Effectiveness and Compliance On-Site Accountability Evaluation this week. Conducting the series were representatives of the Texas Education Agency and other school districts.

# School trustees to meet tonight

School board members will be considering a wide variety of topics tonight during their regular meeting, which begins at 7 p.m. in the Junior High School Library.

Items on the agenda range from an architect's review of district facility needs, to a closed session to consider high school principal applicants; employment of auxiliary employees for the 1998-99 school year; and student concerns.

Mike Marrs of Marrs Architects has been visiting each campus in the district to get an idea of facility needs. He will give a report to board members this evening.

Superintendent Mike Caplinger will give a report on the District Effectiveness and Compliance (DEC) visit that has been underway this week. He will also discuss campus security at high school and whether additional security measures are needed.

The board is expected to adopt a resolution canceling the trustee election because incumbent Jeff Watts is the only candidate to file for Place 4, Randy Alsup the only candidate to file for Place 5, and there were no write-in candidates by the April 3 deadline.

Other action items include consideration of May 8, 1998, as "Take

Your Daughter/Sons to Work Day," a program being encouraged in public schools. The day provides an opportunity for districts to extend plans for career investigation activities. Also, trusees will consider approval of a

"Parent Involvement Policy." According to the policy, this is to "encourage greater involvement of parents in the education of their children in partnership with their child's school."

Should weather not permit the hunt on Saturday, it will be rescheduled on Sunday.

Iowa Park schools will be dismissed Thursday afternoon for the Easter holiday, and classes will not resume until Tuesday morning.

# Variety of cases keep police busy

Iowa Park police had their hands full during the past week, making numerous arrests for a wide variety of offenses.

Four young men were cited in the same residence in the 1000 block of South Park Friday afternoon, all for possession of drug paraphernalia, when police assisted a Department of Public Safety trooper.

Charged were Chad Donnal Fields, 20, Brian Keith Kinnett, 23, Michael Keith Smith, 33, and Josh Bates, 17.

In addition, Kinnett was found to have a local warrant for failure to maintain financial responsibility. He was released after paying \$52 toward a bond of \$352, and signed a promise to appear in municipal court.

Also, Fields had two outstanding warrants issued by the DPS. He was released after paying his fines, according to the police blotter.

Wednesday afternoon of last week, Bryan Wayne McMahon, 27, was taken into custody on a Wichita County warrant for unlawful carrying of a weapon, which has a bond of \$611.25. He was later transported by a deputy to the county jail.

Cory Dale Gaines, 24, was arrested early Thursday morning in the 200 block of West Lafayette, and charged with possession of marijuana, over two ounces and less than four. He was transported to the county jail.

When officers investigated a reported minor accident in the 300 block of East Highway Friday afternoon, Stephen Ray Hale, 35, was arrested for driving while intoxicated. He was transported to the county jail.

Anthony Brandon Doucet, 26, and Ellis Anthony Doucet, 43, were both charged with public intoxication after their vehicle was stopped Fri-

day afternoon driving south in the north bound lane of US 287.

According to police records, both men were released from custody the next morning, after signing promises to appear in municipal court.

When officers responded Tuesday afternoon to the scene of another minor accident, this time at Wall and East Highway, Laddy Dwain Wakefield, 41, was issued a citation for public intoxication. He was later released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

Early yesterday morning, Gavin Harold Anderson, 36, was taken into custody in the 300 block of East Ruby. He was charged with possession of drug paraphernalia, a Class C misdemeanor, and released after promising to appear in municipal court.

Two employees of a Vernon meat company filed a complaint Tuesday afternoon, when they stopped at a business in the 500 block of Southeast Access Road and determined three boxes of meat, valued at \$132 each, were missing.

A former Iowa Park resident, Randall Dean Brown, 18, was arrested on a charge of theft over \$500, when Det. Lynn Collins followed up on a Crimestoppers tip in Wichita Falls.

Brown turned over two Boston Terrier dogs which had been reported Mar. 20 as being stolen from a residence in the 1100 block of Pacific.

The dogs, a pup and adult female, were returned to their owner.

Monty Keith Britt, 18, was taken into custody at Iowa Park High School Thursday afternoon for criminal trespass, a Class C misdemeanor.

### Council to interview chief prospects

The city council met in executive session almost two hours Monday night, narrowing down a field of 22 applications for the office of police chief to five finalists.

Aldermen decided to invite those five candidates for interviews on Saturday, Apr. 25.

Though the names of the finalists were not released, their current residences include Iowa Park, Wilson, Stamford, Anson and Vernon.

The position of police chief has been vacant since the last of December, following the resignation of Ray Smock who held the post five years.

# Council sets meeting

The cost of throwing away old tires likely will increase if the city council approves an ordinance during its meeting Monday night.

The meeting is to get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Because a company that contracts to dispose of used tires accepted by the city is raising its fees, those costs will be charged to the owners of the old tires.

Michael Young has requested to make a personal appearance, seeking to purchase city water at his residence on Brandon Lane. Aldermen will consider awarding a bid for the purchase of unleaded

gasoline for use in city vehicles.

Administrator Mike Price is to ask the council's authorization to purchase a law enforcement records management system for the police department.

Price also will seek authorization to sell surplus city property.

Two resolutions are on the meeting agenda, one authorizing the mayor to execute a contract for auditing services and the other accepting the auditor's report for the previous year.



A favorite recipe, that she gets many requests for, is "Salsa." This recipe makes a large quantity and can be frozen or canned for later use. Sheryl freezes her salsa in plastic bags, but says someday she would like her grandfather to teach her the art of canning foods as her grandmother use to do.

Our theme this year is "Quality of Caring." Across our nation, senior citizens will be recognized during National Nursing Home Week beginning with Mother's Day through May 16.


We hope to have a wide variety of events planned at IHS that week in addition to attending the picnic at Lucy Park. The public is always invited to join us at any of these events.

# AG AGENT'S REPORT

By JOE RAFF, Wichita County Agriculture Agent

Skunk Damage

I had about 20 calls in the last week about skunks and skunk damage. So this week I decided to rerun from last November.

Sorry if it's too boring to read again, but I do know there are several folks that need this information. See you next week.

How many times have you been driving and see a skunk on the side of the road and think "man I hope I don't hit him;" and if you do, your parking place at work will be five blocks away and not in the V.I.P. parking

Or how many times have you gone outside to pat your dog on the head and realize he has made a new friend, too many I'm sure.

Like all animals, there are good and bad with each. Although, like most of you (me included) it's hard to find much good in a skunk.

But they provide a service in the ecosystem, they control grub, insect, and rodent populations.

Of course on the down side they have a taste for poultry and eggs, feed on pet food, garbage, and love to raid your garden in the wee hours of the night.

But, the biggest problem is that favorable results. they are a primary source of rabies in

The Texas Department of Health reports that skunks, in recent years, have accounted for more than 68 percent of all known rabid animals. Human and domestic pets contact with skunks should be avoided at all When skunks are living or rear-

ing young under buildings, attempts to destroy them may result in release of their noxious scent. Before attempting removal, sprinkle a liberal amount of flour or a similar substance in and around the entrance.

After dark, check for tracks which indicate whether the animals have left to forge for food, which openings they use as exits and the number of skunks involved.

When the animals have left, close all possible entrances with sheet metal or hardware cloth to avoid re-entry.

Fencing usually keeps skunks out of the yard; however, they will sometimes dig under. To prevent burrowing beneath a fence, bury a 30-inch piece of hardware cloth so it extends 12 inches below the surface and 18 inches outward at that depth.

Shooting and live trapping, including the use of live traps and steel leg hold traps, are some methods that can be used in rural areas. In urban areas, live trapping with baited box or live traps is the most desirable method.

Skunks rarely released their scent in darkened areas such as completely covered with burlap. Leave an opening to identify the occupant before the trap is removed.

Destroy skunks showing signs of illness and have them tested for rabies if humans or pets are exposed. A skunk's odor on pets, clothing,

under buildings, etc., may be neutralized by the liberal use of a commercial deodorizer.

Vinegar, tomato juice or a weak solution of household ammonia is suggested for removing the odor from clothing. A few drops of oil of wintergreen on pieces of corrugated cardboard or cotton balls also give


