SKATEBOARDS, ROLLERBLADES, BICYCLES

Playing in business district prohibited

The city council passed an ordinance Monday night that should solve a problem many businesses have been experiencing, but likely will be a frustration to many younger people.

Use of skateboards, rollerblades or bicycles on any sidewalk of businesses is now prohibited.

Actually, the ordinance amended an existing ordinance, which prohibited riding of bicycles on business sidewalks, that has been on the books for several decades.

Application of the ordinance is not limited to the downtown business area, but at any business in the city limits.

The city has received numerous complaints in recent months of youths skateboarding and rollerblading at their businesses, and the youths apparently ignored complaints of customers and owners.

An additional paragraph in the newly-adopted ordinance also refers to use of sidewalks in residential areas. It says:

"Whenever any person is riding a bicycle or skateboard or using rollerblades upon a sidewalk outside of business districts, such person shall yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian and shall give an audible signal before overtaking and passing such pedestrian."

Prior to voting on the ordinance, Alderman Bud Mercer suggested that the city should provide an area where youths could use their skateboards and rollerblades.

Alderman Bob Hamilton responded by making the point that "All quality of life facilities provided by the city have been for organized activities, other than parks."

The possibility of allowing the youths to use the business district in the evenings and on weekends also was discussed, but no exception was made in the ordinance.

Administrator Mike Price told the council that the City of Wichita Falls will begin next fall charging Iowa Park an increased rate for water

purchased to supplement that which is produced locally.

The new rate will be 160 percent higher than Iowa Park is now being charged. Though local residents likely will not feel the increase, at least immediately, residents of Horseshoe Bend Estates will, Price said.

Because Iowa Park only purchases water from Wichita Falls during "peak demand" periods, the city is the only customer of Wichita Falls receiving a notice of price increase. Actually, other municipalities receiving water will receive a discount in rate, Price told the council.

In general, the only time Iowa Park purchases water from Wichita Falls is during the summer months. But the Horseshoe Bend area's sole source of water is taking it from the

transmission line Iowa Park built between the two cities in the early 1970s.

The city has been paying \$0.9433 per 1,000 gallons, and the new rate increases to \$2.4604 per 1,000.

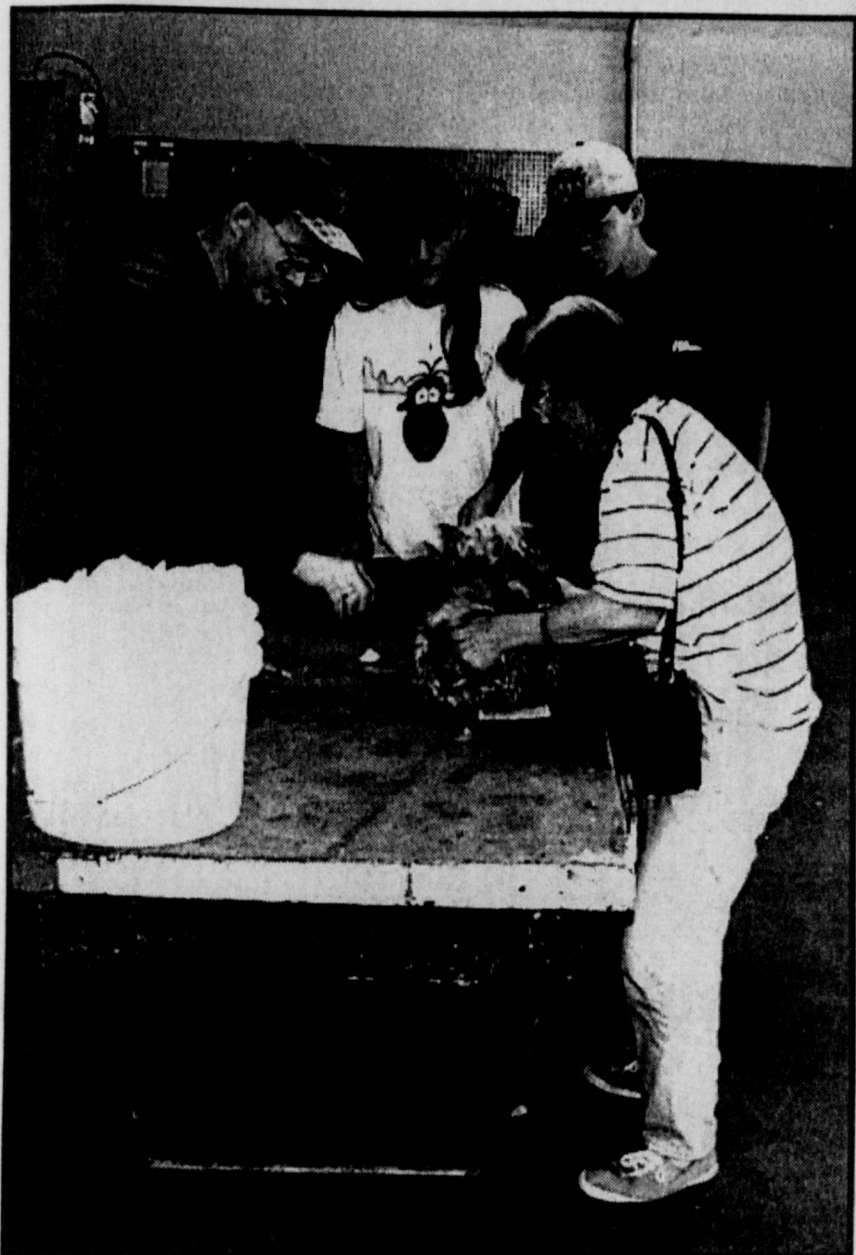
Acting upon Price's recommendation, the council approved accepting a bid of \$67.55 offered by Billy James for the lot of surplus items.

Two public hearings were held, with no comments from the public on either topic.

One concerned a request to annex a 10-acre tract on US 287 into the city limits, and the other was in regard to the completion of the 1996 Texas Community Development Program.

The latter topic related to funds

Police make pot arrests

When police responded to a report of neighbors in the 100 block of South Hawthorne Tuesday night, concerning what was described as misbehaving youths, they found more than they had anticipated.

They arrested an 18-year-old resident for possession of marijuana because he had a small bag of less than two ounces, and also eight plants suspected as being marijuana which were just beginning to grow in pots.

Domingo Limon Jr. was taken into custody on the possession charge,

and later transported to the county jail.

Two juveniles at the house were picked up, taken to the police station and later turned over to a relative, according to the police blotter.

Police arrested two men during a traffic stop Saturday afternoon in the 700 block of South Wall, after finding more than a gram of cocaine in the vehicle.

Do you ever think about who might put a fire out on your property, or help you in a medical emergency?

The Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department and EMT's would be the first many of us would want.

The Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department is made up of 19 men that volunteer many hours of their time to protect the City of Iowa Park and the surrounding area, as well as answer medical and other emergency calls.

In 1997 they responded to 216 fire calls and 280 EMS calls, according to Fire Chief, Danny Skinner, that number is down about one hundred from 1996.

To become a basic volunteer firefighter a person must attend 162 hours of classes and training, and to become a basic EMT they must have an additional 120 class hours and 80 clinical hours. The volunteers also train twice a month to keep up on the latest techniques.

The department currently has two advanced fire fighters, and 17 basic. Of these, four are basic EMT's, one intermediate EMT and one paramedic. The paramedic is also trained in advanced cardiac life support and pediatric advanced life support. Skinner said, "All of the men are fire fighters, but not all of the fire fighters are EMT's."

The Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department was organized May, 1923. In those days, a cart the men

had to pull by hand as they ran was used to fight fires.

The emergency medical service was not added to the department until many years later.

In 1955, the Iowa Park Fire Department had a fund raiser to purchase a resuscitator to be used in case of heart attacks and drownings. At this time, major automobile accidents, rescues, heart attacks and drownings were the only medical emergencies the department responded to.

In 1975, Doug Davidson joined the department as a fire fighter. He attended the EMT course at Midwestern State University at his own expense. He owned a van and purchased all of his own medical supplies.

The police department then began calling him by telephone to all medical emergencies.

In 1978, the Fire Department purchased a Hurst Rescue Tool, "Jaws of Life", with donated money and money from their first street dance. In 1979, they used money from the second street dance to purchase a van and medical supplies.

September 2, 1968 they lost one of their own. On that date, Earl Virgin became the only Iowa Park Volunteer Fireman killed in the line of duty.

Four men, Virgin, Eldon Dowell, T.C. Scott and Bud Thompson, were responding to a fire south of town when the truck he was riding hit a horse and rolled over. Virgin was killed, Dowell was treated at a Wichita

The department's primary response area is 106 square miles in the geographical center of Wichita County. Although they have a first response area, the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department is always willing to go anywhere, anytime they can help someone.

The fire department is partially funded by the City of Iowa Park and Wichita County, but relies heavily on donations.

Skinner says from time to time the department will receive a donation from someone they have helped.

The department began holding an annual street dance in 1978 as a fund raiser. This year the street dance is slated for August.

They also hold car washes and other fund raisers to off set the cost of training and other needs.

The fire department is currently hosting bingo in Wichita Falls two days a week as a fund raiser, according to Skinner this has worked out pretty well.

They are planning a car wash this fall to raise money for "Toys for Tots," a local Christmas campaign they have participated in many years. Recently they held a car wash to off-set the cost of sending some of the fireman and ladies auxiliary members to the Firemen's Convention, which will be held in Wichita Falls this year.

Swim pool memberships available

Advanced memberships for this year's season at the Iowa Park Bicentennial Swimming Pool can now be purchased at city hall, according to Administrator Mike Price.

The pool will open Saturday, May 30, and close on Sept. 7, Labor Day.

Family memberships continue to be \$75, and individual member-

ships remain at \$35 for the year.

Day care memberships are set at \$15 each, with the day care purchasing a \$5 permit.

General admission will remain at \$3, with special \$1 days on Wednesdays and Sundays.

The pool is available for parties at a fee of \$70 each, and additional lifeguard will be paid \$10 per hour, Price said.

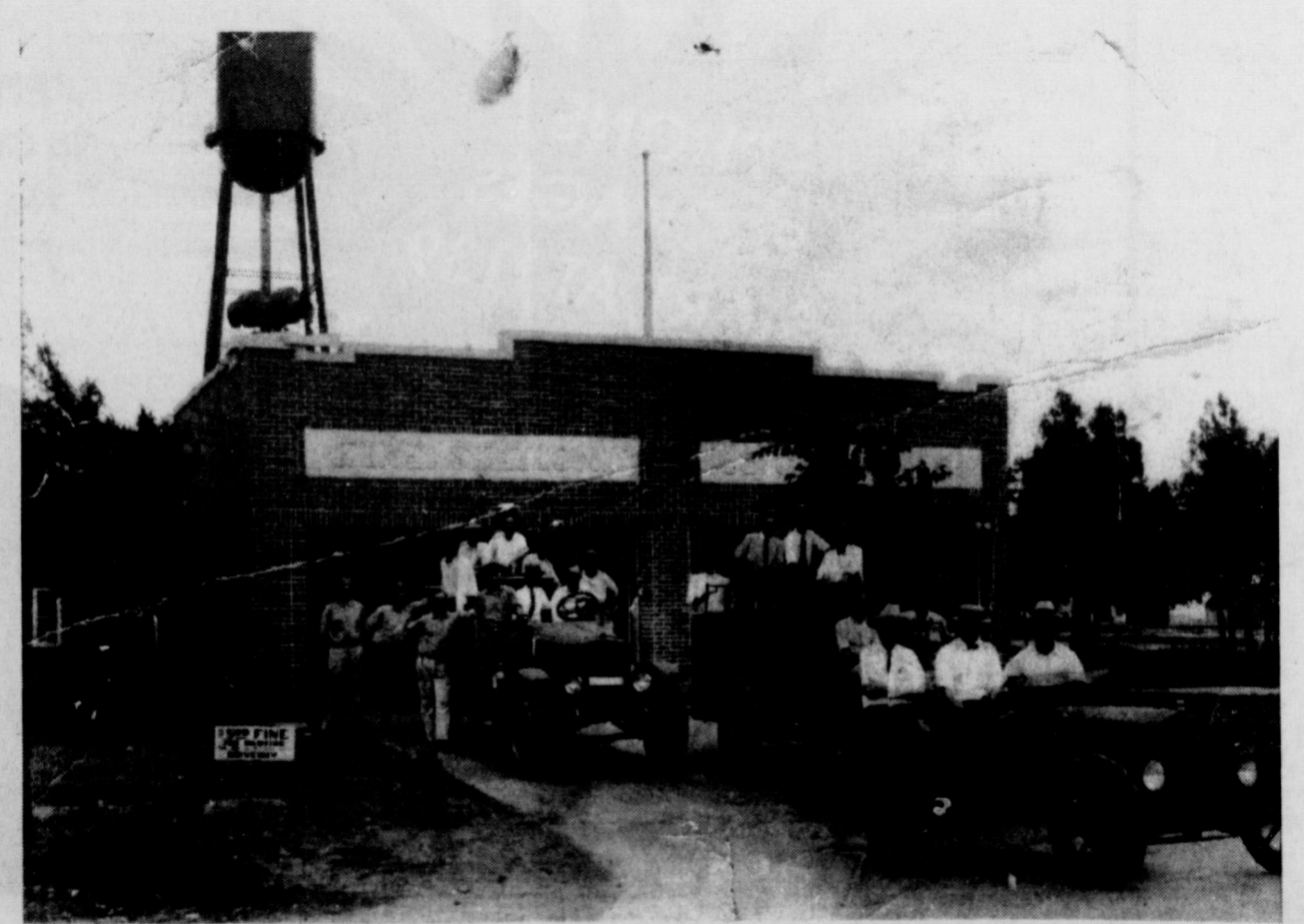

Arlene Eaton, our featured cook this week, has worked 10 and a half years as an administrative secretary for the Wichita Falls Police Department.

In addition to her job, most of Arlene's spare time is spent in promoting law enforcement. For the past 10 years, she has been an advisor for the Wichita Falls Police Explorer Post #500.

Arlene explained that the Explorers are youth between the ages of 14 (who have completed the eighth grade) and 21, who are interested in a career in law enforcement.

"We participate in numerous functions," she said. "We volunteer to work security/traffic at Hotter-n-Hell and Falls Fest; we do fingerprinting for different organizations that request our help; and we do parking and security for the Notre Dame Spring Festival and Spring Fling."

In addition, Explorers compete with posts on a regional level every year and on the national level every other year. "We have a lot of fun, but it's a lot of hard work," Arlene said.

Arlene grew up in Lawton, Okla., and graduated from Eisenhower High School.

Her husband, Jimmy, who grew up in Iowa Park, also works in law enforcement. He is an officer with the Iowa Park Police Department.

Jimmy told us that his wife is an excellent cook, and makes the best chicken fried steak in town.

Arlene has a 14-year-old son, Jamie, and a step-daughter, Jessica, who is 17 years old. Jamie attends Iowa Park High School and participates in football, basketball and track.

Macaroni & Cheese Casserole

1 lb. ground beef
1 family pkg. macaroni & cheese
1 can mushroom soup
1 pkg. Cheddar cheese, grated
Brown meat and drain. Make macaroni and cheese as directed. Mix all ingredients together and put into casserole dish. Top with grated cheese and bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Meat Loaf

1 lb. ground beef
1 egg
1 bell pepper
1 onion
1 tsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
1 cup milk
1 cup Total cereal
Mix all ingredients together. Put into a pan or casserole dish and top with catsup. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees.

Quick Cherry Dessert

1 cup (2 sticks) butter or margarine
1 1/2 cup granulated sugar
4 eggs
1 tsp. almond extract
2 cups all-purpose flour

2 tsps. baking powder
1 can (21 oz.) cherry pie filling
Powdered sugar to dust over top (optional)

In a large mixing bowl, cream together the butter and sugar. Add the eggs. Beat until light and fluffy. Add the almond extract. Stir in the flour and baking powder. Mix until smooth.

Butter a 13x9-inch cake pan. Turn the mixture into the pan. Spoon the pie filling into the cake in 16 spots, spacing 4 spoonfuls evenly in each direction. Bake at 350 degrees 45 to 50 minutes or until golden and cake tests done. Filling will sink into the cake while baking. Place bottom side up on serving plate. Dust with powdered sugar if desired.

Banana Bread

2 eggs
1/2 cup Crisco
1 cup sugar
3 or 4 bananas
2 cups flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla

Cream Crisco, sugar and eggs until fluffy. Add bananas alternately with sugar and dry ingredients. Add vanilla last. Bake in loaf pan (makes 1) at 325 degrees 1 hour and 10 minutes, or until done. (Use toothpick to test.)

If you use coffee cans (1 lb.) makes 2 if you fill 1/2 full (Bake 1 hour).

Green Bean Casserole

4 cans green beans, drained
2 cans mushroom soup
3/4 cup milk
1/4 tsp. pepper
1 1/2 large cans Durkees onion rings
Mix all ingredients together and cook at 350 degrees 30 minutes.

Tortilla Roll-Ups

2-8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese, softened
2 cups Cheddar cheese, grated
3/4 of small jar picante sauce
1 small can black olives
1 Tbsp. chopped pimientos, opt.
1 pkg. tortillas

Mix all ingredients together and spread on tortillas. Roll up and chill. As soon as it is chilled, slice.

* First reading Iowa Park CISD Board Policy Update 58; and

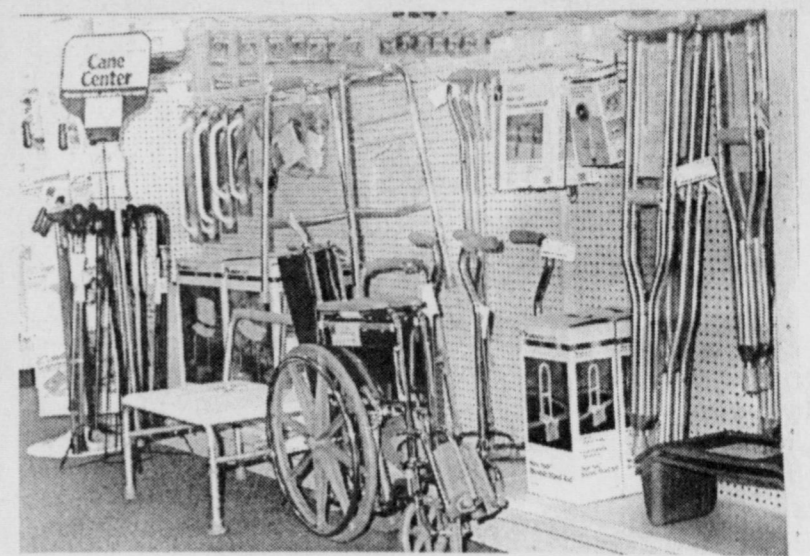
* Certify superintendent to the Regional Advisory Committee of Region IX ESC.

TAAS scores above state average

According to preliminary figures released recently, Iowa Park High School sophomores scored slightly higher than the statewide passing rate on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills exam this spring.

Students must pass the exit-level TAAS in order to receive a high school diploma at the end of their senior year.

Seventy-four percent of Iowa Park sophomores not enrolled in special education passed all three sections of the state test. That compares to 72 percent statewide.

In reading, 88 percent of the Iowa Park students passed the exam, down seven points from last year's 95 percent. The statewide average is 88 percent.

The writing portion remained the same as last year, with 93 percent of IPHS students passing the test. The statewide average is 89 percent.

Math scores were 79 percent passing, down three points from last year. The state average in math is 78 percent.

The exit-level exam is given for the first time in the 10th grade. Students can take the exit-level TAAS test as many as eight times before their graduation date.

A campus that scores over 80 percent is put at recognized level by

the state. Last year, the Iowa Park School District received a "Recognized" rating.

"I'm hoping that our scores at Bradford and the junior high are high

enough to keep our district recognized," said Superintendent Mike Caplinger. "I think we can make up the difference - it's a strong possibility."

Exchange student speaker for Amity Club meeting

Michal Jakubove, a senior exchange student at Iowa Park High School, was the guest speaker for Amity Study Club at their April meeting.

Michal, who is living in the home of Pam Teplicek, an Amity Club member, is from the city of Lucenec, in the Slovak Republic. He described his native country for the group.

Lucenec has a population of 40,000. The country has a population of 5,000,000 and covers an area 250 miles long and 100 miles wide.

Michal's father owns a building company, and his mother is a baker. He has one younger brother. The minimum wage is 50-cents an hour, and a person cannot work or drive a car until he or she is 18 years old.

The exchange rate is 35 crowns to one American dollar. His country

has less drug and crime problems, but other than that, Michal says teens and adults are pretty much the same as those in Texas.

The expense of \$10,000 to come to Texas was paid by his family. His least preferred food is Mexican, and his favorite is steak and French fries. Michal said he would like to return to the United States and attend Texas A&M.

The meeting was held in the home of Marilyn Hale, with Annetta Reusch serving as co-hostess.

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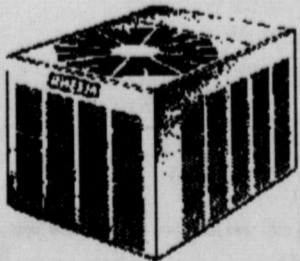

Two of my favorite organizations are having to increase their fees in order to meet their ever-rising costs -- apparently.

The City of Wichita Falls has announced it will increase the price of water Iowa Park purchases by 160 percent.

And the U.S. Postal Department is one step away from increasing the cost of a 32-cent stamp by almost 10 percent.

Things are rough all over. At least that's what is being implied.

Iowa Park was forced to build a

transmission line to Wichita Falls back in the early 1970s, when our three lakes were bone dry due to several years of drought.

I mean, we were having to take that salty water from the irrigation ditch, which gets its source from Lake Diversion, to supply water to the city's system.

Folks were sick and tired of it, and ready to seek another source of water. And the leadership of our neighboring city was happy to help.

Several other cities, as well as

Sheppard AFB also get their water, treated or untreated, from Wichita Falls.

But, because we are the only entity that buys water when our system cannot keep up with demand, which is during the summer, our neighboring city has announced its new rate.

And from what I understand, those other entities are getting a reduction in their rates.

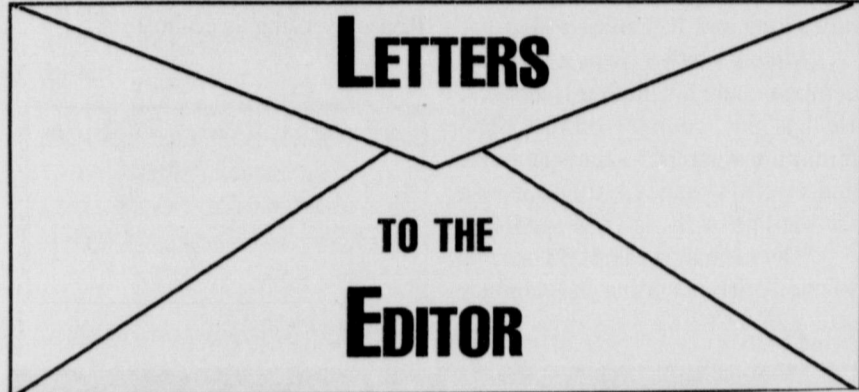

And how much will that additional penny per first class stamp generate? Just an additional \$1 billion.

Cholesterol drugs may aid prevention

Cholesterol-lowering drugs may help people prevent a first-time heart attack.

Cholesterol experts at the DeBakey Heart Center at Baylor College of Medicine and the Methodist Hospital in Houston say cholesterol-lowering drugs may be beneficial in people who have never been diagnosed with heart disease.

"Our studies have shown that people who markedly reduce their total cholesterol level lower their risk of heart attack by one-third," said Dr. Peter Jones.

More than half of American adults have high or borderline-high cholesterol levels, according to the national Cholesterol Education Program. Too much cholesterol can lead to heart disease -- the No. 1 killer in men and women.

Many people work at lowering their low density lipoprotein (LDL) or "bad cholesterol" and increasing their high density lipoprotein (HDL) or "good cholesterol" to prevent a heart attack.

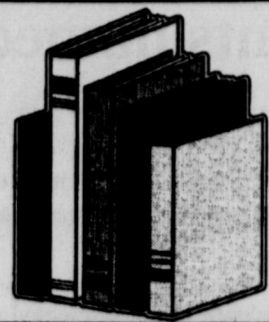
Jones recommends that people with a high risk of heart disease regularly keep their cholesterol level in check.

Heart disease risk factors for people with high cholesterol include:

- Age (men ages 45 and older and women ages 55 and older or who are postmenopausal);
- Diabetes;
- Hypertension;
- Cigarette smoking;
- Low HDL (below 35 mg/dl);
- Family history of early heart disease.

Jones says the greater the number of risk factors, the more important it is to get treated.

"If you have more than one of these risk factors, seek medical advice," Jones said. "Sometimes a low-fat diet and exercise aren't enough. Cholesterol-lowering drugs may be more helpful in lessening your chances of a heart attack."

Many have read the Stars & Stripes, an Armed Forces newspaper. During the Civil War on November 8, 1861, Col. Richard James Oglesby, commanding the 8th Illinois Regiment for the Union Army, captured Bloomfield, Mo., as the Rebels withdrew south.

In the 8th IL regiment there were 10 printers and newsman, who discovered that the Herald, the local newspaper office, had been abandoned. They decided to use the facility to publish a newspaper for their outfit, and named it the "Stars and Strips."

Thus began the newspaper which has become so familiar to US troops and government employees who serve overseas.

It isn't known how many copies of the first edition were printed but only three known now exist. These will be placed in the new Stars and Strips Museum / Library in Bloomfield, Mo.

Officials are now searching for descendants of the 10 men. Most of them served in the 18th Illinois Infantry Regiment and were from Wayne, White, Gallatin, or Peoria counties of Illinois.

Among the known "First Strippers" were, Benson Atherton, John H. Barton, James T. Boseman, Charles M. Edwards, Theodore Edmonson, Otis P. Martin, Walter A. Rhue, John W. Schell, R.F. Stewart, and Thomas Walsh, either to have been publishers or editors of the first editions.

AG AGENT'S REPORT

Changing Again

You might remember one of my articles a few weeks ago that dealt with new advancements in biotechnology. Like most technology or the new computer that you bought last year, it's out of date in a hurry.

AgriBioTech, Inc., has recently introduced its agreement with the Noble Foundation to start biotechnology in alfalfa already. The work that is being done now will focus on improving the digestibility traits using its own genes.

AgriBioTech is the largest forage and cool-season turfgrass seed company in the United States. This work with the Noble Foundation should be very beneficial to all growers, beef cattle and dairy cattlemen because of the quantity that is used in their feed.

Now I know what you folks in downtown anywhere are thinking. All this technology is being used and that's great, but how is this going to benefit me in town? I'll let the Texas legislators explain that one. They have anteed up \$1 million aimed at developing the most competitive, most environmentally safe grain and turfgrass varieties.

The Texas A&M University System, Texas Tech University, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Agricultural Research Service was given the duty to work on this project called TxGRAIN. The legislative initiative focuses on wheat, rice, turfgrass, corn, sorghum, forage and sugar cane. Here's how it's going to effect everyone.

According to biochemist Dr. John Mullet at Texas A&M, the effort will enable an expansion of current biotechnology research, especially to identify genes for insect and disease resistance and use those genes across all of the species. Because (according to Dr. Mullet), the function and order of genes on the chromosomes are similar in the grain, or grassy-type crops, an important gene found on one can be used quickly in

the others. A gene that enables wheat to withstand drought better, for example, could be put into turfgrass for a variety that would require less watering in urban lawns.

Specifically, current research includes: identifying genes in corn that create resistance to aflatoxin and to improve the resistance to spider mites; finding sorghum that is resistant to greenbugs, grain mold and more drought resistant; blast resistance in the shelf life of rice; and isolating genes for fall army worm resistance in turfgrass is being conducted, just to name a few.

And how would you cattle operators and housewives like it if there was a feed additive that would prevent rancidity in feed, reduces the odor of the feces in feedlots, reduces the number of liver abscesses in cattle, lengthens the shelf life of beef, particularly ground beef and increases feed efficiency?

It has been known as 6-Ethoxy-1,2,3,4-trimethylquinolone sense 1921. It is the main ingredient in Agrado a beef cattle feed additive and OSU Regents Professor Fred Owens and graduate assistant Chuck Krumsiek say it can do more than this.

Dr. Owens and Krumsiek say Agrado may also help in shipping-stressed cattle. The research is also

done at the University of Arkansas where they are looking at the effects in cattle in commercial feedlots.

According to Dr. Owens and Krumsiek, they started looking at Agrado as a feed additive to increase shelf life of beef. Apparently, Agrado is a strong anti-oxidant like vitamin E but is cheaper. Their studies (not yet finalized) found that Agrado extends steak life by 18 hours and up to four days with ground beef. While focusing on the shelf life of these meats, they also noticed a slight decrease in feed intake, which turned out to be eight percent increase in feed efficiency.

Now how about the feces odor? "The researchers collected fecal samples, and - and the risk of stretching some friendships - actually had people open and sniff sealed cups of fecal sample" High Plains Journal. "Our subjects reported a decrease odor in the samples from cattle receiving Agrado," Owens said. "We didn't believe it, so we repeated the study. The results were the same."

Technology is every changing. And sometimes we need to look to the past for the answers of the future. As Owens said, "it's a new application for an old product."

AUSTIN — Lawmakers cut the amount of winnings the Texas Lottery paid last year in hopes of increasing the state's share of the revenue, but it hasn't worked.

Lotto ticket sales have slowed since Sept. 1, when prize money was cut to 52.5 cents of every dollar in tickets sold, and because of slow sales, the state expects a \$328 million shortfall in proceeds.

Sen. Ken Armbrister last week said the Legislature should consider returning prizes to the previous level — 57 cents of every dollar in sales — or let the Texas Lottery Commission find a better way to increase profits.

"It was a bet trying to get us to the same place," said Armbrister, D-Victoria, regarding the Legislature's decision to cut the prizes. "We didn't have that expertise and now it is costing us, it seems."

Lawmakers can't make any changes on the lottery prize structure until they convene in 1999. Until then, the lottery commission will offer new games, keep players informed and wait, said commission chairwoman Harriet Miers.

Panel Examines Education Costs

In examining the soaring costs of higher education, a House subcommittee last week learned the cost of an education at a public university in Texas nearly tripled from 1986 to 1996; and

■ The cost has been shifting from the state to the student; and

■ The average cost of an education at a public university in Texas is \$10,481 a year.

"Money is always going to be tight, but I think we can do some things to make sure the money we are spending is spent wisely and that a college education is looked at more as an investment than a cost," said Rep. Jim Solis, D-Harlingen, chairman of the subcommittee.

Bennat Mullen, a professor at Stephen F. Austin University in Nacogdoches, told the subcommittee he has conducted studies that show Texas is doing a poor job of accounting for how universities are spending students' tuition and fees.

The Legislature should require colleges and universities to disclose in detail how much of student fees and tuition are being spent on a student's education, Mullen recommended.

Mullen pointed out that some universities may be using student fees for athletics and other purposes. "If we are going to meet the needs of tomorrow, there needs to be a greater emphasis on academics," he said.

Rep. Irma Rangel, D-Kingsville, chairwoman of the House Higher Education Committee, said that getting an education loan is a tough obstacle for many students, particularly minorities.

"It's hard for someone to get a loan to start a new business when they have \$40,000 to \$50,000 in college loans to pay off. No bank would help them in that case," she said.

Pollution Report Released

More than 40 percent of Texas'

industrial plants illegally bypass pollution rules, according to a report released last week by the Sierra Club and the Galveston-Houston Association for Smog Prevention.

Of Texas' 2,500 plants, 1,070 that existed prior to (or were under construction during) 1971 operate under a "grandfather clause" exempting them from air quality standards in the Texas Clean Air Act imposed that year.

Those plants emit air pollution equaling the exhaust output of 18 million cars, or 37 percent of the state's total industrial air pollution, the report said.

The days of unregulated emissions are numbered. Officials for companies that emit industrial pollution said that by 2000, grandfathered plants will be under federal standards because of changes made in 1990 to the federal Clean Air Act.

Presently, a voluntary state program is helping to reduce emissions. Gary Rasp, a spokesman for the Center for Energy and Economic Development, told the *Austin American-Statesman*, "The ball is already rolling. There are serious reduction efforts in place."

Four areas of Texas presently do not meet federal and state air quality standards: Houston-Galveston, Beaumont-Port Arthur, Dallas-Fort Worth and El Paso. Austin, Corpus Christi and San Antonio are not far behind, the *American-Statesman* reported.

Other Capital Highlights

■ Birdwatching is becoming big

business in Texas. The Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife reports, for example, that birders spend \$20 million each year visiting the Laguna Atascosa National Wildlife Refuge in the Rio Grande Valley, and 70 percent of the birdwatchers visiting the Texas coast are from out of state.

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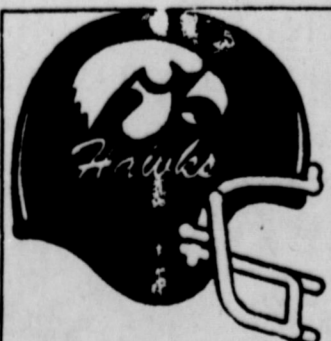

With one district loss Hawks are champions

For the fourth year in a row, the Iowa Park Hawks are the District 5-3A baseball champions.

Iowa Park captured the title with an impressive 14-1 thrashing of Vernon on Tuesday.

Earlier in the week, the Hawks saw their two-year-long district winning streak snapped by the Jacksboro Tigers, in a 7-3 loss in a game that had to be called after five innings due to lightning.

"If we can go out and play every game like we played against Vernon we could be rock-n-rolling for a long time in the playoffs," said head coach David Fuhrman. "We definitely looked like a playoff team."

"One of the good things about winning the district title with one game to go is that it gives us a chance to get all of our pitchers some work in the Childress game on Friday. We've already got a warm-up game scheduled for Monday against Lake Dallas (ranked No. 4 in Class 3A with a 22-4 record) in Decatur."

In their game Friday, the Hawks stumbled for the first time in two years in a district game, falling to the Tigers 7-3.

Jacksboro put up five runs in the top of the first to take control of the game early. A leadoff single followed by back to back catcher's interference calls loaded the bases. Then a base on balls brought home the first run, a single drove home two more, a groundout made it 4-0 and a final RBI single made it 5-0.

"We just hit ourselves in the head in the first inning," Fuhrman said. "Both of the catchers interference calls were border line calls. Both would have been ground outs with one probably being a double play ball. But you have to give Jacksboro some credit, they came out real aggressive and hit the ball against us. Tyler Pulley struggled with his control, some with his curve ball and that let them look for fastballs to hit."

Iowa Park made it 5-1 in the bottom of the first inning as Jonathan

Clubb drove home Michael Swenson with an RBI groundout.

Jacksboro made it 7-1 in the top of the third as the Tigers led off with a triple and a pair of RBI singles.

Iowa Park added single runs in the fourth and fifth innings to make the final 7-3.

"We just started out flat," Fuhrman added. "We didn't do a good job of hitting good pitches. Jacksboro has played us well in all three games we've faced them. This time we didn't play well and we got beat."

Needing to win one of its final two games to clinch the district title, Iowa Park came out on fire against the Lions on Tuesday and pounded out 16 hits, scoring 14 runs while holding Vernon to only one run and two hits. The lone Lion run scored on a balk.

Justin Terry pitched five strong innings, striking out 12 of the 15 batters he faced to improve to 8-2 overall. Terry increased his strikeout total to 123 for the season in only 64 2/3 innings of work. That places him near the top of the 3A strike out leaders in the State.

The Hawks had a host of hitters that helped Terry at the plate, including Swenson who went 3x4 with 3 runs scored and 2 RBI, Perry Green 2x3 2 runs scored and 2 RBI, Scotty Mitchell 2x4 with a run scored, Chase Wright 2x4 with 4 RBI, Pulley 2x3 with a run scored and Justin Smith 2x2 with 2 runs scored.

Iowa Park scored a pair of runs in the top of the first when Swenson led off with a single to left-center. Chad Wright sacrificed him to second, then Terry doubled him home. Green followed with an RBI single to left to make it 2-0.

In the second inning Iowa Park added three more runs. Pulley singled, Smith singled, then Swenson doubled driving home Pulley. Chad Wright hit a sac fly to left to score Smith and Swenson scored on an error on the left fielder to make it 5-0.

Vernon scored its only run of the game in the bottom of the third to cut the lead to 5-1, but Iowa Park came right back with three runs in the top of the fourth to push the lead to 8-1.

Chad Wright led off with a walk and scored on Terry's RBI double to left. Green singled to score Terry, then Chase Wright singled to score Green.

The Hawks made it a run rule in the fifth inning by scoring six runs to make the score 14-1.

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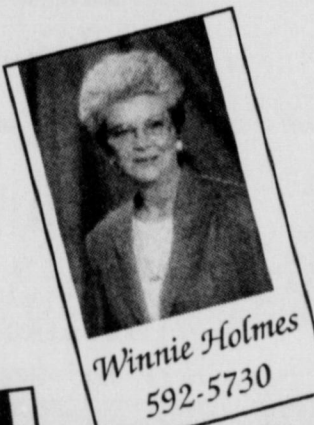
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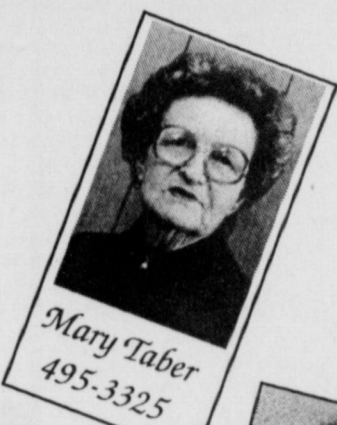
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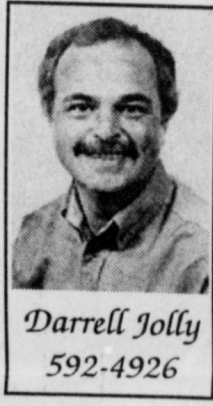
