No challengers yet on city, school ballots

This could be a record year for school and city elections, which are called for May 2.

There may not be any elections. Five positions -- three on the city council and two on the school board -- are to be decided in May.

Five candidates have filed, one for each opening.

But, as provided by state law, if none of the positions are challenged in either election, there will be no election, and the candidates are automatically named.

All three city council incumbents -- Mayor Tim Hunter and Aldermen Joe Singer and Joe Ward -- have filed for re-election.

There are two openings on the school board to be decided. Incumbent Jeff Watts has filed. Randy Alsup has filed for the position currently held by Dennis Yeager.

Deadline for candidates to file in either the city or school election is Thursday, Mar. 19.

Candidates for school trustee can file at the administration building, and candidates for city council can file at the city hall.

Early voting in both elections will begin April 14 and conclude April

SECOND-OLDEST ORGANIZATION HERE

Iowa Park Lions Club

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the first in a series of organizations in Iowa Park.)

The Iowa Park Lions Club is the second oldest civic organization in Iowa Park, the Masonic Lodge being the oldest.

The club was organized in May 1928 by George B. Anderson of Wichita Falls. May 15, 1928 the club met it's charter quota.

A vision of a community service club was what Melvin Jones, an insurance salesman of Chicago, had in mind when he wrote to several club heads across the country in 1917 and told them of his idea.

He had conceived the idea that in addition to meet, eat, trade with each other and use first names, there should be added to the luncheon club concept the idea of "service to others."

Jones had watched Rotary from 1905 and Kiwanis from 1915 progress into real luncheon clubs and grow, despite war-times, to where they were forces in the business and professional world.

After writing letters conferring with some already established organizations heads he finally got them all to meet.

The first meeting was held in Dallas on Oct. 8, 1917, with 36 delegates and eight alternates.

The name "International Association of Lions Club" was adopted

Currently the Iowa Park Noon Lions Club, with about 20 businessmen and women, is still keeping the idea of a "service club" going.

The club strives for one hundred

percent participation from its members. Some members are unable to attend all meetings, but work at the

The main focus of the club is vision. "Working with the blind is what the Lions Club is all about," President Belvin Lytle said.

The Lions Club provides eye exams and glasses to needy children. Lytle said they receive names from the schools of children who may need glasses, but whose family can't afford them. He added they sometimes help adults with eye glasses. The club has also helped with a seeing eye dog, computers and training for the blind.

They have contributed toward the purchase of a computer that was needed at the Iowa Park Junior High for students with vision problems. This is just one of the many services that the Lions Club contributes to citizens of Iowa Park.

The club also gives two to five \$500 scholarships to seniors at Iowa Park High School each year. Lytle explained the way their scholarship recipient is chosen is to invite all applicants to meetings, and have them meet and talk with the members. Members later make their selections.

Locally the club contributes to the Iowa Park Senior Citizens, Operation Kid Fish, and recently made a contribution to the Waling Track Fund for Lake Gordon.

They help support the Lions Club Camp for children with vision problems, and make contributions that help diabetics, health services, envi-

Early voters few in party primary

Voters are apparently saving their effort for the party primary elections on April 14, because very few are casting early ballots at the local poll.

Shortly after noon Wednesday, only 27 Republican and 77 Democrat ballots had been marked at the county annex poll.

And early voting ends Friday. Some observers had predicted a heavier turnout, particularly because of the Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace

Two Democrats, Ray Smock and Marc Newman, are the candidates seeking to fill the post which will be vacated by Bill Robinson, who announced earlier he would not run for another term.

Additionally, Iowa Park native Terri Voyles Penaluna is one of two candidates on the Democratic party ticket for the county clerk office.

The winner in that contest will take on Republican Lloyd Lueck in the Nov. 3 general election.

Additionally, considerable interest has been expressed -- at least around the coffee shops -- in the county judge race.

Incumbent Nick Gipson earlier switched parties, and as a Republican he is being contested by former county commissioner Woody Gossom on the primary ticket.

The winner between those two will take on Democrat Aaron Alejandro in the general election.

Republicans will choose between Ron Buffum and Chip Hitchcock in the primary, for the candidate who will take on Democrat David Farabee in the Dist. 69 state representative

He was later released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court, according to the blotter A business sign in the 600 block



There was a time, not too many years ago, that our utility companies played a major part in our commu-

Pasta can be used in casseroles or as a base for all types of sauces, and the combinations are numerous.

The recipes being featured this week will hopefully provide new ideas for pasta lovers.

Creamy Chicken Manicotti 8 manicotti shells

1 (10 3/4 oz.) can creamy chicken mushroom soup, undiluted

1/2 cup sour cream 2 cups chopped cooked chicken

1/4 cup chopped onion

2 Tbsps. butter or margarine, melted 1 - 4 oz. can sliced mushrooms, undrained

1 cup (4 ozs.) shredded Cheddar or Monterey Jack cheese

Cook manicotti shells according to package directions, omitting salt. Drain shells and set aside.

Combine soup and sour cream; stir well. Combine half of soup mixture and chicken; stir well. Set aside remaining soup mixture. Stuff manicotti shells with chicken mixture and place in a greased 12x8x2-inch baking dish.

Saute onion in butter in a large skillet until tender; add mushrooms. Stir reserved soup mixture into mushroom mixture. Spoon over manicotti. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees 15 minutes. Sprinkle with cheese and bake an additional 5 minutes. Yield: 4 servings.
