



During their meeting this evening, school board members will have a chance to get acquainted with "Rika" a drug detection dog recently acquired jointly by the City of Iowa Park and the Iowa Park CISD.

Rika will be accompanied by Iowa Park Police Chief Lynn Collins and her handler, Officer Jimmy Eaton, who will answer questions and lead the canine through a demonstration of her skills.

Solicitor lands in jail

When police confronted a man soliciting here without a permit from city hall, they determined that he was wanted in Fort Worth -- for fraud.

Jeffrey David LaMel, 28, was approached in the 900 block of Van Horn Tuesday morning while he was distributing printed materials concerning reflective house numbers.

The solicitation sought fees of \$10 or \$15, and asked that checks be made out to him and left either at the home's door the next morning, or mailed to his address in an envelope attached to the note.

The address was to his name, 2005 Gilbert, in Wichita Falls.

No charge was filed against LaMel for violating the city's ordinance, because he was transported to the Wichita County jail to face the charge filed in Fort Worth, according to the police blotter.

City Administrator Mike Price pointed out that the city's ordinance concerning soliciting here is intended to prevent people of this sort from taking advantage of local citizens.

OTHER CASES

In other Iowa Park police activity this past week, nine arrests were reported, four of them on warrants issued by Wichita County sheriff's office.

Kelly Byrd McNew, 33, was wanted for driving while his license was suspended, according to a report filed Friday. He was transported to the county jail.

A warrant also was issued for the arrest of Gary Ray Cline, 21, for criminal mischief, with a bond forfiture of \$6,000. He was picked up Saturday, and transported to jail.

The board meeting will begin at 7 p.m. in the W.F. George Middle School Library.

Trustees will take action on bids for new air conditioning units at the high school, a request to bid for the purchase of a new pickup for the transportation/maintenance department, and a request for permission to inquire about bids for a computer system for the tax office.

Other items calling for a vote include the shared services agreement with Wichita Falls Regional School for the Deaf, and the Iowa Park CISD Board Policies Update 59.

In addition to regular business items, trustees will hear a report from Superintendent Mike Caplinger on the textbook audit, reconsideration of financial support for personnel seeking advanced degrees, students being recognized for donations to the Food Bank, and a grant, donated by Wal-Mart, to W.F. George Middle School.

In the open forum portion of the meeting, a parent has requested to address the board on student admissions policies.

A portion of the meeting will be closed for board members to address personnel matters, and conduct the annual superintendent appraisal

to a larger sewer system need than was proposed.

The lift station, if developed, would serve seven residences in that area not now on the sewer system, and had enough room for about 30 more in the future.

However, the property to be developed includes most of the land north of Texas Street that lies between Bell and Victoria.

Mayor Tim Hunter suggested that engineers study the potential needs of extending sewer service into the area, and have it for council consideration, possibly at the Jan. 25 meeting.

Hunter also stated that no such sewer service would be made available until after that property had been annexed into the city limits.

If the upgrade in the original plan is made, it will add approximately \$12,000 to the projected cost being studied of \$110,000. Beall said the group would pay the additional share.

The other surprise had nothing to do with Monday's meeting agenda, but dealt with city business.

Lee Pelz, who works with the school's technical equipment, said he had a grant application for the mayor and administrator to sign which would benefit the city library.

The grant, if approved, would be for \$20,000 with which to purchase computers, related equipment, and be included in the school's internet system.

The other two items on Monday's agenda received council action. One was the purchase of a 10-wheel dump truck, and the other was the city's participation in development of the Regional Water Plan for Area B.

The dump truck for the street department is being purchased through the Houston-Galveston Area Council of Government's Cooperative Purchasing Program.

It will be manufactured by Volvo, equipped with a 14-yard dump bed,

Volunteer firemen recognize members

named Fireman of the Year at the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department's annual banquet Saturday evening held at First Christian Church.

Skinner has been with the fire department 25 years, and has heid the position of Fire Chief 20 years. He has received the Fireman of the Year award four times in his tenure with the department in 1979, 94, 96 and 98

Firemen also presented Skinner with an ornamental fire ax for his twenty years of service as fire chief. They presented his wife, Frances, quet. with 20 red roses, one for each year she has supported Danny as Fire Chief.

The Special Service Award was presented to Randy Fulbright.

The award goes to a fireman for outstanding fire service. Fulbright was

Fire Chief Danny Skinner was selected by fellow firemen to receive the award because he responded to the most emergency calls in 1998. Skinner said as a rule he answers the most calls but Fulbright topped him this year.

Four retired fire fighters were in attendance. They were Taylor George, who served the fire department 44 years, Loyd Bell, Arthur Williams and Miles Thompson.

The fire department responded to 566 calls in 1998, including 228 fires and 338 medical (EMT) calls.

Each fireman was issued a personal protective device at the ban-

The device is to be worn by firefighters while fighting structure fires. If the fireman is immobile for 20 seconds the device starts beeping; if they have not moved in 30 seconds an alarm sounds that will alert and aid other firefighters in finding the downed fireman.



The Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department has earned the reputation of being one of the finest in the area. The backbone of this organization is Danny Skinner, who has been Fire Chief for the last 20 of the 24 years he has been with the department, and his wife, Frances, his staunchest supporter.

Frances, this week's featured cook, has been a supporter of firefighters all of her life. She was born in Electra, where her father, Bob Gibbs, was on the volunteer fire department 20 years.

She is a charter member of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department and president of the West Texas Firemen and Fire Marshal's Auxiliary.

Members of the local auxiliary take part in many support activities such as furnishing drinking water for the firemen and helping to clean up after fires.

Even surgery last February, when she had a kidney removed, and heart surgery in August in which she had six by-passes, has not slowed Frances down. Two weeks after the heart surgery, she was one of the spectators at the fire department's annual street dance. "They wouldn't let me do anything," she said.

Frances and Danny's son, Lewis, is assistant fire chief of the department and a paramedic. His wife, the former Christy Adams, is a member of the ladies auxiliary.

The Skinners have three grandchildren, Alex, five, Bryce, two, and Kati, who is one year old.

Frances moved to Iowa Park when she was 10 years old and is a graduate of Iowa Park High School and Bethania Hospital School of Vocational Nursing. She has been employed as an LVN at Sheppard Air Force Base Hospital the last eight years. Danny grew up in Iowa Park and is also a graduate of Iowa Park schools. He served two years in the U.S. Army, and has worked at Sheppard AFB 21 years. Although Frances likes to crochet and do cross stitch, most of her energy is directed toward activities of the fire department's auxiliary. Frances said that even though she cooks a lot, she doesn't write down or use a recipe often. The recipes she is sharing are from a cookbook put out by the Ladies Auxiliary in 1979. They include a 1929 recipe for a "Fire Extinguisher," her husband's recipe for hot sauce, one of

her recipes, and two of her grandmother's recipes.

Fire Extinguisher (1929)

Every household should be equipped to combat a chance blaze at its inception. There are many patented extinguishers for this purpose on the market, but their cost has prevented them from coming to universal use.

To fill this gap, a homemade grenade is recommended and while of utmost simplicity, the following described equipment ranks with the high priced:

Fill ordinary 1 pt. thin, flat whiskey flask with a strong brine of salt water, using all the salt the water will take up. Cork tightly and bind flasks together in pairs to insure their being broken when thrown into a blaze; place about the house in convenient places for instant use in an emergency.

To extinguish a fire in the chimney, quickly close all the doors and windows in the room to decrease the draft; throw a few handfuls of common salt on the fire in the range or grate, and the chimney fire will be at once extinguished by the gas evolved from the burning salt.

Chief's Hot Sauce 1 lb. can cooked tomatoes 1 tsp. onion 5-6 jalapeno peppers

Place all ingredients in blender. Blend at medium speed for 15 sec- 1 cup chopped nuts onds. Pour into jars. Yield: 3 pts. May be kept in refrigerator or may be put in hot water bath for 30 minutes to seal.

1 large egg 1/4 cup soft shortening 2 1/4 cup flour

Dissolve yeast in water. Add salt, sugar, shortening and slightly beaten egg. Add flour gradually (1/2 cup at George Middle School. a time). Mix well after each addition. Let rest 10-15 minutes.

Roll on floured surface to approximately 1/8-inch. Slice in squares Robert Baumer, Michelle Behrens, approximately 3 inches. Deep fry at 375 degrees until brown, turn and brown on other side. Drain well.

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

She showed color slides of the many varieties of orchids and spoke on the culture of orchids.





I don't want to see any more of my county tax money going into the MPEC in Wichita Falls.

Period.

With the almost completely-new county commissioners court taking office, there's been a major pitch being made by the Wichita Falls city council for additional funding.

I'm not surprised. That bunch has indicated all along that whatever money the county has to spend, it should be spent in Wichita Falls, for the betterment of Wichita Falls.

The money is needed for a big coliseum, which was in the original plan but never was built.

It wasn't built because what's been done cost more than originally anticipated. And there's reasons for that.

The overall project was supposed to cost a mere \$25 million. The plan was for Wichita Falls and the county to each kick in \$9 million. And they did

The money from the county was available, because the former commissioners court was composed almost entirely of Wichita Falls residents.

But the remaining \$7 million was to have been donated by private contributors. Mayor Kay Yeager stood before our city council and emphatically assured us that the private funding would happen.

First of all, it didn't happen. Secondly, the project cost more than the people were told.

One of the reasons it cost more was a fact that I pointed out originally.

an urban renewal program for Wichita Falls. Buying the homes, businesses and other properties on the land was more expensive than projected.

All the promotion for MPEC had to do with the economic betterment of Wichita Falls and Wichita County.

Thus far, that betterment has been for Wichita Falls, exclusively. There's been no economic "trickle down effect" for Iowa Park, Burkburnett, Electra, Kamay or any place else in the county.

Sure, there was a county-wide vote on the project. And it passed.

But had the people outside Wichita Falls known how the thing would be operated, I doubt they would have given their approval.

One minor point, as an example. The new facility would be a fine place for our junior livestock show to be held. Well it is. But along with that comes a problem.

The auction that follows the kids' showing of their animals has always been a major public relations event for the buyers.

Iowa Park's MuleSkinners had for years always made their contribution, by putting on a free feed for the buyers.

Not any more.

We found out that the MPEC would charge money for each plate that was served, even though it was free to whomever was going to eat it. That free feed was scuttled.

There've been other problems, but I think I've probably made my point.

I'll tell you, again, what I've al-The MPEC location was in fact ready told the newly-elected members of the commissioners court: I don't want any more Wichita County money going into a Wichita Falls money-making project.



Q. I received a beautiful Amaryllis at Christmas and this plant is still in full bloom. My question is how to care for the plant to get it to bloom again next Christmas?

A. Amaryllis in bloom is breathtaking and there is a trick to get the bulb to bloom again next holiday season. Continue to care for the plant indoors as you would for a tropical houseplant. Plant outside in April in a sunny, well-drained garden area.

In July, dig the bulb to dry in a shaded, cool area. Re-pot the bulb

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Working Your Cows Now don't think about this much until we May Save Money

The older I get the more sides I can find on a coin. In other words, there are countless points of view to any subject.

I was asked the other day to comment on the recent cold temperatures.

Well, from one side it's good. We are killing thousands of insects with each freeze, particularly if you live around Kamay during the summer and have to survive the mosquitoes. Or, if you raise cotton along the river and have to deal with boll weevils all summer long.

But, there is another side.

How would you like to have a cow/calf operation with most of your tanks frozen solid, because they were too low due to the drought last year? Or, have some fresh stockers from Mississippi or Florida that have never seen temperatures below 50?

There is one thing for sure we can never, never predict or control. The weather! But we can control what we do and when we do it.

This may be a good time to take a long look at your cows. If you pregnancy check your cows and cull all the open cows, you could save up to \$1 per day, per cow. This may be the most cost effective management tool we have to cut costs.

Now the question, if the market is low now and we generally have higher prices in the spring for these open cows, what should we do with them? Well, it's simple, if you have the forage to support open cows, keep them. If you don't and you are feeding them, sell them.

Most of us have already checked for bad mouths, popcorn teeth, bad eye cows, etc. But if you still have one or two and are running out of feed, you may want to think about these cows next on the culling list.

In terms of general health, check and treat for any ear ticks. We've seen a lot of these ticks this year, and it would be in your best interest to work your cows.

While you have them in the pen. vaccinate for leptospriosis (all five serotypes) 30-60 days prior to breeding. If your cows are already bred, think about this for next year.

One other vaccination you may want to think about is Vibriosis. We

come up with a 20% to 30% calf crop. I remember one sheep breeder in Angelo that ended up with a 20% lamb crop on 50 head of ewes due to Vibriosis. Bad deal.

After our freezes, you may want to feed or inject cattle with vitamin A, D, and E. The building block for vitamin A is found in green leafy material and after a frost, the cow begins to rely on the store of vitamin A in her liver. Vitamin A deficiency causes, among other things, an increase in retained placentas.

Nutrition is another concern after our recent drought. Remember, cows eat to fulfill their energy requirements, but as quality declines, the protein content in her diet may fall below requirements.

Protein supplementation will improve digestibility of poor quality forages by 30% to 60% and stimulate appetite by 6 to 12%. The amount of protein contained in one pound of cottonseed meal (41%) or cubes or two pounds of 20 percent crude protein range or breeder cubes will help winter the cow.

In addition, low energy supplementation (1-2 pounds) will stimulate digestibility slightly (1-3%) and intake (5-10% of poor quality forages. If levels of energy supplementation increase above 10% to 12%, then forage digestibility and intake will be depressed causing a substitution rather than a supplementary effect.

Still, a pound of grain contains nearly twice the amount of energy that a pound of forage or hay does. One interesting fact, a cow requires the energy contained in a pound of hay to travel a mile on level ground, so if you cows are walking any distance, feed a little more energy.

Don't forget about minerals, and I'm the worst. My mineral feeders for the goats stay empty until Nikki remindes me with a boot to the side of my head.

There are hundreds of minerals and I'm not going to take sides on which one is best. But, we do know that it costs between \$8 - \$12 per year, and cows eat an average of 2 ounces per day depending on the mineral.

Sales tax rebate lower


November apparently was not a particularly good month for businesses in Iowa Park, if sales taxes collected that month are used as an indicator.

The city received its sales tax rebate this month, which reflected taxes collected by monthly filers in November.

The check, \$17,966.04, was down 9.73 percent from the rebate check of \$19,792.56 the city received in January 1998, according to the report.

Actually, Electra was the only city in Wichita Falls on the "plus" side. Electra's check of \$14,895.20 was 98.64 percent greater than last January's check.

Wichita Falls was down 7.54 percent and Burkburnett's check was 9.73 percent less.



Q. I would like to begin pruning pecan trees in an orchard. Is it a good time to do this pruning now?

A. Pecan tree pruning is done during the winter months. The only time during winter that you want to avoid when pruning is when temperatures are extremely low (teens and lower). Very low temperatures can cause some tissue damage and inhibit the tree's ability to heal properly.


Prune during winter when temperatures are moderate.

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
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Lady Hawks lose 3rd district game



The Lady Hawks will travel to Childress on Friday then return home to on Tuesday.



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
