A lot of Iowa Park area families will have an inexpensive Thanksgiving dinner again this year, compliments of local businesses.

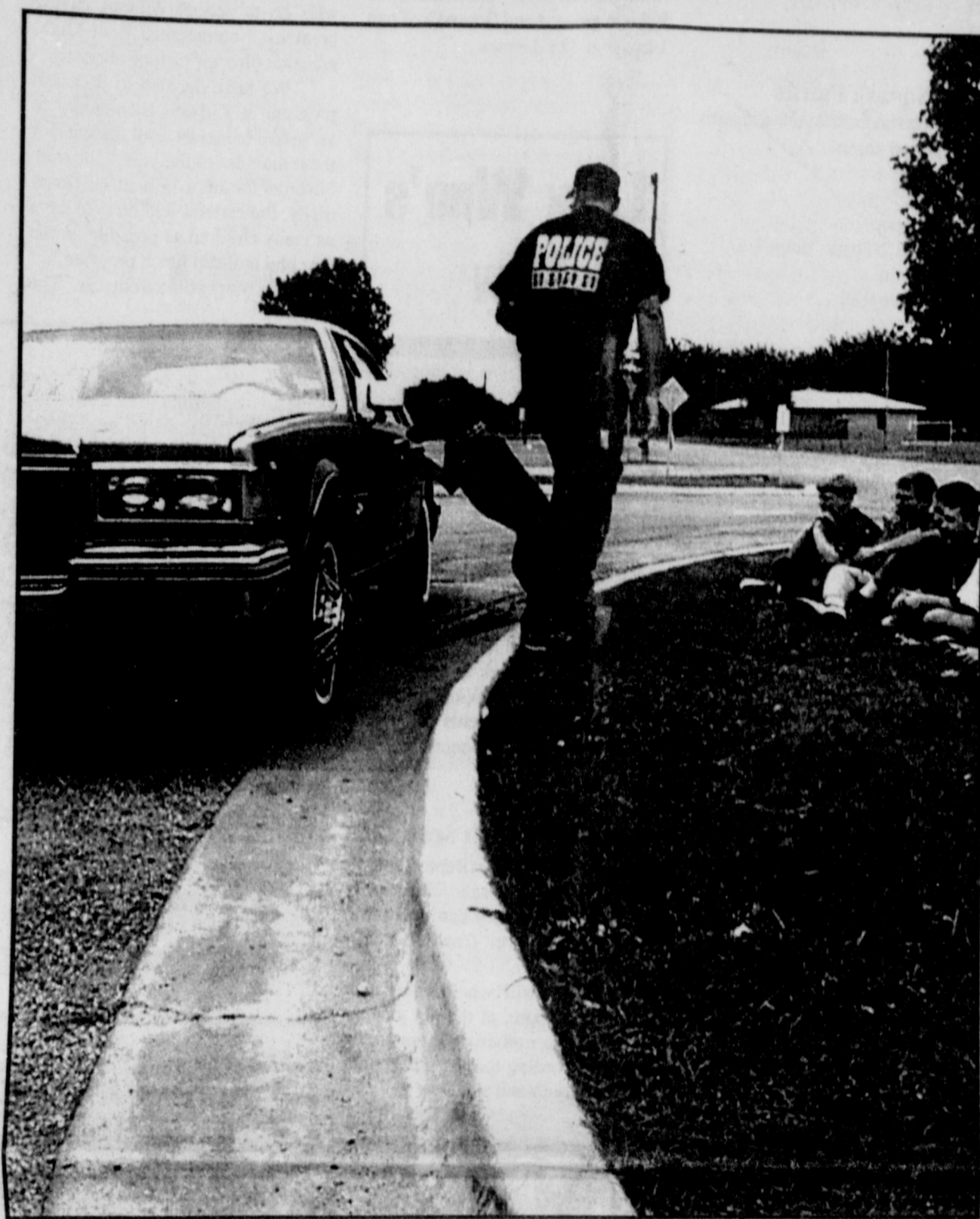
The Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce has again coordinated a free Thanksgiving turkey drawing.

Hawks face important contest with Graham

Heading into the final week of the regular season, two of the three playoff spots have already been decided.

The Childress Bobcats, 7-2 overall and 4-0 in district play, are the District 5-3A Champions and will advance to the State Playoffs as the number one team in the Small School Division.

The Vernon Lions, 7-2 overall and 3-1 in district play, will be going into the playoffs as the Large School Division representative.

That only leaves one spot yet to be determined and two teams with playoff hopes still alive.

They are Iowa Park at 6-3 overall and 2-2 in district play and Bowie 5-4 overall and also 2-2 in league play. The Hawks will play host to Garham Friday at 7:30 p.m. at Hawk Stadium, while Bowie will play host to Vernon. Childress eliminated Graham from any playoff hopes with a 47-28 win last Friday night in Graham.

For the Hawks to keep their playoff streak alive, Iowa Park must beat Graham and have either a Vernon win, or a Bowie win by no more than one point over the Lions.

An Iowa Park win coupled with

a Vernon win is simple. Both teams advance to the playoffs, Vernon with a 4-1 record and Iowa Park with a 3-2 mark.

Should Iowa Park win and Bowie win by only one point, that would leave all three teams with a 3-2 mark. You would then go to a total point differential between the three teams involved. Vernon beat Iowa Park by 13 and would lose to Bowie by one, making the Lions a plus 12. Iowa Park lost to Vernon by 13 but beat Bowie by 7, making the Hawks a minus 6. Bowie lost to Iowa Park by 7 but would beat Vernon by one, making them a minus 6. If two teams are tied, it reverts back to head-to-head with Iowa Park advancing because of the win over the Jackrabbits. A Bowie win by two or more would knock the Hawks out of the playoff picture regardless of the outcome of the Iowa Park-Graham game.

Confused???

If Iowa Park qualifies for the third playoff spot, the Hawks would take on Brady in the Bi-district round of the playoffs in either Abilene at Shotwell Stadium or in Sweetwater on either Friday or Saturday night depending on the availability of the facilities.

Following a tough road loss last week in Vernon, head coach Weldon Nelms has all the confidence that his team can bounce back and get the job done this week against Graham.

"This is definitely another championship week for us," Nelms

said. "Last week was a tough loss for us. We were just one play away from being right there. We jumped on them early, then they came back. Three times we were within a touchdown of tying the game and just never could seem to come up with the plays when we needed to."

Besides being a game with huge playoff implications, it is senior night with the seniors honoring their parents before the start of the game.

"We want to continue our playoff tradition," Nelms added. "Most of our seniors have been around playoff football for the last four seasons and they don't want their season to end at home this week. We have always played well at home and I expect another big effort from our players and fans as well. We need to come out like we did in the Henrietta game and jump on them early. Graham has already been eliminated from the playoff picture and if we get on them early we could take them out of their game. Graham has not played well on the road so far this season. We need to get the crowd involved early. This is going to be a tough game for Graham to prepare for mentally. They are just playing out the season right now."

The Steers come into the game at 2-7 overall and 1-3 in district play. Graham is averaging 19.6 points per game, but is allowing almost 27. Last week against Childress, the Steers allowed 278 yards rushing and gave

Election turnout low in area boxes

Iowa Park area voters didn't particularly overcrowd the voting polls Tuesday. But 810 of them did cast their ballots at the four voting precincts.

There were 580 votes cast in Precinct 32, 136 in Precinct 33, 30 in Precinct 34 and 64 in Precinct 35, according to the official figures.

More might have been cast in Precinct 33, had it not been for a mistake made by the County Clerks office.

That precinct's voting poll, according to the official document published, was to have been at Bradford Elementary. Instead, it was held at Faith Baptist Church.

Even the voting signs had been posted at the school's building, which were moved after Commissioner Gordon Griffith was notified of the error.

Marc Newman, the only Iowa Parkan on the ballot, was unopposed on the ballot in his bid as Pct. 3 Justice of the Peace. He received a total of 290 votes from the three boxes in his area.

Griffith was the only member of the five-person Wichita County Commissioners Court not on the ballot, having been re-elected last year.

Though Woody Gossom received the most votes in his bid for County Judge, he did not carry all four boxes in the Iowa Park area.

Aaron Alejandro out-gained him 290-280 in Pct. 32; 77-58 in Pct. 33; and 22-8 in Pct. 34. Gossom carried Pct. 35 by a 35-28 margin.

In another hotly-contested county race, that of County Clerk, Lloyd Lueck carried three of the four boxes over Lucille Hering: Pct. 32, 327-241; Pct. 33, 71-62; Pct. 35, 37-25. Hering won Pct. 33 by a narrow 16-14 margin, however.

Like the rest of the state, Gov. George W. Bush swept all four local boxes, 600-202.

Rick Perry narrowly edged out John Sharp in the four boxes, 413-371. The only local box Sharp carried was Pct. 33, 66-65.

Holliday's Charles Fennell likely suffered the greatest shock of the election, reportedly losing to first-time candidate Rick Hardcastle in their bid for State Representative of the 68th District.

Hardcastle carried two of the three boxes in the Iowa Park district: 73-62 in Pct. 33, and 16-14 in Pct. 34. The two candidates tied at 31-31 in Pct. 35.

The north side of Iowa Park is not within the 68th District.

In his first bid for a state office, David Farabee defeated Ron Buffum to be the 69th District State Representative.

However, Buffum narrowly carried the Pct. 32 box, 296-273.

Cryovac purchases large land tract

Cryovac Division, Sealed Air Corporation has completed the purchase of the 338.57 acres of land just west of its existing facility in Iowa Park.

The land, long known as the "Van Horn Property", is bounded by Johnson Road, US 287, Dennis Brooks' property on the west, and the railroad track.

The acquisition enhances Cryovac's long-term strategic capability for growth to provide rapid response to company customers.

Cryovac opened its first Texas plant in Iowa Park in 1975. Today, the plant has grown to over 500,000 square feet, approaching an employee level of 800, making it Sealed Air's second-largest packing operation in North America.

Lynda and Kelly both play recreational co-ed softball.

Almost all can be prepared in the crock pot, leaving little to cook at dinner time. The recipes for "squash patties" and "cinnamon carrots" are great ways to cook these vegetables to get kids to eat them, Lynda said.

Mur's Date Nut Cake is a recipe given to her by her late grandmother.

Sonja's Pork Chops and Rice

Approx. 5 pork chops
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can cream of celery soup
1 can cream of onion soup
1 can water
Cook all day in crock pot on LOW. Add cooked rice (amount up to you) to mixture along with 1 can new potatoes. Cook on HIGH approx. 15 minutes.

Hoppin' John

2 cups dried blackeyed peas
1/2 lb. salt pork
1 cup diced onion
1 cup sliced celery
1 bay leaf
1 can (1 lb.) tomatoes
4 cups water
4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1 cup uncooked rice
Soak peas overnight. Drain and combine peas, salt pork, onion, celery, bay leaf, tomatoes, water, salt and pepper in crock pot. Cover and cook on LOW 6-8 hours or until tender.

Cowboy Stew

2 lbs. ground beef
1 onion
1 large can ranch style beans
1 can hominy
1 can whole kernel corn
1 can (1 lb.) tomatoes
Salt
Pepper
Brown ground beef and onion. Add meat mixture and remaining ingredients to crock pot. Cook on LOW 6-8 hours.

Cinnamon Carrots

1/3 cup butter
1/2 cup sugar
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. cinnamon
Cream butter and sugar, add salt and cinnamon. Add 1/3 cup boiling water. Pour over dish of cleaned, sliced carrots. Cover and bake 1 1/2 hours at 350 degrees.

Chicken in a Pot

2 carrots, sliced
2 onions, sliced
2 celery stalks w/leaves, cut in 1" pieces
4 whole chicken breasts
2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
1/2 cup water or chicken broth
1/2 tsp. basil

Put carrots, onions and celery in bottom of crock pot. Add chicken. Top with salt pepper and liquid. Sprinkle basil over top. Cover and cook on LOW 8-10 hours.

Squash Patties

2 cups grated uncooked yellow squash
2 tsp. grated onion
2 tsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
1/4 cup plus 2 Tbsps. flour
2 eggs, beaten
2 Tbsps. margarine

Combine first five ingredients; cover; let stand 30 minutes. Drain. Add flour and eggs; stir well. Melt margarine in large skillet over medium heat. Drop squash mixture by tablespoons into hot margarine. Cook until golden brown, turning once.

Banana Bread

1/2 cup vegetable oil
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
3 bananas, mashed
2 cups flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
3 Tbsps. milk
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 cup nuts (optional)

Mix oil and sugar together. Blend in eggs and bananas. Blend flour, baking soda, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. Add flour mixture to banana mixture along with milk and vanilla. Beat well. Stir in nuts if desired. Bake in loaf pan 1 hour at 350 degrees.

Mur's Date Nut Cake

1 pkg. dates
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup shortening
1 egg
3 cups flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup nuts

Pour 1 1/2 cups boiling water over one package of dates. Let stand while creaming sugar and shortening then pour into date mixture. Add egg, flour, baking soda, vanilla and nuts. Bake in greased and floured loaf pan 1 hour at 325 degrees.

Kidwell offers free breakfast for remainder of school year

Free breakfasts will be available to all Kidwell Elementary students for the remainder of this school year.

The decision was made this week when all schools in the Iowa Park school district were participating in the state-wide Texas School Breakfast Week.

"During the course of the week, we found that there are some children who go to school without having breakfast," commented Beth Merk, assistant director of food services.

"We have decided to do a test program at Kidwell Elementary to serve free breakfast to all students for the remainder of the year," she said. "In order for this to be justified financially, the cafeteria will have to have as many children as possible on the free and reduced lunch program."

Mrs. Merk pointed out that, "The

more children who are on the program, and eating at school, the more state reimbursement the cafeteria will receive each month."

"This reimbursement is the only income the cafeteria will receive for breakfast. In order for the program to continue after this school year, we'll need to have a high amount of participation to offset the cost of preparing the breakfasts," she said.

Below is a chart showing which households are eligible to apply for free and reduced lunches. Any parent who would like to apply should contact Judy Williams at Kidwell Elementary, 592-4322, or Beth Merk at the Tax Office, 592-4254.

Also, parents are reminded that any time their income changes, they can reapply for free and reduced meals.

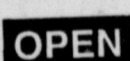

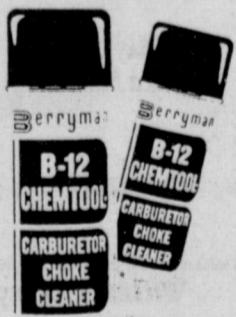

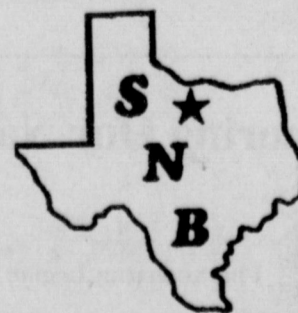

designated areas.

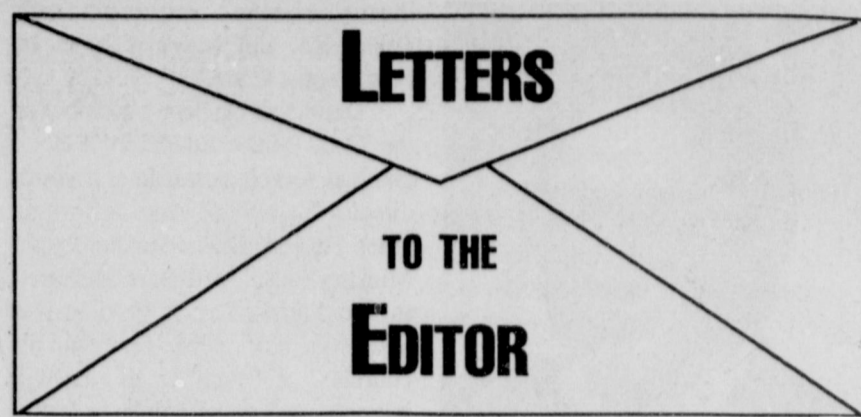
All community members are being encouraged to arrive by 9:50, as the flag-raising ceremony will begin promptly at 10:00.

The subject was taken to the police station, where a fine on the warrant, \$266, was paid, and then released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court on the local charge, according to the police blotter.

Patrisio Luna Ramirez, 42, was arrested at 1:40 a.m. Saturday on an outstanding warrant issued by the Wichita County sheriff's office, for aggravated assault - no bond. He was turned over to a deputy at 4:10 to be transported to jail.

A 16-year-old male was transported to a Wichita Falls hospital early Sunday morning for possible alcohol poisoning, after he reportedly had participated in a party at a residence in the 800 block of East Bank, according to the police blotter.

Searching for Irish roots has been very difficult and requires a good deal of initiative as so much of family details are sparse, but as more Irish local histories are compiled by historians who pour through church and land records, more information is becoming available to the family genealogist, so keep searching.

James C Ryan, Ph. D., an Irish research expert, and head of Bio Research Ireland, Ireland's biotechnology development program is the author of several books on Irish research. His latest compilation, "Irish Records: Sources for Family and Local History," is a large volume and has listings of genealogical record sources for each county in Ireland.

There is a record created in the late 18th century, when the linen board tried to encourage the growth of flax in Ireland. One enticement was the offer of a free spinning wheel for every acre of flax planted in the year 1796. The "1796 Spinning Wheel Premiums," a list of those who received spinning wheels, gives the name and parish of the residence of more than 52,000 persons. This is especially useful in northern Irish counties, where the linen industry was strongest.

Do you remember stories about spinning wheels or perhaps in some land records, an ancestor in America had listed yardage as a possession, they very well could have brought the spinning wheel with them when they immigrated.

Have you found among your Irish family records the name of a county ancestors originally came from, and can't find it on any maps? This may be because the name was written incorrectly, or remembered from pronunciation of the name given by an Irish speaking ancestor. Most place names were in Gaelic or derived from dialect. Also many other names

from the Scottish, Hueguenots, Palatine, Jewish and English were adopted by the Irish in the 17th and 18th centuries.

You may find the answer to your puzzles in "Irish Roots." If this book is not available in local libraries, this outstanding record is available (\$54.95 postpaid) from Ancestry, PO Box 990, Orem Ut. 84059; (800) Ancestry or on the Web at, <http://www.ancestry.com>.

Vernon outscores Hawks, 35-22

When the Iowa Park Hawks traveled to Vernon Friday night for the District 5-3A showdown, head coach Weldon Nelms said it was very important for his team to do two things.

One was jump out early, and that's exactly what they did. Toby Williams intercepted a Jason Klappenbach pass and returned it 75 yards for the game's first touchdown, with 6:50 left in the opening quarter to give Iowa Park a 7-0 lead. The play was set up by a big hit by K.C. Green that caused Klappenbach's pass to fall into the hands of Williams who outraced everyone for the score.

That was one of the things Nelms wanted to get accomplished. The other was to contain Chedrick Ricks, Vernon's big play man on offense.

Sometimes one-of-two is okay, but that was not the case Friday night.

In last year's game Ricks almost single handedly beat Iowa Park, rushing for 311 yards. In Friday's game, Ricks was held in check for the first half with only 92 yards and one touchdown, but exploded in the second half for 228 yards and two more touchdowns to finish with 320 total yards for the game.

It was Ricks, who got the Lions on the board with 4:21 left in the opening quarter, on a 35-yard run around his left end to tie the game at 7-7.

Vernon took the lead with just 1:17 left in the first half, at 14-7, following an Iowa Park fumble, when Klappenbach hit J.R. Holder for a 30-yard TD pass down the right sideline.

But trailing by only one touchdown and getting the ball to start the second half, the Hawks were very much still in the game. All they needed to do was to come out and mount a scoring drive to start the second half and the game would be back even.

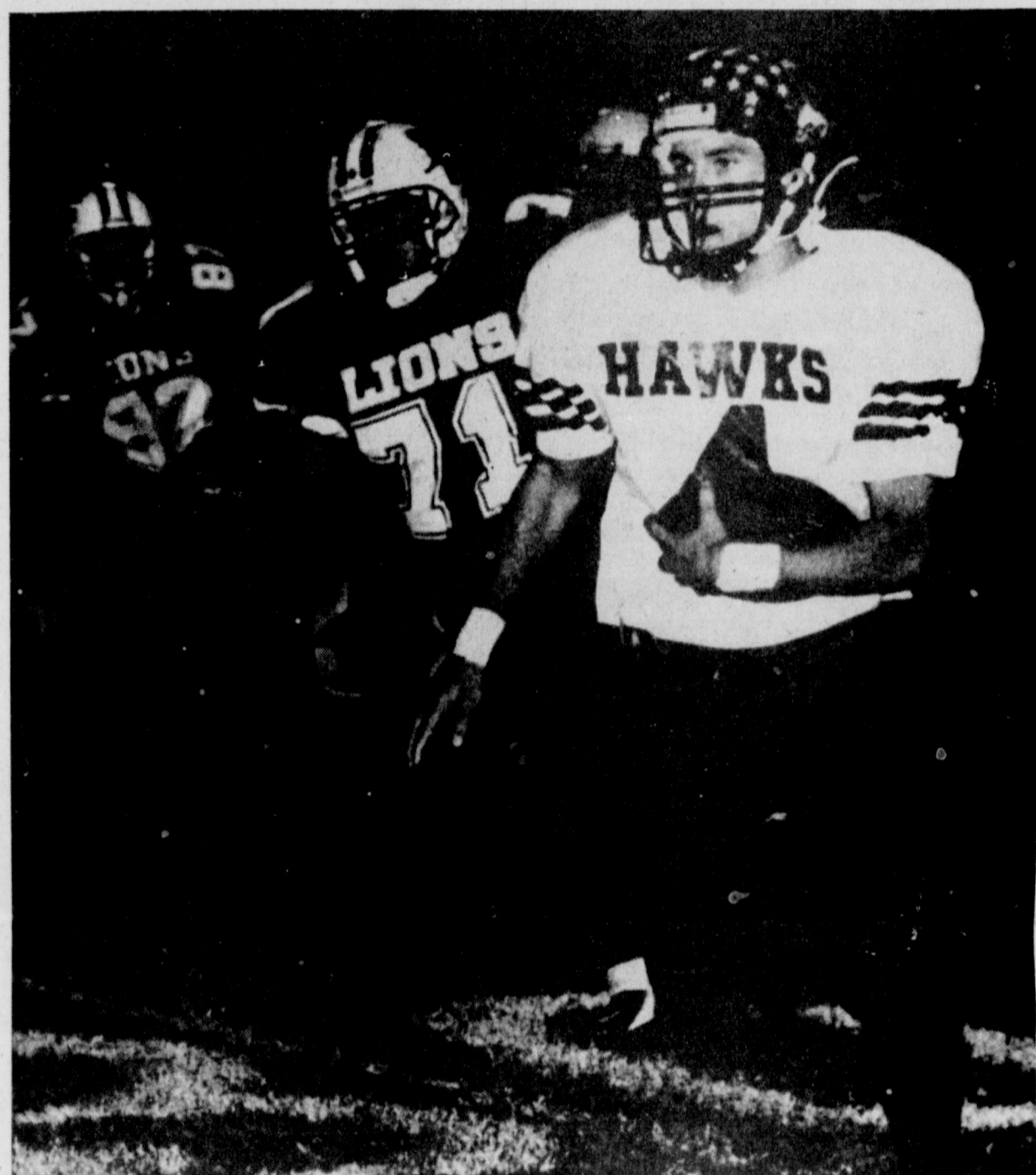
That was not the case, as the Lion defense forced the Hawks to punt after only three plays turning, the ball back over to Vernon at the Lion 35.

On the first play from scrimmage, Ricks broke free and rambled 65 yards for the touchdown to extend Vernon's lead to 21-7 with 10:06 left in the third period.

But the Hawks fought back. Russell Duggins recovered a Micky Ricks fumble at the Vernon six to put the Hawks on the door step with 6:50 left in the third quarter.

Bryan Miller took it in from the six to cut the Vernon lead back to 7, at 21-14.

But the Lions, like they did all night long, seemed to come up with the big plays when they needed them. Vernon took the ensuing kickoff at it's own seven and marched 93 yards for a touchdown, capped by Holder's second touchdown reception from Klappenbach, this one a 45-yarder with 3:03 left in the period.

Iowa Park then moved the ball to the Vernon 21 on it's next possession, thanks to a big 30-yard reception to Tommy Duerson from Williams, but on third-and-one from the Vernon 21, Williams underthrew Thomas Brake who had gotten behind the Vernon defenders and had his pass picked off by Holder to end the threat.

On the Hawks' first drive of the fourth quarter, Iowa Park again moved deep into Vernon territory, all the way to the 13. But on first down, Tyler Pulley saw his pass bounce off the chest of Brake and into the arms of Matt Byars, giving the Lions the ball at their own seven.

It only took the Lions one play to cover the 93 yards, as Ricks went around his left end and despite appearing to have stepped out of bounds after only a short gain, raced the distance for the touchdown to put his team up 35-14 with 7:46 left to play.

Iowa Park scored with 1:58 left in the game on a four-yard run by Duerson, and then got a

two-point conversion run by Duerson to make the final 35-22.

Duerson led Iowa Park in rushing with 78 yards on 14 carries, followed by Chase Wright with 47 yards on nine tries. Miller added 38 yards on six carries.

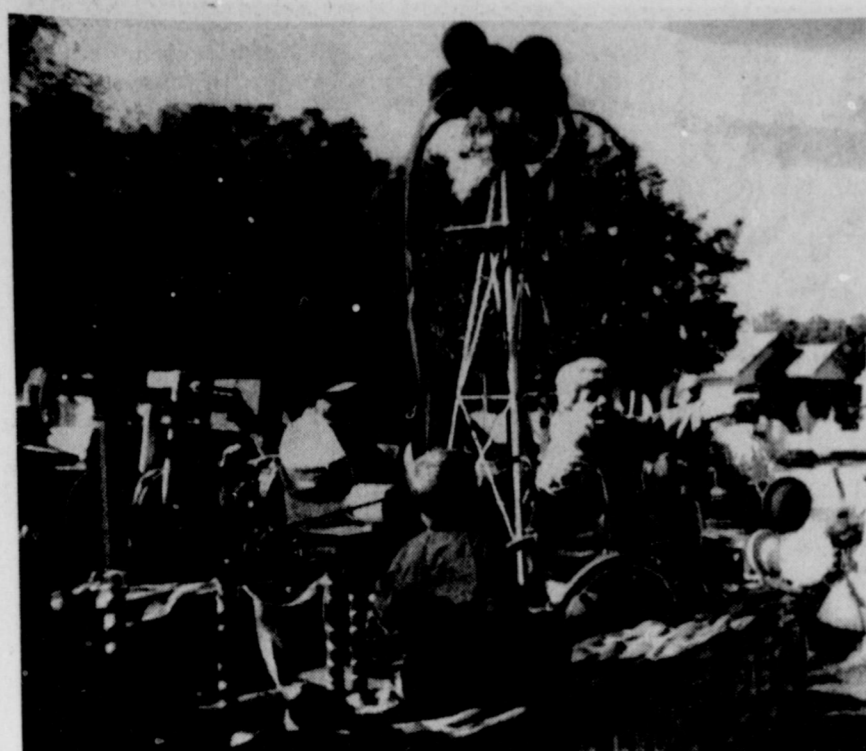

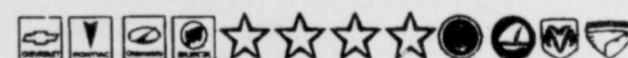

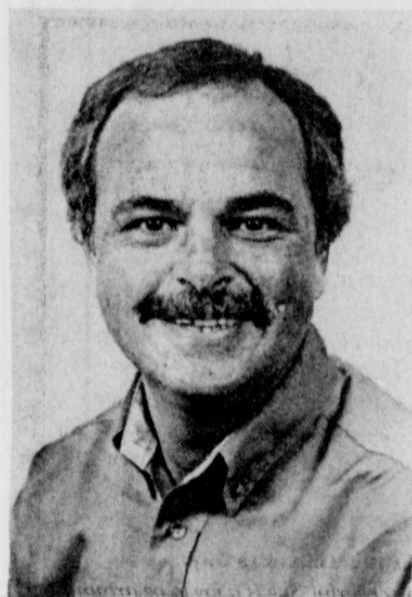
