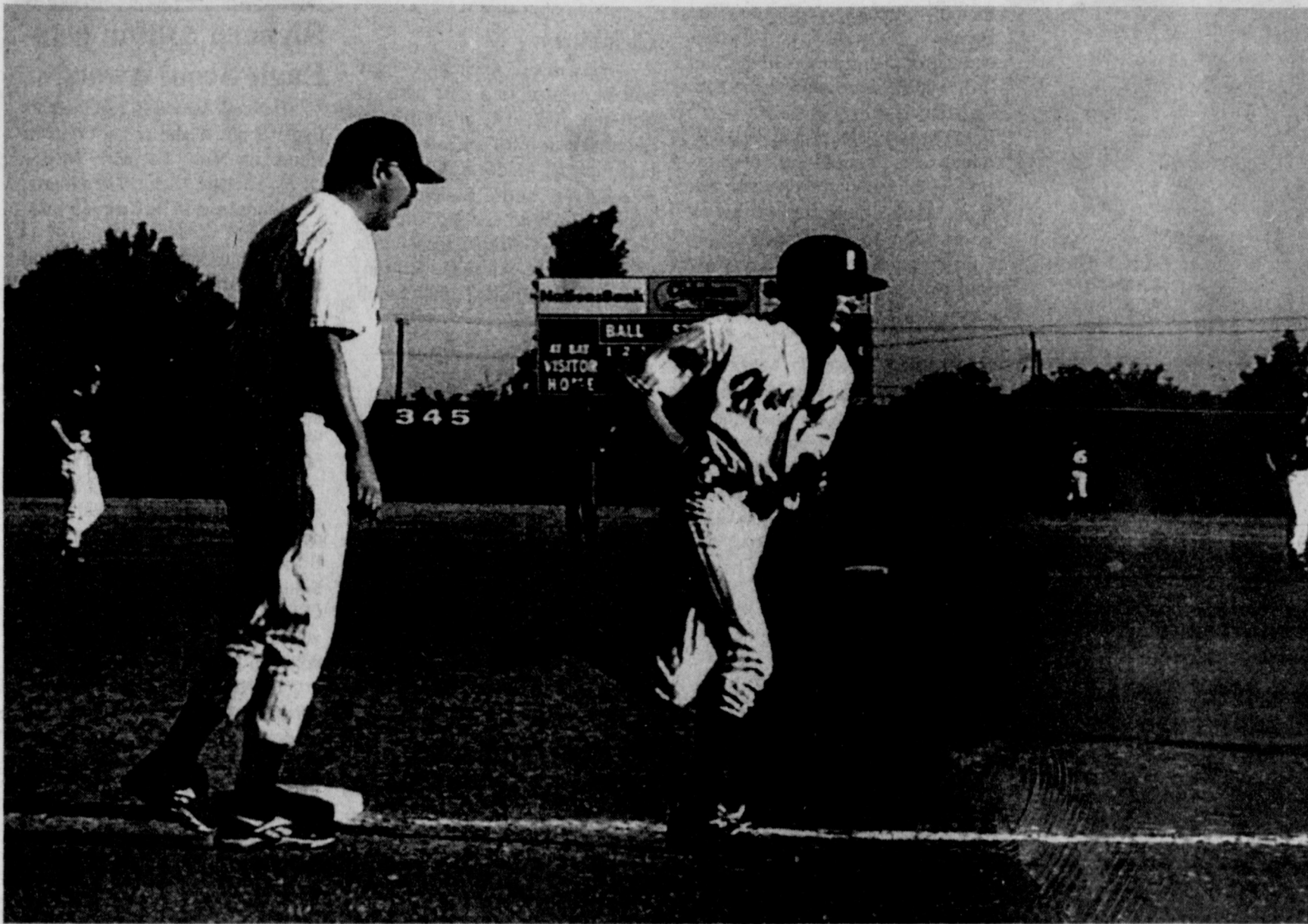

Hawks in state tourney today

There's an old saying that says "There's no 'I' in team."

The Iowa Park Hawks proved that statement to be true as they squared off against tenth-ranked Abilene Wylie in the best-of-three series this past weekend in Mineral Wells.

The Hawks used a winning formula of solid pitching, timely hitting, aggressive base running and great defense to down the Bulldogs in two straight games to earn the right to advance to the State Tournament in Austin, which starts today.

Iowa Park (22-9-1) captured the Region I Title by beating Wylie 4-2 in ten innings on Friday, beating their ace pitcher Grant Gregg, who pitched all ten innings. Then in game two on Saturday, the Hawks used five different pitchers en route to a thrilling 6-5 come-from-behind victory to capture the title.

The Hawks will now be hoping that another old saying holds as much truth. The one that says "The third time is a charm."

Iowa Park will be making its third trip to the State Tournament today, still looking for that first-ever State Title.

In 1975, the Hawks lost to Brenham 9-6 in the semi-final game, and in 1993 they lost to Bellville 7-0. Both teams went on to capture the State Championships.

This time around, the Hawks will open against Dripping Springs (24-6) at 7 p.m. at Nelson Field. The other semi-final game will be between Hallettsville (26-3) and Atlanta (23-7) at 4:30 p.m. Dripping Springs advanced to the tournament by beating Medina Valley 8-0 in the Region IV Tournament. Hallettsville beat Liberty 9-8 in Region III while Atlanta beat Lake Dallas 6-1 in Region II. Iowa Park also owns a win over Lake Dallas which was ranked fourth.

The Hawks also own a win over the top-ranked team of Aledo, which Iowa Park eliminated in the Area Round of the playoffs.

In game one of the series against

Wylie, Iowa Park sent Tyler Pulley to the mound against what head coach David Fuhrman said was probably the best pitcher he'd seen since he's been at Iowa Park in Grant Gregg.

The Hawks wasted little time in getting on the board against the Bulldogs' ace lefty. With one out, Chad Wright drilled a double off the center field wall. Wright then stole third and scored on Justin Terry's RBI groundout, giving the Hawks' a 1-0 lead in the top of the first.

Iowa Park made it 2-0 in the top of the third when Chad Wright scored his second run of the game. Wright singled with two outs, ahead of back-to-back walks to Terry and Jonathan Clubb, to load the bases. Wright scored the second run of the game on a wild pitch.

Wylie got on the board in the bottom of the fifth inning. A leadoff walk and a pair of wild pitches and a sacrifice fly to center scored the Bulldogs' first run to cut the lead to 2-1.

Back-to-back doubles in the bottom of the sixth tied the game at 2-2, as the Bulldogs chased Pulley in the sixth. Pulley gave up only four hits in his six innings of work. Chase Wright came on in the bottom of the sixth to retire the side.

The game remained scoreless until the top of the tenth inning. A one-out walk to Terry put the winning runner on base. Terry then stole sec-

ond. Clubb followed with a single to put runners at the corners. Clubb stole second and Perry Green was inten-

Directions to the ball fields

Here are the directions to find both the baseball fields where the games will be played in Austin.

Nelson Field, where the Hawks will take on Dripping Springs tonight, is about a mile East of I-35 and North of Hwy. 290 East (toward Houston). It is on the campus of Reagan High School.

Disch-Falk Field is East of I-35, using the 15th Street exit.

Storm damage being assessed

Homeowners and insurance investigators were still gathering information at presstime Wednesday concerning damage inflicted by Tuesday afternoon's storm.

Winds estimated between 60 and 75 miles per hour possibly caused the most common damage, breaking tree limbs, knocking over fencing, sending outdoor furniture and trampolines into neighborhood yards, and damaging roof vents.

Those winds also knocked over numerous highline poles, causing dangerous situations where the electric wires were exposed.

Hail, described as three inches

around, but flat like a saucer, knocked out hundreds of windows in homes, dented vehicles parked out of doors, and took its toll on roofs.

Numerous barns, sheds and carports also were either heavily damaged or destroyed by the winds.

A portion of the Gun Club's roof at Lake Iowa Park was missing after the storm.

Most of the damage reports were along the railroad track and three miles to the north, as the storm followed path from the west and headed northeasterly.

Portions of the city were without electric service for a period of time, but service was returned as a result of

some four TU Electric service vehicles converging on the city.

The city's storm warning sirens were sounded about 4:30 p.m., after fire department storm spotters and police observed the storm's actions on property in the western portion of the city.

No injuries were reported by any individuals or agencies.

About the only good report to come out of the storm was that .90 of an inch rainfall accompanied it, according to Virgil Woodfin.

That, along with the .15 shower Sunday evening, went a long way to relieving the area's dry conditions.

Council names Collins chief

The city council unanimously voted Monday night to name Lynn Collins the new chief of police, filling a void which had existed since the position was vacated in December.

Aldermen also agreed to join a coalition of immediate area counties to battle the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) which is proposing air quality requirements for the Dallas/Fort Worth area.

Collins joined the Iowa Park department five years ago, and soon after was named the department's criminal investigator. He was promoted to operations lieutenant in 1997.

Born in Iowa Park in 1961, his family soon moved to Vernon, where he resided until returning here. He was on the Vernon police department eight years.

Collins' annual salary was set at

\$31,500. Aldermen voted on the promotion following a lengthy executive session.

Because of the Hawk baseball team's advancement to the state playoffs in Austin, the school board meeting scheduled for tonight has been rescheduled.

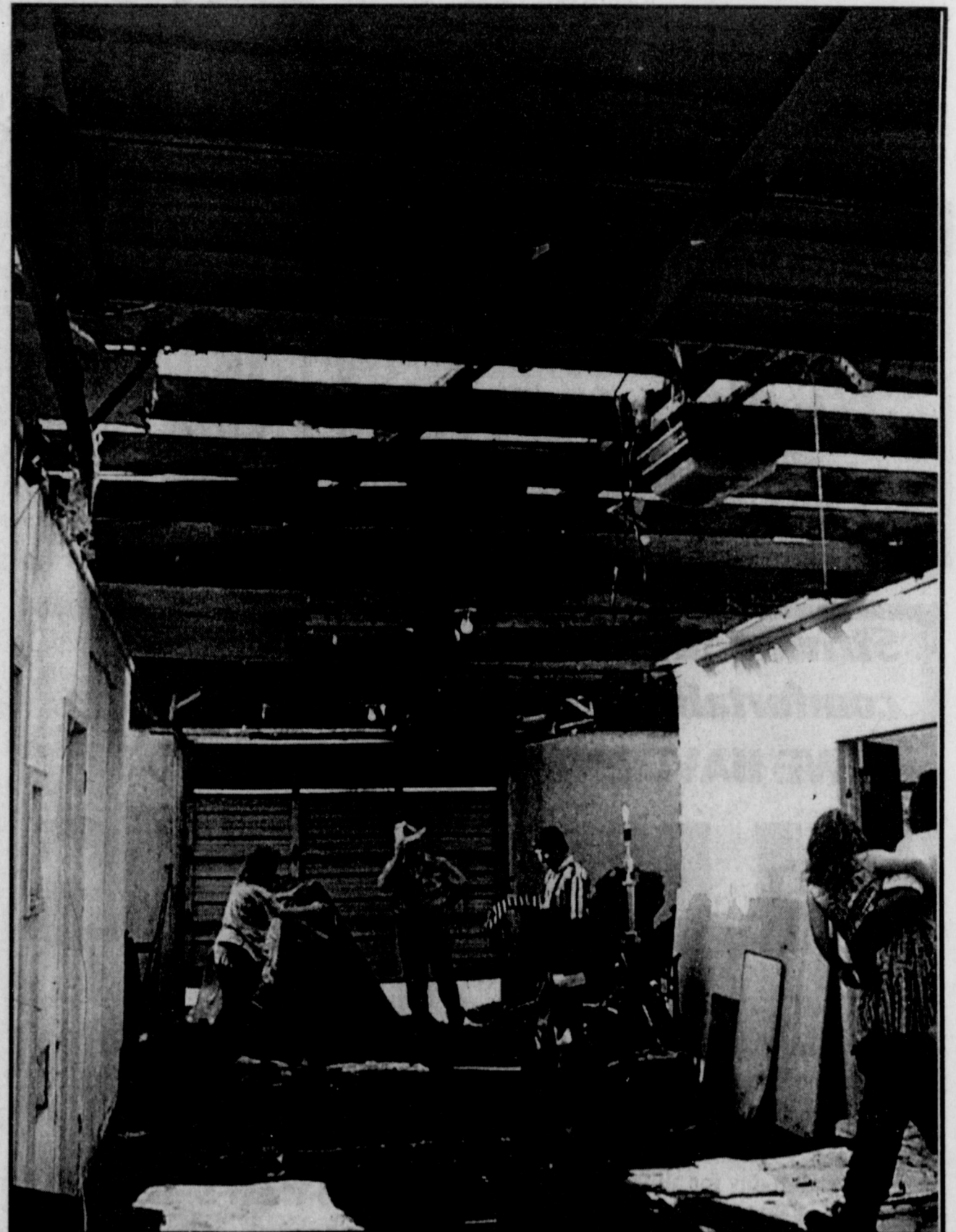
The meeting will be held at 6 p.m., Monday, in the W.F. George Middle School Library.

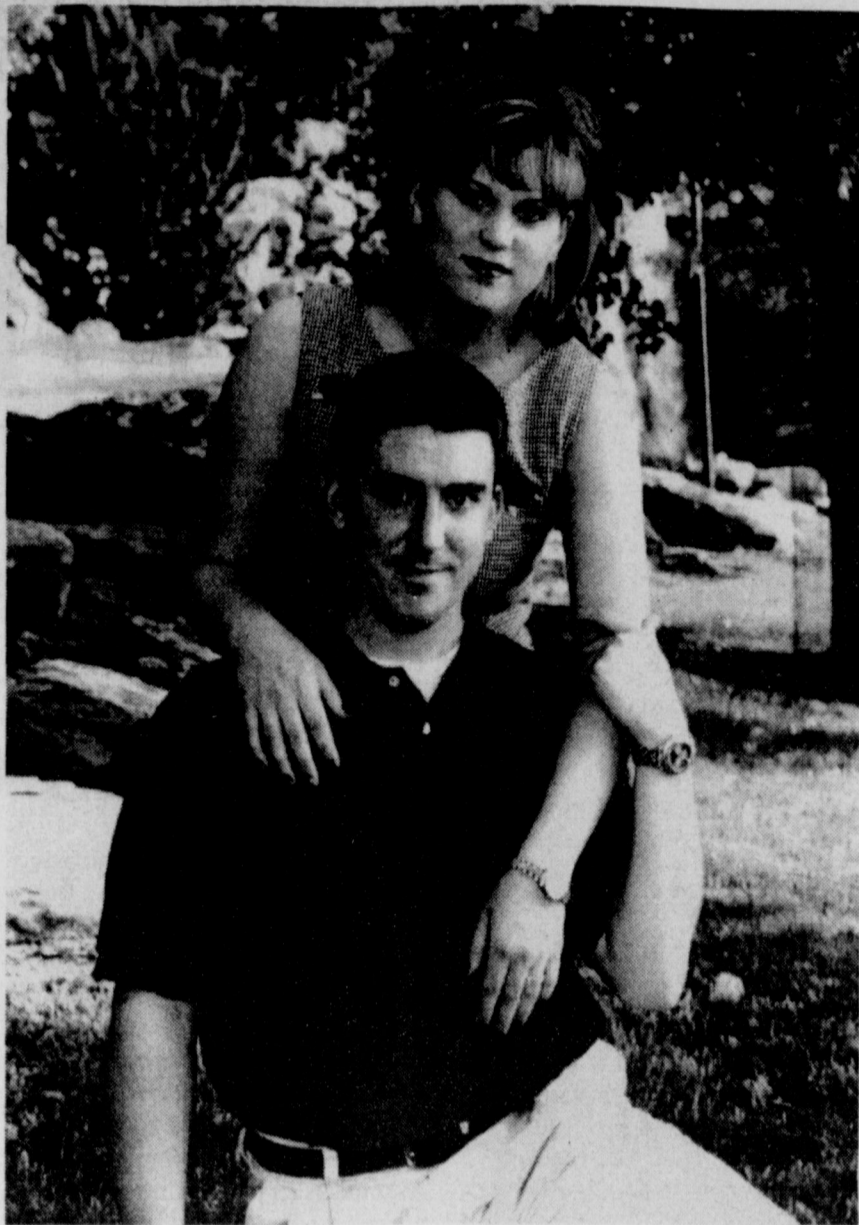

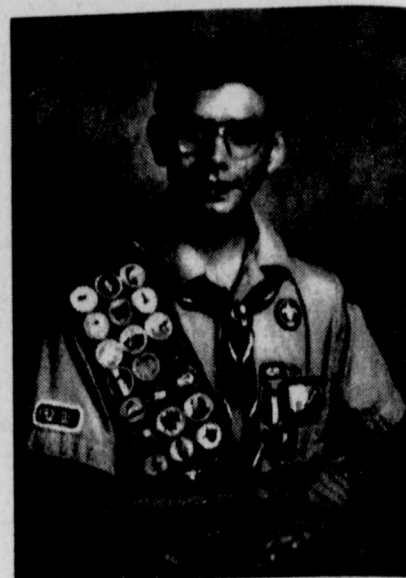

But won't it be great, when we can boast of having four, instead of

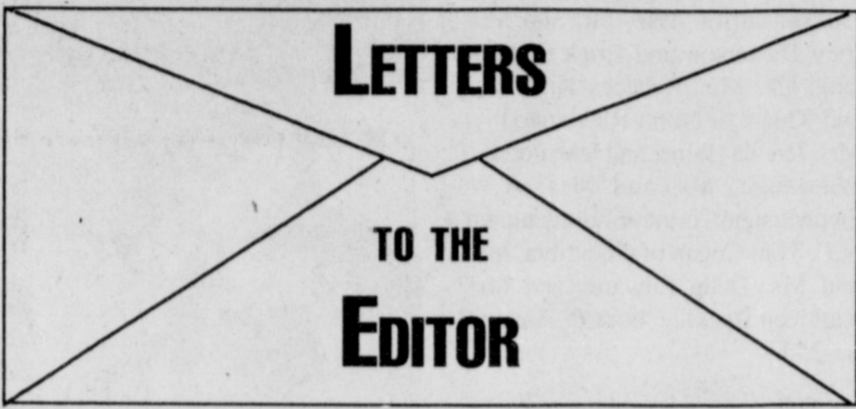
three, state high school championships on our record? You remember, I'm sure, Iowa Park won the state title in track in 1960, and football in 1969, coming back to share the championship again in 1970.

In other business Monday, the council approved annexation of a 10-acre tract of land into the city, a proposed replat of two lots in the east side, and heard Mayor Hunter read and present a proclamation declaring Thursday, June 11 as "Iowa Park Hawk Baseball Day."

The annexation action follows a series of required public hearings. The land fronts US 287 in the extreme east side of the city. Authorization to lay a water line to the tract along highway property is expected to be received in the near future. Price told the council.

The two lots being re-platted are at the corner of Bank and Seneca.

Baseball Coach David Fuhrman and members of the Hawk team were in attendance for the mayor's reading and presentation of the proclamation.

The council has scheduled a budget work session for 7 p.m. next Monday in council chambers. Representatives of all groups which use city facilities or receive city funding are to be in attendance.

Numerous cases keep police busy

The Iowa Park Police Department had one of its busiest weeks in memory, considering arrests, domestic disturbances, taking persons into custody on outstanding warrants, and investigating one case of criminal mischief.

Two men were taken into custody early Thursday evening in the 300 block of West Highway.

Both men were transported to the county jail, where the bond on Phillips was set at \$10,000.

Because Phillips' pickup was involved in the drug arrest, it is reportedly subject to forfeiture to the Iowa Park police.

In the early morning hours of Thursday, two persons, Justin David Gellner, 19, and Kacie Renee Dunlap, 17, were issued citations for minor in possession.

Sam Woods was taken into custody at 9:27 a.m. Thursday in the 200 block of West Ruby, after it was determined the 41-year-old was wanted by the state for parole violation.

William Perry Roberts, 65, was arrested at 1:14 a.m. Thursday in the 100 block of South Wall on a charge of driving while intoxicated.

Woods and Roberts were both transported at 2:06 p.m. to the county jail, according to the police blotter.

A Wichita County sheriff's warrant for the arrest of Shane Lee Weaver, 24, was the cause of his being taken into custody Friday afternoon. The warrant was for a Class A assault.

vacant since Ray Smock's resignation.

A meeting was held May 22 of representatives of elected officials and industries in Wichita Falls concerning the possibility of the TNRC imposing air quality control programs in this area.

Mayor Tim Hunter, Alderman Joe Singer and Administrator Mike Price were in attendance, along with officials from Wichita Falls, Burkburnett, Electra, Vernon, and Wichita and Wilbarger counties.

Also in attendance were representatives of virtually all major industries in the county.

Coalition agreed to contract the services of a consulting firm, Baker and Bots, L.L.P., to develop answers to the proposals and represent the area.

Each entity, including the industries, will finance the first year's actions with \$5,000 contributions.

The TNRC has reportedly alleged that the multi-county area to the north and northwest of Dallas-Fort Worth, as far away as Wilbarger County, are contributing to the quality of air there.

Should the control measures be put into place, they reportedly would impose such expensive air quality control standards that would greatly affect existing industries, and more importantly send any new prospects north into Oklahoma, where such policies are not required.

Besides industries, other businesses which would be greatly affected by such measures would include businesses which sell gasoline, bakeries, dry cleaners, etc.

NEWS OF THE IOWA PARK GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL SOCIETY



Jimmy Banks, General Manager of the Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 2, presented a program for the Iowa Park G.H.S. on The History of Wichita Valley Farm Irrigation Project.

Members and guests greatly enjoyed the many slides that showed how the huge undertaking evolved over many years, and explained the different stages of construction.

Pioneers in this area well remember the problems finding potable well water. Salt springs contaminated the rivers with so much salt, that some areas appeared to be covered with snow. Flooding after heavy rains was also a severe problem.

Joseph A. Kemp envisioned a project that would make water available for households and irrigation. The state legislature finally approved the project in 1917, and construction of the Lake Kemp Dam was begun in 1922. A large storage lake was made to collect and store the water from the Wichita River and flood waters during the heavy rains. Canals to carry the water to the farms and communities were built. In 1970, the dam was rehabilitated for safety and Lake Diversion was constructed below Lake Kemp.

Banks showed slides of the beginning of the project to its completion in 1996. He told of the fish hatcheries and had slides of the area around the lake and the various agricultural

programs in progress. Valley Farms became possible by this vast project.

There will be no meeting in July. There will be a regular meeting in August, and in September officers will be elected for the coming year. Refreshments will be a potluck supper. Guests are always welcome, so come and join us.

Cook of the Week



Niki Voyles

Our featured cook this week, Niki Voyles, is well known resident of Iowa Park, having lived here since 1975.

Niki, a beautician, grew up in Dallas. She completed her studies in cosmetology at Vernon Regional Junior College and has worked in several salons in the Dallas area and has owned two shops locally. She is the owner of Good Cuts in Iowa Park.

She is married to Iowa Park native, Joe Voyles, who is a barber, with his shop located next to hers on West Park Street.

Niki has two grown children, Casey Reed and Becca Reed, who both live in Wichita Falls.

For a pastime, Niki likes to read and cook. But she is going back to school in July to get here instructor's license, and said she wouldn't have much leisure time after that. She is a member of Faith Baptist Church.

Most of Niki's recipes are ones she has put together, and she says they are simple and fast. One of Joe's favorites is "Sausage and Potato Casserole."

Sausage & Potato Casserole

- 1 lb. Jimmy Dean sausage (fat free)
- 2 Tbsps. olive oil
- 1 large red bell pepper, cut into thin strips
- 2 med. zucchini, thinly sliced
- 2 tps. minced garlic
- 1/2 tsp. black pepper
- 2 tps. basil
- 2 tps. parsley
- 3 med. potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced
- 1 cup Parmesan cheese

- 2 cups Mozzarella cheese
- Salt and pepper to taste

Crumble sausage and cook in olive oil. Add red pepper, zucchini and spices. Simmer until vegetables are almost done. Layer meat mixture, potatoes and cheeses. Bake at 400 degrees about 30-40 minutes.

Crab Salad

- 2 cups macaroni, cooked & drained
- 1-2 cups imitation crab meat, cut in small pieces
- 1 small can sliced black olives, drained
- Chopped green onion, to taste
- 1 cucumber, chopped (optional)
- 1 med. tomato, chopped
- Salt & pepper to taste
- 1 bottle Kraft cucumber & Dill dressing

Mix all together and serve hot or cold.

Homemade Yeast Rolls

- 1 dry package of yeast
- 3/4 cup warm water
- 3 tps. sugar

Mix and let stand 5 minutes.

- 2 tps. oil
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 1/4 cups flour

Mix both together and turn out on floured board. Knead until not sticky. Roll out flat (1/2 - 1-inch thick). Cut with small glass to make round shape. Place in greased pan; let stand 1 hour; cook at 350 degrees until golden brown.

Mexican Pie

- 1 lb. ground beef, browned
- 1 cup corn meal

- 1 cup milk
 - 1 tsp. salt
 - 1 tsp. soda
 - 2 eggs, beaten
 - 1/2 cup oil
 - 1 cup (4 oz.) Cheddar cheese
 - 1 - 16 oz. can cream style corn
 - 1 med. onion, chopped
 - 4 jalapeno peppers
- Mix all ingredients and pour into 9x13" pan. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

Cheeseburger Pie

- 1 cup Bisquick
- 1/4 cup cold water
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 Tbsps. Bisquick
- 1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup small curd (creamed) cottage cheese
- 2 med. tomatoes, sliced
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese (about 4 ozs.)

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Mix 1 cup Bisquick with water until soft dough forms; beat vigorously 20 strokes. Gently smooth dough into ball on floured board; knead 5 times. Roll dough 2 inches larger than inverted 9x1 1/2" pie plate. Place in plate; flute edge if desired.

Cook and stir ground beef and onion until beef is brown; drain. Stir in salt and pepper, 2 tablespoons Bisquick and Worcestershire sauce. Spoon into pie crust.

Mix eggs and cottage cheese; pour over beef mixture. Arrange tomato slices in circle on top and sprinkle with Cheddar cheese. Bake 30 minutes or until set.

Mississippi Mud Cake

- 2 cups flour
 - 2 cups sugar
 - 2 tps. baking powder
 - Bring to a boil:
 - 1 cup water
 - 1/2 cup Crisco
 - 1 stick butter
 - 3 Tbsps. cocoa
- Add dry mixture to wet mixture, then add:
- 2 eggs
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 1 tsp. vanilla.

Mix together and bake 25-30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Icing:

- Powdered sugar
 - cocoa
 - butter
 - water
- Beat with mixer until creamy and of spreading consistency.

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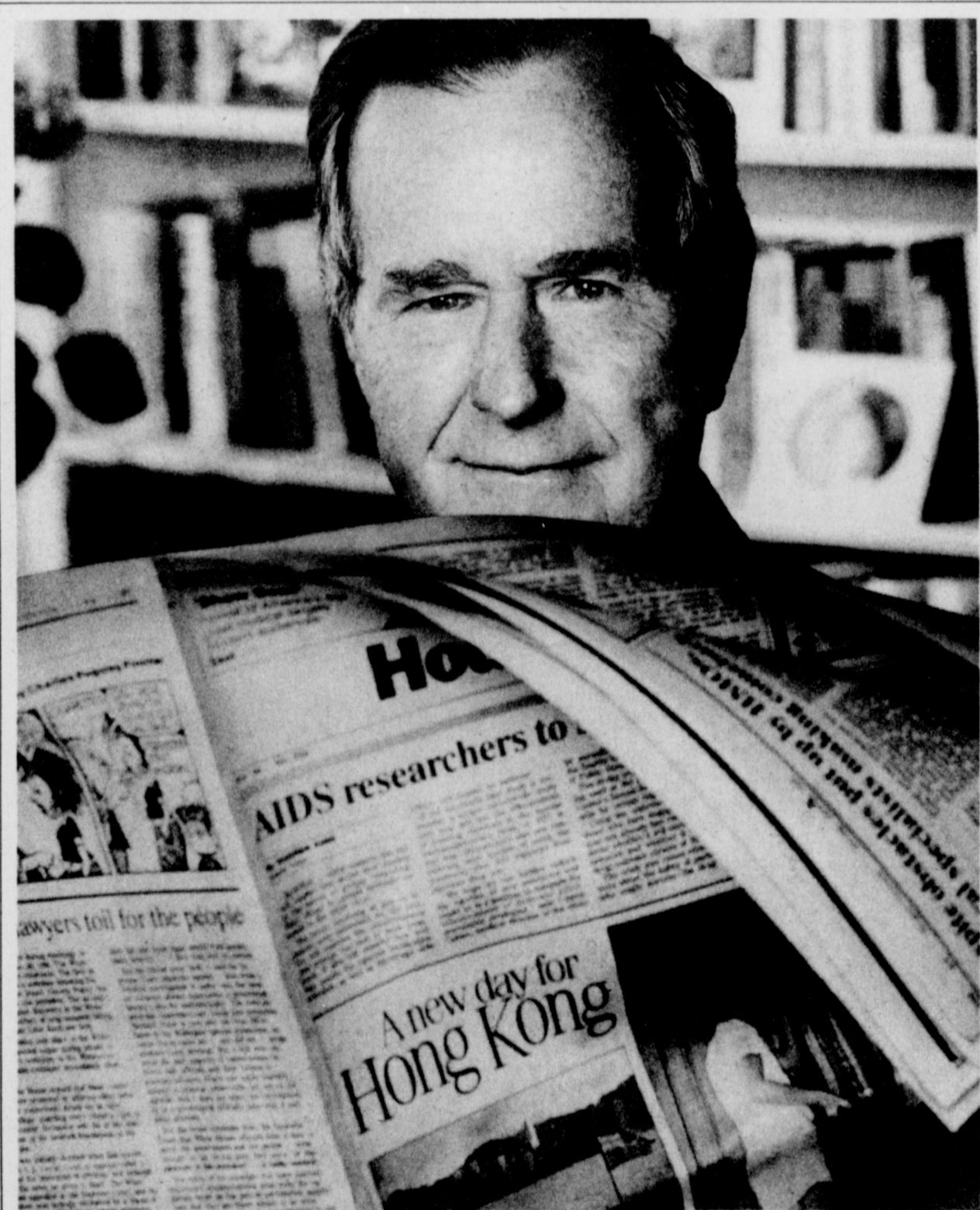

tionally walked to load the bases. Scotty Mitchell, who came on to pitch in the ninth inning, drove home the go-ahead run with an RBI groundout. Clubb then scored the insurance run on a passed ball, to make the final 4-2. Mitchell retired the Bulldogs in order in the bottom of the tenth to pick up the win.

"Our goal was to get the Gregg kid used up in the first game," Fuhrman said. "And if we won the game, that would be the icing on the cake. We played a great game defensively and our pitchers did an excellent job of pitching with runners on base."

Game two of the series started just like the first one did. Chad Wright led off with a double off the center field wall and went to third on a passed ball. Terry drove home the first run of the game with a sacrifice fly to center to make it 1-0.

Chase Wright took the mound for the Hawks and retired the side in order in the first, before having to leave due to back spasms.

"Chase hurt his back in Friday's game but we thought he might be able to go on Saturday, but it just hurt too much," said Fuhrman.

Iowa Park made it 2-0 in the bottom of the third inning as leadoff hitter Michael Swenson led off with a double just inside the third base bag and later scored on an error by the shortstop.

Mitchell came on to relieve Chase in the second inning, striking out two of the three batters he faced, but in the third, he ran into some trouble. Back-to-back singles put the tying runners on base and brought Gregg to the plate. Gregg drilled a three run homer to right-center to give the Bulldogs their first lead of the series at 3-2.

The Hawks tied the game at 3-3 in the bottom half of the fourth inning. After two outs, Mitchell doubled to center and Chase Wright blooped a single over, the head of the third baseman to drive home Mitchell.

Wylie regained the lead in the top of the fifth, scoring two runs on only one hit. Jessy Robertson came on to relieve Mitchell in the fourth inning and pitched his way out of a jam, stranding a runner at third with no outs. But in the fifth, he gave up three walks, a double and hit a batter.

In the bottom of the fifth for Iowa Park, with one out, Swenson doubled to center, but was thrown out at third on a fielder's choice when Wright grounded out to the shortstop.

The next batter was Terry, who hit the first pitch he saw well over the fence in left center for a game-tying two-run homer. The next batter, Clubb, reached on an error by the second baseman and went to third on Green's double. Clubb scored the game winner on a passed ball.

After taking the lead in the fifth, Pulley came on to pitch in the sixth inning for Iowa Park. Pulley struck out the first two hitters he faced, then walked Gregg intentionally before getting the next batter to ground out to second.

Iowa Park went three-up, three-down in the bottom of the sixth.

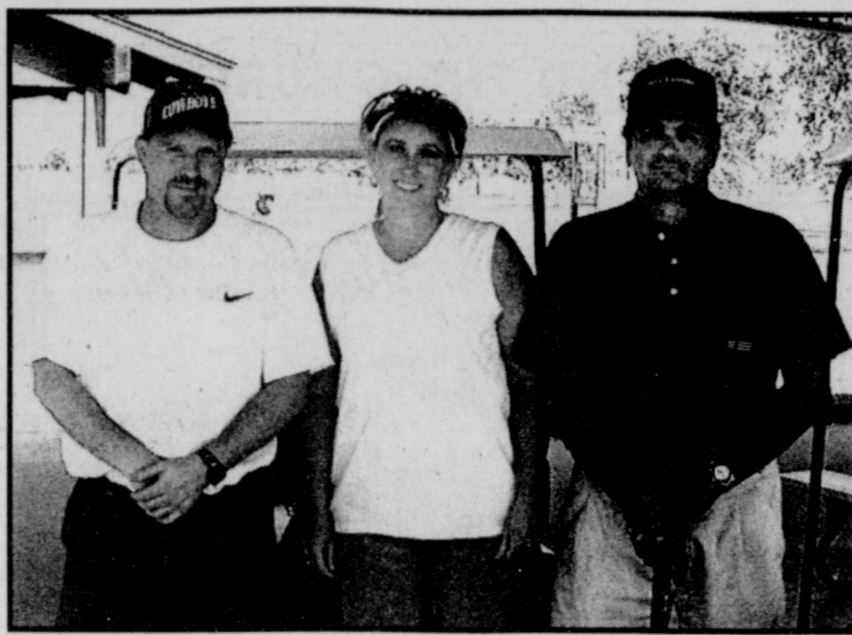
With only three outs standing between the Hawks and a trip to Austin, Fuhrman handed the ball to his junior right hander Terry, and sat back and watched him do his job. Terry retired the first two batters on fly balls and the third on a grounder to Pulley at third.

"This was a total team effort for us," Fuhrman said of his team's come-from-behind win in game two. "We had to use five pitchers to get it done, but we did it. We were going to save J.T. for the third game if we had too, but after we got the lead in the fifth, we just shut them down. After J.T.'s homer that tied the game, you could kind of feel the momentum switching back over to our side and you could see Wylie kind of deflate.

"We're very excited about getting to Austin, but we realize that we're still not where we set our goals to be," Fuhrman added. "Our confidence level is extremely high right now, after wins over Aledo (No. 1) Lake Dallas (No. 4) and Wylie (No. 10), so we know that if we play well we can compete with anybody in the state."

Dripping Springs will be the next opponent for the Hawks. A brief scouting report said that in their Regional final, they had 12 hits with all nine batters having at least one hit. Their best pitcher throws in the mid 80's and has a good curve that he likes to throw when he's ahead in the count. They are also a good bunting team that will try and manufacture runs.

If Iowa Park wins its game against Dripping Springs, the Championship game is scheduled for 4:30 p.m. at Disch Falk Field.

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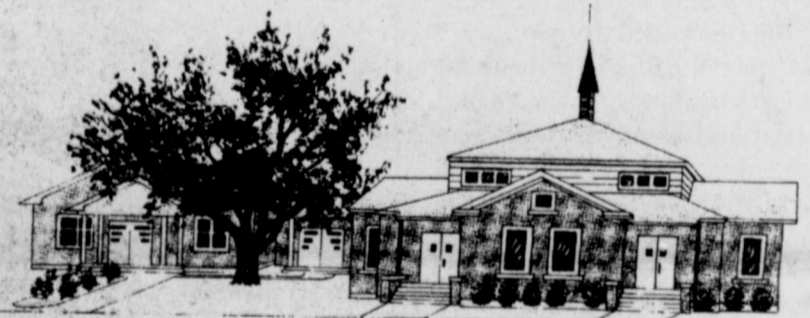

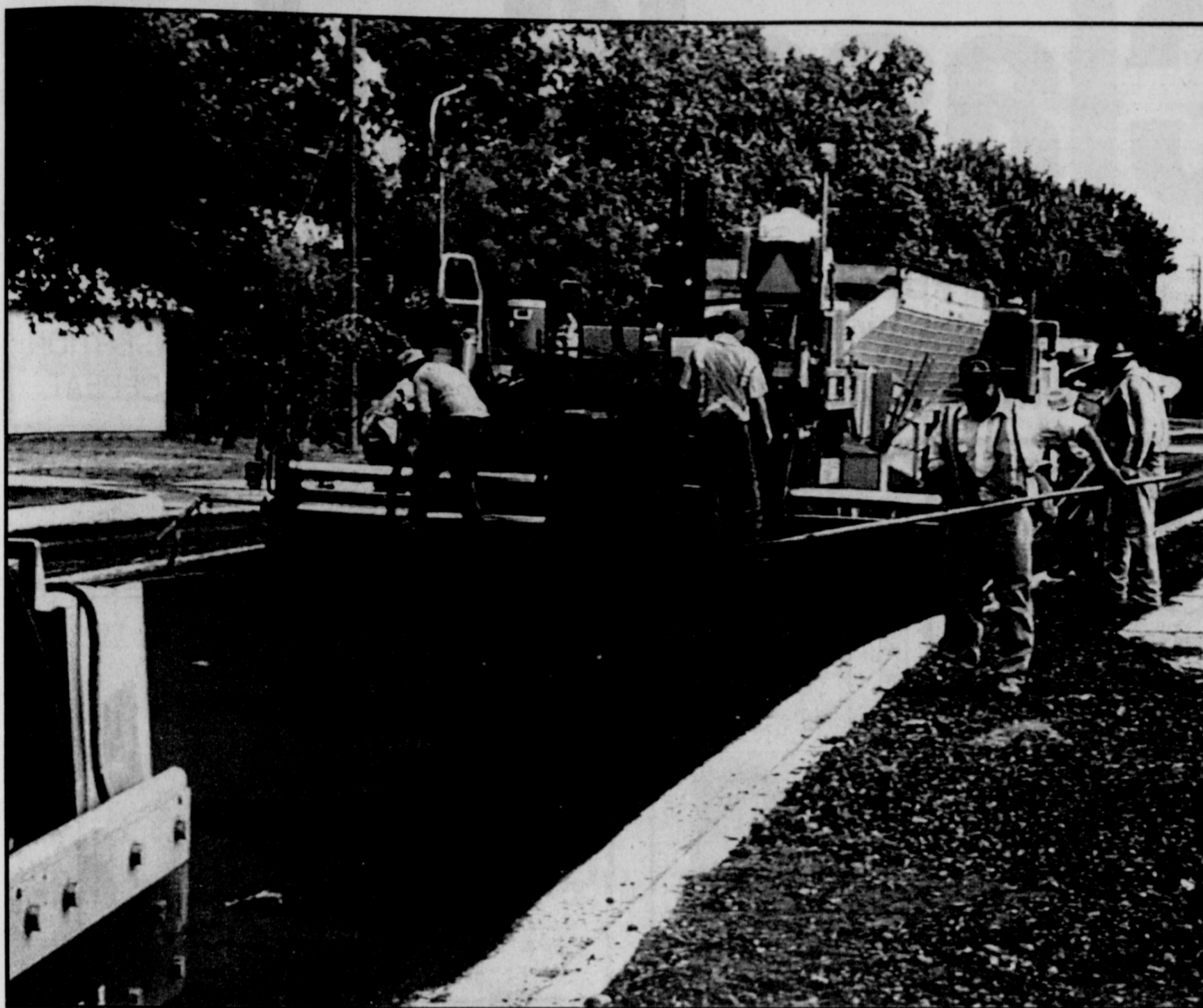

AG AGENT'S REPORT

By JOE RAFF, Wichita County Agriculture Agent

Wheat Harvest

If you haven't noticed, we have had large machinery driving down the country roads, and the once-green fields of wheat have turned into amber waves of grain.

Yes, it's harvest time again. Accompanying harvest comes long hours, and days in the field, in hopes of harvesting 40 or more bushels of wheat to the acre.

If you see these combines running down the road, you need to be cautious. First, they don't travel very fast down the road, top speed may be 20 mph. Second, they take up most all of the road. These are huge pieces of equipment and will take up their side of the road plus most of your's. And third, they make wide turns, and they turn at places where there may or may not roads (into fields, turn rows, etc).

In addition to the harvesters, there will be lots and lots of grain trucks. These trucks are also slow moving and may turn into places that you don't expect. They will also take up

much of the road and sometimes part of your side, so be careful.

The biggest thing to remember is that these men and women are doing their jobs. They are going to the office and conducting business just like everyone else in this great nation of our's.

Now their office is the field, and their business is harvesting wheat, and they need to be treated with the same respect as anyone else. Just keep in mind that combine that is taking up most of the road, or the truck turning into the field is carrying wheat that will be your loaf of bread tomorrow.

Another thing to consider as you are driving around the country side and meet one of these business men or women, is the cost of that equip-

ment. One of those combines cost about what you paid for your house. Most of these harvesters cost upwards of \$100,000 to \$150,000 each, something that you probably do not want to pay for.

I always think back to those wine commercials, "We will sell no wine before it's time." Keep that in mind as you travel down the road. It takes time to harvest these amber waves of grain. And these business people are traveling as fast as they can. Most may have been up all night harvesting wheat and they are in a hurry, just like you.

Here's some tips that will help everyone. If you travel one of these roads that the harvesters travel, give yourself an extra five to 10 minutes each day. Don't try to pass them until they pull over. If you've been behind one of these before, nine out of 10 times, they do pull over and let you pass.

And the last thing, be patient. They are in as big a hurry as you are, and they're traveling as fast as they can.

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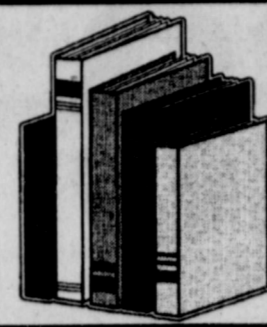

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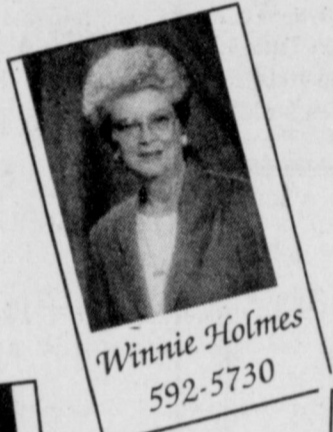

AUSTIN — Seven state legislators continue standing with Gov. George W. Bush in opposing legal fees in Texas' \$15.3 billion tobacco settlement.

Bush and the legislators oppose the \$2.3 billion in legal fees U.S. District Judge David Folsom awarded in the largest settlement in a civil lawsuit in U.S. history.

Last week, the seven told Folsom, who is overseeing the settlement, that Attorney General Dan Morales is wrong in saying the governor refuses to mediate the dispute. They say Bush has even proposed mediators as alternatives to federal appellate judges he rejected on the advice of his general counsel, Margaret Wilson.

"The facts are that the governor has not refused to negotiate or mediate," the lawmakers' Austin lawyer Pete Schenkkan told the judge.

Morales said Bush refused mediation after rejecting two federal appellate judges proposed by Folsom to work out a compromise over attorneys' fees. Morales' spokesman Ward Tisdale said, however, "The governor wanted to pick some of his own people. That simply is not acting in good faith."

But Bush said the judges, who sit on the New Orleans-based 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, cannot mediate because they are on the court that may hear an appeal in the case.

Violators Will Be Ticketed

Buckle up, Texans. If you don't, you're more likely than ever to get a \$25 to \$50 ticket for violating the state seat belt law.

"There's no excuse for Texas driv-

ers not to know about the law and not buckle up, so there's really no need for warnings," Department of Public Safety Director Col. Dudley Thomas said last week.

A 1985 law made it mandatory for drivers and front-seat passengers in all vehicles to wear seat belts, but the DPS recommends that all occupants wear seat belts.

Children under age 2 must ride in safety seats, and children ages 2 through 4 must be secured in safety seats or seat belts.

"Seat belt use is one thing all motorists can do to protect themselves from injuries in the event of a crash," Thomas told *The Dallas Morning News*. "About half the vehicle occupants aren't buckled up. Seat belts could save many of these lives."

DPS spokesman Mike Cox told the *Austin American-Statesman* an estimated 15 percent of Texans buckled up before the mandatory seat belt law came into effect, and current estimates put compliance at 75 percent.

"We're going after that other 25 percent who should be buckling up but still think they are bullet-proof," Cox said.

More Minority Admissions Offered

Data released last week by the University of Texas School of Law show the institution has offered admission to nearly twice as many blacks and more Mexican-Americans than last year.

Despite the increase in offers, however, fewer minorities are applying at UT in the wake of the federal court's 1996 Hopwood decision that banned a race-based admissions policy.

And although the number of the law school's offers has increased, those to blacks and Mexican-Americans represent just 6.4 percent of the 1,081 offers made, as of last week.

Gary Bledsoe, president of the Texas NAACP, said UT is making progress, but offers to minorities are far below figures from the mid-1980s.

Insurance Complaints on Internet

Beginning June 2, Texas joined the first states in the nation to give the public Internet access to detailed information on complaints against insurance companies and HMOs.

An Internet Complaint System

(ICIS) that lists certain individual complaints by company and provides statistical analyses by insurance type and geographic region is available at the Texas Department of Insurance web site, www.tdi.state.tx.us. ICIS data can be downloaded for further study.

"Most of the information we collect at TDI is open to the public, but access to detailed data can be cumbersome at times," Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer said. "Our decision to provide complaint data routinely over the Internet is one more way to make important information available to more people."

In general, the analyses show claim delays as the reason given most often for filing a complaint.

Other Capital Highlights

■ President Clinton's signing of a waiver to continue China's most-favored nation status increases opportunities for an already burgeoning Texas-China commerce. Texas exports to China include agricultural products, electronics and oil exploration equipment.

■ Players bought \$6.1 million worth of tickets in the first week of the Texas Lottery's new "Texas Million" game, but four \$1 million winners and other payouts totaled \$6.37 million, resulting in a net loss.

■ Texas Railroad Commissioner Carole Keeton Rylander, the Republican nominee for state comptroller, last week was voted chairman of the commission by fellow members Barry Williamson and Charles Matthews.
