

# FIRST-DAY REPORT **Enrollment reaches 2,141**

There were 30 more students who reported for the first day of classes Monday in Iowa Park schools than showed up when school began last fall.

The high school reported 699 pupils, 505 at junior high, 468 at Bradford Elementary and 469 at Kidwell Elementary.

The first-day total was 2,141, as compared with 2,111 who were counted on the first day of the 1997-98 school year.

Enrollment at Kidwell exceeded expectations, which has caused the district to begin hiring an additional first grade teacher.

The first grade received 20 more pupils than expected, for a total of 145. There were only 119 in the kindergarten class last year.

The additional enrollment in that grade has consumed the only extra classroom left available in the school district, according to administrators.

First-day enrollment figures do not give an adequate indication as to how many students will be in classes by the end of the year. Last year was an example. The first-day count was 2,111, but that increased to 2,136 by the close of the year.

The 1995 fall began with 2,094, but there were 2,143 students counted at the end of the '96 spring semester.

A break-down of first-day enrollment this year includes:

ALL CLASSROOMS FILLED

High school - 135 seniors, 153 juniors, 196 sophomores and 215 freshmen.

Junior high - 178 eighth grade; 173 seventh and 154 sixth grade.

Bradford - 164 fifth grade; 147 fourth grade and 157 third.

Kidwell - 145 second grade; 145 first grade; 146 kindergarten; four in Early Childhood, and 29 Pre-Kindergarten.

The 2,141 students counted on first day this year ranks third-highest in Iowa Park's history. 1970 was the highest, with 2,294, and 1971 followed with 2,188.

# **Chamber now accepting Whoop-T-Do reservations**

The Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce is now accepting reservations for Whoop-T-Do booth spaces.

# to make schools safe

Several changes have been made this year to provide a safer atmosphere for students attending school in Iowa Park.

After several violent episodes recently at schools across the country, Supt. Mike Caplinger and the school board felt additional security measures were needed for precautionary purposes.

As a start, security cameras have been installed at several entrances to the high school. They will give school officials more awareness of people entering and leaving the building.

The school district and Iowa Park Police Department are working together to improve discipline and security at the schools.

The City of Iowa Park and Iowa Park CISD have jointly purchased a dog to be used for drug detection. The dog, a 17-month old Dutch Shepherd, arrived this week, and will continue training until sometime in October. His handler will be a local police officer. During the interim, a contract dog is expected to be brought in.

Signs will be posted in the parking areas of the schools informing the public that all vehicles are subject to search. Any vehicle entering the area is subject to search by school authorities and law enforcement working with them. Such search may be conducted without warrant for any reasonable purpose.

In those cases where narcotics or drug paraphernalia are found, the vehicle is subject to seizure by the state and will be forfeited by the owner.

Police Chief Lynn Collins said the police department would make the decisions on when the drug dog would be used and no announcement would be made in advance.

He said searches won't be limited to one or two a month, and could be done multiple times during a week or day, when they show up at random.

"We're not trying to be critical or threatening, we just want schools to be a safer place," Collins said.

"Drugs are not a big problem in

our schools right now," he continued, "we just want to make sure we don't have a problem."

A zero tolerance policy will be used at the high school to deal with student misbehavior.

Principal Alan Seay has said, "High school kids are old enough to know right and wrong. So I have to believe that if they choose to do things that are wrong they also choose to suffer the consequences."

Supt. Mike Caplinger said, "We are making an effort to beef up discipline and consistency in what we do. There needs to be predictability, and students held to the consequences of their actions. Kids want predictability and to know where they stand."

"The police department and school district together will be more involved in what happens to a youngster who is involved in creating an unsafe situation," he said. "Increasing discipline creates a safer invironment, which allows ups to deal with some of these horrible situations across the country."

A "Notice of Laws" will be posted on each campus which reads:

The Iowa Park Independent School District and local law enforcement are committed to keeping our school environment safe from the effects of drugs, guns and violence. A No Tolerance approach will insure the safety of all that attend and/or visit our campus.

Laws to be enforced for your protection include, but are not limited to:

- \* Disorderly conduct (fighting in public)
- \* Assault (including threats)
- \* Possession of alcohol (beer, wine, etc.)
- less tobacco)

\* Possession of a firearm (and other weapons)

\* Drug possession, Possession of drug paraphernalia and/or Delivery of drugs (includes possessing drugs on or within 1,000 feet of school property)

\* Theft (including possession of sto-

len property)

# **City receives** tax rebate

Another \$32,471.87 was added to the city's general fund this month, thanks to shoppers doing business here in Iowa Park.

The money was the sales tax rebate from the state comptroller's office which included local sales taxes collected by monthly filers on June sales, and by quarterly filers for April, May and June.

The rebate was 4.21 percent greater than the \$31,159.31 received by the city in August of 1997.

For the year, Iowa Park has now received \$193, 422.95, a 4.03-percent increase over the same period last year

Excited, he went into the office, but Brett Hale was in court. Howard would have to come back another time.



#### **Joyce's Sweet Potatoes**

2 cups cold mashed sweet potatoes (without added milk or butter) 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted 2 eggs, beaten 1/3 cup milk 1 tsp. vanilla extract 1/2 cup flaked coconut

**Topping:** 1/2 cup packed brown sugar 1/2 cup chopped pecans 2 Tbsps. butter or margarine, melted 1/4 cup all-purpose flour

in a mixing bowl, beat sweet potatoes, sugar, butter, eggs, milk and vanilla until fluffy. Stir in coconut. Spoon into a greased 2 1/2-qt. baking dish.

Combine topping ingredients until well blended; sprinkle over sweet potatoes. Bake, uncovered, at 350 degrees 35-40 minutes or until golden brown. Yield: 8 servings.

#### Soul Bread

3 cups corn meal 1 Tbsp. sugar 1 1/2 tsp. salt 2 1/2 cups boiling water 1 small sweet potato 1 cup cold water 1 cup all-purpose flour 1 1/4 cup molasses 1/2 tsp. baking soda

Combine corn meal, sugar and salt in large bowl. Pour in boiling water. Beat with electric mixer until well blended.

Boil sweet potato until tender. Peel while hot. Add to meal mixture. Beat 10 minutes. Add cold water. Beat well. Add flour and molasses. Beat well.

Cover. Place in warm, draft-free place overnight.

Heat oven to 250 degrees. Grease and flour 10-inch Bundt pan. Stir baking soda into bread mix-

ture and pour into pan. Bake 3 hours at 250 degrees.

Remove from oven. Cover pan tightly with foil to steam bread. Cool at least 1 hour before removing from pan.

#### **Peanut Butter Cream Pie**

1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened 3/4 cup confectioners' sugar 1/2 cup creamy peanut butter 6 Tbsps. milk 1-8 oz. ctn. frozen whipped topping, thawed

1 graham cracker crust (9 inches) 1/4 cup chopped peanuts

In a mixing bowl, beat cream cheese until fluffy. Add sugar and peanut butter; mix well. Gradually add the milk. Fold in whipped topping; spoon into the crust. Sprinkle with peanuts and chill overnight.

#### **Country Ham and Cornbread Casserole**

2 cups cubed cooked ham

1/2 cup chopped green onions 1/4 cup margarine or butter, melted 2 eggs, well beaten

1 - 11 oz. can corn with red and green peppers, drained 1 - 8.5 oz. can cream style corn

1 cup self-rising white commeal 3/4 cup buttermilk

4 oz. (1 cup) shredded Cheddar cheese Heatoven to 350 degrees. Grease a 12x8-inch (2-quart) baking dish. In large bowl, combine all ingredients except cheese. Pour into greased baking dish.

Bake at 350 degrees 45-55 minutes or until golden brown and set. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake an additional 2-3 minutes or until cheese is



melted. Let stand 5 minutes before serving. Cut into squares.

**Bread Pudding for Two** 

1 1/2 cups day-old buttered bread cubes (2 slices) 2 eggs

1 cup milk 1/4 cup sugar 1/4 tsp. ground cinnamon 1/8 tsp. ground nutmeg Dash salt

Divide bread between two greased 8-ounce baking dishes; set aside. In a bowl, beat eggs, milk, sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt. Pour over bread. Bake, uncovered, at 350 degrees 40-45 minutes or until a knife inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool slightly. Serve warm.

Skillet Squash & Potatoes 1 small potato, peeled and thinly sliced 1/4 cup chopped onion 1 Tbsp. cooking oil 1 small yellow summer squash, sliced 1/4 tsp. salt 1/8 tsp. pepper Dash paprika

In a covered skillet over medium-low heat, cook potato and onion in oil for 12 minutes. Add squash; cook, uncovered, for 8-10 minutes or until the vegetable are tender, stirring occasionally. Season with salt, pcpper and paprika. Yield: 2 servings.

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O. We have several large oaks in our landscape in Wichita Falls. We are having trouble growing any St. Augustine around the trees. Our neighbor's yard appears to get about as much sun as our lawn and they have nice St. Augustine. What is causing the problem with our lawn?

A. You may be dealing with more shade than what your actually think. In heavily shaded areas under large, shade trees it is very difficult to grow even St. Augustine grass. St. Augustine prefers a sunny location with ample amounts of moisture.

Areas which have less than at least four hours of sun are not suitable for St. Augustine. Needless to say, Bermuda would not even be an option for a heavily shaded area.

Your best option would be to plant a shade-loving groundcover into the area. Use plants such as Mondograss, Asian Jasmine, English Ivy or Vinca among others.

Remember, St. Augustine does not like shade, but will tolerate modest amount of shade.

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

J. Gary Kaenzig, Jr., was kind enough to accept an invitation to speak Thursday to about a dozen community leaders. The meeting, organized by Wayne House, was held at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

Kaenzig had earlier in the day spoken to a civic group in Wichita Falls.

The answers I got were available only from him or another official in the Duncan, S.C. office.

The first one was concerning the merger of Cryovac with Sealed Air Corp.

When one looks at the company's logo, it appears that Cryovac is actually a subsidiary of Sealed Air.

That's not the case. Cryovac is by far the larger outfit, and generates far more revenue than Sealed Air.

Then why does the company logo indicate Cryovac is a part of Sealed Air?

It turns out, Kaenzig told us, that the leadership chose to do it that way, for the simple reason that Sealed Air was already established on the New York Stock Exchange.

Cryovac, you may recall, formerly was a subsidiary of the W.R.

Yes, in fact, Cryovac has taken an option on the property west of Johnson Road and in between US 287 and the railroad. Now owned by Stanley and Bert Williamson, the land was under the Van Horn estate for many, many years.

Will it be an expansion of Cryovac production, or will it produce Sealed Air materials?

Only future market development will dictate that.

Sealed Air produces a plastic sheeting with air-filled bubbles, which are used for encasing items in boxes which can be easily broken.

Because of its composition, it cannot be shipped great distances like Cryovac's bags, films and other products. Therefore, production must be reasonably near its buyers, we were told. Also their plants are smaller than Cryovac installations.

Kaenzig was highly complimentary of employees and management at our Cryovac plant. He confirmed that the plant has greater production with fewer problems than other plants in the company, prima-

# Trustees hear report on school's finances

During the regular meeting of the school board last Thursday, Sharon Powell, the school district's business manager, told trustees that this year's budget deficit is lower than previously figured.

Earlier figures, which had put the deficit at \$126,288, have been lowered to \$16,429.

Powell said that some of the earlier figures used were estimates, and the actual numbers were lower than expected.

She also reminded board members that the local school tax rate set this year will determine state funding for the next two years.

There will be a public hearing on the 1998-99 school budget at 7 p.m., followed by a public hearing on the tax rate at 7:30 p.m. today in the W.F. George Middle School Library.

To begin the meeting, trustees
