Busy police handle variety of problems

The past week was an especially busy period for Iowa Park police, with cases ranging from possession of drugs and sexual assault to groups violating the city's ordinance against drinking in parks.

A 16-year-old Wichita Falls boy was taken into custody after investigation was completed on a sexual assault case reported Mar. 23.

The youth is accused of aggravated sexual assault of two Iowa Park juvenile females Mar. 13 and 14.

He was placed in the juvenile detention center for 10 days, after which another juvenile hearing of the case will be held, according to police.

John Wesley Skierski, 17, was arrested Wednesday afternoon of last week for carrying a prohibitive weapon, a knife.

Skierski was taken before Jus-

tice of the Peace Bill Robinson, who set his bond at \$5,000, and then he was transported to the county jail.

Randal Drian Carpenter, 36, was picked up Thursday afternoon on a charge of possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamines, a third degree felony.

He was transported to the county jail under a \$5,000 bond, according to the police blotter.

Two young men were arrested at 1:55 a.m. Saturday on drug charges.

Ronald Patrick Whitehead, 18, was charged with possession of marijuana, less than two ounces, and Monty Keith Britt, 19, was charged with possession of marijuana, and also for possession of a prohibitive weapon.

Both men were transported at 7:45 a.m. to the county jail.

When police were called to a domestic disturbance at a residence in the 200 block of James Saturday afternoon, they arrested a man and woman on charges of Class C assault.

Charged were Michael Adrian McDaniel, 23, and Shawna Renae Allen, 20. Both were later released after signing promises to appear in municipal court.

Taken into custody on a county warrant for criminal non support was Walter David Fowler, 40. He was turned over to a deputy to be transported to the county jail.

Nine people, including two juveniles, were issued citations over the weekend for violating the city's ordinance prohibiting consumption of alcohol in a city park.

Police were alerted in the early

AT STATE MEET

Powerlifters earn honors

For the second straight year, the Iowa Park Lady Hawk Powerlifting team finished as the second best team in 3A in the State Meet held this past week at Ft. Hood in Killeen.

But it was the boys' team that stole the spotlight, as the Hawks tied Frisco as Co-Champs in the 3A division. What made it so special was that Iowa Park had only two lifters at the meet while Frisco had five.

Richard McCann and Brandon McLemore won their respective weight classes to pick up State titles and seven points each, which was enough to give the Hawks enough points to tie Frisco for the Championship.

The girls also had a pair of State Champions in their Class, as Amanda Stephens and Sarah Kaspar each brought home the gold in their respective divisions.

Stephens, the defending State and National Champion, finished runner-up to the overall champion while Kaspar finished third. In the girls' divisions, you not only compete against your own class, you compete against all classifications from 2A-5A.

Other lifters for the Lady Hawks

at the State Meet included: Lisa Nichols finished 8th in the 105-lb. division with a total of 510; Lacy Slack finished 12th in the 123's with a total of 560 and tied a school record in the squat with a lift of 120; Jennifer Nicholson finished 4th in the 132's with a total of 660 and set a new school mark in the bench with a lift of 120, and Carmen Tidwell finished 3rd in the 165's with a 720 total and finished 6th overall.

In the 181's, Sabrina Luckey finished second with a total of 700, setting two new school records with a 275 squat and a 140 bench. Also

lifting in the 181's, Shannon Eaves finished 4th with a total of 685, in the 198's Christy Goin finished 3rd with a total of 715.

Stephens won the 97-lb. division with a total of 575 and set a new school and State Record in the bench with a lift of 115. Kaspar won the 198's with a total of 785.

"I think the girls were disappointed that they didn't win, because they were so geared up for it," said head coach Steve Stewart. "We had a meeting the night before the meet and

Clean & Green Committee leaving its mark on the city

Since 1993 there has been a lot of clean-up and beautification work accomplished in Iowa Park, thanks to the Clean and Green volunteers and the organizations that have worked with them.

The group's first project was

cleaning an area on the north side of Lake Gordon, in Oscar Park.

It took the group three work days to gather the trash, clear brush, prune trees and paint the picnic table and awning. When all was done, the city hauled away 20 truckloads of trash and brush.

Lake Gordon and Oscar Park have been an ongoing project for the committee.

A couple of years ago, a member of Clean and Green appeared before the city council to see if a survey could be done to determine if citizens wanted a walking path around the lake.

Councilmen agreed to put the survey on the citizen's water bills, and the results showed that most were in favor of a walking path.

Since that time, the committee has worked with city officials, as well as others, to get a walking path with bridge around Gordon Lake.

The city has put in a request for the old Beaver Creek bridge, to be used for the walking path to cross over the north end of the lake.

There are some projects on hold for a time until other projects are worked out. The group is hoping to fund a gazebo for Oscar Park someday.

Another project of the Clean and Green was the transformation of a vacant lot at 113 W. Cash into a pocket park. The site was left bare

when a building at that location burned several years ago.

The lot was leveled and top soil brought in. Several citizens donated their time, supplies and heavy equipment to get the area ready for planting.

Iowa Park High School Horticulture class donated bedding plants, and local civic clubs bought trees.

Clean and Green members, women's club members, and high school students planted the trees, flower beds, grass, and laid the steel edging for the walking path.

These are just a couple of the bigger projects of Clean and Green.

They have worked in conjunction with several groups and organizations to improve the appearance of Iowa Park.

Seeing a need for a beautification program in Iowa Park and being impressed with the beautification programs of other cities in the county, Dolores Hamilton suggested to Larry Dutton, president of the chamber of commerce, that something similar be done in Iowa Park.

Dutton prompted Mrs. Hamilton

to start a program locally, and as a result, Iowa Park Clean and Green was formed in April 1993, as a committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

There were about 60 volunteers at the first meeting, where Mrs. Hamilton was named chairman and Frances George co-chairman.

Mary Lou Wolfe, head of the Burk Burnett Beautification Program, helped the group get started and get in touch with the Keep Texas Beautiful office.

According to Mrs. Hamilton,

Hambright, 11, is in the sixth grade. Carroll, 14, and Strange, 15, are both in the eighth grade at junior high.

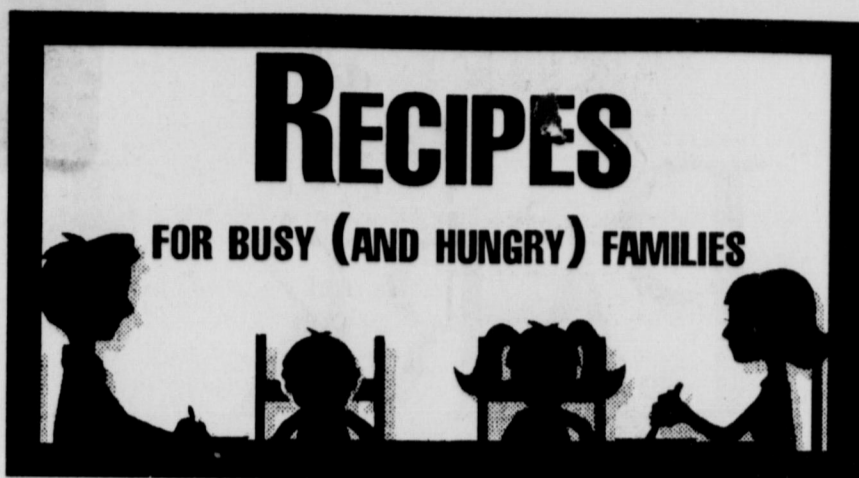
Jacobson, 13, who was the only one competing in the boys division, is also in the eighth grade.

An interest in preparing great-tasting, nutritious meals is as high today as ever. But the schedules and demands on the time of mothers today make it necessary for them to find recipes that are quick and easy to prepare, as well as appetizing. The recipes this week fit that description, most of them taking no more than 30 minutes to prepare.

Chocolate Turtle Cheesecake

1 - 14 oz. pkg. caramels
1 - 5 oz. can evaporated milk
1 1/4 cups chopped pecans, divided
1 - 9-inch chocolate crumb pie crust
1 - 3 pz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
1/2 cup sour cream
1/4 cup milk
1 - 3.9 oz. pkg. chocolate instant pudding mix
1/2 cup fudge topping

1. Place caramels and evaporated milk in a heavy saucepan. Heat over medium-low heat, stirring continually, until smooth, about 5 minutes. Stir in 1 cup chopped pecans and pour into pie crust.

2. Combine cream cheese, sour cream and milk in a blender. Process until smooth. Add pudding mix and process about 30 seconds longer.

3. Pour pudding mixture over caramel layer, covering evenly. Chill, loosely covered, until set, about 15 minutes.

4. Drizzle fudge topping over pudding layer in a decorative pattern. Sprinkle top of cake with remaining pecans. Chill, loosely covered, until serving time.

Preparation time: 30 minutes.
To make ahead: Cheesecake may be made 1 day ahead through step 3. Cover loosely with plastic wrap and refrigerate. Add topping and decorate with pecans before serving.

Chicken Fingers with Honey Mustard

4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts
1 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
3/4 cup milk
1 cup vegetable oil for frying
Honey Mustard
1/2 cup honey
1/4 cup Dijon mustard

Cut chicken into 1/2x2-inch strips. For honey mustard sauce, blend honey and mustard in a small bowl; set aside.

Mix flour, salt and pepper in a shallow bowl. Dip chicken in milk. Roll in flour mixture to coat well. Place chicken on waxed paper.

Pour 1/4 inch of oil into a large heavy skillet. Heat over medium-high heat to 350 degrees or until a cube of white bread dropped in oil browns evenly in 1 minute.

Divide chicken into batches. Place chicken in an even layer in hot oil. Fry, turning once, for about 3 minutes on each side or until golden brown and crisp. Drain on paper towels. Serve with sauce.

Time Saver: Prepare the honey mustard one or two days ahead of time so the flavors have time to blend. Fry the chicken fingers up to one day ahead; wrap in foil. Reheat in a 300 degree oven.

Quick Bread

2 cups Bisquick
2/3 cup milk
1/2 to 1 cup (2-4 ozs.) shredded Cheddar cheese or to taste
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted
1/2 tsp. garlic powder, or to taste
1 tsp. parsley flakes

Mix the baking mix, milk and cheese until a soft dough forms; beat vigorously for 30 seconds. Drop dough by spoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake about 10 minutes at 450 degrees or until lightly brown.

Mix butter, garlic powder and parsley and brush over warm biscuits before removing from cooking sheet. Serve warm. Makes 12 biscuits.

Simmer, covered 10 minutes or until potatoes are tender.

Remove potatoes with a slotted spoon to serving bowl. Add pepper to skillet and stir. Pour sauce over potatoes. Sprinkle with remaining parsley.

Club group tours garden

Members of Iowa Park Garden Club toured the "herb landscaped" garden of Renee Elbaum in Wichita Falls last week.

Elbaum has a degree in horticulture from Texas A&M Univ. She teaches floral interpretation through classes at her business, Herbal Expressions Design. She also teaches in Midwestern State Univ. continuing education program.

She explained the many uses of herbs for food, aroma and medicinal purposes. Garden Club members were given the opportunity to pick leaves from the many varieties of herbs to taste and smell, and plants were available for planting in home gardens.

After a short business meeting, members had lunch in Wichita Falls. Plans were made to meet at the RAC on April 1 with floral arrangements to be taken to the nursing home for the residents' dining tables.

Bonnie Illingworth gave the thought for the day: "Some people get lost in thought because it is such unfamiliar territory to them."

Tuna Noodle Casserole

1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 cup milk
3 cups hot cooked rotini pasta
1 - 12.5 oz. can tuna packed in water, drained and flaked
1 - 2.8 oz. can French fried onions, divided
1 - 10 oz. pkg. frozen peas and carrots
1/2 cup (2 ozs.) shredded Cheddar or grated Parmesan cheese

Combine soup and milk in 2-quart microwavable shallow casserole. Stir in pasta, tuna, 2/3 cup French fried onions, vegetables and cheese. Cover and microwave on HIGH 10 minutes or until heated through, stirring halfway through cooking time. (Can bake, covered, 25 to 30 minutes in 350 degree oven). Top with remaining 2/3 cup onions. Microwave 1 minute or until onions are golden.

Garnish with chopped pimiento and parsley sprigs, if desired.

Parslied Potatoes

1 1/2 lbs. small new red potatoes, scrubbed
1 Tbsp. vegetable oil
1 med. onion, chopped
1 small clove garlic, crushed
1 cup chicken broth
1 cup chopped fresh parsley, divided
1/2 tsp. pepper

Peel a strip of skin from around the middle of each potato. Place potatoes in cold water and set aside.

Heat a large skillet over medium-high heat; add oil. Saute onion and garlic 5 minutes or until tender. Add broth and 3/4 cup parsley; mix well. Bring to a boil.

Place potatoes in a single layer in skillet. Return to a boil; reduce heat.

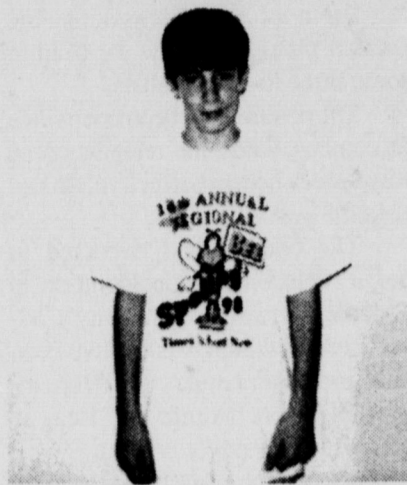

To my way of thinking, those kinds of folks either have ants in their pants, or need to have their heads examined.

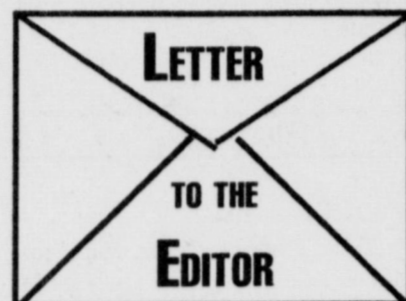

Last year, the Texas Department of Transportation contacted Clean and Green and wanted to do a project in Iowa Park. The requirements were that there be water available at the site and a group to adopt the landscaped area.

An area at Johnson Road and West Highway was selected for the project. Water was supplied by the city, and the high school horticulture class agreed to adopt and take care of the landscaped area.

Clean and Green members have spoken to several clubs, organizations, and at schools on recycling, landscaping, environment and beautification.

Iowa Park schools, churches and many businesses have made an extra effort to beautify their grounds. Our streets and highways are cleaner, people are spending more time working in their yards, the number of vacant lots, overgrown with tall weeds and grass, has diminished. Since Clean & Green has formed, they have found what can happen to the appearance of a community when citizens work together for a common cause.

Clean and Green projects are not just limited to the spring and summer. During the Christmas season they are still putting their touch to our city.

In the past they sponsored an outdoor Christmas decorations con-

test, and awarded first, second and third place winners.

Christmas season of 1997, the group succeeded in getting enough lights to decorate the trees at Tom Burnett Memorial Library, the pavilion at Oscar Park, and the pocket park.

Through monetary and light donations they were able to light up trees at the library, the pavilion, and decorate the "pocket park." In addition, two citizens made candy canes out of PVC pipe and donated them to outline the walking path at the pocket park.

Claudia Friday is the chairman for the Christmas light committee.

Fund raisers in the past have been: a pancake feed, cooked by the MuleSkinners at no charge to Clean and Green, collection of aluminum cans, and selling engraved bricks that were laid around the flag pole in front of the RAC.

Donations have been made by clubs, individuals, civic groups and churches.

The group still collects aluminum cans to raise funds and at this time they are trying to get a container set up to make it more easily accessible to the public for donations.

Clean and Green can be found at Oscar Park, Lake Gordon, during clean-up week, picking up trash and debris. Anyone who would like to join them is more than welcome.

Members of Clean and Green include city officials, police officers, school administrators, teachers, businessmen and women, housewives, and retirees.

Council to begin selecting chief

The Iowa Park city council will meet in a called session Monday night to consider 22 applications for chief of police position.

The meeting will get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers, but then aldermen will go into executive session for their discussions.

From the discussions, the council plans to narrow the field to some three to five finalists.

The position has been open since December, when the resignation of Ray Smock became effective. He had held the post five years.

The council had expected to begin replacement consideration in February. However, the city's advertisement which was to have been published both January and February in the Texas Municipal League magazine was never printed.

Most of the applications were in response to word of mouth, and most recently following advertisements in several North Texas daily newspapers.

Qualifications specified in the city's advertisements included:

- * direct and manage police department operations including \$600,000 budget and 15 employees;
- * advanced certificate from TCLEOSE required;
- * four years supervisory skills preferred;
- * six years law enforcement skills preferred;
- * must possess strong leadership skills;
- * must have a proven record of establishing cooperative relationships

He was the first recipient of the Educator of the Year award, presented by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce; received the Association for Retarded Citizens' Educator Award; and was recipient of the Honorary Chapter Farmer's Degree and State Chapter Farmer's Degree for Future Farmers of America. He served on the Iowa Park CISD School Board and on the Wichita County Tax Appraisal District Board.

Sibley developed a Vocational Transition Curriculum for handicapped students, and conducted the first follow-up study in Texas of special education high school graduates.

He is preceded in death by his parents, and a sister, Alice Tindle.

Survivors include his wife, Florence Arney Sibley of Nacogdoches; a son, Stephen Sibley of Fort Worth; a daughter, Sylvia Middlebrook of Nacogdoches; a sister, Evelyn Tindle of Athens; and four grandchildren.

Hawks find their bats with 9-8 win over Hirschi

After struggling to score runs in their last few games, the Iowa Park Hawks put a 10 spot on the board Saturday against the Hirschi Huskies to pick up their 8th win of the season.

And it took all 10 runs for the Hawks to win as Iowa Park scored the game winner in the eighth inning on a balk call, to improve to 8-5-1 for the season.

The Hawks got on the board in the top of the first, scoring three runs. Michael Swenson led off with a shot to the Hirschi third baseman, who mis-played the ball, allowing Swenson to reach safely. Chad Wright followed with an RBI double to score

Swenson. Justin Terry then doubled home Chad Wright to make it 2-0. Terry scored the third run in the inning on another error by the Huskies, on a ball hit to the shortstop by Kevin Park.

Iowa Park added two more runs in the top of the third to take a 5-0 lead. Chad Wright led off with a single, then advanced to second on a passed ball. Terry's sacrifice fly moved Wright to third. Wright scored when Scotty Mitchell reached safely on an

error by the pitcher on his bunt attempt. Park then followed with an RBI single that scored Mitchell.

Hirschi finally got on the board in the bottom of the fourth with a single run that was quickly answered by the Hawks in the top of the fifth. Iowa Park scored its run without a hit as Wright struck out, but reached safely when the catcher missed the third strike, then threw the ball into the outfield trying to get Wright at first. Wright advanced to second on

the play, then stole third and later scored on a passed ball to make it 6-1.
