





vation plan has been worked out between Stanley Williamson and the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District the past week. Stanley is principally a dairy man and plans to plant sown crops on all the cultivated land. He plans to follow a 3 year rotation in which one-third of the land will be planted to a legume each year. Tht pastures will be fenced and a rotation system of grazing followed. Some land is being retired to pasture and will be seeded to buffalo and grama grass. Vetch and rye are looking good on this farm at present. He plans to plant Chinese red peas as a summer legume on approximately 10 acres. Fish have been requested for his stock pond.

Gale Lowrance of the East Iowa Park conservation group is planning to plant Chinese red peas when the weather permits. He plans to inoculate the seed before planting. Soon after grain harvest he plans to complete the terrace system on this


