Fred had been in ill health for two years and had retired about a year ago. He died of a heart condition at 11:30 Saturday night in a Wichita Falls hospital.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral home of Iowa Park. Masonic graveside rites were held.

Mr. Thompson was born Feb. 9, 1900, in Johnson county. He moved to Iowa Park with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Thompson, in 1909. The Thompson family settled on a farm northeast of town and he attended the Iowa Park schools. In July 1923 he married Miss Odessa Henry of Henrietta.

For several years Fred and his brother, the late L. L. Thompson, were partners in the Thompson Bit shop. In 1937 they incorporated under the name of Thompson Tool company and began manufacture of the Thompson Shale Separator and Sampling Machine. First machine was sold to Perkins and Cullum Oil company of Wichita Falls.

The Thompson company has sold machines throughout the world. In 1950 Fred sold his interest to the L. L. Thompson family and started the Thompson Manufacturing company, fabricating oilfield equipment.

Mr. Thompson served as chairman of the board of stewards of the Methodist church many years. A long-time member of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce, he served as chairman of various committees.

Fred was chairman of the first countywide 4-H calf show and was many years a member of the board of directors of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair association.
