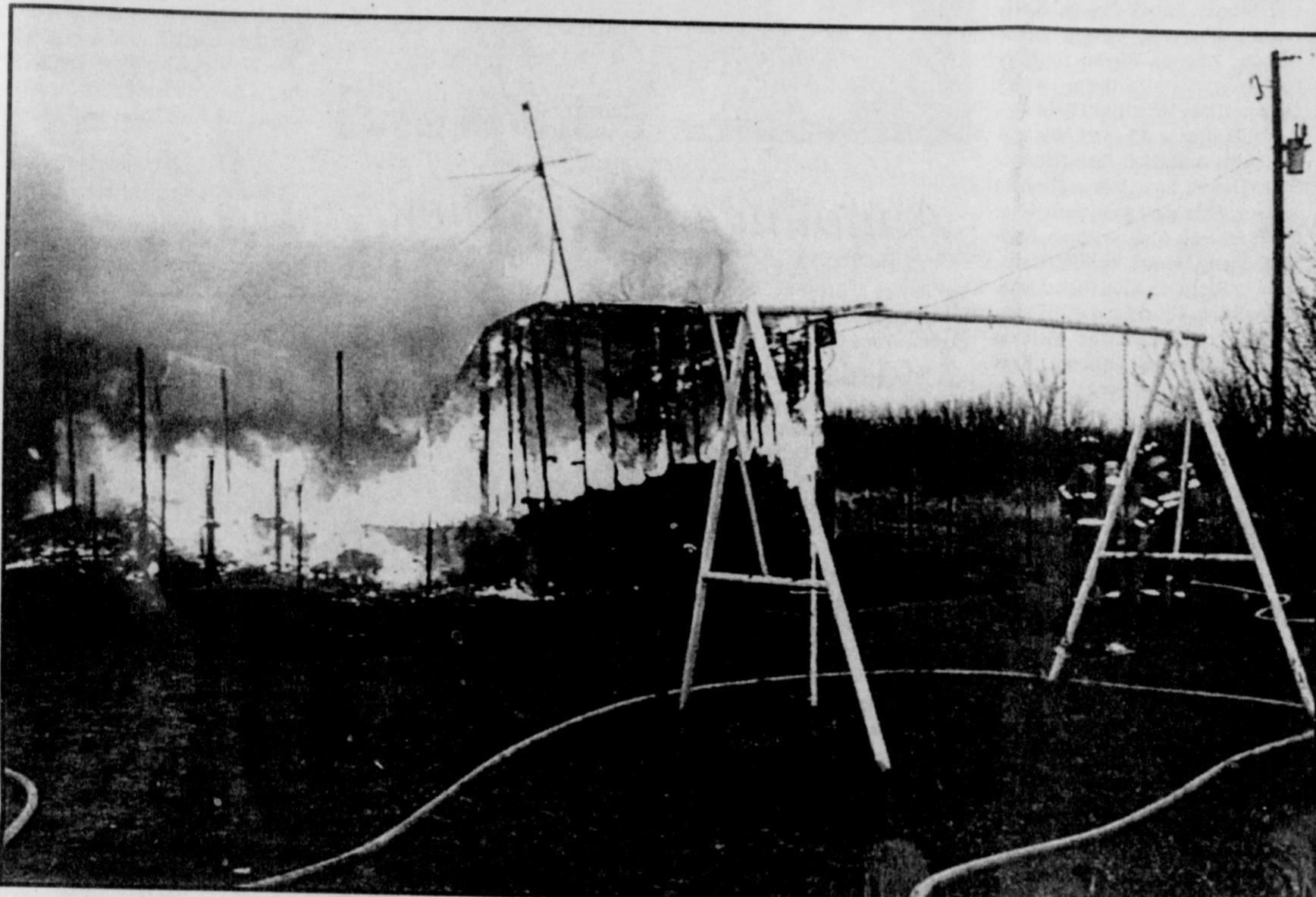

Council's actions helpful to growth

The city council took action Monday night on several items which are designed to assure continued growth of Iowa Park.

They included an addition to the sewer system to serve a housing development area, continued cooperation with another developer, and designation of an enterprise zone to benefit the city's largest employer.

Aldermen approved advertising for bids to install a sewer system on North Bell Road which not only will benefit residences not now served in that area, but additional new homes.

The additional new homes are expected to be constructed with the development of all the pasture area on the west side of Bell.

A group of investors reportedly has negotiated the purchase of the tract of land formerly known as the George Estate, which is surrounded by Bell, Victoria, Texas and US 287, with the exception of the two existing residences.

David Parkey, a spokesman for the group, has agreed to have both the

east and west sides of the property annexed into the city, according to Mike Price, city administrator.

The city also approved advertising for bids to develop "Phase Three" of Park Place Addition, which includes pavement, curbing and water and sewer lines.

Through an agreement with developer Tommy Key, the city is reimbursed proportionately for its investment as each lot is sold, plus interest.

The same agreement has been used for the other phases of the addition.

Also, aldermen approved a resolution nominating the Cryovac plant area and making application to the Texas Department of Economic Development for acceptance.

If approved by the state, such a designation can benefit the company in future growth projects.

Also concerning the subject of growth, Iowa Park's extraterritorial

Additional deputies for rural protection

Wichita County Sheriff Tom Callahan has announced the beginning of a permanent daytime Sheriff's patrol in rural areas of Wichita County.

For several years, the Sheriff has

worked with any regularity during the daytime, Monday through Friday, due to commitments at the courthouse.

The pressing obligation to transport inmates to court appear-

ing transferring inmates back to the County from out of state had precluded any regular daytime patrol, Callahan explained.

Due to an increase in staffing,

budget, the Sheriff will be able to place two or more patrols on duty, Monday through Friday, with the primary mission to patrol rural housing areas and businesses.

The daytime, when people are normally gone from their homes, is a prime time for rural burglars to work. However, persons, who would commit these or other crimes now must risk the prospect of being discovered by roving Sheriff's patrols.

These patrols will be manned by experienced Sheriff's deputies. Deputies assigned to patrol rural areas will also be available to take routine calls for assistance, and assist Highway Patrol officers, Game Wardens, and officers from Iowa Park, Burkburnett and Electra as needed.

The daytime patrol should significantly increase the security of county businesses and citizens living in rural housing areas.

According to Sheriff Callahan, "Deputies assigned to this duty have only two requirements; they must frequently check rural housing areas and business, and not eat lunch in Wichita Falls."

Deputies Cpl. David Mayo and Greg Dooley are presently assigned to this duty.

Iowa Park police

Iowa Park police cleared a burglary of a residence case Friday that had been pending almost two years.

Mitchell Gene Williams, 28, turned himself in to the Wichita County Sheriff's Dept. on a warrant issued by Iowa Park police.

He was held under a \$10,000 bond.

Williams reportedly stole \$1,700 worth of guns in February of 1997 from a residence in the 600 block of West Washington.

He reportedly sold the guns to various individuals, and when one of them attempted to sell his purchase to the original owner, it was reported to police.

All the guns with the exception of one have been recovered, police said.

Police made three arrests of drivers in cases involving drinking and driving, according to the police blotter.

When officers responded to a reported accident, in which a car damaged a fence Sunday morning in the 1500 block of Rita, they arrested David Lee Waterbury, 22, on a charge of driving while intoxicated. He was later transported to the county jail.

Johnny M. Spivey, 51, was arrested the same evening in the 1500

block of North Johnson Road on a DWI charge, and transported to the county jail.

The third DWI charge filed during the week was at 2:55 a.m. Wednesday, when Christopher Edward Tyson, 31, was stopped in the 400 block of East Highway. He also was transported to the county jail.

After receiving permission to search a residence in the 300 block of Valley Drive late Saturday evening, police found marijuana seeds and rolling paper, and issued a citation to Brandon Lee Lewis, 17, for possession of drug paraphernalia.

Police picked up Larry Daniel Thompson, 29, Sunday afternoon on two outstanding warrants issued by the county sheriff's office.

The warrants were for possession of marijuana and driving while intoxicated. He was later turned over to a county deputy for transportation to jail, according to the police blotter.

Tuesday evening, police arrested Christopher Clark Gilmore, 19, on two Iowa Park warrants, for failure to maintain financial responsibility and having an expired license plate.

Gilmore was released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

Volunteers important to life

When one is in need of emergency medical attention we don't give much thought to what the medical giver is thinking, where they got their training, how long it took them to get their training or if they are being paid for the job they are doing. We just want the best possible care for ourselves or our loved one.

When we receive emergency medical care in Iowa Park we are being served by volunteers. Volunteers who have spent many hours learning the technique of giving us the best and fastest "field" care possible.

The Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department has three intermediate Emergency Medical Care Technicians and a Paramedic.

The three Iowa Park Volunteer EMT's are Mike McCarty, Archie Layfield and Skip McClure. Volunteer Paramedic is Lewis Skinner. They are also Volunteer Firemen.

The EMT's have each completed over 200 hours of training, including 20 hours in each Wichita Falls hospital emergency room, 50 hours on an ambulance, eight hours in surgery and classes two nights a week for two and a half months.

A paramedic has to attend classes eight hours a week for nine months and spend 24 hours in each of the Wichita Falls hospital emergency rooms, eight hours in the cardiac care unit, eight hours in intensive care, 8 hours in pediatrics, eight hours in labor and delivery, and 50 hours on an ambulance.

Each of these men completed their training while working their full time jobs, volunteering for the Iowa Park Fire Department and keeping their families happy.

Lewis Skinner became a volunteer fireman while he was still in high school. After four years as a volunteer fireman he decided he would train to become an EMT, then he saw how much more he could do if he

were a paramedic and decided to increase his medical training to that level. That was six years ago, and in that time he has used his medical skills almost daily.

Skinner works a full time job in Wichita Falls and part time for the ambulance service there. He also volunteers 30 to 60 hours a month for the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department. He is the Assistant Fire Chief.

He and his wife Christy have three children and are expecting their fourth.

His wife is very understanding about his volunteer work. Most of the calls he responds to are between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m. and that keeps down the time he is absent from the family's activities.

Skinner says that he spends the hours training and volunteering for the satisfaction of helping people.

Knowing that the fire department team has made a difference is what keeps him coming back. He added, each member of the team has something different that makes them tick and all those ticks are what makes the team. No one person can make everything happen that needs to happen during an emergency call, it takes teamwork.

He says the team puts in a lot of hours to make life better and safer for our community.

The department has state of the art equipment. They just purchased a \$6,000 Auto-Medic Fibulator. An EMT can use the auto fibulator, but to use it manually, one must be a paramedic.

The fibulator is a very important piece of equipment for someone having a heart attack, sometimes the shock from a fibulator is just what it takes to save a life.

Skinner says one of the most memorable calls he has responded to was while working on the ambulance.

They received a call on an eight-month old baby that was in full cardiac arrest. He said when they arrived

at the scene the first responders had started CPR and the paramedic took over. (The baby had been born with a heart defect that was not detected at birth.) Skinner says the baby is alive today. That was about two years ago.

Skinner said at the time he had a daughter in day care and an infant about the age of the baby they had saved. He said when it was all over, he called day care and had them to awake his daughter so he could talk with her.

Another memorable call was when one of his former teachers, Patsy Todd went into antilift shock. He recalls stating to her "I'll bet you never thought you would see me with a needle." He said a call like that just gives you a different feeling.

Of course, not all calls have a happy ending. Skinner says that when they respond to a call they never really know what they are looking at until they get to the destination, and then the adrenaline kicks in.

He added adrenaline is a wonderful thing.

He says while on a call he focuses on the "small picture" (the patient) and blocks out the "big picture" (their family). Then when the situation is under control he sees the "big picture", someone's family member is ill, been injured or has passed away.

That is when they (the medical attendants) have to cope with their feelings. Sometimes dealing with their emotions are easier than others. But for Skinner it is almost always dealt with the same way.

He goes back to the fire department and talks with the other firemen. He says the great thing about working with his dad, Danny, is that he has "been there". He knows what the other guys are going through and talking with him and the other guys are a great help. Skinner says that he, Danny and a couple of the other vol-

In family research we often come across interesting and unusual family first names. The practice of continuing the names for generations on your direct line is often complicated by collateral relatives of the same name, which requires more detective work.

My Scotch - Irish ancestors used Alexander, William, James, and John in all the families, it seems, and it has not been easy to sort out the cousins without confusing who married who, but it all seems to work out.

Popular names in the 17th century were Richard, John, William, Thomas and Joseph. Girls were often given names of Biblical women and were given middle names. Where boys neither had middle names or initials, until the 19th century. It was about this time when girls were given nicknames, Sarah became Sally, Elizabeth became Betsy, Beth, Liza and even Libby.

During the 19th century boys were often named after heroes of the time, including generals, explorers and presidents. One of my uncles was named after Admiral Dewey. He said there was no way he could hide his age. About the same time girls were given names of states. Around the turn of the century, daughters were given names of precious stones. Opal, Ruby, Sapphire and Pearl were popular.

Think about the names in our time, some so trendy and easy to date by decade. So you see, names are

another way genealogists sort out and untangle the generations.

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Orphan Train is topic of program

A history of the Orphan Trains of pioneer days was the topic of a program presented for members of Twenty-Three Study Club last Thursday afternoon in the home of Lucy Reynolds.

Co-hostesses were Bonnie Medlinger and Flossie Nunn.

The program was given by Beverly McClure, local author and writer of children's books, whose mother was one of the orphans who came west on an Orphan Train.

Mrs. McClure said that in the 1840's thousands of homeless children wandered the streets of New York, due in part to the large numbers of immigrants coming to our country with no jobs, or children left as orphans by the deaths of their parents in those hard economic times.

They had no means of support other than what they could earn by begging, stealing, or by menial jobs, and no future other than winding up as criminals to be confined in the prison system.

A young Congregational minister, Charles Loring Brace, age 26, was very concerned about the seemingly hopeless situation. He began working to try to get these children into families, not as indentured servants as some were, but as members of a stable family situation. He was instrumental in helping to establish the Children's Aid Society of New York which worked toward placing orphaned and deserted children in families.

At this time, the migration westward was in full swing, and the idea came to him to form groups of children to be shipped west to be adopted by the pioneers as members of their families.

On Sept. 20, 1854, the first group of children, ranging in age from seven to 15, were sent west by boat, "The Issac Newton," to a destination in Michigan where they were picked by settlers to join their families. This effort was such a success that the project continued.

The Children's Aid Society

would decide which children to send, get permission from a parent, if any, clean them up and begin to teach them something about family life, and then decide which cities the children would be shipped to.

In the next 75 year period, until 1929, approximately 150,000 children were sent by train to almost every state in the nation to be selected by families at each destination.

A large number of children were sent to Texas, and Mrs. McClure said that her mother was one of these children. She had been brought by her father to the Children's Aid Society in New York, along with her five siblings, following the death of their mother from tuberculosis in a crowded tenement building in New York. The children were separated and sent west, and at the age of nine, her mother arrived on the Orphan Train at Bowie, Texas, where she was picked and adopted by the W.V. Young family.

Mrs. McClure displayed an article written several years ago by the late Olive Blaylock who had interviewed Mrs. McClure's mother in a local nursing home. She also showed the group several books written on the subject of the Orphan Trains by actual survivors. Most of the youngest are now in their 70's.

Preceding the program, Program Leader Bonnie Medlinger read the thought for the day, "Common sense is genius dressed in its working clothes," by Ralph Waldo Emerson. Mrs. Medlinger led the Pledge to the American Flag and a reading of the Club Collect, after which she introduced Flossie Nunn who gave the meditation, titled, "The Worm Within." This dealt with the comparison of those who would work to destroy our nation in much the same way the worm silently destroys the inner apple, and warned that we as a people must be ever vigilant.

Frances Park gave the Federation Counselor's report, urging members to contact state legislators from their district and urge them to support direct aid to Texas public libraries.

The poetry selection, read by Wanda Singer, was "Measure for

Living," which stressed that God's instrument to measure is just one thing, the heart.

President Margaret Soell conducted the business meeting in which Lita Watson reported on the "Libraries 2000" project of GFWC. She urged members to contact their legislators to encourage more support for public libraries, stating that Texas ranks forty-sixth in the nation for per capita support for libraries.

Members were urged to become personally involved by each contributing a book to the local library. Wanda Singer reported that the book, "Barbara Jordan, American Hero," has been placed in Tom Burnett Memorial Library by the Twenty-Three Study Club.

Following the meeting, members were served refreshments by the hostesses.

unteers have taken a class on Critical Interest Stress Debriefing, not only to help them, but so they can help the other members of the team cope after a bad situation.

Skinner feels that any day without a call for the EMT's or firemen is a good day. He added that means no one's family members are hurt and no property has been lost.

Skinner says the one thing he would like to do is deliver a baby.

Mike McCarty has been an EMT two years. He had been a volunteer fireman one year before going to EMT training. He said before going into training it was really hard for him to stand back and not be able to help medically. Before his EMT training he was a "go-fer", which is important, but he wanted to do more. So when he was offered the chance to take the classes necessary to become an EMT he did not hesitate.

McCarty says he likes being able to help people when they need it. He added it gives him a great deal of pleasure and self satisfaction helping someone.

McCarty says it is real hard to find people who have the time to volunteer. He volunteers about 60 to 70 hours a month and works 40 hours a week at his employers. He is also the departments secretary / treasurer.

McCarty says though he is not married he has a girl friend and she is learning to deal with his sudden answer to calls for help. She is also learning to adapt to his not wanting to talk and just needing time to think.

McCarty also says that going back to the fire department and talking with the guys is the way he deals with the stress of the job. He said they might spend a hour or more just talking about anything and then when he gets home he just wants time to think.

McCarty says there are a couple of calls that he responded to that really stick in his mind.

One was shortly after he became an EMT, there was a couple in a wreck. They had either just gotten married or was on their way to get married and the man was dead on arrival and the lady had serious injuries but was conscious and kept asking about her husband. McCarty said he was trying to treat her injuries and didn't know what to tell her and felt really bad for her.

The other was a truck fire that had quite an impact on him. McCarty says that calls concerning children are always the hardest to deal with and harder to treat because they can't or don't know how to tell you where they are hurting. You just have to use your knowledge and try to figure out their problems.

All calls are disturbing but pediatric calls is the toughest emotionally, even if it is just minor.

McCarty says he is just glad that he can help people in this way.

Archie Layfield has been with the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department for 10 years. He became an EMT in 1992 and recertified in 1997.

Layfield says his wife, Lynnie, is flexible and is a lot of support to him. He says talking with his wife helps a lot. Sometimes it can make for an interesting dinner conversation. He also says that going back to the department and talking and cutting up with the guys is the best way to get over a distressful call.

He stated that through all the years doing this, it doesn't get any easier.

Layfield says that in a small town like Iowa Park, it is hard to go out on a call that you don't know someone involved.

He recalls going on a call for an accident and it was a fireman's wife and children involved. He added they never know what or who they are going to find when they go on a call.

Layfield recalls going on a "code" call for an infant. When he arrived he discovered the baby was his 3 1/2 month old cousin.

Layfield says it's hard to say why he does this, and he can't say he enjoys doing it but he enjoys being able to help somebody when they need help. And someone has to do it, so it might as well be him.

They always need more volunteers. At this time they only have 14 volunteers to cover fires and medical calls.

He works nights at the city's water treatment plant and is able to make most of the day-time calls. Most of the other men work day jobs. That might be part of the reason Layfield responded to the most calls last year.

Layfield says the main thing is getting to the scene right away.

He stated that a really sad thing is that alot of the elderly don't have someone to check on them often, and that sometimes leads to bad situations.

As with the other guys, Layfield says that calls concerning children is by far the most disturbing. But sometimes there is satisfaction in those calls. No one likes to make them but if a child is in need, it is nice to be able to help them. One case was a 2 1/2 or 3 year old that fell, and had bruises from head to toe. The child was transported to the hospital and received the help that was needed. Layfield says that helping a child like that makes it all worth while.

Scott McClure has been with the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department two years. He was stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base and said when he got out of the service he and his wife Carrie had decided they wanted to move to Iowa Park.

They have four children, two of which are nine month old twins (boy and girl).

He and his wife got acquainted with Iowa Park through his part-time job at Lone Star 103. He had broadcasted some of our football games and decided he really liked Iowa Park.

Peanut Butter Fingers

1/2 cup margarine
1/2 cup white sugar

1/2 cup brown sugar
1 egg
1/3 cup peanut butter
1/2 tsp. soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1 cup flour
1 cup rolled oats
1 (6 oz.) pkg. chocolate chips, (opt.)
Frosting:
1/2 cup powdered sugar
1/4 cup peanut butter
2-4 Tbsps. evaporated milk

Cream together the margarine, sugar, and brown sugar. Blend in the egg, peanut butter, soda, salt and vanilla. Stir in the flour and rolled oats. This will be thick. Spread in greased 13x9-inch pan. Bake 20-25 minutes at 350 degrees. When just out of oven, sprinkle with the chocolate chips (opt.). While they soften, mix powdered sugar, 1/4 cup peanut butter and evaporated milk. Drizzle this mixture over the top of chocolate chips. Spread over the entire top.

Blondies

6 Tbsps. margarine
1 3/4 cup light brown sugar
2 tsps. vanilla
2 large eggs
1 cup flour
2 tsps. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
1 1/2 cups pecans

Line a 9x13 pan with foil and grease foil. Oven 350 degrees. Melt margarine on low heat, remove pan and stir in sugar and vanilla, then eggs. Add combined dry ingredients just until blended. Stir in pecans. Spread in pan and bake 30 minutes.

Enchilada Casserole

1-2 lbs. ground hamburger meat, browned
1 med. onion, chopped
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can enchilada sauce
1 pkg. soft corn tortillas
1 lb. Cheddar cheese

Brown meat and onions. Grate cheese; set aside. Add chicken and mushroom soups and enchilada sauce to cooked meat and onions. In long baking dish layer, starting with tortillas, meat sauce, cheese, tortillas, meat and cheese. Leave enough cheese to cover top. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Yield: 8 servings.

Coconut Praline Pie

1/2 cup pecans
1/3 cup margarine
1/3 cup packed brown sugar
Melt margarine and add sugar and pecans. Bring to boil, and boil exactly 30 seconds. Pour into baked 9-inch pie shell and cool.

Beat together for 6 minutes:
2 envelopes Dream Whip
1 cup cold milk
1 tsp. vanilla
Then add two small boxes vanilla instant pudding, 1 3/4 cup milk and 1 can Baker's coconut.
Pour over praline pie - chill until set.

New Orleans Okra Gumbo

1 pkg. frozen okra, or 1 lbs. fresh okra
2 bell peppers
2 onions, chopped
1 can tomatoes

1 cup celery, chopped

Cook all ingredients in two cups of water until tender, adding okra and tomatoes last. Season to taste with salt, pepper, garlic salt, and butter. Bits of bacon or ham can be added. Cook down low and serve on rice. Yield: 4-6 servings.
