Council approves project on sewer

The city council voted to replace Price informed the council he now a sewer main in the 400 block of Clara and Texas Streets, and also to accept bids for two surplus items.

Aldermen also agreed that another work session on the 1998-99 budget was unnecessary, and they are ready to act on budget July 27 which could cut the tax rate slightly.

Bids for surplus property which were accepted included a 1988 pickup, \$800 submitted by Lynn Stone, and \$1,502.01 for an auto lift from Strickland Racing.

Neither of two bids offered for a 1987 Ford Taurus sedan met the minimum required, and were rejected. The council then authorized Administrator Mike Price to negotiate for a more accedptable price for the vehicle's sale.

Public Works Director Belvin Lytle had informed the council that the original sewer main between Clara and Texas has been causing frequent problem to residences.

Also, because the line was installed in the early days the city service was introduced, it actually was placed along private property and not in the dedicated alleyway.

Price estimated the cost of replacing the old line, as well as extending the private lines to the alley, would be approximately \$15,000.

Advertisements for bids to have the project done will be published.

The new budget, if approved, could be adopted which would require a tax rate of 68 cents, as compared with this year's 69 cents.

New construction and increased assessments of values have made the decrease in rate possible, it was explained. Each cent on the tax rate produces \$12,300, Price explained.

The council approved one of two resolutions which were listed on the meeting's agenda.

Approved was a request for permission to purchase a back-up lift station pump which serves the Garden Valley Addition. Estimated cost of the unit would be approximately \$8,600, Price told the council.

Aldermen decided to delay action on the second resolution, which involved approval of the Wichita Appraisal District's budget for 1999.

A representative of District will be asked to attend the council's next meeting and provide more information relating to the proposed \$60,000

The City of Iowa Park regularly pays 1.0540792 percent of the District's budget, while the local school district's share is 4.6852781

Miller earns doctorate

After 25 years of choral teaching experience at the high school and collegiate levels, Robert Dale Miller, a 1969 graduate of Iowa Park High School, is a May, 1998, doctoral graduate of Texas Tech University.

He is currently Director of Choral Activities at Arkansas State University in Jonesboro, Ark.

Miller received the Doctor of Philosophy in Fine Arts, majoring in choral conducting and minoring in fine arts administration. His dissertation research concerned the church music of Johann Michael Haydn, colleague of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart and brother of Franz Joseph Haydn.

A former president of the IPHS A Cappella choir under Darrell Dick. Miller began his course of study for the Ph.D. in the summer of 1995 while serving as the choral director and music department chair at Kilgore College.

During the 1996-97 year at Texas Tech, Miller was awarded the DeWitt-Jones Fellowship in Music, awarded to the music doctoral candidate receiving the highest score on the Graduate Record Exam. As a result of this fellowship, Dale conducted the 100-voice Texas Tech University Singers and co-conducted the University Orchestra.

During the 1997-98 academic year, Dr. Miller has served as the director of choral activities at Arkansas State University and on July 1, assumed the duties of the chair of the department of music at that institution.

Miller's career highlights include his conducting debut at Carnegie Hall in November, 1995, when he was guest conductor of the New England Symphoic Ensemble MidAmerica Chorus. Also, two European concert tours with is choir from Kilgore College, and guest conducting appearances with two other professional orchestras, the Chamber Orchestra of the Palace of Fine Arts in Mexico City and the Longview Symphony Orchestra.

Miller is the son of Jim and Gearldene Miller, and brother of Janice and Norman Hodges of Pleas-

He and the former Nancy Thompson of Bonham have been married 26 years. They have four children, one grandson and another on the way.

To help cope with the hot summer temperatures, this week's recipes require little or no cooking.

Chicken Salad Surprise

1 - 3 oz. pkg. lemon or orange pineapple jello

1 tsp. garlic salt 3/4 cup boiling water 1 1/2 tsps. grated onion

Dash of pepper 1 Tbsp. wine vinegar 1 cup sour cream or mayonnaise

1/4 cup chopped pecans 2 cups diced cooked chicken (or use 1 - 12 oz. can boned chicken, drained

and diced) 1/2 cup diced celery

4 quarts torn salad greens 1/3 cup sliced ripe olives 1/2 cup drained canned pineapple

tidbits 2 med. tomatoes, diced

Dissolve jello and garlic salt in boiling water. Add onion, pepper, and vinegar; cool. Blend in sour cream. Chill until very thick. Fold in pecans, chicken, and celery. Pour into a 9-inch square pan. Chill until firm. Cut into cubes. Toss remaining ingredients lightly with salad dressing, if desired, and place in salad bowls. Arrange cubes on salads (do not toss).

Crab Louis

1 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing 1/4 cup chili sauce

2 cups cooked crab meat, flaked (two 7 1/2 oz. cans crab meat, drained and flaked, or two 6-oz. pkgs. frozen crab meat, thawed, may be used)

2 Tbsps. finely chopped bell pepper 1 stalk celery, chopped

1 Tbsp. finely chopped onion 1/2 tsp. salt

1/8 tsp. pepper

1/2 cup whipped cream, sweetened, or 1/2 cup frozen topping, thawed. (Optional)

In bowl, combine mayonnaise and chili sauce until smooth. Add crab meat, green pepper, celery, onion, salt and pepper. Fold in whipped cream. Chill before serving. Serve in lettuce cups.

Chocolate-Peanut Butter No-Bake Cookies

1 - 6 oz. pkg. semisweet chocolate chips (1 cup)

1/4 cup light corn syrup

1/4 cup peanut butter

2 Tbps. milk 1 tsp. vanilla

2 cups quick-cooking oats 1 cup peanuts

Cover 2 cookie sheets with waxed paper. Heat chocolate chips, corn syrup, peanut butter, milk and vanilla in 3-quart saucepan over medium heat, stirring constantly, until chocolate is melted and mixture is smooth; remove from heat. Stir in oats and peanuts.

Drop mixture by rounded tablespoonfuls onto waxed paper. Refrigerate uncovered about 1 hour or until firm. Cover and refrigerate any remaining cookies.

Ancestors among French refugees in Virginia?

In 1685 Louis XIV repealed the Edict of Nantes in an act called the Revocation. French Protestants (Huguenots) fled France by the thousands, most with nothing but the clothes on their backs.

Some went to South Africa and Holland about 400,000 escaped to Germany and England.

In 1700 many of these French refugees (Huguenots) who fled to England came to America. Land was donated by King William III, of England, to the French refugees in Vir-

Turff and Twigg is a very old expression reflecting a transfer and ownership of real property by handing over to the buyer some clod, piece of turf, bought or twig. This term is found in some very early Virginia deeds.

"Turff and Twigg" by Priscilla Harriss Cabell, is the appropriate title of a land study of 10,000 acres on the southern banks of the James River at Mankintown Virginia. There are some 6000 names in the index, including slaves, also some wills plus many birth, marriage and death records.

Some names of the French refugees who fled England and came during this time, are progenitors of many Americans. When researching remember many names were Anglicized. Names such as Agee, Amonet, Barnard, Chamboon, Chastaine, Dupre, Dupuy, Flournoy, Foure, Gevodan, Harris, Holman, Jones, Lefeavour, Lafiet, Lavillian, LeSuer. Mallet, Martin, Panitour, Perault, Rspine, Salle, Sassin, Soblet, and Trabue, are of record.



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



AG AGENT'S REPORT

By JOE RAFF, Wichita County Agriculture Agent

Upcoming Meetings

It was sure nice to get some rain. Even though my pens are wet and standing in water, I'll take it any day.

There are some big upcoming meetings that I wanted to tell everyone about. The first one will be here in Wichita County today at the MPEC. Dr. Travis Miller, professor and Extension agronomist, will be here from Texas A&M delivering a talk on his trip to Australia last year.

Dr. Miller has provided leadership to the Interdisciplinary Test Plots at the David Kearney farm and has worked on several plots throughout the state. He has some great slides and insight on farming in Australia. This should prove to be a very interesting meeting as we look at the world market, and how Australia fits into the scene.

The meeting will be sponsored by the Wichita County Crops Committee, and will start at 7 p.m.

Ranch Estate Planning will be the next state-wide meeting, which will be held Sunday, Aug. 2, and Monday the 3rd. Dr. Wayne Hayenga, professor and Extension specialist, will teach this course in Room 457 of the Blocker Building at College Sta-

Dr. Hayenga is a member of the Texas and American Bar Association and the American Agriculture Law Association.

Topics that will be discussed will include: the will, what should it say and how to properly draft a will; a living trust, do you want one and what are the benefits of one; estate tax deferral, a married couple can elect to not pay any estate tax on the death of the first spouse, what are the in's and out's; gifts, they are an alternative to leaving property in your estate, is this the best way for you; estate taxes, what is included in the taxable estate; use of corporations and partnerships, both can give different results which one is for you; special use land valuation, what are the new rules, do you qualify, and deferred estate tax payment rules and

life insurance. On Aug. 2 the session will start at 3 p.m. and the Aug. 3 session will start at 8:30 a.m. The cost of the program will be \$75 per person. I have registration forms in the office if you are interested, and for more information you can call 409-845-



to begin defending their homes against wildfire, advises the Texas Forest Service.

"The ongoing disaster in Florida should prod Texans, suffering the driest conditions in a century, to build a fire-safe zone called "urban interface', or what is commonly referred to as 'out in the country', are at great risk. A few hours of work now could pay off by saving your home from wildfire."

Sloat advises homeowners to clear them completely from the safety

"Yard trees and shrubs should be at least 15 feet apart, and limbs should be cut off up to 15 feet from the ground," according to Sloat.

He also advises removal of limbs that hang over roofs and chimneys,

Homeowners need to take time cleaning leaves from gutters and roofs, and storing firewood at least 30 feet away from homes preferably not on a

The dry conditions also, dictate some other common-sense precautions, according to Sloat. Those include dumping cooking charcoal and spent fireworks into metal buckets then soaking them with water, keeping garden hoses hooked up, and shovel, rakes and a ladder at hand.

"Home owners should think strategically," Sloat said, advising them to examine their access roads to ensure they're wide enough for fire engines and bridges are strong enough to support large fire vehicles.

"Good people to consult are volunteer fire departments are the principal defenders of urban interface homes in Texas," Sloat said.

Hunter Ed courses offered this weekend

A Hunter Education Class is being offered July 18 and 19, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., at the Recreational Activity Center.

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Q. We have a garden in Iowa Park. Our tomato crop has been pretty good this year, however, most of our tomatoes are splitting. What causes the splitting of the fruit?

A. The splitting as you refer to is actually what horticulturists call radial cracking. Large, flat-fruit varieties of tomatoes tend to crack worse than other types. Avoid using these types and try to use more round fruited cultivars such as Celebrity and Carnival. Planting on raised rows and using several inches of mulch around the base of plantings will also help reduce the problem.

Q. Enclosed are leaves from our recently-planted Redbud tree in Wichita Falls. All the leaves are turning yellow and then brown. What is causing this and will the tree survive?

A. The leaves you mailed were very dried out when they arrived which makes diagnosis a bit more difficult. Potential causes could be plain and simple transplant stress due to the excessively hot and dry weather we have experienced this summer.

Try to keep the tree evenly moist during this heat wave and use several inches of mulch around the base of

the tree to moderate soil temperatures and hold moisture.

If all care factors are in order, then there is the possibility of a devastating disease called cotton root rot. This disease is a major problem for pears, apples and related species of plants as well as Redbuds. No plant is immune to cotton root rot, but some plants are much more suscep-

Redbud is highly susceptible to the pathogen. Rapid yellowing and browning of foliage results in a very short period of time. One indication of cotton root rot is that dead foliage tends to remain attached to the plant even after death. This disease occurs during the hottest parts of summer and in areas with more alkaline soils.

There is no perfect cure for cotton root rot with the exception of planting other trees which are much more resistant to the disease. Plant material lists are available which rank plants in terms of their susceptibility to the disease at your local county Extension office.
