

AT GAINESVILLE

Hawks ready for another thriller

If you are running late and can't make it to the start of the Hawk football game in Gainesville this week, don't worry.

If it's anything like the last three, you can show up with a minute or two

left in the game and see the best part. For the third straight game, Iowa Park has made it interesting right down to the final gun for it's fans, with the final decision being made just before the final gun.

Iowa Park, now 2-1 overall (both wins coming against 4A schools), will take to the road again, following last week's home opener against Hirschi. The Hawks will travel to Gainesville to take on the 2-0 Leopards tomorrow night at 7:30.

The Leopards own wins over Fort Worth Northside and Wichita Falls High School. Gainesville beat Northside 45-0 in week one, then escaped with a 6-0 win at Memorial Stadium against the Coyotes last week in a defensive battle. In the Coyote game, the Leopards managed only six total first downs. The Leopard defense, which hasn't been scored on this season, allowed only five first downs to the Coyotes.

At the start of the season, Gainesville was ranked as one of the top 15 3A teams in the state, which sets the tone for another exciting game this week for fans and coaches alike.

To find Gainesville's stadium, when entering the city on Hwy 82 Friday, turn south on I-35, exit on California, go under overpass, turn right on Weaver, pass Braums to Hird, turn left on Hird to stadium.

Advanced tickets will be sold on Friday only: \$4 for adults, \$3 for students. Sales will end at 3:30 p.m. All tickets at the gate are \$5.

"I think it's more exciting for the fans than it is for the coaches," said head coach Weldon Nelms. "Those nail-biters are always tough on the coaches, but that's the way you want to win games. You like to see your team playing well in crucial situations like we did last week. It will help us prepare for the big games that will come later this season and in the playoffs."

"Hirschi had a couple of chances to get into the end zone late in the game and our defense stepped up and made the plays for us," said Nelms. "That's what you want when the game is on the line. You want your 11 players on defense to all do their job and that's what we did. In the second half we held Hirschi to only a field

Hirschi." Look for another big effort from the Hawk defense this week against Gainesville.

The Leopards are led by junior quarterback Nick Buker, senior tailback Zach Haverkamp and junior fullback Stanley Bigger.

And speaking of bigger, that's what the Leopard offensive line is. Gainesville will line up a pair of 260lb. tackles, their guards are 240 and 250-lbs., with their center being the light weight at 210-lbs.

"They're real big up front," Nelms added. "They like to run the football and up to this point they haven't been able to move the football through the air. We're going to make them beat us by throwing the ball. They've got two real good backs in Haverkamp and Bigger. The Haverkamp kid made it to the State Finals in the 400 meter dash last year and ran a 10.6 100meter earlier in the year, so he has excellent speed. Bigger is another one of those backs we have to contain or he can hurt you, too.'

The Leopards have only one starter that plays both offense and defense, so they might be a bit fresher than most of the other teams they

No rate increase for city residents

Iowa Park residents are not fac- caused by the reports which stated, ing a rate increase for their water next year, but wholesale consumers are, Park not having a backup system." according to Mike Price, city administrator.

The city council had earlier accepted Price's recommendation to not raise local customer rates, even for water purchased from there by Iowa Park.

Aldermen, during Monday night's regular council meeting, instructed Price to develop a revision in water rates charged to two wholesale customers, Sereno Lago Adventures and Wichita Valley Water Supply Corporation, for the coming

Wichita Falls recently announced it was increasing the price of water purchased by Iowa Park by a whopping 261 percent, as of Oct. 1.

The city is currently paying \$0.9433 per thousand gallons, and the new rate will be \$2,4604, Price ceives water from Iowa Park's surexplained to the council.

However, media reports coming out of Wichita Falls have caused considerable confusion, and Price says he has received numerous calls from residents concerning what they would be charged for water next year.

"The city will attempt to absorb Price stated.

Water purchased from Wichita Falls normally amounts to only five percent of all the water used by Iowa Park customers. However, this year's drought has created an increase in that figure to 14 percent, Price said. Price explained the confusion

"The increase was largely due to Iowa Wichita Falls is our backup

system," Price stated, adding that Iowa Park is the only community facing an increase, while all other Wichita Falls wholesale customers though Wichita Falls is hiking its rate will actually experience a cost decrease next year.

Wichita Falls agreed to allow Iowa Park to purchase water whenever needed during the early 1970s, when all three of Iowa Park's lakes were dry.

Following that agreement, Iowa Park built a 16-inch transmission line from Wichita Falls, and purchases water through it only when the local treatment plant's capacity is exceeded.

Sereno Lago, which is the development at Horseshoe Lake, takes its water directly from that transmis-

School's needs are discussed

There are needs on each campus in the school district, but the lack of classroom space at the high school and the junior high band hall and science labs are the most pressing.

This was the consensus of the facility committee in a report given during the regular meeting of the school board Thursday night.

The committee, made up of board members Jeff Watts, Martha Dudley and Randy Alsup, had toured the schools during the day while classes were being held.

They said there is a definite need for extra classrooms at the high school. "Touring the schools while kids are in the classrooms is quite an eye opener," one committee member

In addition to building needs, it was pointed out that lack of air conditioning in some areas is a problem, especially with school starting in mid-August. Also, repairs and maintenance should be taken into consider-

The committee was asked to pri- make recommendations which are oritize the needs and compare them with recommendations from the Facility Task Force and Marr's Archi-

In addressing air conditioning needs at the high school, Russell Guyette recommended replacing the 28-year-old units in the auditorium and library. He told the trustees that replacement parts were difficult to find and very expensive. He said that new units would pay for themselves in energy efficiency.

In the open forum portion of the meeting, Susan Osmon, whose fifth grade son has a pierced ear, asked the board to consider changing the district's dress code policy to allow all students to wear earrings. She cited examples of men in the

15th and 16th centuries wearing earrings while women didn't, and many of the sports figures kids look up to also wear earrings. Board President Keith Fisher told

Mrs. Osmon that the dress code committee could consider her request when it meets next spring.

The dress code committee, made up of teachers, students and parents, submitted to the school board for final approval.

Mrs. Osmon concluded by saying she had given her son permission to pierce his ear, and now she felt it was her duty to defend his right to wear an earring.

Following Mrs. Osmon, Lee Pelz told board members how Tom Burnett Memorial Library would soon get on the internet through the TIF grant, and the possibility of forming a community network with the schools and

Martha Dudley was appointed to serve as the board's Legislative Liaison to the TASB School board Advocacy Network. The Network will include at least one school board member from every school district in Texas. The network is designed to enable the local school boards to become well-informed and effective advocates for public education through the legislative process.

Banana Bread

1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour 2/3 cup sugar 2 tsps. baking powder 1/2 tsp. baking soda 1/4 tsp. salt

1 cup mashed ripe banana (2 to 3 medium bananas) 1/3 cup shortening, margarine, or butter

2 Tbsps. milk 2 eggs

1/4 cup chopped nuts Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

In a large mixer bowl combine 1 cup of the flour, the sugar, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. Add mashed banana; shortening, margarine or butter, and milk. Beat with an electric mixer on low speed till blended, then on high speed for 2 minutes. Add eggs and remaining flour; beat till blended. Stir in nuts.

Pour batter into a greased 8x4x2inch loaf pan. Bake in a 350 degree oven 55 to 60 minutes or till a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes on a wire

rack. Remove from the pan; cool thoroughly on a wire rack. Wrap and store overnight before slicing. Makes 1 loaf (16 servings).

Salt Dough Ornaments

(Will burn if oven is too hot!) 1/2 cup salt

2 cups flour 3/4 cup boiling water

Place salt in a bowl, pour boiling water over salt and stir; then let cool. Add flour (all at once) and mix well by forming a ball and kneading the dough until it is smooth, soft and workable. Roll out dough on a floured surface if necessary. Cut out whatever shapes desired. Then carefully insert a piece of wire into the top of the ornament, pushing the long end into the center of the ornament until loop rests on the top of the shape. Transfer completed ornaments with wire onto baking sheet covered with foil. Place in a 150-200 degree oven and bake until ornaments become completely hard. When cool, paint ornaments or personalize with markers. To prevent ornaments from bulging, use a toothpick to prick small holes into the shapes before baking. Makes many ornaments.

Gingersnaps Grandpa's Favorite!

2 1/4 cups all-purpose flour 1 cup packed brown sugar 3/4 cup shortening or cooking oil 1/4 cup molasses

1 egg 1 tsp. baking soda 1 tsp. ground ginger 1 tsp. ground cinnamon

1/2 tsp. ground cloves

1/4 cup sugar Preheat oven to 375 degrees In mixing bowl combine about

half of the flour, the brown sugar, shortening, molasses, egg, baking soda, ginger, cinnamon, and cloves. Beat with an electric mixer on medium to high speed till thoroughly combined. Beat in remaining flour.

Shape dough into 1-inch balls. Roll in sugar. Place 2 inches apart on an ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 8 to 10 minutes or till set and tops are crackled. Cook cookies on a wire rack. Makes about 48 cookies.

Grandpa John's **Chocolate Chip Cookies**

Super Yummy! 1 1/2 cup packed light brown sugar

1 1/3 cup granulated sugar

1 1/2 tsp. salt 1 1/2 tsp. baking soda

1 cup butter

1 cup shortening

5 eggs

7 dozen.

6 1/2 cups sifted cake flour 24 oz. semi-sweet chocolate morsels

Cream together sugars, salt, baking soda, butter and shortening; beat well. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well. Add flour, mixing well after each cup. Add chocolate morsels. Drop the dough using a small ice cream scoop into baking pans lined with baking papers. Bake at 360 degrees 10 to 12 minutes. Cool 5 minutes in pans before removing to a cooling rack. Makes approximately

Speed Bumps

For the most part, our street department does a pretty fair job at keeping our streets and roads in good repair. I one area, however, they seem to excel: building obstacles across streets.

A few years ago, the railroad repaired the siding tracks across Victoria Street, and in the process they raised the tracks six or eight inches above street level. City crews were left to build the ramp leading up to the tracks and back down to the road. Instead of spreading the gradient across 10 or 15 feet on each side. the transition was made in about three feet, thus creating one of the larger speed bumps in town. It's still there;

experience it for yourself.

Just recently, most of Ruby Street was torn up and replaced, and the result is a fine-looking road -- but use extreme caution if you try to drive it. Not one, but THREE storm drains were built across the road, each one so deep and so abrupt that signs have had to be erected to warn unwary drivers. There are already scrape marks on the concrete where vehicles have hit the pavement. Why weren't the drains run under the street while it was torn up? If it was really necessary that they cross over the road, why wasn't the gradient spread out enough to avoid damaging vehicles moving at the speed limit?

Maybe the folks who plan these

things need to be reminded that STREETS EXIST FOR THE PUR-POSE OF MOVING TRAFFIC! Obstacles defeat that purpose. Speed bumps are sometimes desirable for controlling speeds in parking lots, but on through streets they are unwanted and unnecessary obstacles. Any sign that reads "DIP - 15 MPH" is a sure indication of poor planning somewhere. Motorists should be able to move at the posted speed limit without having to worry about losing control or damaging their car because of obstacles built into the road.

We'll probably have to live with the obstacles we already have, but one can only hope there will be fewer of them in the future. Ken Edwards

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

AUSTIN - "Increasingly minority" and "increasingly poor" are adjectives the Texas Education Agency used in its report released last week describing Texas' public school population.

Minority and poor students also are increasingly moving out of urban, inner-city schools and into predominantly white suburban school districts, the report showed.

"That really caught our eye," agency spokeswoman Debbie Graves Ratcliffe told the Austin American-Statesman.

"I think it may be that more minorities are entering the middle class and following the middle class to the suburbs.

During the 1997-98 school year, the number of minority (African American, Hispanic and Asian) students made up 55 percent of the 3.9 million Texas public school students, the eighth consecutive year minorities comprised 50 percent or more of all public school students.

The number of minority school students also is growing at a rate eight times faster than that for white students, the report said.

But the growth rate that stands out the most in Texas is that of economically disadvantaged students, which at 65 percent is the most of any population group tracked in the report.

Economically disadvantaged students now account for 48 percent of all Texas public school students, compared to 35 percent in

Students are classified as economically disadvantaged if they are eligible for U.S. Department of Agriculture meal programs offered at schools, through which children from low-income families receive free or low-cost breakfasts and lunches.

Bomer OKs Code Changes

Texas Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer has adopted, on an emergency basis, a citizen advisory committee's recommended changes in the state's new coastal building code for windstorm resistant construction.

Without Bomer's emergency action, changes in the code likely would take 60 to 90 days because of public notice and public hearing requirements.

Bomer said he planned to follow those requirements and consider permanent adoption of code changes that would:

- Increase eave-to-eave roof span of one and two-story buildings from 36 to 48 feet.
- Allow builders to connect building components, such as wall studs, top plates and sole plates with plywood sheathing, appropriately nailed to assure resistance to uplift from hurricane-force winds.
- Add new provisions giving builders guidance on the design of recessed front entryways.

New homes built to the new code will qualify for Texas Windstorm Insurance Association wind and hail insurance premium discounts to be set by Bomer.

Other Capital Highlights

■ With the voluntary assistance of Texas newspaper publishers, Texas Secretary of State Alberto Gonzales is conducting an essay contest in which school children will write on the topic, "Why My Parents Should Vote." Winning entries will be published in newspapers and displayed at the state Capitol. On Sept. 8, Gonzales certified the ballot for the Nov. 3 general election.

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AG AGENT'S REPORT

Validation Updates

As fall approaches there are several events that are getting underway. Football season is in full swing, school is back in session, and one of these days it will get cooler.

And, as we are getting cooler, we start thinking about putting wheat into the ground, and other fall crops.

We are also getting closer to fall fairs and starting a new show season with the livestock animals. As in years past, these animals that are being shown in major stock shows, and they need to be validated with the county validation committees.

We have already validated the steers for the 1999 show season, and have ordered tags for the lambs. So next on the agenda is the hogs.

If you are in FFA, you will need to tell your Ag teacher how many hog

tags you will need. If you are in 4-H, you will need to turn in your order to me at the Extension office. The cost of the tags is \$2.50 each, and each order must be turned in with payment. These orders are due on Sept.

For those of you that are not familiar with the validation process, or why we validate 4-H and FFA livestock projects, here is a quick explanation.

Several years ago the county Extension agents, Agriculture Science Teachers, and major stock shows got together and decided to validate the steers in the state of Texas. The validation process included taking a nose print, putting in an ear tag and taking a photo of the steer.

These three things were checked at major stock shows to verify the 4H or FFA exhibitor showed the same calf he or she started with in the spring. From there we have modified the steer validation process to include a blood test. The new blood test is being tested this year on steers and will be implemented for lambs and hogs next year.

After several years of the steer validation program, similar programs were started with the lambs and now the hogs. The lamb validation program is very similar to the steer program whereby, the lambs are nose printed, an ear tag is put into the ear, and a tattoo is also placed in the ear for identification. In contrast, the hog validation process only includes an ear tag and tattoo. Ear notches are also recorded on the official validation form.

We do have some confusion each year as to what hogs need to be validated. The hogs that will need to be validated are those that will be shown at a major stock show in Texas. These shows include Fort Worth, San Antonio, El Paso, Houston and San

So, if you are not planning to show at these shows, your hog does not have to be validated. You can only show barrows or male castrated hogs at these shows, so don't buy tags

Also, if you are showing a barrow at the county show, and have no intention of showing the barrow at a major stock show, you do not have to buy a validation tag.

My advice to all 4-H and FFA exhibitors is to validate each one of your barrows if you are planning to show at a major stock show in 1999. I have seen several cases in years past where a person only validated one barrow, and that barrow got sick, died, or did not turn out like the exhibitor thought he would, and wanted to show one of the other barrows in the pen. Well, if they're not validated, they don't show.

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Hawks hustle past Huskies, 21-17

Forget the idea of beating the crowd out of the parking lot on Friday nights following the Hawk football games.

There's no leaving mid-way through the fourth quarter so you can get home early.

In fact, in all three games so far, you've had to wait until the final seconds ticked off the clock just to see who won the

That's been the case in all three games the Hawks have played so far this season. The Hawks fell to Holliday in double overtime, then beat Burkburnett by seven with the Bulldogs having the ball with less than a minute to play and a chance to tie the game.

Last week, the Hawks played their home opener, and it was another case of keeping the fans on the edge of their seats until the very end.

Iowa Park beat Hirschi 21-17, but not before a goal-line stand in the game's final 57 seconds by the Hawks. Hirschi saw it's final chance at a win knocked away in the end zone on a fourth-and-goal pass play that was broken up by Scotty Mitchell.

The Huskies broke on top early on a seven-yard touchdown run by Jared Estus just 1:53 into the first quarter. Hirschi's score capped a five-play, 71-yard drive, all coming on the ground. Brandon Booker did most of the damage with runs of 14 and 54 vards in the drive.

Iowa Park took the ensuing kickoff and quickly answered the Huskies' touchdown with on of it's own with 7:11 left in the opening period on a two-yard run by Bryan Miller. Ross Dillard was again perfect on his extra points for the night to tie the game at 7-7.

The Hawks covered the 56 yards in seven plays, the biggest coming on a 24yard pass completion to Ryan Huff from Tyler Pulley that moved the ball to the two.

Just when the game looked like it was going to turn into a track meet with each team marching down the field every time it got the ball, the Iowa Park defense stiffened.

On the first play after the ensuing kickoff, Hirschi's quarterback Marvin Thompson ran for 36 yards, moving the ball to the Iowa Park 21. Four plays later, the Huskies had a first-and-goal from the Iowa Park nine. Three short runs by the Huskies left them with a fourth-and-goal from the two, and on fourth down, the Hawk defense rose to the occasion and stopped Hirschi at the one.



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and were moving the ball until Thomas Brake, who had caught a 13-yard pass from Toby Williams, fumbled while trying to pick up extra yardage, giving the ball back to the

Six plays later, Darrel Davis dove over from the two to make it 14-7 with 10:31 left in the second quarter.

After both teams traded punts twice, Iowa Park took over at mid-field with 1:26 left in the half.

After a controversy on a call made by an official which allowed the Hawks an extra down, Iowa Park kept a drive alive that culminated in an 11-yard touchdown pass from Pulley to Chase Wright on the final play of the first half to tie the game at 14-14.

In the third quarter, both teams again traded punts to start the second half. Following a Hirschi punt that gave the Hawks the ball at their own 43 with 4:55 left in the third, head coach Weldon Nelms went into his bag of tricks on a fourth-and-three play from mid-field.

The Hawks lined up in punt formation, but snapped the ball to one of the up men, Chris Simmons, who threw a perfect pass to Mitchell who was wide open, for a 27-yard gain. Three plays later, Miller scored his second touchdown of the game, this one on a four-yard run to put the Hawks on top 21-14 with 1:31 left in the third quarter.

In that third quarter, the Hawk defense led by K.C. Green, Brake, Wright and Dillard, held the Huskies to only 12 The Hawks took over from that point total yards and only one first down.

On the Huskies, first drive of the fourth quarter, Hirschi moved the ball to the Iowa Park 21 before the drive stalled, leaving a fourth-and six. Courtney Smith came on to kick a 37-yard Huskies at the Iowa Park 22 with 1:07 left in field goal to cut the Iowa Park lead to 21-17 with 6:46 left in the game.

With 3:04 left in the game, a Hirschi defender broke through the line and blocked a punt by Brake, giving the Huskies the ball at the Iowa Park 30.

A holding penalty on first down moved the ball back to the 40. Four plays later, the Huskies were left with a fourth-and-eight from the 28. Thompson found his split end, Jermaine Rankin, for an 11-yard completion, moving the ball to the Iowa Park 17. Two plays later the Huskies had a first-and-goal from the seven, with 1:16 left in the game.

On first down, Thompson lost three yards, then threw three straight incomplete passes, the last being knocked away in the end zone by Mitchell to preserve the win for the Hawks.

Wright led the Hawks in rushing with 85 yards on seven carries. Pulley completed four-often passes for 59 yards to lead the Hawks in the
