EVERYTHING CONCERNING EDUCATION within the Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District was discussed during three days of meetings as part of a District

Effectiveness and Compliance On-Site Accountability Evaluation this week. Conducting the series were representatives of the Texas Education Agency and other school districts.

School trustees to meet tonight

School board members will be considering a wide variety of topics tonight during their regular meeting, which begins at 7 p.m. in the Junior High School Library.

Items on the agenda range from an architect's review of district facility needs, to a closed session to consider high school principal applicants; employment of auxiliary employees for the 1998-99 school year; and student concerns.

Mike Marrs of Marrs Architects has been visiting each campus in the district to get an idea of facility needs. He will give a report to board members this evening.

Superintendent Mike Caplinger will give a report on the District Effectiveness and Compliance (DEC) visit that has been underway this week. He will also discuss campus security at high school and whether additional security measures are needed.

The board is expected to adopt a resolution canceling the trustee election because incumbent Jeff Watts is the only candidate to file for Place 4, Randy Alsop the only candidate to file for Place 5, and there were no write-in candidates by the April 3 deadline.

Other action items include consideration of May 8, 1998, as "Take

Your Daughter/Sons to Work Day," a program being encouraged in public schools. The day provides an opportunity for districts to extend plans for career investigation activities. Also, trustees will consider approval of a

"Parent Involvement Policy." According to the policy, this is to "encourage greater involvement of parents in the education of their children in partnership with their child's school."

Easter weekend approaching

Easter weekend is always a major period for residents of Iowa Park.

Most paramount is the scheduling of special activities of all the city and area churches.

Saturday, the Evening Lions Club will hold its annual Easter Egg Hunt, a project the organization has sponsored some 35 years.

The hunt, to begin at 1:30 p.m., will be staged in the area East of the

high school campus. Areas will be set up for children of five age groups, and 4,000 eggs will be hidden, 10 of them containing prizes.

Should weather not permit the hunt on Saturday, it will be rescheduled on Sunday.

Iowa Park schools will be dismissed Thursday afternoon for the Easter holiday, and classes will not resume until Tuesday morning.

Variety of cases keep police busy

Iowa Park police had their hands full during the past week, making numerous arrests for a wide variety of offenses.

Four young men were cited in the same residence in the 1000 block of South Park Friday afternoon, all for possession of drug paraphernalia, when police assisted a Department of Public Safety trooper.

Charged were Chad Donnal Fields, 20, Brian Keith Kinnett, 23, Michael Keith Smith, 33, and Josh Bates, 17.

In addition, Kinnett was found to have a local warrant for failure to maintain financial responsibility. He was released after paying \$52 toward a bond of \$352, and signed a promise to appear in municipal court.

Also, Fields had two outstanding warrants issued by the DPS. He was released after paying his fines, according to the police blotter.

Wednesday afternoon of last week, Bryan Wayne McMahan, 27, was taken into custody on a Wichita County warrant for unlawful carrying of a weapon, which has a bond of \$611.25. He was later transported by a deputy to the county jail.

Cory Dale Gaines, 24, was arrested early Thursday morning in the 200 block of West Lafayette, and charged with possession of marijuana, over two ounces and less than four. He was transported to the county jail.

When officers investigated a reported minor accident in the 300 block of East Highway Friday afternoon, Stephen Ray Hale, 35, was arrested for driving while intoxicated. He was transported to the county jail.

Anthony Brandon Doucet, 26, and Ellis Anthony Doucet, 43, were both charged with public intoxication after their vehicle was stopped Fri-

day afternoon driving south in the north bound lane of US 287.

According to police records, both men were released from custody the next morning, after signing promises to appear in municipal court.

When officers responded Tuesday afternoon to the scene of another minor accident, this time at Wall and East Highway, Laddy Dwain Wakefield, 41, was issued a citation for public intoxication. He was later released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

Early yesterday morning, Gavin Harold Anderson, 36, was taken into custody in the 300 block of East Ruby. He was charged with possession of drug paraphernalia, a Class C misdemeanor, and released after promising to appear in municipal court.

Two employees of a Vernon meat company filed a complaint Tuesday afternoon, when they stopped at a business in the 500 block of Southeast Access Road and determined three boxes of meat, valued at \$132 each, were missing.

A former Iowa Park resident, Randall Dean Brown, 18, was arrested on a charge of theft over \$500, when Det. Lynn Collins followed up on a Crimestoppers tip in Wichita Falls.

Brown turned over two Boston Terrier dogs which had been reported Mar. 20 as being stolen from a residence in the 1100 block of Pacific.

The dogs, a pup and adult female, were returned to their owner.

Monty Keith Britt, 18, was taken into custody at Iowa Park High School Thursday afternoon for criminal trespass, a Class C misdemeanor.

He was released after signing a

Council sets meeting

The cost of throwing away old tires likely will increase if the city council approves an ordinance during its meeting Monday night.

The meeting is to get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Because a company that contracts to dispose of used tires accepted by the city is raising its fees, those costs will be charged to the owners of the old tires.

Michael Young has requested to make a personal appearance, seeking to purchase city water at his residence on Brandon Lane.

Aldermen will consider awarding a bid for the purchase of unleaded gasoline for use in city vehicles.

Administrator Mike Price is to ask the council's authorization to purchase a law enforcement records management system for the police department.

Price also will seek authorization to sell surplus city property.

Two resolutions are on the meeting agenda, one authorizing the mayor to execute a contract for auditing services and the other accepting the auditor's report for the previous year.

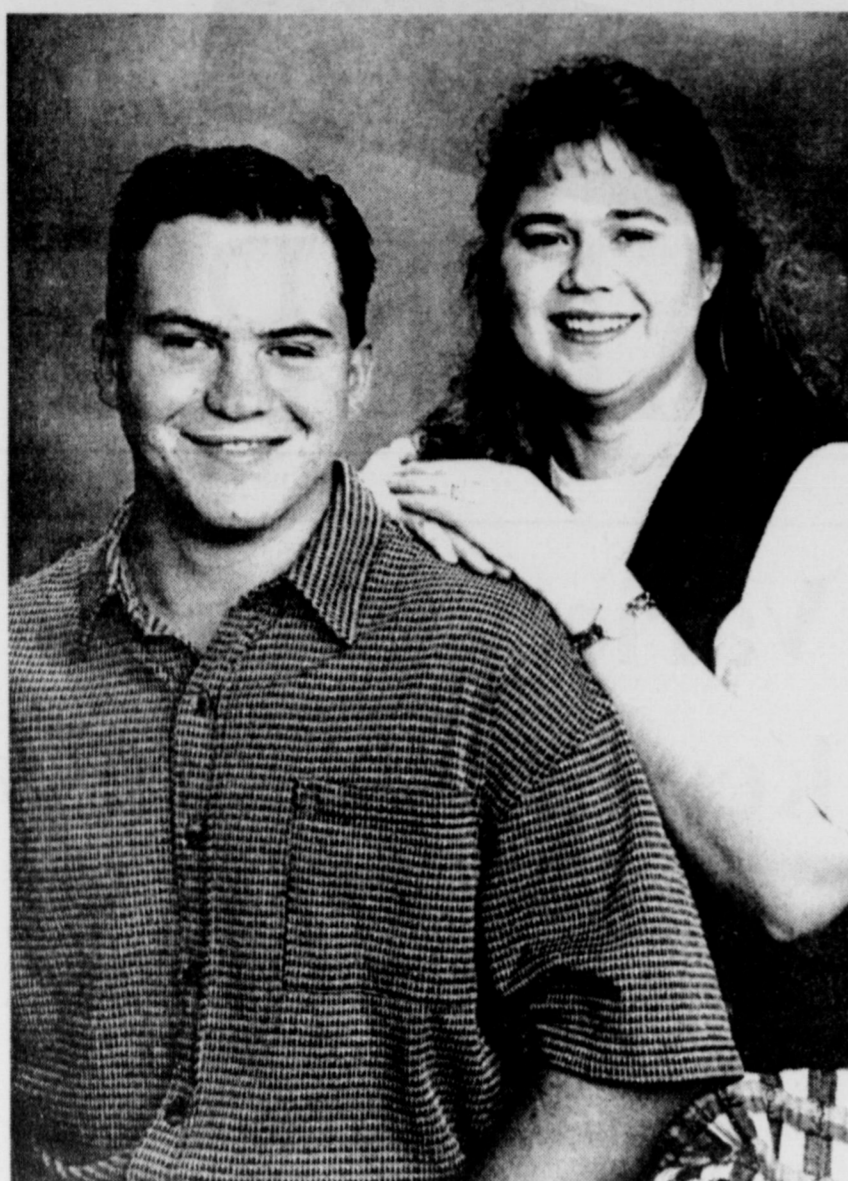

Cook of the Week



Sherry Smith

Sheryl Smith comes from a family of good cooks. She credits her mother with teaching her to cook, and one of her recipes, "Grandpa's Great Roast," was provided by her grandfather. She said he always prepares this roast for family dinners at Thanksgiving and Christmas. Sheryl enjoys cooking and said she gets a lot of ideas from watching (or listening) to cooking shows on television.

A favorite recipe, that she gets many requests for, is "Salsa." This recipe makes a large quantity and can be frozen or canned for later use. Sheryl freezes her salsa in plastic bags, but says someday she would like her grandfather to teach her the art of canning foods as her grandmother use to do.

Sheryl grew up in Henrietta and is a graduate of Henrietta High School. She received an accounting degree from Vernon Regional Junior College. She is employed as office manager at Joe Pistocco Auto Mall in Wichita Falls.

Her husband, Gary, a graduate of Iowa Park High School, owns CarSmith in Iowa Park.

They have two sons, A.J., 12, and Garrett, three-years-old. A.J. is in the sixth grade at Iowa Park Junior High School, and is in the band. He is also active in sports, Scouts, and R.A.'s at church.

Sheryl said her favorite pastime is reading the Bible and being involved in her sons' activities. There are things she use to do, like sewing and playing

golf, Sheryl said she would do again if she had the time.

Sheryl is a member of the Iowa Park Rotary Club, and the family are members of Faith Baptist Church.

Gary is a member of North Texas Bird Club and Ducks Unlimited. He likes to hunt and fish, and often takes A.J. along for these activities.

Salsa

- 1 gal. tomatoes, peeled and chopped (1 use gallon canned)
- 3 large onions, diced
- 15 jalapenos (start with 10-12 and add to taste)
- 1/8 cup cumin
- 5 garlic cloves, chopped
- 2 cups vinegar
- 1/2 cup cilantro
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup salt
- 1 tsp. basil
- 1 tsp. red pepper

Combine ingredients. (I mix everything except the jalapenos in a large container. I fill a saucepan and a stewpot and add the jalapenos to the stewpot mixture because my children don't want the jalapenos.) Bring to a

boil, cook 20 minutes at a rolling boil. Salsa can be canned or frozen in small containers.

Confetti Spaghetti

- 1/2 - 3/4 lb. spaghetti, cooked
- 1/2 medium onion, diced
- 6-8 mushrooms, sliced
- 1/2 medium bell pepper, diced
- 10 pepperoni slices, halves
- 3 garlic cloves

Cook and drain spaghetti. Sauté pepperoni, onion, bell pepper, mushrooms and pressed garlic in skillet sprayed with oil. Add spaghetti to sautéed vegetables and heat through.

Serve as main dish or side dish.

Grilled Hamburger

- 2 lbs. hamburger
- 1/2 medium onion, diced
- 20-25 unsalted crackers
- 3 Tbsps. soy sauce (lite/less sodium)
- 2 cloves garlic

Crush crackers in mixing bowl. Add onions, pressed garlic and soy sauce. Mix well. Add hamburger, Mix and shape into patties. Grill or cook as desired. Makes 6-8 patties.

Patties can be shaped, wrapped individually in plastic wrap, and frozen for later grilling.

Grandpa's Great Roast

Add water to roaster to cover 1 1/4-inch. Add 3 lb. chuck roast. Season with salt, pepper, garlic flakes and Mrs. Dash. Cook about 1 1/2 hours at 375 degrees.

Add cubed potatoes, sliced carrots, sliced onion, Brussels sprouts and broccoli spears to cover roast. Cook until meat is tender, 45 minutes to 1 hour.

If cooking pork roast, add sweet potatoes instead of white potatoes.

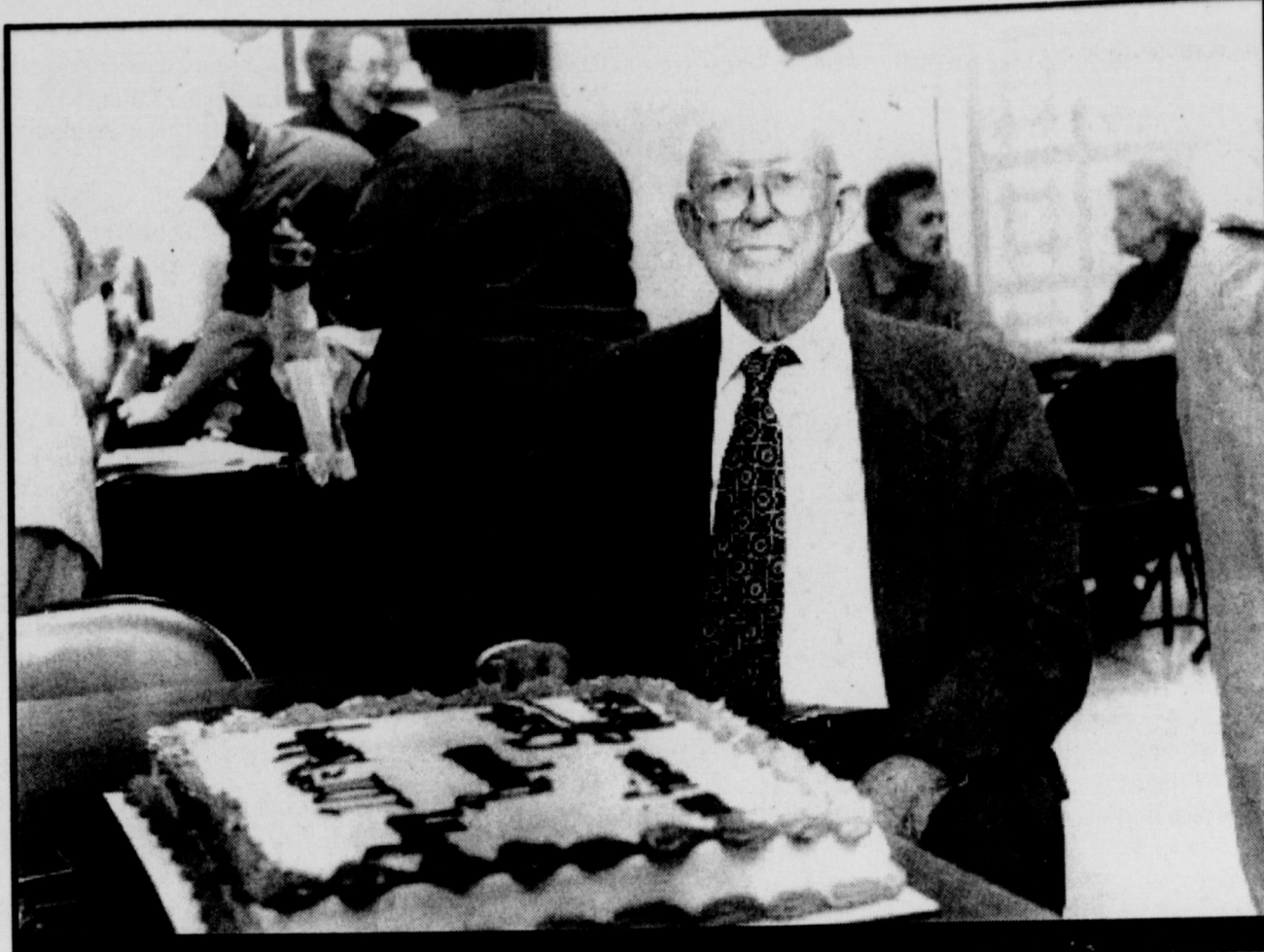

As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



Have you caught up on your sleep yet, now that we've changed to Daylight Savings Time? A lot of folks looked like they hadn't as of Monday, and most all commented about how they didn't like changing their schedules. A woman told me Sunday that

she had gotten very little sleep Saturday night. She explained that she did in fact have an alarm clock, but she kept waking up frequently because she was afraid she wouldn't wake up in time to get to work. I normally wake up around 5:00 in the morning, and never sleep past

5:30. But now that 5:00 is 4:00, I've got to admit it's tough to get accustomed to. Lots of people can't understand how, or why, I normally go to bed about 8:00 in the evenings. That's not a problem for me. But here in another couple of weeks, that means hitting the sack before the sun sets. That's a problem. With a few exceptions, people

tell me they wish Texas hadn't adopted the Daylight Savings Time policy. Those who do like it usually are those who have lots of activities they want to do after getting off work. That extra hour of sunlight fits their liking. The people I feel sorry for are the students living in the country, and have to get out while it's still dark in order to catch their bus ride. Sure, they have to do it during the winter anyway, but this just prolongs that problem. When our legislature voted to adopt DST, one of the reasons they gave was that it would save on utility bills. I'm afraid that just didn't happen. Really, my personal problem is likely my age. I like routine. Just feel more comfortable with a routine type of life. But when you change my routine, it disrupts things... mainly my mental clock.

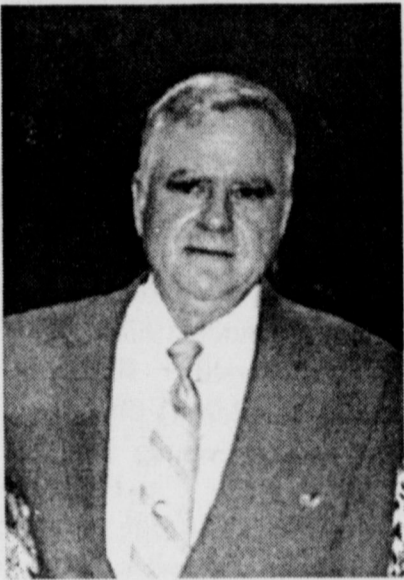
After they both retired, Mrs. Reaves and her husband traveled extensively to see firsthand and learn more about the countries she had taught to three generations during her 52 year career.

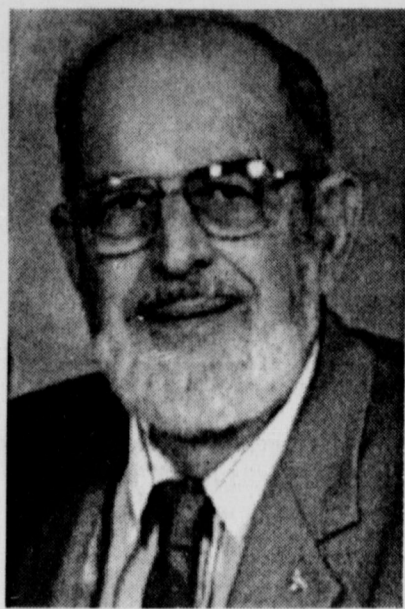
James Bert Brown
