Students Aid 23 Club Present Americanism amous Program at School The glorious heritage of America was impressively depicted in speech, music and drama in a program sponsored by the 23 Study

club last Thursday morning. The program was presented during the chapel period in the local high school autitorium and was dedicated to patriotism and freedom, observing the approach of the birthday of the Father of Our Country.



Effectiveness of the patriotic program was enhanced by the performance of Mrs. China B. Smith, the reader.

To open the program Bob Mc-Manus played the national anthem. as a trumpet solo from behind the curtain. David Sewell then led the audience in giving the pledge of

allegiance. To precede "My Country Tis of Thee," a historical pageant in musical form, Mrs. Owens directed high school speech students in "I Hear America Singing," a presentation designed to show how people in all walks of life are privileged to sing about what belongs to them.

Reminding the audience that our Pilgrim fathers came to these shores for religious freedom, the sixth grade choral group directed by Mrs. Hawkins sang "Old Hundredth" in the original meter and 'Faith of Our Fathers.'

Dressed in Indian costume, Mrs. Chas. Coppock sang an Indian folk song suggestive of the music used by the redmen as means of importuning their gods or chasing away their devils.

Mr. Vaughn exhibited a tuning fork and explained its use. The influence of the Franciscan fathers from Spain who settled in the Southwest was revealed in 'Adeste Fidelis," another rendition by the sixth graders. The number was sung in Latin.

Soil Conservation

Directors of the Wichita Valley Water Improvement District and supervisors of Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District have since June 1948 jointly attacked the drainage problem in the Valley Farms area.

The first problem was drainage of a corrective nature on some 1800 acres located on 12 creek or pond segments such as Deer Creek and Horseshoe Lake.

To January 1 this year approximately 57 miles of channel of some 672,700 cubic yards of excavation have been completed. The Water Improvement Districts usually have two draglines working on these projects and the Soil Conservation Service furnishes the planning and engineering.

A portion of the Horseshoe Lake segment is being extended northward across Highway 367. As the level of the drainage ditch is cut to the required depth, large quantities of water from subsurface drainage enter the canal.

Waterway was staked during the past week for Albert Wolf of Electra. During heavy rains Wolf has found that the present natural drain was not of sufficient capacity to carry runoff. After shaping. the area will be seeded to K R Bluestem and Buffalograss. When the oats are large enough they will be mowed for dead cover of small plants.

Contour borders for better use of irrigation water have been staked for Maloy Reneau, Amer Lewis, Sam P. Howell and A. J. Voyles. John Hund is installing checks for irrigation ditches and turnouts for borders.

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
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
