Commencement exercises will be held at 8 p.m. Friday in Hawk Stadium for Iowa Park High School's Class of 1998.

The traditional presentation of the school key will be made by Valerie Johnson, class president, to Dena Brown, 1998-99 Student Council president.

Two members of the class, Toby Catlin and Wendy Bridwell, will give the invocation and benediction, respectively.

Drinkers violating city ordinance

Hawks seek revenge against Aledo tonight

You can't help from wondering if the Iowa Park Hawks were looking ahead to their next opponent when they opened the Class 3A State playoffs in Mineral Wells on Friday.

All the Hawks had to do was beat Eastland to set up a long-awaited rematch with the Aledo Bearcats, the team that had knocked them out of the playoffs last year.

What the Hawks almost forgot was that they had to beat Eastland to get the opportunity to face Aledo.

In dramatic fashion, Iowa Park rallied from two runs behind in the "it's final at bat," scoring three runs in the bottom of the seventh to escape with a 5-4 Bi-District win over the Mavericks at Pratt Field in Mineral Wells.

The win lifted Iowa Park's record to 18-9-1 and set up the rematch with Aledo today at 7 p.m. in Mineral Wells. The Bearcats are the No. 1 ranked team in Class 3A with a record of 22-3.

The Hawks got on the scoreboard first against Eastland with a single run in the bottom of the second inning when Perry Green led off with a walk and came around to score on Chase Wright's RBI triple.

The lead was short-lived as the Mavericks struck for a pair of runs in the top of the third to take a 2-1 lead. Back to back walks and a two, RBI triple by Kirt Fox left the Hawks down by a run.

Eastland added single runs in both the fourth and sixth inning. In

the fourth on a one-out single and an RBI double, and in the sixth on a leadoff home run to boost its lead to 4-1.

Iowa Park cut the lead to 4-2 in the bottom of the sixth inning when Chad Wright led off with a walk, then went to second on a balk call. Wright then tried to steal third, but the catcher's throw sailed over the head of the third baseman, allowing Wright to come all the way around to score.

Heading into the bottom of the seventh, Eastland's Kelton Moore had allowed only one hit in his six innings of work, that being the triple by Chase Wright.

In the bottom of the seventh, it

NEWS OF THE IOWA PARK GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL SOCIETY



During Memorial Services at this time of year we remember all veterans of all our conflicts. Most families had members who participated in the wars, and military records are a great source of information and are very useful in verifying primary information.

Men who served during the Civil War were usually born between 1806 and 1849, but there may have been men older or younger. Don't assume they were Rebels or Yankees, some served on both sides. If you know what part of the country they were in, this is a help in deciding where to search as most were in units in the area in which they lived.

If you have discovered a confederate ancestor, there may be information to be found at the Confederate Research Center in Hill College, Hillsboro, TX. This archival repository also has soldiers letters, diaries and unpublished manuscripts. You will find a treasury of information, magazines, newspaper clippings, including major newspapers published during the Civil War. There are service records of all of Hood's Texas Brigade, Confederate generals and staff officers and an index listing all Confederate soldiers showing their companies and regiments.

The center will do research for a fee. Write for forms first by writing to:

Confederate Research Center and Museum, Harold B. Simpson Hill College History Complex, P.O. Box 619, Hillsboro, TX 76645.

Those living in this area who want to learn more about their Confederate ancestors are fortunate to have such a resource close by and will want to do their own research with the help of the librarians and archivists. Take whatever names dates, etc. you have to help you get started, you may be surprised at the information you will find.

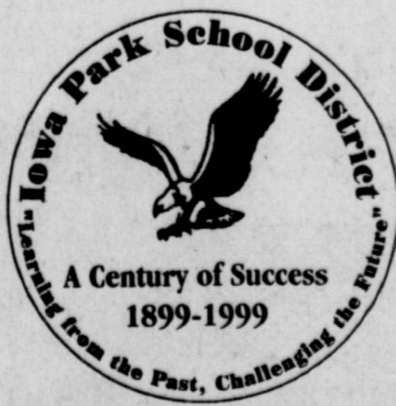
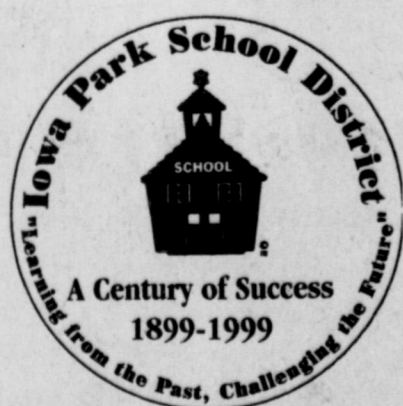

The Iowa Park Arts and Crafts Association met last week at the Chamber of Commerce office. This was their last meeting before taking a break for the summer.

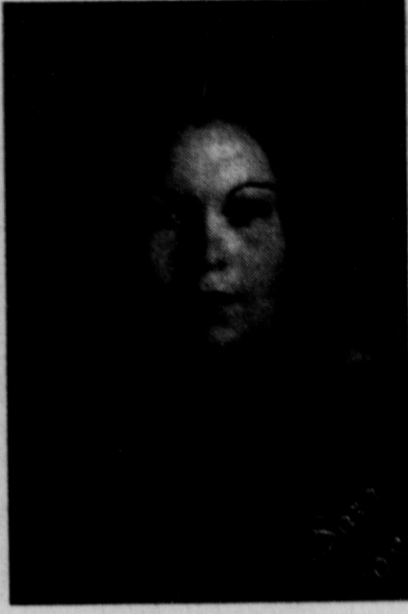
The program was presented by Debbie Williamson, who instructed the members on making paper twist decorative baskets.

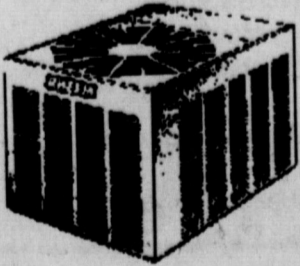

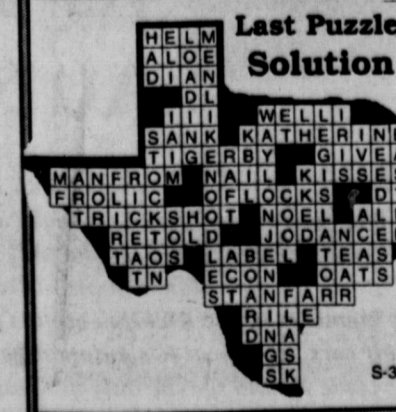

As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



Congratulations to our graduating senior class members. You've been an outstanding group throughout your years here, and we're all proud of you.

This week I received the results of a survey conducted by the National Newspaper Association concerning postal service of delivering newspapers to subscribers.

I was among more than 1,000 community newspapers which responded to the survey, and what the NNA reported was virtually the same as my response was. In other words, you could look at my response and it was exactly what the survey report was.

"The Postal Service measures the quality of First Class mail deliv-

ery, but refuses to measure the delivery of community newspapers," said Kenneth B. Allen, NNA executive vice president and CEO. "We know why. Community newspapers around the country report that it is taking longer than ever to get their products to subscribers, especially those who are outside the county and state."

Here's the key findings:

- * In-county delivery is good. Non-daily newspapers report that 98 percent of in-county subscribers receive their paper within five days and 86 percent of in-county subscribers to daily newspapers receive their paper within two days. The *Leader* subscribers tell me they always get theirs by Saturday, outside Iowa Park.
- * Out-of-county delivery is get-

ting worse. Thirty-five percent of subscribers of non-daily newspapers must wait six or more days for their newspaper and nine percent must wait 11 days or more.

- * Out-of-state delivery is worst of all. The out-of-state subscribers to non-daily newspapers must wait six or more days to receive their paper, and over 50 percent have to wait 11 days or more.

- * Complaints about service delivery are increasing. Over 80 percent of the newspapers responding to the survey reported customer complaints, with some newspapers receiving more than 100 complaints each month.

- * Readers are cancelling their subscriptions to community newspapers. Over 60 percent of the newspapers responding to the survey reported that they have lost subscribers in the past year as a result of poor delivery.

I had a native Iowa Parkan tell me this past year he wasn't renewing a subscription he had with us more than 25 years, because he was tired of getting papers four to six weeks late. And all I could do was agree with him.

That's just too long for a copy of the *Leader* to reach a reader in California.

And another just outside Dallas cancelled, because it was taking one to two weeks to get her's, even though papers going there are bundled by area zip codes.

was Chase Wright who once again started the rally with his second hit of the game, a line drive single just past the third baseman. Tyler Pulley followed with a single, putting the tying runner on base. Kevin Park then hit a ball to the third baseman who booted it for an error to load the bases with no outs.

"We knew we had them then," said Chase Wright, who came on to pitch for the Hawks in the sixth inning and retired all six outs on strikeouts to pick up the win. "We knew we could come back and when they pulled their pitcher after the two hits, we were all riled up. We were in their heads."

Bryan Lyons came on to run for Park following the error and with the bases loaded, Michael Swenson was hit by a pitch to drive home Chase Wright to cut the lead to 4-3. The next batter, Chad Wright, drew a bases loaded walk to tie the game at 4-4. Justin Terry then delivered the knock out blow with a sacrifice fly to center to score Lyons with the game winner.

"I was little worried heading into the seventh inning," Terry said. "I knew we were going to come back, but I was still a little worried. I knew that they couldn't shut us down for the entire game. One of the best things about our team is that we're never going to give up no matter what the score is."

Terry not only delivered at the plate but did a nice job on the mound as well. The junior right hander struck out nine batters in his six innings of work before turning the ball over to Wright.

"I thought I came out pretty strong," Terry added. "I was a little nervous to start but after a pitch or two I settled down. My arm started getting tired late in the game and it still hurts from that collision with Swenson last week."

When asked if he was looking ahead to Aledo, Terry said, "I wouldn't
