TCI's existing franchise with the city expires May 22, and several changes are being proposed by the
city, Mayor Tim Hunter explained to the two Buford representatives who attended the meeting. Most significa changes demanded by the city is the point that every residence within the city limits be offered cable service.

The current franchise permits the cable company to require a certain number of potential customers within
a given distance. a given distance.

## Gardening Hints <br> by Mark Ternig

The following questions were received at the Wichita County Ex. received at the Wichita County Ex-
tension office over the past week tension office over the past week.
Q. Our lawn in Wichita Falls is covered with weeds! What can we do about all these weeds?
A. Winter weeds have takenover many lawns this spring. Wetter than normal conditions and mild temperatures have increased our weed
problems. problems.

Broadleaf winter weeds like henbitor dandelions can be controlled
with a broadleaf herbicide. Control products such as Weed-B-Gone and Wipeout among others can be carefully spot sprayed onto unwanted broadeaf weeds for control. These hormone type herbicides should be applied during warmer temperatures with low wind speeds
and with dry conditions. Be and with dry conditions. Be patient
and allow several weeks before judging the control results. judging the control results.
Winter grassy weeds will no controlled by the broadleaf herbicides. You may simply mow these areas regularly until warmer weather causes their decline. Spot treating with Roundup and similar control products can be risky this late in the spring.

Bermuda lawns are greening up in areas near sidewalks and on south
and west exposures. Roundup and west exposures. Roundup could
kill actively growing bermuda St Augustine bermuda. completely went into dormancy with the mild temperatures this winter.

Program (WHIP) is the U.S. Department of Agriculture's newest wildlife program and it's for people who want to restore degraded native wildife habitat on private lands. "WHIP is a voluntary program which provides both technical assistance and cost-sharing to restore degraded native habitat on private lands," explained Michael A. Isbell,
District Conservationist with the USDA Natural Resources Conser vation Service. Participant
"Pervice.
o own or conment a wildlife habitat developmen plan which contains wildlife habitat practices to be installed on the land. "In addition, if the landowner agrees, wildlife agencies like the Texas Department of Wildlife and
Fisheries, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Fisheries, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Ducks Unlimited may also provide expertise or additional funding tohelp experise or additenal a project," Isbell said.

The plan is prepared in consul
lation with the Wichita Soil \& Water Conservation District.
Itdescribes thelandowner's goals for improving wildlife habitat, in-
cludes a list of practices and schedule
