Hawks hosting Coyotes Friday

Let's see here. Gainesville beat Wichita Falls High School 6-0 two weeks ago and then Iowa Park beat Gainesville 27-6 last week, so that means the Hawks should beat the Coyotes 33-0 this week. Right?

And since the Coyotes beat Vernon 24-17 last week, that means Iowa Park should kill the Lions when the two teams meet later in the season. Right?

It would be nice if that's the way things would work out, but it doesn't always happen like that.

After the Coyotes looked terrible against Gainesville two weeks ago, they turned things around in only one week and knocked off the sixth-ranked Lions 24-17.

"That win was no fluke," said Iowa Park head coach Weldon Nelms. "Old High just plain whopped Vernon. They blocked better, they tackled better and they ran tougher. They just outplayed Vernon. They looked like two entirely different football teams from the way they played against Gainesville. They came out flat and didn't play with any emotion against Gainesville, but they got after Vernon from the very start."

With a team that is as up and down as the Coyotes are, you have to wonder which team is going to show up this Friday night.

In their common opponent, Gainesville, the Hawks were far more dominate both offensively and defensively.

"The first half against Gainesville, we didn't look very sharp," said Nelms. "Defensively we couldn't seem to stop their fullback. In the Coyote game, they ran their tailback wide a lot more than they showed against us. We had worked

on stopping that and we did a good job. They started running off tackle and it worked for them.

"Offensively, we just didn't execute well in the first half," Nelms added. "We'd run a couple of plays well, then we'd have a breakdown. At halftime we talked about being more consistent. We put in a new formation that opened some things for us that worked well. Our offensive line did a better job of coming off the ball and we just wore them down, I think."

This week against the Coyotes, Iowa Park will again have it's hands full in preparation for Old High.

The Coyotes have been running the option and running it well, according to Nelms.

"Old High runs the option a lot like Rice does," Nelms said. "Their quarterback is a sophomore that can run and can throw the ball well on the run, so he's going to put a lot of pressure on our secondary to read if it's a run or pass. They have a real big fullback that runs hard. He's big and strong and also blocks well for them.

Then they have a pair of halfbacks with great speed."

"The option is tough to defend," said Nelms. "You have to be able to stop the dive, they keep the pitch and the pass on every play and if you don't, they can come up with a big play. They're a very young team and that's a little scary. They are going to get better every week and they looked good last week against Vernon."

When coach Nelms said young, he meant young.

The Coyotes only start two seniors on offense and start one sophomore. Defensively Old High starts only three seniors and has three sophomores in the starting lineup.

Offensively the Coyotes are led by sophomore quarterback Greg Henderson. Joining Henderson in the backfield are tailbacks Freddie Johnson and Anwar Bell, both 180-lb. juniors, along with Mike Morris, the big 250-lb. junior fullback. The Coyote offensive line averages over 220-lbs. and five plays start both ways.

Defensively, the Coyotes are led

by Bell at strong safety, along with Morris at defensive tackle and Tyler Ashley at linebacker.

Whoop-T-Do looks to be real whopper

To no one's surprise, this year's Whoop-T-Do celebration will be the largest ever in its history.

The event, coordinated annually by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, will be held Saturday, Oct. 24, in conjunction with Iowa Park High School's homecoming.

And, because this year marks the 100th anniversary of the school district, the largest crowd ever to attend that weekend's activities has prompted greater participation with Whoop-T-Do booths.

At Monday's monthly meeting of the Chamber's board of directors, Secretary Susan Dillard reported she had already scheduled 28 non-profit organization booths, and eight of those organizations had never sponsored a Whoop-T-Do booth in the past.

In addition, 12 arts and craft booth spaces have been reserved, an increase from 10 already and more expected.

By tradition, only non-profit organizations based within the school district are allowed to have booths at the Whoop-T-Do.

Those booths are allocated along the streets of Cash and Wall. Oct. 22 has been set as the deadline booths can be reserved without deposit penalty, it was decided Monday.

Besides the booths, the featured area this centennial year will be a large tent, which will be located on the grounds of the First Christian Church.

Housed in the tent will be an extensive collection of photos, articles and various items representing the school's 100 years of existence.

Whoop-T-Do was originally established to provide an activity for former students who returned to

participate in homecoming, who previously had nothing planned between Friday night's football game and Saturday night's Ex-Students' Association banquet.

Other business discussed during Monday's board meeting included tourism, a home page on internet, officer election, and renting of the Chamber building.

Chamber President Robert Palmer told the board that he and Mrs. Dillard had attended a meeting of the Red River Tourism Committee which was held the previous Friday.

He showed a booklet that is distributed over the state promoting the Red River areas of interest, and suggested Iowa Park should be included in the next issue.

Though many local residents may not realize Iowa Park has features of interest to tourists, Palmer stated the community's three lakes and the Tom Burnett Memorial Library are major attractions.

Mike Caplinger, superintendent of schools, asked if Iowa Park had a home page on the internet. The discussion which followed included interest of the directors to create such a page.

A committee which includes directors Glenna Via, Cindy Clifton and Joe Hughes is to nominate new officers and directors for 1999, and their nominations will be voted on during the Chamber's all-membership luncheon meeting in November.

Education Coop open for business

Monday was the first day of classes at Texoma Education Center Cooperative, a facility made possible through the joint efforts of the Iowa Park, Holliday, Electra and City View school districts.

The center, located in Iowa Park, furnishes an alternative education program for students in grades five through 12 who have difficulty adjusting to the regular education setting. They can be referred to the center for persistent misconduct, drugs, alcohol, weapons, felony and other violations.

In addition, the facility will serve as a means of meeting the state mandate that says students who are charged with or commit crimes classified as a felony or other serious breaches of the Student Code of Conduct be placed in an alternative education placement (AEP) setting.

With the exception of special education students, the campus administrators will refer all students to the center. An ARD committee will refer special education students. Students may be referred to the center after the student has failed to comply

with the discipline measures employed by the classroom teacher and school administrators. Any student referred will spend at least six weeks at the center.

Electra Superintendent Don Windham, who has been selected to serve as chairman of the program, said the program is not just a way to punish students but has the task of working with students so they can function properly in the regular education program at their home cam-

Mrs. Singer reported on the summer workshops held in Paducah July 28, which were attended by Mmes. Singer, Watson and Soell, along with Judy Silvers of Amity Study Club.

New yearbooks were distributed and two new members, Paula King and Jo Ann Hale, were recognized.

Following the business meeting, members adjourned to the River Bend Nature Works in Lucy Park.

Mrs. Johnson introduced Peggy Nunn of Wichita Falls, a member of Native Plant Society of Texas, who presented a program on "Wildflowers."

Mrs. Nunn demonstrated a number of native plants and wildflowers of this area and described methods of using them in gardening and landscaping. She urged members to consider participating in the native plant movement, and distributed flower seeds and descriptive literature for club members to take home.

Following this presentation, the group was taken on a tour of the River Bend Nature Works by a Nature Bend volunteer guide. They observed many native plants, wildflowers, and trees in their native habitat.

The guide said that scheduled tours are conducted beginning in the latter part of September each year, and that last year approximately 5,000 area school children participated in the tours.

CWF members from First Christian Churches in Wichita Falls, Burkburnett and Henrietta have been invited to the next meeting on Oct. 5.

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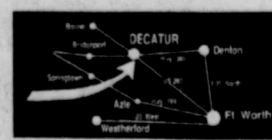


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Hummingbird Cake

3 cups flour
2 cups sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
1 tsp. cinnamon
3 eggs
1 1/2 cups oil
1 1/2 tps. vanilla
1 - 8 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained
2 cups mashed bananas
1 1/2 cups chopped pecans

Frosting
18 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1/2 cup margarine
1 - 16 oz. box powdered sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup chopped pecans

pan over low heat, stirring constantly. Pour over cake. Sprinkle with chocolate chips and half of pecans. Pour remaining batter over pecans. Sprinkle with remaining pecans. Bake 20 minutes or a little longer.

Pineapple Cake

2 cups flour
2 cups sugar
2 tps. soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1 - #2 can crushed pineapple
2 eggs

Mix dry ingredients; add pineapple and eggs and mix. Bake in greased and floured 9x13-inch pan 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Icing:

1 1/2 cups sugar
1 1/2 cups coconut
1 small can evaporated milk
1/2 stick margarine
1/2 cup chopped pecans

Mix all ingredients and cook three minutes. Pour over hot cake.

Dump Cake

1 can cherry pie filling
1 can crushed pineapple

1 box yellow cake mix
1 stick margarine, melted
In a 9x13-inch pan dump cherries and pineapple. Sprinkle cake mix on top and pour on melted margarine. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees.

For variety, sprinkle with chopped nuts or coconut during last 10 minutes of baking time.

Heavenly Cake

Prepare a chocolate cake mix according to directions on package and bake in a 9x13-inch pan.

Cream 8 ounces of cream cheese and add 1 cup powdered sugar and 1 1/2 cups Cool Whip. Spread over cooled cake.

Mix vanilla pudding and chocolate pudding with 3 cups cold milk. Let stand for a few minutes, then spread over the cheese mixture. Spread the rest of the Cool Whip on top. Top with a can of flaked coconut. Refrigerate at least 6 hours before serving.

Show Stopper

1 box yellow butter cake mix
1/2 cup butter, melted
4 eggs
1 1/2 cups chopped dates
3/4 cup chopped pecans
3 1/2 cups (1 lb.) powdered sugar, sifted
1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
1 tsp. vanilla

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine cake mix, butter and 2 of the eggs; blend well. Spread in well greased 9x13-inch pan. Sprinkle with dates and nuts; press into cake mix. Mix powdered sugar, cream cheese, remaining eggs and vanilla. Spread on top of dates and nuts. Bake 40-50 minutes or until golden brown. Cake will sink in middle. Refrigerate.

2 - 4 oz. pkg. chopped pecans

Prepare cake mix according to directions. Pour half the batter into greased 9x13-inch pan. Bake 15 minutes in a 350 degree oven. Melt caramels with milk and butter in sauce-

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As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



During Friday's trip to and from Gainesville, I complained to myself about that stretch of Hwy. 82 between Henrietta and Nocona being only two lanes, while all the rest of the trip was on divided four lanes.

My complaining was loudest on the return trip, which was during the darkness of night time. Because we were meeting a lot of east-bound traffic, I had to keep my headlights on dim, and that made all those curves difficult to see.

The next morning, I learned that I wasn't the only one who had a concern about that stretch of road.

I got my copy of the *Nocona News* in the mail Saturday, and my old buddy-type publisher friend Tracy Mesler's lead story featured Hwy. 82.

It seems that on Thursday, two buses had been chartered for a delegation from Nocona to travel to Austin for a meeting with the Texas Department of Transportation, concerning Hwy. 82 and its need to be widened.

As far back as 1972, residents of Northern Montague County imposed a special tax on themselves to raise half a million dollars to finance their

share of the widening project.

That money has been sitting in a special account since then, just waiting for the state to make its commitment.

Continued delay in TexDot's part is feared to cost Montague residents even more money, Mesler pointed out. That's because their fund is for purchasing right of way, and the value of land continues to increase.

Montague folks have been told each year that other highway projects in the state have received higher rankings during the past 26 years,

thus pushing their project onto the back burner.

It seems to me all they need is for the power structure of Wichita Falls to speak in their behalf. They've got the political pull, as indicated by re-

Maybe Iowa Park needs to schedule future games that don't require driving on Hwy. 82... until that stretch of road gets the attention it has from Nocona to Sherman.

It likely wouldn't make any difference to the folks down in Austin, but it sure would make my driving fears easier.

Council meeting Monday appears to be long session

City aldermen face a possibly lengthy session when they meet Monday night, according to the tentative agenda which has been released.

Included on the agenda are a public appearance, three resolutions, two ordinances, all of which is to be followed by an executive session.

The regularly-scheduled meet-

ing is to get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Steven Raby has requested time for a public appearance, in which he will seek permission to use the old Recreational Activities Center building as a haunted house next month.

The resolutions include:

* reserving Lake Gordon from 8 a.m. Friday, Oct. 9 until 1 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 10, for KidFish, and prohibiting public fishing during that period;

* authorizing the city administrator to purchase three computer work stations and a printer for the police department;

* writing off bad debts for the year.

Both ordinances, if approved, would accept replating of lots in two subdivisions.

The executive session is being called "... for the purposes of private consultation with legal counsel on any or all subjects and matters authorized by law," under the subtitle of "threatened litigation: United States Department of Labor vs. City of Iowa Park."

Aldermen will consider approving settlement offers with members of the police department, and if they approve, will resume the meeting in public order to do so.

to the county jail. But Officer Frazier reportedly will be unable to work for a period of time.

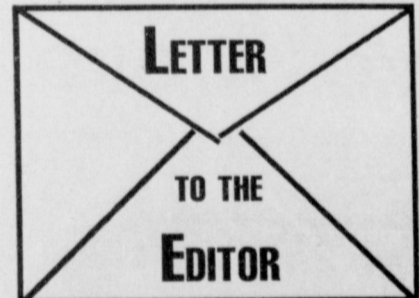
Jimmy Shane Onstead, 27, was arrested at 2:53 a.m. Saturday in the 100 block of East Highway, on a charge of public intoxication.

Serving as director of the center is Rosie Flanigan, known for her talent in working with youth, and a lady who is dedicated to the education and well-being of the students.

Mrs. Flanigan was formerly director of student personnel services for Wichita Falls ISD. She has held positions in that school district from math teacher to assistant principal, Hirschi High School Dean of Students, co-director of the district's summer school, director of the principals' assessment project and director of secondary personnel.

She has degrees from Grambling State University and Midwestern State University, and holds a mid-management certificate from MSU.

Mrs. Flanigan's staff at the center will consist of two other teachers, with one being certified in special education, and four aides. The aides come from each of the four member districts, and part of their responsibility is to transport students to the center.

Goals of the program include helping students learn, through functioning in a highly structured environment, to use skills that will enable them to become more successful academically and behaviorally in the normal school setting.

The school will provide students with the opportunity to continue their academic program, to receive individual and group counseling, to engage in activities to improve self-concept, and to become aware of the juvenile justice system.

Individual and group counseling will be an integral part of the program, and personnel from the juvenile probation department in Wichita Falls, students from Midwestern State University, and DPS Trooper Joe Clement have agreed to work with the students.

Mrs. Flanigan and her staff have been busy the last several weeks getting the inside of the building ready for classes. She bought cans of paint on sale and everyone pitched in and helped her paint the rooms. Carpet, donated by the Electra school district, was laid free of charge by another volunteer.

They also brought furniture and decorative items from their homes to dress up some of the rooms.

The four school districts have donated items such as dividers for classrooms, a computer, TV-VCR's,

desks, globes, and teaching materials.

Mrs. Flanigan said many other items are needed such as vertical blinds for the front windows, a small refrigerator, office furniture, paneling, floor mats, books of interest to

secondary students, nursing supplies and liquid soap.

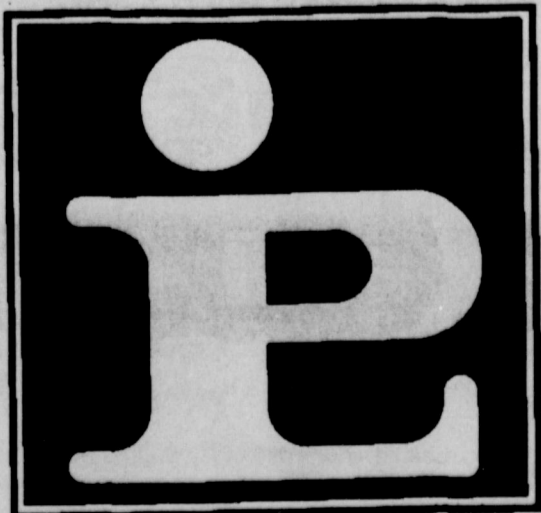



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Mean Green clobbers Leopards, 27-6

A true sign of a good coach and a good football team is how they make adjustments as the game progresses.

With all the scouting and film every team has on each of its opponents, it comes down to the team that can make adjustments, normally at halftime that sometimes decides the outcome of many football games.

That was never more evident than Friday night in Gainesville as the Hawks snapped a 0-0 tie at the half and went on to win big 27-6 to improve to 3-1 for the season, with only one game remaining before the start of district play.

Iowa Park couldn't find an answer to the Leopards' fullback Stanley Biggers in the first half as Gainesville rolled up 112 yards rushing in the first two periods, with Biggers gaining 86 on 15 carries. At the same time, the Leopard defense had held the high-powered Hawk offense, which had been averaging over 30 points per game, scoreless with only four first downs and 62 total yards, all on the ground in the first half.

Gainesville appeared to be on the way to the game's first points on the second play of the second quarter. The Leopards had driven the ball to the Iowa Park one and were facing a third-and-goal from that point. To no one's surprise, the ball went to Biggers, who was met in the hole by Ross Dillard and Ryan Huff who knocked the ball loose. Iowa Park's Scotty Mitchell recovered at the Hawk two to end the Leopards scoring threat.

Later in the second quarter, James Williams recovered another fumble by the Leopards to end another scoring threat, with 2:44 left in the half.

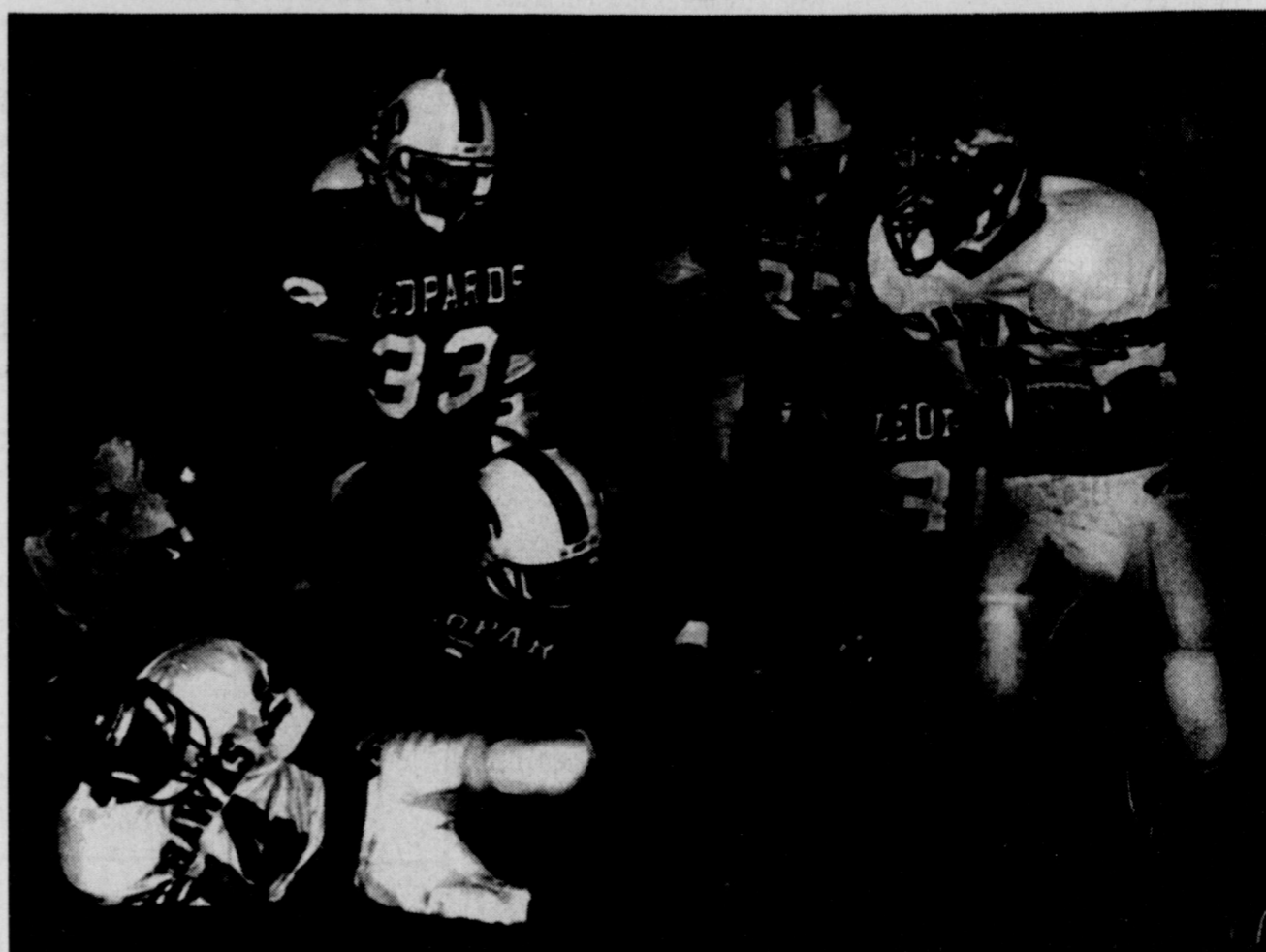
The Hawk offense never really threatened in the first half, crossing midfield only once.

But the second half was a whole new ballgame.

Not only did the Hawk defense come up with an answer to the Leopards' offense, the Iowa Park offense came alive on its first possession of the second half.

On third-and-14 from the Gainesville 24, Tyler Pulley found a wide open Anthony St. James for a 71-yard pass that moved the ball to the Leopard five. St. James had worked his way behind the Gainesville defenders and was off to the races before being caught from behind.

Two plays later the Hawks were on the board. Chase Wright headed left, but fumbled the ball into the end zone, where Bryan Miller pounced on it for the touch-

down, giving Iowa Park a 6-0 lead. Ross Dillard tacked on the point after to make the score 7-0 with 9:29 left in the third quarter. This was the second time in four games that Wright has had the ball knocked free heading into the end zone, with Miller recovering both times for the touchdown.

On the Leopards' next series, Mitchell again came up with a big play, intercepting a pass, giving the Hawks the ball at their own 36. On the ensuing kickoff, Duerson recovered a Gainesville fumble, giving the ball back over to the Hawks at the Leopard

37 with 5:12 left to play. Exactly three minutes later, Huff found the end zone to end the scoring on a four-yard run, to make the final score 27-6. The big play of the drive was a 22-yard run by Miller.

The Hawk defense, which had allowed 112 yards rushing in the first half, held the Leopards to a minus three yards rushing in the second half and to only 36 total yards in the second half. Gainesville finished the night with 148 total yards while the Hawks finished with 303, with 241 of those yards coming in the second half.

Duerson led Iowa Park in rushing with 83 yards on 16 carries, followed by Miller with 63 yards on eight carries, Wright with 60 yards on 10 carries, and Huff with 44 yards on seven tries.

Iowa Park attempted only one pass in the game, the 71-yarder to St. James from Pulley.

team ready to play defensively," said Nelms. "I think we're going to have to come out and be more balanced than we were last week.
