New Year's celebrators are few

While many law agencies express concern about how heavy their activities usually are over New Year's, that was not the case for Iowa Park's police department.

Shortly after 1 a.m. New Year's Eve, a 14-year-old male was taken into custody on a charge of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, when the vehicle he was driving struck another parked in the 400 block of West Val-

ley Drive.

The youth was later transported to the county juvenile detention center, according to the police blotter.

At 1:40 a.m. on New Year's Day, Michael David Craft, 27, was arrested on a charge of driving while intoxicated.

His passenger, Melissa Lynn Loyd, 23, was found to have an outstanding local warrant, for failure to

maintain financial responsibility, and facing a fine of \$447.62.

Both Craft and Loyd were later transported to the county jail.

At 2 a.m. New Year's Day, Christopher Alan McRae, 18, was arrested in the 200 block of West Highway on a charge of public intoxication. He was released at 9:45 a.m., after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

When officers responded Monday afternoon to a reported disturbance in the 600 block of West Coleman, they arrested Larry Allen Johnson, 17. He was released some two hours later after promising to appear in municipal court.

Another disturbance call, this one Tuesday evening in the 300 block of East Diamond, resulted in the arrest of Mark Allen Sims, 31. He was charged with Class C assault to prevent family violence.

Sims was later released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

Dumping charge changes are noted

The City of Iowa Park's convenience center now has new hours of operation, and a new method of disposing of local waste, according to Belvin Lytle, public works director.

The new hours of operation will be 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday. The hours will be posted on a sign at the entrance to the landfill, off Smith Road.

All vehicles must go across a set of scales before entering the convenience center or landfill area.

Iowa Park residents will still use a permit to dump their solid waste, however the new type permit now costs \$15 per calendar year instead of \$5.

The permit will allow a resident to have dumping privileges up to 12 times during a calendar year. The permit card will be hole-punched each time a resident dumps solid waste.

The card will not, however, be punched if brush is being disposed of, Lytle added.

Persons wishing to dump more

than 12 times during a year will be charged \$10 per trip.

Regulations of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, plus expense of operations in the landfill, have caused the increases to be necessary, Lytle said.

The city has contracted the grinding of stumps, brush and other debris that has been dumped at the convenience center the past several years. That is a cost to the taxpayers and the increase in the dumping fees will help offset the expense, Lytle explained.

All brush will still be taken at the landfill, as in the past, but each vehicle will still have to go across the scales to enter the landfill area.

For those who do not reside inside the city limits, there will be a fee of \$40 per ton. Business permits for dumping will be \$200 per year.

If a resident has a dump sticker on the window of their vehicle, it will be accepted. However new permits can be purchased at city hall and will

be valid for a calendar year.

Postage stamp price increases

For the first time in four years, the U.S. Postal Service will change its rates effective Sunday, Jan. 10.

The new 33-cent first-class stamps are now available, as are one-cent makeup stamps to use with existing supplies of 32-cent stamps.

The 33-cent stamp funds sending first class letters weighing one ounce, and each additional ounce will require an additional 22 cents, according to local Postmaster Ken Turman.

Priority mail up to two pounds

will cost \$3.20. The two-pound rate will also be charged for all matter in a "flat rate" envelope provided by the Postal Service.

Express Mail costs will be \$11.75 for up to eight ounces, and \$15.75 for up to two pounds.

Certified mail will be \$1.40, return receipt fee \$1.25 and return receipt for merchandise \$1.40.

In addition, insured mail will be 85 cents for the first \$50, \$1.80 for \$50 to \$100 and 95 cents for each additional \$100.

Don't forget to tell about rationing during World War II. Prices were different, old newspaper ads are of interest too.

Entertainment has changed but offers a glimpse into the similarities and difference between young people then and now.

Family trips make interesting stories, rather long buggy rides were necessary to get to community and family gatherings, dances and picnics.

Now, if you still can't get started there are books to help with ideas. To *Our Children's Children, Preserving Family Histories for Generations to Come* by Bob Green, available at some libraries. You'll be flooded with memories and hopefully other relatives have their version of family happenings and will share this as well as pictures. It is hard to get started but can become great fun.

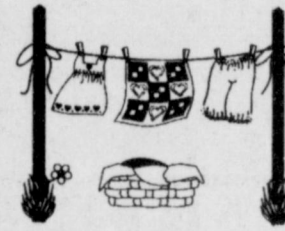

As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



When the Iowa Park city council amended an old ordinance a few months ago, one that prohibits use of skateboards and roller skates on business sidewalks and parking lots, a lot of grumbling became apparent.

The use of skateboards and roller skates are now prohibited, and riding bicycles in those areas has long been prohibited.

"Well what are our kids supposed to do?" was the question posed by many parents. And I can understand their concern. Lots and lots of youngsters have them.

As is usually the case, a small handful of boys created the demand that the ordinance be passed. They were causing all kinds of concern to business people, as well as drivers in the downtown area, because they were frankly careless in having their fun.

What they, and their concerned parents, don't understand is the liability businesses face in case they or

a customer is injured on the business property -- which includes the sidewalk.

Some parents came up with the idea that a skate park be developed for the youngsters to use.

City Administrator Mike Price tells me that such a facility would cost in the neighborhood of \$80,000.

That's a lot of money. But there's more to that story. The City of Granbury looked into building such a facility, and learned that the cost of liability insurance for that kind of facility would be \$866 per month.

Consequently, Granbury's city leaders not only dismissed that idea, but also is in the process of considering an ordinance prohibiting use of skateboards and skates just like Iowa Park has done.

There may be a remedy to the problem, but thus far none has come up.

And until that happens, parents please keep your kids out of the business area if they leave the house with their skateboards, skates and bicycles.

Building activity low in December

December was one of the lowest months of 1998 for building permits issued at city hall, but not the lowest.

The month's total was only \$42,722. However, that still was well above October's \$28,450.

Still, 1998 was a relatively big year for permits, which finished with a total of \$2,515,138.

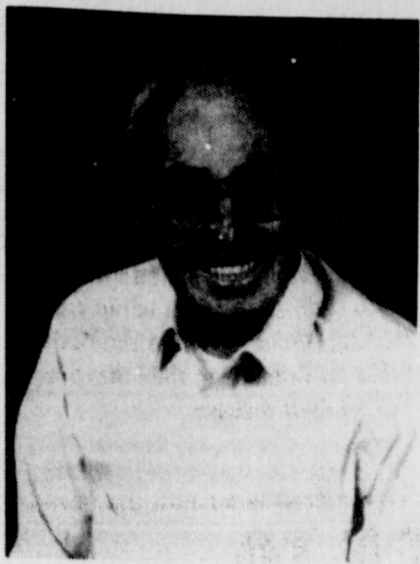

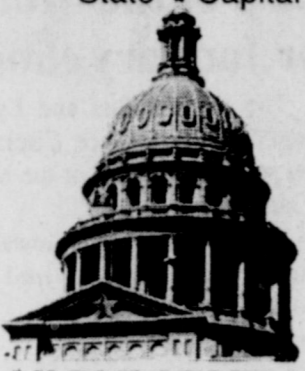

AUSTIN — Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock may be ending a long career in state government, but his influence will endure for years, *The Dallas Morning News* reported last week.

Among the graduates of "Bullock University" over the past two decades are the head of the U.S. Mint to Texas' budget chief, as are an assortment of county judges, legislators and executive directors of state agencies.

Other former Bullock staff members are now high-powered lobbyists and some of the most successful lawyers in Austin.

Glen Castlebury, spokesman for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, said this of his former boss:

"Everyone can say wonderful things about his vision and philosophy, but I was always impressed with his high level of expectation about what government should do and what government employees should do.

"The perfection he demanded at every level has been instilled in all these people, wherever they have gone."

Bullock leaves office this month, after serving eight years as lieutenant governor and 16 years as state comptroller. He also is a

former secretary of state, gubernatorial aide and House member.

He will continue working in the private sector in association with Public Strategies Inc., an Austin-based corporate consulting firm.

As he leaves office, the veteran Democrat told *The News* when asked what he wants to be remembered for:

"That I was able to attract the brightest people there were. Many have gone on to other agencies to run them.

"The people I worked with have been the real leaders of Texas, and I am very proud of that."

Budget Surplus Up for Debate

State lawmakers will convene in Austin on Jan. 12 for the 76th Texas Legislature.

They will have to decide how to slice up a projected budget surplus of about \$6 billion.

About \$3 billion of the surplus is destined for public education, teacher health care and prisons.

Winners of the well-mannered scramble over the course of the 140-day regular session will appropriate the remainder for other worthy causes.

Final Figures in From FEMA

The Federal Emergency Management Agency reported last week that nearly 24,000 Texans applied for emergency assistance following the October floods.

About \$70 million in housing aid has been paid.

Out of the 43 counties declared disaster areas the largest number of requests for aid came from Bexar County where 11 people died.

Other Highlights

■ U.S. District Judge Sam Sparks last week called Texas' clemency system for death row inmates "extremely poor" but then ruled that the system meets minimum standards set by the U.S.

Supreme Court.

■ Gov. George W. Bush has made the passage of a limited school voucher system one of his priorities for the 1999 legislative session. And although advocates of a such a program are busy looking for votes, some social conservatives have turned against the idea, saying it could put private schools under government control.

■ The Austin Independent School District has suspended one official and reprimanded another for their roles in an attempt to boost the district's accountability ratings by altering TAAS test scores.

Hawks about ready for district opponents

Head coach Tim Clark can finally see some light at the end of the tunnel.

And this time the light is not the one on the front of the train.

With only one week left before the start of district play, Clark's Hawks are starting to put everything together, as evident by their play this weekend in the Archer City Tournament.

Iowa Park opened against Olney, a team that had defeated Iowa Park by 16 the previous week.

The Hawks played a much better game this time out, falling 61-54. Olney jumped on top 17-13 after the first quarter and extended its lead to 38-30 at the half. The Cubs then outscored Iowa Park 13-12 in the third before both teams finished with 12 points in the fourth.

"We played them a lot tougher than we did the first time we played them," Clark said. "We cut down on our turnovers, but we still are having trouble scoring when we need to."

Leading the Hawks in scoring were Chris Simmons and Ryan Huff, each scoring 15 points followed by Bryan Lyons with 10 and Clayton Sales with five.

Having trouble scoring was never more evident than in game two of the tournament against Petrolia, as both teams combined for a total of 54 points with Iowa Park winning 31-23. The Hawks led 9-2 after the first quarter and 13-10 at the half. Petrolia came back in the third quarter to outscore the Hawks 9-4 to take a 19-17 lead into the final period. In the fourth quarter, Iowa Park managed 13 points while holding the Pirates to only four to take the 31-23 win.

Leading scorers for the Hawks included Huff with nine, Lyons with six and Aaron Duran with four.

"Again, we just couldn't put the ball in the basket," said Clark. "But on the bright side, we played pretty good defense to hold them to only 23 points and we won, which gave us some confidence and right now we

can use all the confidence we can get to get ready for district."

In the Consolation game of the tournament, Iowa Park hammered Chillicothe 75-38.

"We went out and played our typical first half," Clark added. "Then we came out in the third quarter and played like we are capable of playing in the third quarter and took control of the game. Everything was clicking, our inside game, our outside shooting, everything. That's the way we need to be playing when we start district."

Leading 26-19 at the half, the Hawks exploded for 30 in the third quarter and then came back with 19 in the fourth while holding the Eagles to 13 in the third and 6 in the fourth.

Lyons led Iowa Park in scoring with 18 points followed by Chase Wright with 10, Huff added nine while Sales, Landon Miller and Johnny Dillard all scored eight.

On Monday, Iowa Park hosted Holliday and fell 57-51 to an Eagle team that is 15-1 on the season and playing well right now.

Holliday led 9-7 after the first quarter and 29-22 at the half. Iowa Park won the third quarter 11-10 to pull within six, only to see both teams score 18 in the fourth.

"Some of that confidence we gained in the tournament showed up in the Holliday game," Clark said. "We played well against a good team. Holliday had been scoring in the high 80's and our defense held them to 57. I saw some flashes of being where we need to be. We only have one game left to get there before district starts."

Leading scorers for the Hawks included Wright with 14, Huff with 12 while Lyons and Simmons each scored nine.

Iowa Park will play host to Boyd Saturday at 2:30 p.m. in its final tune-up game before the district opener Tuesday at home against Henrietta.

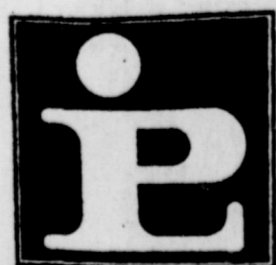

Lady Hawks edged in district opener

In what head coach Kim Huff called her team's best game of the year, the Lady Hawks, who had led for the majority of their district opener against Vernon, watched as Vernon's Jennifer Taylor hit a big three-pointer with only 17 seconds left in the game,

leaving Iowa Park on the short end of a 53-49 score.

The Lady Hawks trailed 13-8 after the first quarter and watched as Vernon scored the first four points to start the second quarter to push the lead to 17-8 with 7:03 left in the half. But that's when the game turned in favor of Iowa Park.

Randi Nelms, who finished the game with a game-high 19 points and had already nailed a three-pointer in the first quarter, caught fire. The senior guard hit back-to-back-to-back three-point bombs to tie the game at 17-17 with 4:32 left in the quarter. Alisha Clements then sank a pair of free throws to give Iowa Park its first lead of the game. Lacy Wells then continued Iowa Park's deadly shooting from outside the three-point stripe with a trey of her own to push the lead to 22-17.

On top of the scoring spurt by Iowa Park, the Lady Hawks defense was equal to the challenge, holding the Lady Lions scoreless for 4:07 until Jamie Adkins made a layup with 2:53 left in the half that cut the lead to 22-19. Vernon's final six points of the half came from the foul line, with Ashley Hughes knotting the game at 25-25 just before the buzzer.

For the half, Iowa Park made only seven field goals, but six of those came from long range as Nelms finished the half with four three-pointers, Wells with one and Melissa Threet with the other.

"Randi Beth got hot there and hit some big shots that got us going," Huff said. "We're not going to be afraid to shoot the ball from out there. If teams are going to give us those

shots we're going to take them."

Both teams were still tied with less than a minute to play in the third quarter when Threet gave Iowa Park the lead, you guessed it, with a three-pointer to make the score 35-32 heading into the final eight minutes.

In the fourth quarter both teams combined to shoot a total of 34 free throws with Vernon hitting on 12-of-17 while Iowa Park converted 10-of-17. The Lady Hawks held their biggest lead of the game at seven with 4:06 left to play, but a 6-0 run by Vernon trimmed the lead to 46-45 at 2:17. The lead moved back to 4 at 49-45 with 45 seconds left to play. Lindsay Havins' layup at 38 seconds showing cut the lead to 49-47. Then with 17 ticks left on the clock, Taylor's three-pointer from the right wing gave Vernon its first lead since the seven minute mark of the second quarter. Iowa Park had a chance to regain the lead, but a turnover in the back court gave the ball back to the Lady Lions and forced Iowa Park to foul to get the ball back. Vernon then made three-of-four free throws in the final 7 seconds to pull off the win.

"It was our best game of the year," Huff added. "Everybody stepped up and played their role. Despite losing, this gives me a boost of confidence. If we play like this and cut out some of the mental mistakes, we are going to win some big games in district. On that three-pointer, they subbed after the time out and we didn't communicate and find out who had the new player, but that wasn't the reason we lost. We had several opportunities to put the game away and we just didn't."

Nelms led Iowa Park in scoring with 19 followed by Clements and Wells with seven each. Threet added six points for the Lady Hawks. Taylor led Vernon with 13 points followed by Havins with nine.

Earlier in the week, Iowa Park played in the Archer City Tournament, falling to Olney in the opener 43-40. Clements led Iowa Park in scoring with 11 points followed by

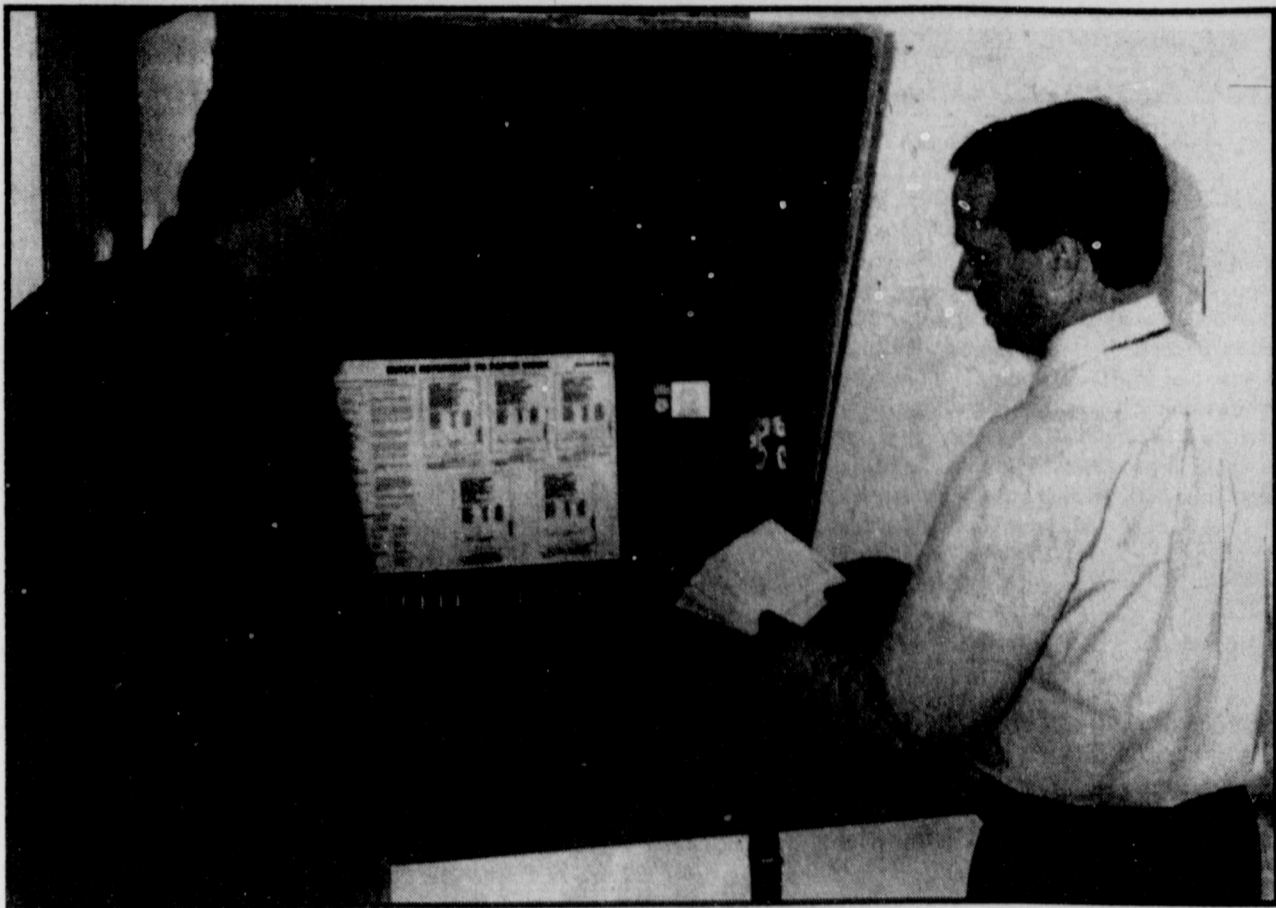

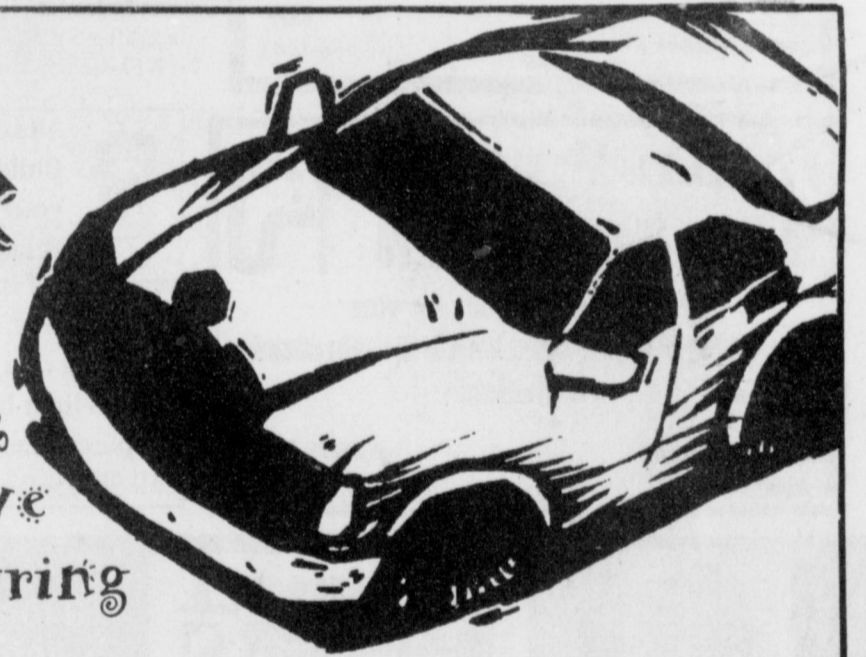
