Hawks facing La Vega Friday in Stephenville

The "experts" have Iowa Park as the underdog in Friday's Area play-off game against Waco LaVega, undefeated in 11 games, but that's nothing new for this club.

After graduating more seniors than it took to field two teams last spring, the Hawks weren't supposed to do much this year.

But, here they are, the Dist. 5-3A third-place team taking on the state's fourth-ranked AAA team, with the matchup scheduled at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Tarleton State Univ. field in Stephenville.

Iowa Park earned the right to continue in the playoffs by virtue of defeating 9-1 Brady, 29-24, last week in Abilene, while the Pirates smothered Comanche, 49-0, in their contest.

The Hawks' win featured two impressive points: they scored each of their first two touchdowns on the second play from scrimmage; and

they held a highly-explosive Bulldog team down with their defense.

Brady had been rolling up impressive yardage figures, such as the 328 yards rushing and 101 passing against Ballinger the previous week.

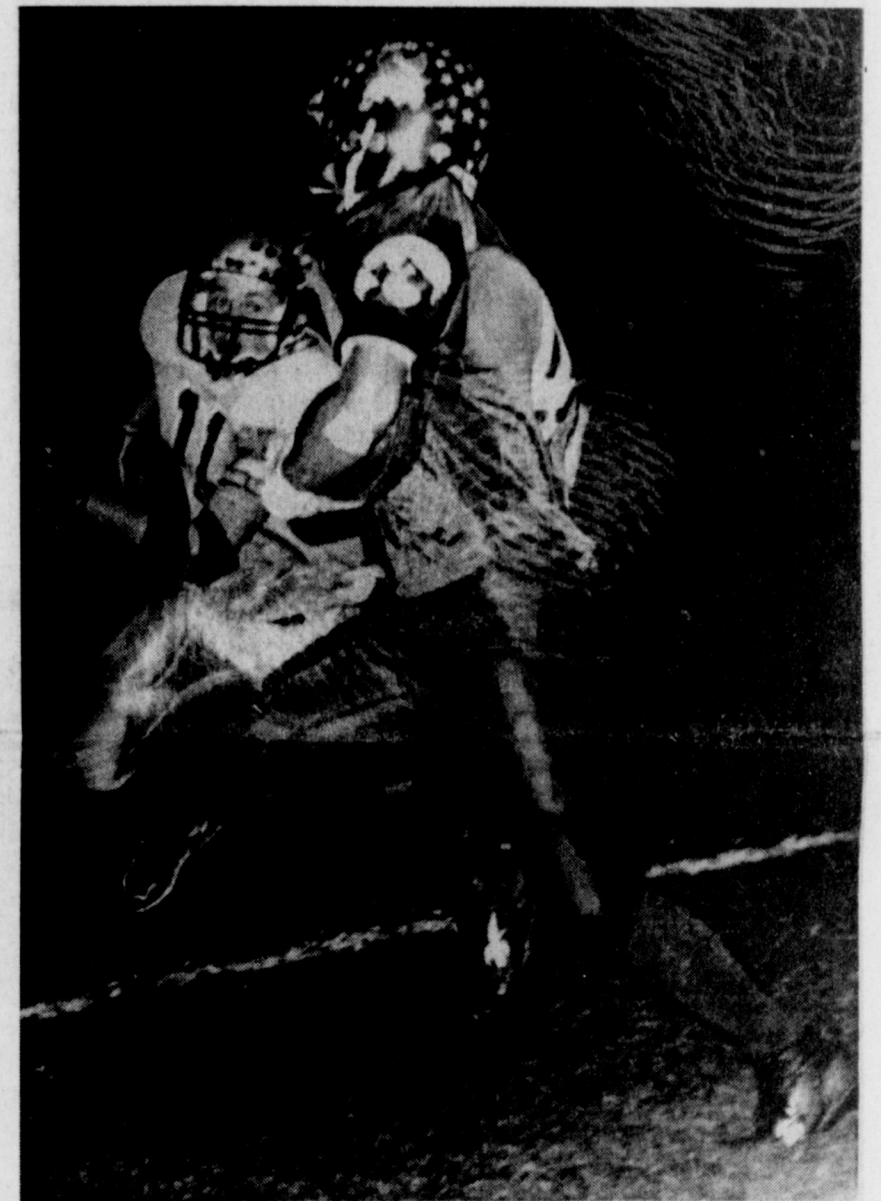
LaVega's yardage figures aren't available, but the Pirates have outscored their opponents 452-129 thus far this season.

Head Hawk Weldon Nelms be-

lieves if his Mean Green troops can jump out into the lead early, LaVega could possibly react similar to the Bulldogs and have them worried, as well as changing their game plan.

"We've gotta rattle them, and get ahead early," said Nelms, who described the Pirates as a team with a wide-open passing game and power

What you need to know, if you're Going To The Game

The pep rally will be held in the high school gymnasium tonight, starting at 7:00, and the general public is invited to participate.

Pre-game ticket sales at the high school will be only for students on Friday, at \$3. There will be no advance ticket sales for adults. All tickets sold at the gate will be \$6.

To reach the stadium in Stephenville when traveling south on Hwy. 281, take the new four-lane Hwy. 8, which is near the Texas A&M Research Center, past Hwy. 108 to a red traffic light (near a Piggly Wiggly store), turn on the Northwest Loop to another red light which is on Harbin Drive, go past a four-way stop at the Frey St. intersection (has a fire station on the corner), and continue to the stadium, which will be on your left. If you reach Washington St., you've gone too far.

Weather drives up schools' costs

Iowa Park school trustees found that the hot, dry summer days that extended into the fall months, has taken a toll on utility bills for the school district.

During his report to the board during a regular meeting Thursday night, Ron Woods, Energy Manager for the school district, said that electricity costs in 1998 (Jan. to Oct.) were \$31,787.02 higher than for the same period in 1997. Also the cost of water, during the same time period, was \$6,373.43 higher in 1998.

It was felt that the new air conditioning and heating system being considered for the high school will help lower utility bills, and Woods said he felt that installation of ceiling fans would be the most cost effective thing they could do.

The bid of \$50,699 from Hemphill Bus Sales, Inc. was accepted for the purchase of a new

handicapped equipped school bus. Allen Shewmake, Director of Transportation, said the bus should be delivered by the end of the school year.

Trustees also approved a contract with Claims Administrative Services in Tyler to provide a drug testing program for the transportation department.

During the schools' annual audit report, presented by Mike Edgin, C.P.A. with Mathis, West, Huffines, & Co., it was pointed out that they were especially impressed with management of the cafeterias. The report was accepted unanimously by the board members.

A gift of \$1,000 to be used in the Vocational Agriculture Department at the discretion of Supt. Mike Caplinger was accepted by trustees.

Board member Randy Alsup said that his family had placed \$2,000 in the bank to be used in memory of his brother, the late Ricky Alsup.

Council to meet Monday

The city council is expected to act on two resolutions Monday night which will put into effect increased rates for water purchased by two major entities outside of the city.

Horseshoe Bend residents will be charged \$3.0224 per \$1,000 gallons purchased, and the new rate charged the Wichita Valley Water Supply Corporation will be \$1.5364, according to discussions held by the council last week.

The reason for the increases, City

Administrator Mike Price explained, is due to a 260 percent rate increase being applied by the city of Wichita Falls, for water Iowa Park purchases.

Horseshoe Bend's water is taken directly from a transmission line between here and Wichita Falls, and that is why the rate is higher for those residents than Wichita Valley.

Water sold to Wichita Valley is only blended with Iowa Park treated

Beckwith inducted into IPHS Walk of Fame

Callie Beckwith became the latest inductee to the Iowa Park High School Walk of Fame Tuesday morning.

In order to be inducted into the Walk of Fame, a student must achieve "Academic Recognition" on each of the three portions of the Exit Level TAAS test, which is given each spring to Texas sophomores.

Of the 164 local students taking the test, she was the only one to achieve the honor.

Her name has been placed on a bronze floor plate to be displayed in front of the trophy case in the foyer of the building, along with the four honorees from 1996 and 1997.

She is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Steve Beckwith.

The TAAS tests students' abilities in three areas, including math, reading and writing. In order to achieve Academic Recognition, a student must master each objective and have an overall TLI greater than 90.

Beckwith missed only one question on the writing and reading tests, and two on the math.

"This is a remarkable accomplishment," said Alan Seay, principal. "I have been working with TAAS

tests for several years, and I know that very few students are able to master all 26 objectives on the TAAS."

Dr. Dan Roberts gives Garden Club program

The Garden Club met November 13, at the home of Polly Roberts. Freddye Skinner opened the meeting with Evelyn Thompson giving the report of the day, "You don't get much done by starting tomorrow."

Plans were made for the traditional Christmas tree decorating at Tom Burnett Memorial Library on Nov. 30.

Following the business meeting Polly Roberts introduced her husband, Dr. Dan Roberts, and gave a brief overview of his remarkable life and veterinary career. Well known in veterinary circles, he was a practitioner's practitioner and won many high honors. Dr. Roberts' area of practice was with horses and cattle, then later small animals.

A man of many interests, Dr. Roberts showed a heavy hand press with a complex pattern made of metal that was used in printing batik and also showed a piece of cloth made by this method. Members were shown a beautiful collection of Ukrainian Easter eggs, and Dr. Roberts explained the technique was used on naturally dried-not blown eggs. The many intricate patterns on the eggs were made using wax and color requiring many hours of concentrated hand work. Given as presents at Easter time the Kransky Easter egg custom is legendary.

Before photography came into use in the mid 1800s, mourning jewelry was made by delicately weaving hair from the deceased and worn as a memory token.

Dr. Roberts showed several examples from the early 1800s he had inherited from his ancestors. The finely woven hair was encased in metal and glass and often worn on a necklace or as a brooch. There was also a narrow band ring with strands of braided hair inlaid in the metal. After photography came into general use the art of making mourning jewelry became lost.

Seven members of the Garden Club attended the District II convention held recently in Denton.

There's one thing that I don't like about spring and fall -- I'm never sure how to dress in the mornings.

Oh, I always catch the weather reports in an effort to plan, but that's not always certain.

And even though it's real nice in the morning doesn't mean it'll be that way in the afternoon -- or visa versa.

When I dress in the mornings, I want to be dressed the same way that afternoon, and comfortably.

"Weather on the west side of the mountains can change completely as

it crosses them onto the eastern side," my forecasting friend explained.

I've never forgotten that bit of wisdom, but being human, I still would like to know how to dress in the mornings during spring and fall.

Guess I just don't like surprises. At least those that make me uncomfortable.

Juveniles problem for police

Iowa Park police were kept busy by the normal number of cases, which were sandwiched in between numerous juvenile problems, according to this week's police blotter.

Three different times officers were called to handle a 14-year-old female who has been assigned to the alternative education program (AEP).

Officers say the girl's mother has been told by the judge that she could face fines in excess of \$200 for all future instances, if she does not find a control of the juvenile.

According to the police blotter, there have been other instances in the immediate past when officers have been called to handle the girl.

But she wasn't the only juvenile case police worked during the past week.

Two male juveniles, both well known to the police and are supposed to be enrolled in AEP, reportedly went to a home one day last week, asking the resident to use the phone because they alleged they had been kicked out of AEP.

The pair had left that location when police arrived, but according to the blotter entry they were located, issued citations and delivered to AEP. Police are investigating two reports of criminal mischief, to determine if juveniles are involved in those cases.

Both involve vehicle tires being slashed or "stabbed."

A resident in the 800 block of Van Horn told police someone had stuck a knife into a parked vehicle some time last Wednesday night.

The next day, a tire was reportedly slashed overnight while parked in the 700 block of North Jackson.

Police were informed of a problem Friday concerning four males threatening two females at the junior high campus the day before, and asked officers to investigate.

One of the males was found to have a knife in his possession. No charge was filed, and the situation will be handled by the school, ac-

ording to the blotter entry.

Saturday, the mother of a 14-year-old male called police to report the boy having fought with her, and then leaving the residence.

The youth was later found, returned to the home, and instructed to receive counseling.

When Robert Anthony Cortez, 31, gave permission for police to search his vehicle at 11:11 p.m. Thursday in the 300 block of East Diamond, a drug dog was called into action, with results.

Cortez was charged with possession of less than two ounces of marijuana and taken to the county jail under a \$500 bond.

Charles Rhea Chastain, 41, was taken into custody at 2:38 a.m. Sunday in the 200 block of East Highway, on a charge of driving while intoxicated.

He was transported to the county jail for confinement under a \$1,000 bond.

Only 500 tickets were printed, and the \$10 donation for them is dedicated to the organization's student scholarship fund.

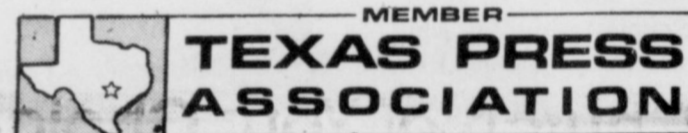

New officers were elected during a meeting Tuesday night of the Iowa Park Arts & Crafts Association.

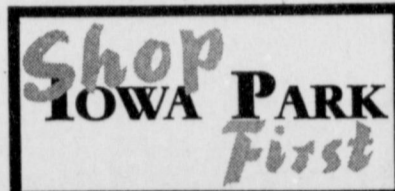

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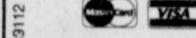

Thanks to the Re-Hab nurses who visited and answered question which taught us how to care for her.

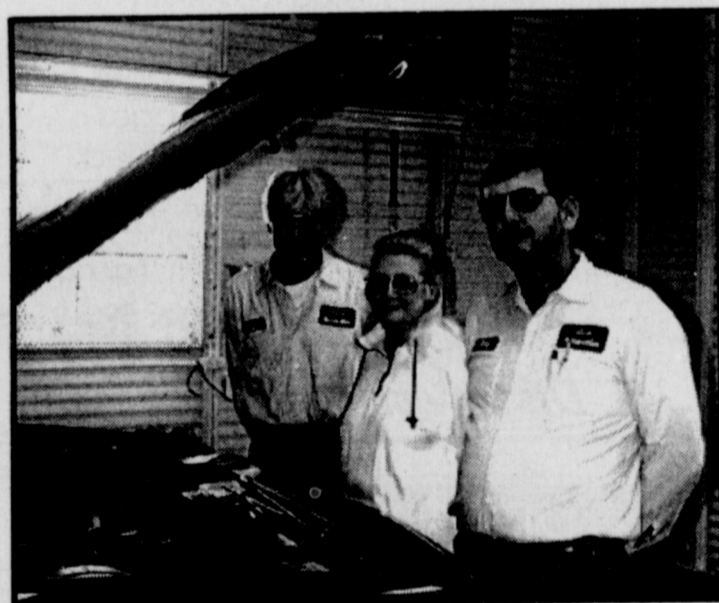

Rulo pleads guilty; gets 7-year sentence

David Howard Rulo, 46, of Iowa Park, will be spending the better part of seven years behind bars after pleading guilty to one count of indecency with a child.

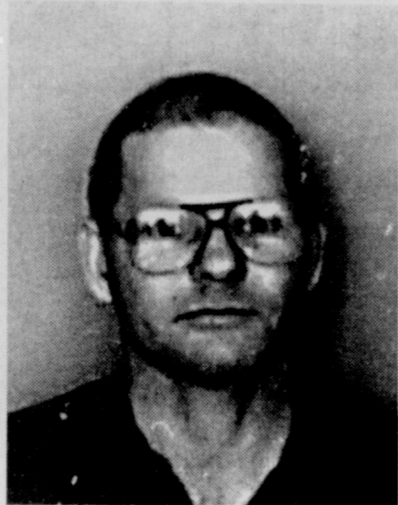
The plea agreement came Monday, the same day a jury trial was to begin on charges against Rulo and his wife, Mary Jane Rulo, 28.

In the plea agreement, Wichita County prosecutor agreed to dismiss the case against Mrs. Rulo, who was indicted Oct. 21 on two counts of indecency with a child and one count of aggravated perjury.

David Rulo was indicted the same day on one count of indecency with a child and was re-indicted on one count of sexual performance by a child.

He was accused of taking photographs of his nude wife and two nude juvenile females in a sexual pose in October, 1993.

Rulo was originally indicted for sexual performance by a child on March 23, 1994, but was re-indicted both on March 4 and Oct. 21 of this year because of problems with get-

ting the language right in the indictments.

Court document accused Mrs. Rulo of exposing herself in front of the two children, and lying under oath about the identity of the subjects in the photographs when questioned by the grand jury.

Sentencing should take place in the next two weeks.

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GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Q. I live in Wichita Falls. My dilemma is I cannot get any type of lawn grass to grow under large trees. I have tired sodding, seeding, replacing soil and nothing has worked. I have been told in the past that the area does not get enough sun. I don't want to cut the large trees down. My wife would cut me down. Please give me any advice you can on the situation.

A. Heavy shade and turfgrass does not get along very well if at all. The fact is you are going to be much better off by utilizing a shade loving

groundcover in heavily shaded landscape areas. Groundcover will grow there and it is normally lower maintenance than lawn grass if you select the appropriate groundcover. Good shade loving groundcovers for these type of landscaping zones would be Asian Jasmine, English Ivy and Mondo Grass. The Mondo Grass will grow in dense shade and give you a turfgrass type of appearance. Your difficulties growing turfgrass in heavy shade are very common. Many homeowners have hit the same exact impasse. Use a shade loving ground-

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Hawks outscore Brady, 29-24

Iowa Park head football coach Weldon Nelms is not superstitious, at least when it comes to Friday the 13th being bad luck. After all it was on a Friday the 13th four years ago that he won his first football game as a head coach for the Hawks.

He followed that win by taking his team into the playoffs that season and, in doing so, started a run of four consecutive playoff appearances heading into Friday's Bi-District game against Brady at Shotwell Stadium in Abilene.

The first three playoff appearances were short lived as the Hawks fell in each of the three Bi-District games.

But none of the three games were played on Friday the 13th. This one was. Nelms wishes that every Friday fell on the 13th, after leading his Hawks to a thrilling 29-24 victory over the Bulldogs and running his record to 2-0 on Friday 13th's.

Iowa Park, now 8-3 overall, advances to the Area round of the playoffs and will face Waco LaVega Friday at 7:30 p.m. in Stephenville. LaVega defeated Comanche 49-0 to earn the right to play the Hawks.

Brady, which finishes the season at 9-2, came into the game with a defense which had allowed only one touchdown to be scored on it's first string. But it took the Hawks only four offensive plays to score twice on the Bulldogs in the opening quarter.

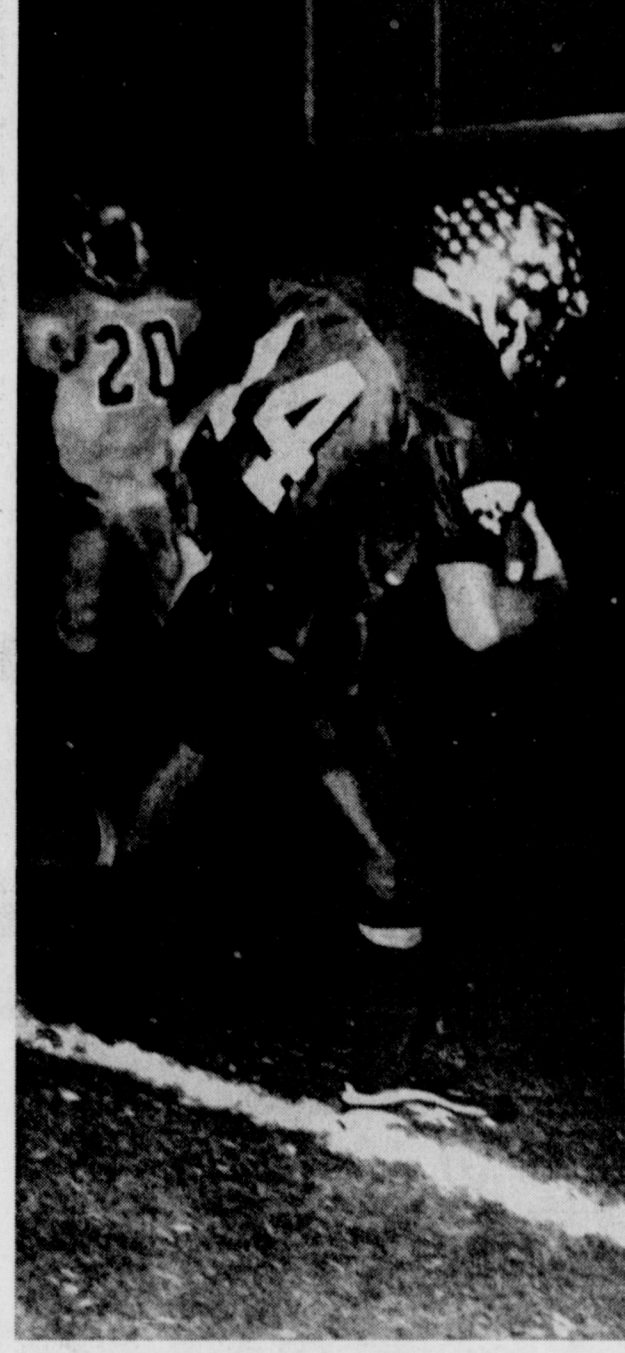
For those of you who were in the victory line, you probably hadn't made it back to your seat before the Hawks were in the endzone.

Tyler Pulley opened the game with a nine-yard run, moving the ball to the Hawk 49. On the next play from scrimmage, Bryan Miller broke through a hole on his left side and was off to the races, going 51 yards for the game's first score. Daron Blackerby added the point after making it 7-0 with only 58 seconds gone off the clock.

Brady answered with a six-play, 60-yard touchdown drive, capped by a 12-yard pass to Rhett Behrens from Craig Talley. The Bulldogs lined up for the point-after kick, but came up throwing completing the pass from Talley to Blake Lewis to grab an 8-7 lead with 7:54 still showing in the opening quarter.

Iowa Park took the ensuing kickoff at it's own 31 and on the first play from scrimmage, Chase Wright started left, then cut back right and rambled 53 yards all the way down to the Bulldog 16. On the very next play, Pulley scored on a quarterback keeper to his left, just 35 seconds after the Bulldogs had taken the lead. The Hawks showed that they also could go for two, as Wright swept in over his right side to make the score 15-8 with 7:19 left in the first quarter.

The Hawks held Brady on it's next possession and took over in good field position, following a

short punt taking over at the Brady 35.

But the Iowa Park offense stalled and was forced to punt. Thomas Brake's kick rolled out of bounds at the nine, pinning the Bulldogs deep in their own territory.

Brady went on an 18-play, 91-yard drive that chewed up over seven minutes of clock, capped by Jim Peel's two-yard run. Brent Raybion added the point after to tie the game at 15-15 with 7:25 left in the first half.

The Bulldogs extended their lead to 21-15 with 3:32 left in the half, on a 44-yard touchdown pass to Raybion from Talley. Raybion's point after was wide right, leaving Iowa Park down by six.

Iowa Park took the ensuing kickoff at it's own 32 with 3:21 left in the half and went on a 12-play 68-yard scoring drive that ended with a 15-yard touchdown pass to Tommy Duerson from Pulley with just 24 ticks left on the clock. Blackerby's kick extended Iowa Park's lead to 22-21 at intermission.

The Iowa Park defense stepped it up a notch in the second half, as the Hawks shut the Bulldogs down on their first two possessions of the second half, getting big plays from Shane Dunn, K.C Green, Russell Duggins, Kevin Park, Toby Williams, Chris Simmons and several others.

On the Hawks' second possession of the third quarter, Iowa Park took control of the ball at the Bulldog 48 with 3:59 left in the period. Six plays later, Wright scored on a sweep to his left with 1:34 left showing to stretch the Hawk lead to 29-21 following Blackerby's third extra point kick.

Following the touchdown, Brady took over at it's own 19. On the first play from scrimmage, Michael Shippman broke loose for 18 yards. One play later Shippman again was in the clear and appeared to be on his way to a touchdown, when Ross Dillard caught him from behind, dragging him down at the Hawk 11 after a 54-yard gain.

That seemed to inspire the rest of the Hawk defense, as they held the Bulldogs to only one yard in the next three plays, forcing Brady to have to settle for a 27-yard field goal by Raybion which cut the lead to 29-24 with 10:39 left to play.

After the Hawks were unable to move the ball on their next possession, Brady took over at their own 39. Wright ended any threat when he intercepted Talley's pass intended for Raybion at the Hawk 46.

Needing only to run the clock out, Iowa Park stayed on the ground moving the ball to the Bulldog 26, only to fumble it away with 2:40 left in the game. Brady picked up two first downs, moving the ball to their own 46. On the next play, Talley's pass sailed over the head of his intended receiver at the Iowa Park 30. The official threw his flag for apparent interference, only to be overruled by the referee who ruled the pass to be uncatchable, with 43 seconds left on the clock, which finished the Bulldogs off.

Leading rushers for Iowa Park included, Wright who finished with 107 yards on eight carries, Miller with 76 on eight tries, Pulley with 57 on nine carries and Duerson with 43 on 13 tries.

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AG AGENT'S REPORT

Prussic Acid and Nitrate Poisoning

It's so nice to have this cooler weather set in.

I know that some don't like to hear this, but we really need a good, long freeze. Yes, that means chipping ice in the water troughs, running heat lamps and getting up 30 minutes earlier to defrost your windshield in the mornings.

But, that also means killing the

tremendous insect population that we have been growing the last few years.

Well, along these lines of cooler weather comes some more concerns. This summer I wrote about prussic acid and nitrate poisoning. Most of the time we don't think about this problem in the summer, but due to the drought, and then scattered rains, we did see some problems.

Well, now is the time we start thinking about these two problems, after a freeze.

The big thing to remember about prussic acid or nitrate effected forages is that you can get by on them, provided they have some good forage along with it. If you have a spot of Johnsongrass (or whatever) in a pasture, make sure the cows are full prior to field entry. And if they're already in the pasture, make sure there's enough other forage for them to eat.

Below is some good information about both problems:

Nitrate accumulation can occur in virtually any plant with the ability to grow rapidly and use soil nitrogen efficiently. Small grains, millet, Bermudagrass, and fescue are forages common to having the po-

tential for nitrate accumulation. The most infamous for nitrate and prussic acid are the sorghums: forage sorghum, sorghum-sudan, sudan grass and johnsongrass. Keep in mind that many weeds can also become harmful like pigweed, dock, lamb's quarter, Russian thistle, and nighshades.

Any condition hindering plant growth can cause nitrate accumulation, like drought situations or a freeze. Nitrate poisoning occurs when these excessive nitrates are consumed and converted to nitrate faster than the animal can use it. Free nitrite in the rumen is readily absorbed into the blood stream, where it destroys the blood's ability to absorb and carry oxygen. That's why it's important to make sure that the cattle have enough good forages in their rumen to dilute the nitrites.

Nitrate poisoning usually is treated by intravenous injection of methylene blue. It is recommended that a vet diagnose and treat the livestock.

Prussic Acid accumulation oc-

curs when the plant slows its growth by some environmental condition like a drought or freeze. Other factors could enhance prussic acid accumulations, like prolonged cloudy days, soil acidity, abnormally high or low temperature (especially sudden changes, i.e. freeze), herbicide treatment and low soil phosphorus.

Unlike nitrate poisoning, curing or ensiling of forages infected with prussic acid greatly reduces or eliminates the danger, because free prussic acid volatilizes fairly quickly after it is released.

Contrary to popular belief, prussic acid is accumulated in the new growth of the leaves on a plant, and not in the stem like nitrates. Like nitrate poisoning, you should consult a vet to diagnose and treat infected animals (providing their still alive). A common treatment is intravenous injection of sodium thiosulfate and sodium nitrite.

There are some simple qualitative quick tests for potentially toxic levels of nitrate or prussic acid in

suspected forages or crops. The Noble Foundation's Agricultural Laboratory will run these tests on forage and crop samples free of charge for local cattle producers.

I have a fact sheet in the office on how to make your own field test kit. These tests can work, but remember that prussic acid and nitrate to a lesser extent, can be very variable across a field.

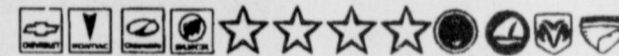

"With six seniors, we have leadership, especially since three of those are returning starters," commented Coach Huff.

"The girls are familiar with my program and expectations now. Last year was a learning time for them, and me. Now we are all on the same page and ready to make a run for the playoffs.

"Six of these 12 girls were on the volleyball team that won bi-district. They understand what it takes and what it is like to be in the playoffs, and that is experience that can help us do


Top of Texas championship games Saturday

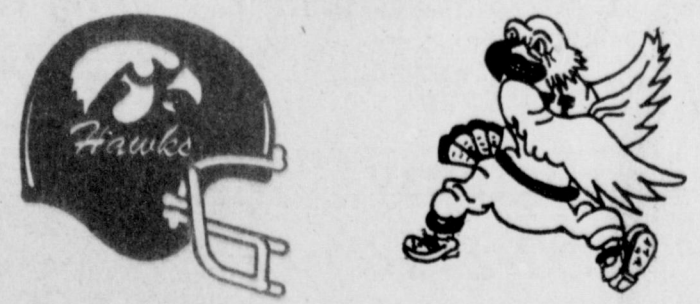


