Christmas decorating is his specialty

Iowa Parkan Fred Toler is still keeping up with his neighbors and family by decorating his yard each year for Christmas.

Toler's simple and festive touch adds to a neighborhood that obviously takes pride in holiday spirit.

Tolar and his wife, Mary Glen, have been decorating their yard some 50 years. Mrs. Toler said they started decorating their yard the year Toler returned from World War II, serving with the Army. That was the same year they built their home at 810 Yosemite - 1949.

She added that the decorations were begun for the benefit of their two daughters, Peggy Robertson and Jo Ann Yarbrough, and then for their grandchildren and great grandchil-

Toler's decorations began years ago with fifty dollars worth of lights and has added to them ever since.

In past years, Mary Glen has always helped Toler with the yard decorations. However, this year Mrs.

At the young age of 81 years, Toler was feeling under the weather so she opted to stay inside and check lights, changing the ones out that didn't work.

Over the years, the couple decided together where the lights would be placed. He said he would point to an area and Mary Glen would say whether or not lights would go well there. He said one particular area was vacant, with no structure on which to place lights. So he built a gate frame at the entrance of their yard for the sole purpose of displaying Christmas lights.

In the past years, the Tolers have put lights all the way to the top of their trees, but the doctor told Toler he could not climb a ladder. This year the lights go up as far up as he could reach standing on the ground.

Although Toler says it takes him a little longer than it used to to get all of the Christmas lights put up, he starts early enough to be finished by the first of December.

Toler brags on his entire neighborhood's outdoor Christmas

lighting, noting that almost everyone

in the area decorates for Christmas.

One of the Toler's daughters lives next door to him and the other lives south of them at the end of the block. They also have two grandchildren that live "within shouting distance," and they all decorate as well

Chamber seeks nominations for annual award recipients

As has been the case in years past, the highlight of the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet, which will be held Jan. 16, will be the announcements of the recipients of several awards.

Nominations are now being accepted from civic and social organizations, as well as the public at large. Forms are available at the Chamber's office, which is open between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. weekdays.

The awards include Outstanding Citizen of the Year, Outstanding Senior Citizen, Outstanding Educator, Outstanding Business, and Outstanding Agriculturist.

Selection of the recipients is made by awards committees, whose names are never made public. If, in the opinion of committee members, none of the nominees qualifies to be a recipient, no award in a particular category is made.

Deadline for the nominations is Dec. 31. It was set in order to give committee members adequate time to do their research and arrive at a decision.

Basic qualifications considered by the committees for the various awards include:

* Outstanding Citizen: may be of any age; not necessary to be a lifetime resident; may be of any sex, married or unmarried; must have done something to distinguish them from the other members of the commu-

* Senior Citizen: should be 60 years of age or older; may be of either sex; should have done something to distinguish themselves from other citizens of the community; should have contributed to the community in general, neighbors, church, and city in an unselfish manner.

*Outstanding Agriculturist: may be of either sex, married or unmarried; may be of any age; must have contributed something outstanding in the field of agriculture.

* Outstanding Educator: must have the same good character of the Outstanding Citizen of the Year; may be of either sex, married or unmarried; should be a person that is recognized by other educators as out-

Christmas Cookies

2 cups soft butter

1 cup sugar

1 egg 2 tsps. vanilla

4 1/2 cups sifted flour

Cream butter and sugar. Blend in egg and vanilla and gradually blend in flour. Cover and refrigerate at least 2 hours. Roll a quarter of the dough at a time, approximately 1/8 inch thick. Cut out cookie shapes and bake on greased baking sheet 6 to 9 minutes at 375 degrees.

Icing

2 egg whites 1/4 tsp. cream of tartar Dash salt

2 tsps. vanilla

3 cups powdered sugar

Beat egg whites with cream of tartar and salt until stiff. Add vanilla. Gradually beat in powdered sugar until peaks form. Divide into five bowls and add food coloring to four. Add decorative trims.

Seven Layer Bars

1/4 lb. butter 1 cup graham cracker crumbs 1 cup shredded coconut

1 (8-10 oz.) pkg. chocolate chips 1 (8-10 oz.) pkg. butterscotch chips 1 can sweetened condensed milk 1/4 cup chopped nuts

Melt butter in bottom of 9x13" pan. Evenly spread the other ingredients in the pan, one by one, in the order listed. Do not stir or mix. Bake at 350 degrees 25-30 minutes. Let cool slightly and cut into squares.

Pecan Balls

1 - 6 oz. pkg. semisweet chocolate pieces

1 - 6 oz. pkg. butterscotch pieces 3/4 cups sifted powdered sugar

1/2 cup sour cream 1 tsp. grated lemon peel

1/4 tsp. salt

1 3/4 cups vanilla wafer crumbs

(about 45 cookies)

3/4 cups chopped pecans

Lots of Gifts Melt chocolate and butterscotch Open Afternoons pieces together over hot water; remove from heat. Add powdered sugar,

sour cream, lemon peel and salt; mix well. Blend in wafer crumbs. Chill 15-20 minutes. Shape into 1-inch balls and roll in chopped pecans. Store in a tightly covered container. Makes about 3 1/2 dozen balls.

Mix together in a heavy saucepan. Bill 5 minutes and add: 1 small pkg. dates, chopped

Cook 4 more minutes, stirring constantly. (Mixture may stick slightly, but it doesn't affect the results.) Remove from heat and add: 1 pt. marshmallow creme 2 cups pecans 1 tsp. vanilla

Beat until cool. Pour into a buttered dish. Cool and cut into squares.

Apricot Balls

3 - 6 oz. pkgs. dried apricots, diced 1 - 14 oz. pkg. flaked coconut

1 cup chopped pecans

1 - 14 oz. can sweetened condensed

1/2 cup sifted powdered sugar

Combine apricots, coconut and pecans in large bowl; add sweetened condensed milk, stirring well. Chill. Shape mixture into 1-inch balls, and roll each ball in powdered sugar. Store in an airtight container in refrigerator. Makes 8 dozen balls.




Walker said the basic purpose of


the tour is sharing.

Education is constantly changing, and if you want an example, just keep reading.

I've gotta give credit to Virgil Woodfin. No, he's not the educator, but he loaned me a book, "Domestic Science Principles and Application," that was a textbook for public schools, as revised in 1921.

You girls and women who took Home Economics obviously will have a better understanding of what they were teaching then, as compared to now.

This is how a classroom should be run:

DUTIES OF HOUSEKEEPERS

Two members of the class may be assigned at the beginning of each lesson to perform the housekeeping duties. These girls may be called Housekeeper No. 1 and Housekeeper No. 2, each serving a section of the class. The students on the immediate right of the girls appointed make double portions in cooking, for the benefit of the housekeepers.

Housekeeper No. 1, Section I,

- performs the following duties: --1. Bring out the supplies for
- 2. Pass dish cloths and towels.
- 3. If ovens are to be used, get ovens for Section I.
- 4. Wash out half the towels that are soaked. Housekeeper in afternoon classes put day's towels to soak.
- 5. Straighten the shelves in the pantry.
- 6. Wipe off the oilcloth with a damp cloth.
- 7. See that each desk in Section I is supplied with soap, flour, salt, and
- matches. 8. Fill the pitchers of Section I with cold water.
- 9. Collect garbage from utility pans at the close of lesson.
- 10. Put away supplies at the close
- 11. Sweep floor around Section

Police arrest woman shoplifter

A woman Iowa Park police arrested in a shoplifting case last week won't face charges for that action.

But she will be incarcerated,

The woman, Loretta Foster Latchett, 31, will reportedly now have to serve the balance of a 10-year sentence in prison, according to po-

Police received a call Thursday evening from Wal-Mart, reporting a woman had left that store with a full shopping cart of merchandise which she had not paid for.

Officers observed a vehicle matching the employee's description, and gave chase until it stopped in the 600 block of East Jefferson.

The male driver remained in the parked vehicle, but the woman reportedly ran across the tracks and into the area of the county's precinct

Officers captured the woman who was attempting to evade them in

After receiving a number of different alices, officers were finally able to determine the woman's real identity. Using that name for a check in the computer, they determined she was wanted for violation of her pa-

She had been convicted of robbery, and released after serving three years of a 10-year sentence.

The merchandise she allegedly took from Wal-Mart, valued at \$164, was returned to the business, according to the police blotter.

Another person was arrested on warrants issued from an agency outside Wichita County.

Brian Dwight Jackson, 29, was taken into custody Saturday evening after it was determined two outstanding warrants for him had been issued by authorities in Colorado Springs, Co.

Jackson was transported to the county jail to be detained until he is extrodited.

Two women were arrested by Iowa Park police within 35 minutes of each other Tuesday evening, both due to warrants issued by the Wichita County sheriff's department.

India Allen Troutman, 41, was wanted on a charge of capis pro fine resisting arrest, and Brandi Leann Butler, 18, was wanted for driving while license was suspended.
