Annual golf tourney slated by Chamber

The annual All-Iowa Park Golf Tournament will be held Friday, June 5, it was announced during Monday's monthly meeting of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce board of directors.

Once again, this year's event, which is open to everyone who either resides or works full time in the Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District, will be held at River Creek Golf Course.

Chamber President Robert Palmer said the entry fee has not yet been set, but students who will be eligible to compete in UIL competition next year will not be assessed a prize fee because they cannot receive any types of awards.

Even though a group of communities west of Iowa Park along US 287 were competing with the town-wide yard sale held here recently, Palmer reported there were 33 sales held here the same day. That event is sponsored and promoted annually by

the Chamber.

School Superintendent Mike Caplinger gave directors a report on plans for the district's celebration of its 100th anniversary.

The major observation will take place during the school's annual homecoming celebration in October, and is expected to attract a record crowd for the Chamber-sponsored Whoop-T-Do.

Concerning the Whoop-T-Do, directors are already planning to meet the need for more booth space by requesting closing of more downtown streets on that day.

Director Gene Jordan told board members that the Wichita County Young Farmers is already requesting at least five booth spaces for the event, including beans and cornbread, chili, ribs, "cowpatty bingo" and possibly a go cart track.

No action was taken during the meeting on approving the organization's request, however.

Council to interview applicants for chief

The city council is scheduled to meet most of Saturday at city hall, in executive session, interviewing five finalists who are seeking to be hired as police chief.

The interviews are to begin at 8:30 a.m., with the final session scheduled for 1:30 p.m.

Candidates to be interviewed reside in Anson, Stamford, Wilson, Vernon and Iowa Park.

Should council members determine they are ready to make their selection, the posted agenda calls for

an open session, during which a vote could be held.

REGULAR MEETING

A regular meeting of the council will be held at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

The only items on the tentative agenda are a public hearing to annex a 10-acre tract of land along US 287, and an ordinance extending the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction.

An executive session possibly will also be held, according to City Administrator Mike Price.

Few early voters at poll

Very little interest has been shown during early voting in the city council election.

As of noon Wednesday, only 11 ballots had been cast.

Voting will continue from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. at city hall through next

Tuesday.

All three candidates on the ballot, including Mayor Tim Hunter and Aldermen Joe Ward and Joe Singer, are incumbents.

A blank line is below Singer's name, allowing for a write-in vote to be cast for that position.

Timothy James Smith, 29, was charged with Class A assault and transported to the county jail. Emergency medical personnel treated a female who was injured, according to the police blotter.

Wednesday evening of last week, police took Christie Lynn Bryan, 22, into custody in the 600 block of East

Bank, on an outstanding warrant issued locally for speeding. She was released after paying a \$126.25 fine, according to the police blotter.

Mario Francisco Garcia, 23, was arrested Friday evening in the 700 block of East Bank, after it was determined a county warrant for driving while license was suspended had been issued. He was transported to the county jail in lieu of a \$500 bond.

MuleSkinners entering 24th year of service

The Iowa Park MuleSkinners were formed in 1974, to help promote Iowa Park.

The MuleSkinners started as a chili and bean team. Don Flowers, then president of State National Bank, came up with the idea and just started calling people he thought would be interested, according to Billy James, a charter member.

The club started with 40 members. The membership now stands at 25, with four charter members still active.

They became known as the "MuleSkinners" because the hobby of one of the charter members was raising miniature mules.

When they first began, the members traveled to such places as San Marcos, Grand Prairie, and as far away as Puerto Vallarta, Mexico for chili cook offs, and promoting Iowa Park.

The members wore a distinctive uniform, a white hat and shirt, that clearly stated they were the "Iowa Park MuleSkinners." They still wear a white shirt and a blue apron.

The first couple of meetings consisted of inter-club cook-offs in an effort to select a chili recipe worthy of the "MuleSkinner" name.

One of the MuleSkinners' first public events was a chili feed for all residents of Iowa Park. They prepared 650 pounds of chili meat to feed the crowd.

Their main function is to be a service to the community.

The MuleSkinner members volunteer hundreds of hours each month, whether it is cooking to raise funds or cooking as a contribution.

Local senior citizens benefit from the MuleSkinners. Four times a year, the MuleSkinners hold a free feed for Senior Citizens, who live in the Iowa Park School District, or they make a cash contribution to Friendly Door.

They also have an annual "Bean Day" feed at Faith Mission in Wichita Falls.

As another service to the community, the MuleSkinners prepare the meal for the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce Banquet at cost.

In the past they have adopted a squadron at Sheppard Air Force Base and held feeds for the adopted squadron.

The group raised funds for the Iowa Park Clean and Green by holding a Pancake Feed.

The MuleSkinners also provide trophies for the local 4-H and FFA

shows.

They gave money for the proposed walking path around Lake Gordon, and funded the porch on the new Friendly Door building.

They also support other service organizations in Iowa Park, such as the Lions Club, Hospice, Optimist Club, Highland Cemetery, and others.

A large contribution they made was after the April 10, 1979 tornado in Wichita Falls.

They prepared food, took it over and served the victims and volunteers out of the back of a pickup.

The following day they set up their kitchen next to a grocery store that offered the meat (mostly chicken) from their freezer to be cooked for the victims and volunteers of the tornado. The MuleSkinners cooked from 10 a.m. until 8 p.m.

The MuleSkinners raise all of their funds by cooking.

For seven or eight years, they have cooked for the State National Bank's annual customer appreciation day that is held on Friday of Homecoming weekend.

They serve chili, beans and brisket the following day at Whoop-T-Do, and that night they serve food they have prepared for the Alumni

Association banquet.

The last two years they have

served the Wichita Falls branch of State National Bank.

MuleSkinners also serve the an-

24 Hour Oriental Chicken Salad

Judy Williams, Kidwell Elementary

1 whole chicken, cooked and cut up
4 Tbsps. toasted sesame seeds (10 minutes at 300 degrees)
1 pkg. toasted slivered almonds
1 head cabbage, shredded
4 green onions, chopped
2 pkgs. Ramen noodles - do not cook, break up small
Dressing:
2 pkgs. seasoning mix from Ramen noodles
4 Tbsps. sugar
1 cup peanut oil
1 tsp. pepper
1 Tbsp. soy sauce
1/2 cup rice wine vinegar (unseasoned)
Mix all of the above. Pour on dressing. Mix well and let stand in refrigerator overnight.

Layered Pea Salad

1 small sack frozen peas (blanched)
3/4 cup onion
1 cup chopped celery
1 can sliced water chestnuts
1 lb. bacon cooked crispy
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
1 pkg. Mozzarella cheese
2 cups mayonnaise
1 medium head lettuce
Tear lettuce into small pieces and layer in large flat pan. Next slice onions into rings and place on top of lettuce. Add celery, water chestnuts, and peas. Add half of the bacon, (crumbled). Spread mayonnaise on top. Sprinkle salt, pepper, Parmesan, Mozzarella and the rest of the bacon on top.

Pink Stuff Salad

1 can Eagle Brand milk
1 large can crushed pineapple
1 can cherry pie filling
1/2 cup chopped pecans
1 - 16 oz. Cool Whip
Mix all ingredients together and refrigerate.

"Sinful" Salad

2 small pkgs. strawberry jello
1 cup boiling water
1 - 10 oz. pkg. frozen strawberries
1 cup chopped pecans
1 can pineapple with juice
3 bananas, mashed
1/2 pt. sour cream
Dissolve jello in boiling water. Add strawberries, pecans, pineapple, and bananas. Pour 1/2 of mixture in dish and let gel. Spread sour cream over gelled mixture and then pour remaining mixture on top. Let gel until firm.

Mix all together and let set overnight in the refrigerator.

1/2 tsp. black pepper

Broccoli/Ramen Salad

1 pkg. Mann's broccoli slaw
1 bunch green onions, chopped
4 Tbsps. sesame seeds
1 cup slivered almonds (slivered almonds and sesame seeds are quick to burn, so I toasted these at 350 degrees about 3 minutes)
2 pkgs. Ramen noodles (chicken flavor) - remove the seasoning packets and save for the dressing
DO NOT COOK RAMEN - crumble the ramen in with the above.
Optional: If desired, you can add 2 chicken breasts (already baked & cubed)

4 Tbsps. sugar
1 cup canola oil

The workshop was conducted by Dorothy Johnson, Cathy Price, and Debra Williamson.

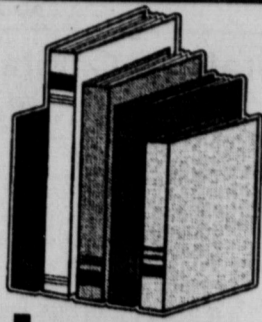

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As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



Because of the very mild weather we had through the winter, this is going to be one of "those" years for pesky insects.

Of course, if you've been outside much the past week or so, I'm not telling you anything you didn't already know.

There's nothing to be alarmed about, but we all need to be aware of the situation and use preventative measures for ourselves, our pets, and our homes.

Currently the main insect problem is ticks and buffalo gnats.

Several people have commented on how bad the ticks are. Pet owners have been noticing the pests on their animals, especially their dogs, for the past couple of weeks.

Naturally, if dogs are permitted inside the home, they act as carriers and the pests take up residence in the carpet, on furniture, and have a shot at attacking anyone living there.

It's suggested to treat your yard with chemicals, either spray or dry materials, or maybe even both. The labels will tell you whether they are effective on ticks, and fleas, and how best they should be applied.

And this year there are a lot of various materials on the market for treating pets, ranging from pills to simple drops of liquid material. They

are very simple to use, and I understand they are very effective.

Of course, giving the dog or cat of the house a good bath with treated soap is usually effective. But once a season won't get the job done.

Some folks have commented about being attacked by buffalo gnats while out in their yards during the past week or so.

If you don't know about buffalo gnats, let me tell you they can make a huge and worrisome welt where ever they bite.

These gnats are something like the mosquito. But you won't hear them like you often can hear a mosquito that's buzzing around.

I've known people who've been hit by these gnats around the eye or lip, and not one said anything pleasant about the results. One man's eye was completely closed by the swelling after one bite on his eyebrow.

Using mosquito spray won't keep a buffalo gnat off you. I've had a lot of experience in finding that out.

One of the most common materials you can use to fend off the buffalo gnat is household vanilla. That seems to do a relatively good job.

Not liking to use it, however, I use another material which seems to be 100% effective. Absorbeen Jr., a

common material in any drug store, is my choice.

But when the mosquitoes are out, which will be any day now, I use a mosquito spray along with my Absorbeen Jr.

Anyway, you might as well be prepared for the insects this season. Get a good supply of all the materials that are available.

And you might as well add to your list of needs a good fly swatter.

AUSTIN — University of Texas System officials see the decline in minority enrollment and they want to reverse the trend.

Last week, the *Austin American-Statesman* reported that UT officials and legal experts said they want to take steps to revise the case that made it illegal for the university to have a race-based admissions policy. The Hopwood case was brought by four white students who claimed they were denied admission to the UT School of Law in 1992 because of race.

UT officials recognize it likely will require another hearing in the U.S. Supreme Court, even though in 1996 the high court let stand a 5th Circuit Court of Appeals ruling that banned affirmative action. They also recognize that reviving the case may be a catalyst that results in a positive change for the nation.

"This is, no doubt, not just a major Texas issue — it's a major national issue," UT System Vice Chancellor and General Counsel Ray Farabee was quoted in the *American-Statesman*. "Sooner or later, it will need to be determined not just for Texas but for the rest of the states."

UT urged Attorney General Dan Morales to appeal. Morales, who

represents the state of Texas in lawsuits, is expected to decide whether to go forward with an appeal this week. In deciding, he must consider the cost to the state for attorneys' fees and potential damages if Texas loses.

Proceeding is worth the risk, UT Systems Regent Patrick Oxford, a Houston lawyer, said. "I don't think it's risky at all to appeal. Under no circumstances can we be worse off than we are now."

Larry Faulkner, UT's new president, said that if the appeal goes forward, it could benefit the university.

Insurers' Data Still Closed
Auto insurers in Texas don't have to release information that could identify the practice known as "redlining."

In a case heard in Austin last week, State District Judge Paul Davis sided with auto insurers, deciding that the number of vehicles they cover and the rates they charge in each of the state's ZIP codes are not open to the public.

The case was brought by Birny Birnbaum, an advocate for low-income consumers.

Birnbaum contended the information — which is filed quarterly with the Texas Department of Insurance — could show that insurance companies are illegally denying policies in areas where large numbers of minorities and low-income Texans reside.

Attorneys for State Farm successfully argued that the information is confidential under state law, and that releasing it would aid competitors.

Low Turnout Explained
Secretary of State Al Gonzales had this to say about the 3 percent turnout in Texas' runoff elections last week: "We have too many election dates."

For instance, Gonzales told *The Dallas Morning News*, 103 elections have been conducted in

Dallas County in the past decade — an average of more than 10 elections per year.

He said that spreading out those voting opportunities over too many dates is costly to taxpayers and causes voter fatigue and confusion.

In the runoff, only 342,960 Texans — a mere 3 percent of Texas 11 million registered voters — went to the polls.

Ex-Prison Chief Enters Plea
James A. "Andy" Collins, former executive director of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, pleaded not guilty to charges that he accepted \$20,000 in kickback money to approve a \$33 million contract for a soy-based meat substitute fed to prisoners.

Collins entered his plea last week in Houston to federal bribery, money laundering, fraud and conspiracy charges.

Collins and Yank Barry, president of Montreal-based VitaPro Foods Inc. were indicted March 30.

Collins resigned Dec. 31, 1995 from his \$120,000-a-year job as chief of the Texas prison system.

If convicted of all six counts against him, he could be sentenced to 70 years in prison and fined \$2 million.

SA Planning GOP Bid
San Antonio is moving ahead with efforts to attract the Republican National Convention in 2000 by preparing a \$17.4 million bid to persuade GOP officials to select the Alamo city.

More than half the money — a total of \$10.4 million — would be raised privately by a host committee headed by former U.S. Rep. Tom Loeffler and financier B.J. "Red" McCombs.

To bid on the convention, the city must agree to reserve both the Alamodome and the San Antonio Convention Center for 68 days. No other events could be held at either site during that period.

The convention will be held July 29 to Aug. 4, 2000.

City receives needed rainfall

Iowa Park received more than half an inch of welcomed rainfall Monday.

Virgil Woodfin reported measuring .62.

The precipitation was welcomed by virtually everyone, considering the time of the year, and the fact that only a trace had been measured during the month of April.

Finding information about your ancestor who immigrated to this country is sometimes difficult.

The first act for naturalizations in the United States was passed in 1790, providing that any alien wishing to become a citizen of the new country should apply to "any common law court" in the state where he had resided for at least one year.

Later the residency requirement was changed to five years, but the rule on the court to be used was set, allowing the immigrant to apply for citizenship in federal, state, or local court.

After September, 1906, records of immigrants applying for citizenship have been kept by the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

Statutes governing the naturalization process did not specify local, state, or federal courts as the proper course, and some records of naturalization can be found in Federal Court records.

To obtain a complete list at the Federal Archives Record Center of those available, the time periods covered and the center having custody of the court records, chapter three of Genealogical Research in the National Archives, would be helpful. Check with your library for the address.

You will also find Broderbund software "Immigrants to the New

World 1600's - 1800's on CD at your library, please check for scheduling time on the computer.

If you are interested in a program or workshop on immigration and naturalization sources, write IPGHS PO Box 553, Iowa Park 76367 or come to a meeting on the first Saturday of every month, 2 p.m., Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

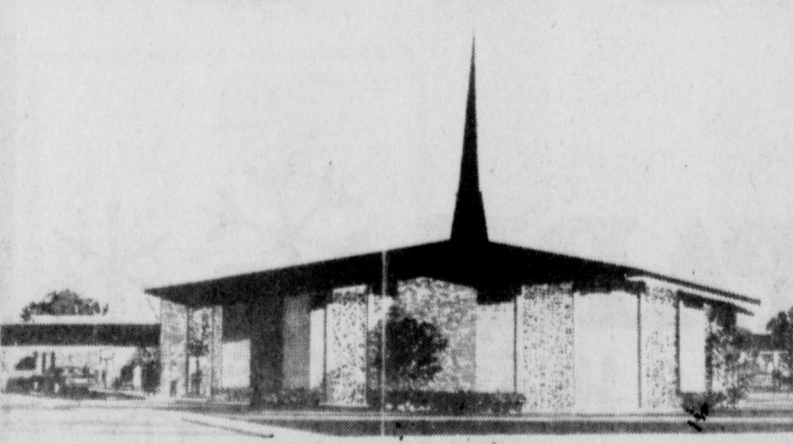

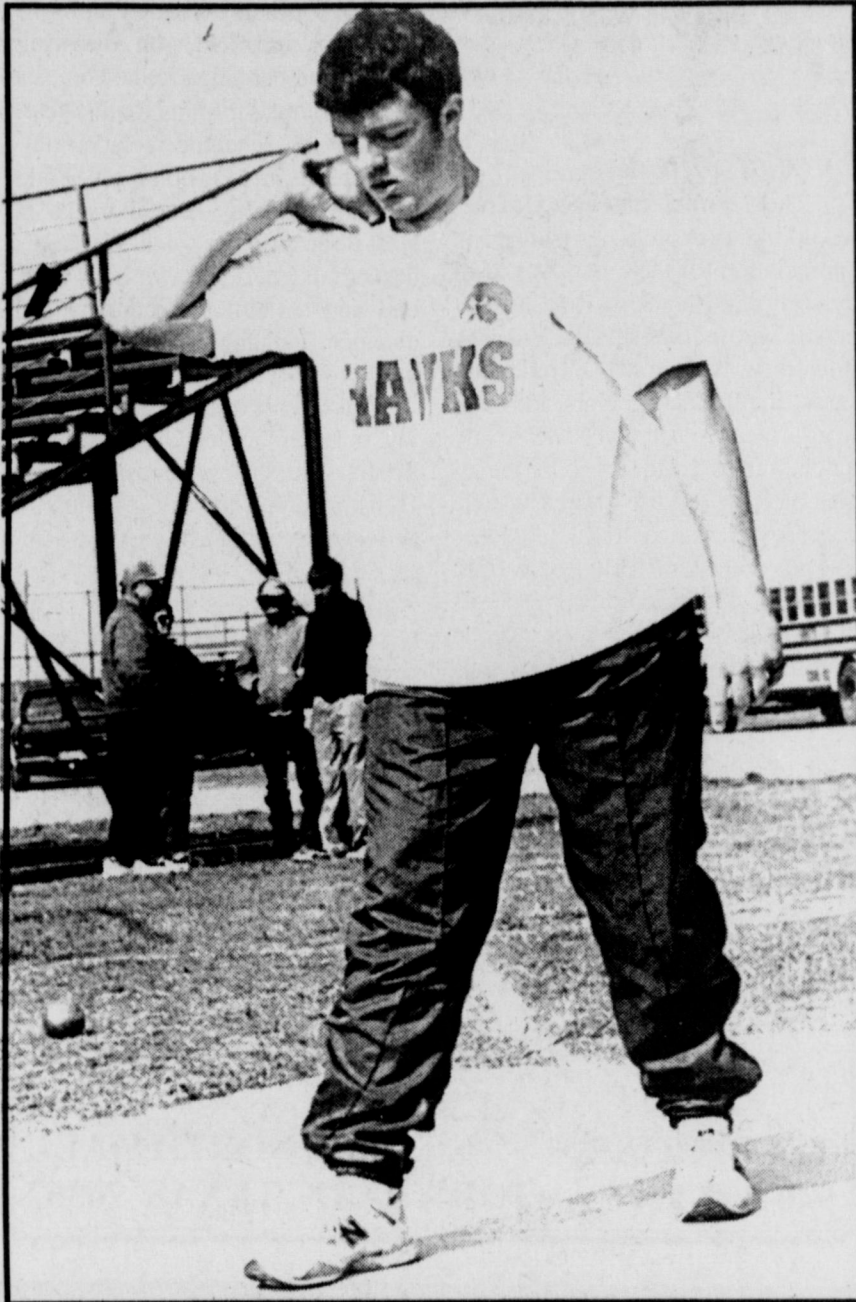

Hawks remain unbeaten in district baseball play

The Iowa Park Hawks remain perfect at 4-0 in the District 5-3A baseball race by winning a pair of games this week over two of the toughest teams in the district.

Iowa Park opened the week with a 4-0 shutout win over Vernon here Friday afternoon.

Chase Wright picked up the win for the Hawks, going the distance striking out 10 and walking only two while giving up four hits. Wright's record improved to 2-3 following the win.

The other of the Wright brothers, Chad, scored the only run his brother would need in the bottom of the first inning when he scored on a sacrifice fly by Jonathan Clubb. Chad Wright reached safely with a single and moved to third on one of three errors by the Lions.

Iowa Park added three more insurance runs in the bottom half of the fifth. Michael Swenson, Chad Wright and Justin Terry all crossed the plate giving Iowa Park a 4-0 lead.

Leading hitters for the Hawks included Chad Wright 1x2 with a pair of runs scored, Swenson 1x2 with a run scored, Terry 1x3 with a run scored and Scotty Mitchell 1x3.

"Defensively I thought we played very well again," said head coach David Furhman. "With two outs in the top of the first they had runners at first and second and were trying to

score the run from second on a single to right. Scotty Mitchell came up with a perfect throw to Kevin Park at the plate to nail the runner for the third out. Swenson also had a great catch later in the game on another nice play."

"I thought Chase did a super job on the mound," Furhman said. "He did an outstanding job of mixing up the speed on his pitches. He struck out 10 and walked only two and that's against a team that can hit the ball."

In Tuesday's game in Jacksboro, you would have thought you were at Wrigley Field with the wind blowing out.

Iowa Park won the game 8-3, with all but two of the runs coming as a result of home runs.

The Hawks powered three balls out of the park, including a grand slam in the top of the sixth to break a 2-2 tie, giving the Hawks the lead for good.

Jacksboro opened the game with a leadoff home run to straight away center off starting pitcher Terry to set the tone for the game.

In the top of the fourth Iowa Park tied the game at 1-1 on a solo homer by Park to center. Park drilled a 3-2 pitch over the center field wall for his first home run of the season.

In the top of the fifth, Iowa Park looked like they could blow the game

open as they loaded the bases with no outs. Miller led off with a walk, then stole second and third. Swenson and Chad Wright both walked to load the bases for Terry, who singled to drive home Miller to make the score 2-1. On the play, Swenson tried to score and got in a rundown and was thrown out. Wright also got caught in a rundown and was also thrown out, taking the Hawks out of a big inning.

The Tigers quickly tied the game

in the bottom half of the fifth, on another solo home run by the leadoff hitter to make it 2-2.

With the game tied and only two innings left to play, Iowa Park took over. With one out, Mitchell homered to right-center to make it 3-2. One out later, the bases were loaded for clean-up hitter Chad Wright, who hit an 0-1 pitch over the center field wall for a grand slam, giving the Hawks the lead for good.

In the bottom half of the sixth, Jacksboro led off with three straight singles, which led to a run. But the Hawk defense stepped up with a big double play to end any thoughts of a come back by the Tigers.

Iowa park scored its final run in the top of the seventh on an RBI double by Tyler Pulley, driving home Chase Wright to make the final 8-3.

"Once again we played a great game defensively," Furhman added. "We faced a playoff caliber pitcher in Chancey and we came up with 10 hits off him. Earlier in the year he held us to only two hits in the game we tied. He is a good pitcher with a live arm and it did us a lot of good to hit well

off him. We stole eight bases and ran well except for the two rundowns in the fifth inning."

"It's good to be on in the district, but we can't afford to slip up and lose a game, then we'll be right back with everyone else," Furhman said. "We have to travel to Childress Friday and that will be another tough game for us. We're starting to hit the ball better and if we continue to play defense and get the pitching we've been getting, we'll do alright."

The Hawks will travel to Childress on Friday for a game scheduled to start at 5 p.m., then return home to host Henrietta on Tuesday.

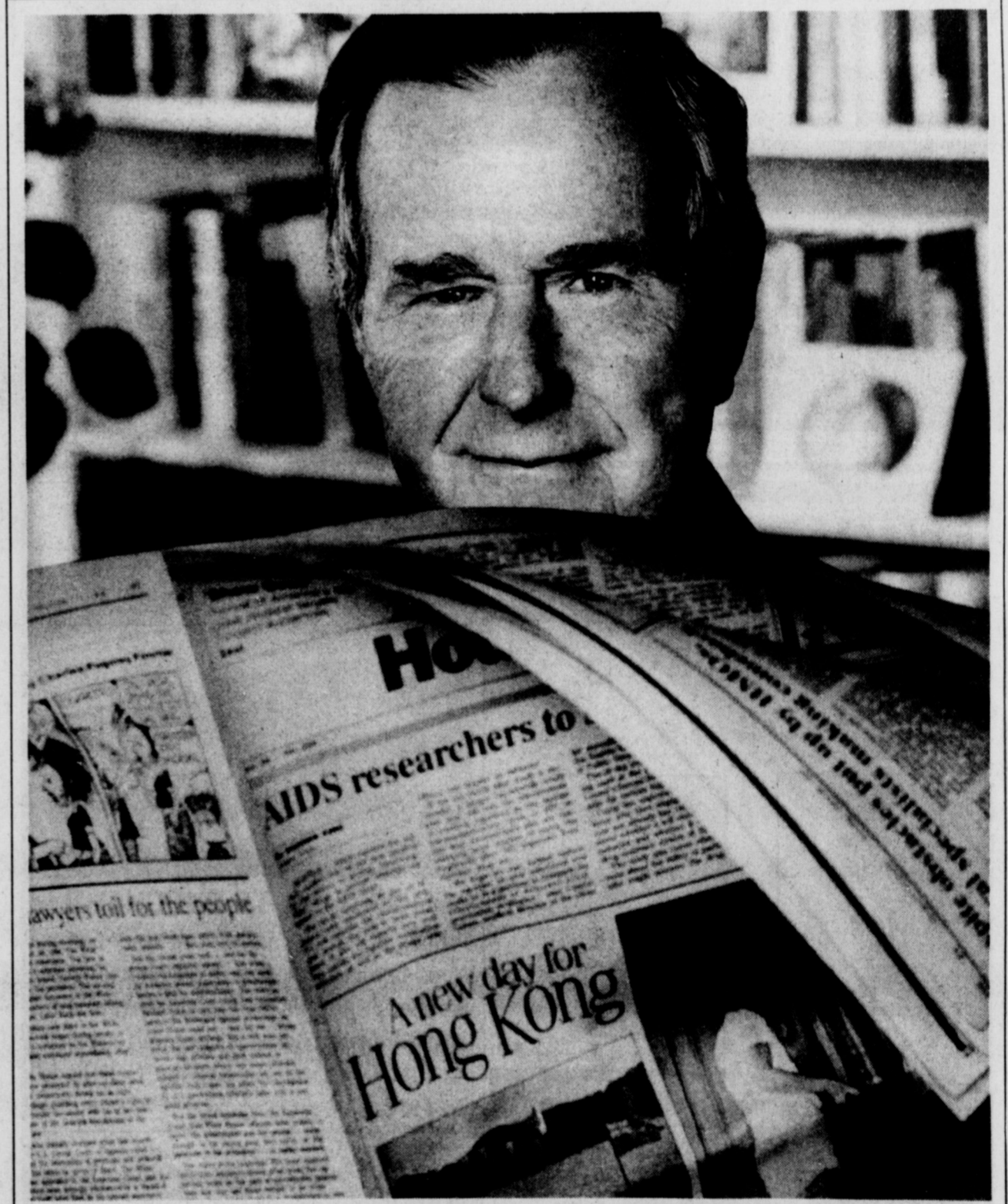
Track and Field T-shirts
