just connect the camera with your computer and it produces your pictures.

But my desire to switch to the digital camera hasn't yet been matched by the manufacturers.

I haven't found one as yet that will allow me to take pictures under all the different situations I need to shoot. I'm sure they're out there, but as of now I haven't seen one.

And when I do find what I'm wanting, it won't be cheap. My guess is that the camera I select will likely cost several times more than all the cameras I've had over the past four-plus decades.

I'm not griping about being discriminated against by the TPA and TCU, however.

They just gave me grounds to harrass them whenever we next meet.

That's another advantage of having lived 67 years. You learn the best and most effective way to do things.

AUSTIN — Following two weeks of legal skirmishes, Attorney General Dan Morales agreed last week to stop Morales from spending on his favorite projects the \$1.2 billion the tobacco industry will pay the state this year. The remaining \$14.1 billion to be paid over 25 years would have gone to the state treasury.

The agreement between Morales, Sen. Bill Ratliff, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Rep. Rob Junell, head of the House Appropriations Committee, requires the tobacco companies to send all payments to the Texas Treasury and leaves lawmakers to decide how to spend it.

Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant and Junell, D-San Angelo, had sued to stop Morales from spending on his favorite projects the \$1.2 billion the tobacco industry will pay the state this year. The remaining \$14.1 billion to be paid over 25 years would have gone to the state treasury.

Morales wanted to use \$428 million of the tobacco settlement to establish a private foundation. A foundation will be formed, but it will be financed by the five private attorneys who represented the state in its lawsuit against the tobacco industry.

Ratliff and Junell pledged to support Morales' proposed list of health programs that would be financed by the first settlement

money but offered no guarantees, the *Austin American-Statesman* reported.

"Every member of the Legislature will have the opportunity to vote on these measures," Junell said in a memo to House members.

Other Capital Highlights
U.S. Rep. Dick Arme, R-Irving, pledged to legislate a permanent ban on cloning humans in the United States. The House Majority Leader said President Clinton's proposed ban doesn't go far enough. "This is the right thing to do, at the right time, for the sake of human dignity," Arme said.

Karla Faye Tucker on Feb. 3 became the first woman executed in Texas since the Civil War. Tucker, 38, hacked a man and a woman to death with a pickax in 1983.

A campaign finance report filed last month showed that a political action committee for Putting Children First, a group that favors using tax dollars for private school tuition vouchers, accepted \$100,000 from Wal-Mart heir John Walton of Arkansas. Voucher supporters are gearing up for an intensive lobbying effort in the 1999 Legislature.

Texas A&M University officials hope a new early acceptance and admission program at the Texas A&M College of Medicine will boost the number of minority medical students. Under the partnership for primary care — designed in response to the Hopwood decision — students who maintain at least a 3.5 grade-point average and complete required courses would be automatically admitted to the college of medicine upon graduation.

Lawyers for a Corpus Christi-based Bay Area Citizens Against Lawsuit Abuse says that if it is forced to make public its contributor list, other non-profit organizations in Texas might have to follow suit. The Texas Supreme Court is hearing the group's case to keep the list secret on First Amendment grounds.


