Long-time dentist retiring

Dr. Richard Carver will be taking down his shingle when he closes his office this afternoon.

The 73-year-old is retiring, after 39 years of practicing dentistry, 38 of which were here in Iowa Park.

He explained he wanted to enjoy retirement, while he is still in good health.

Though he has hobbies with which to spend his new-found spare time, such as jewelry making and figuring out how to operate his two home computers, he admitted he and his wife, Helen, likely will do some traveling as well.

Carver opened his first office in Lamesa, but after a year of fighting the aggravating dust storms which are common in that area, he moved to Iowa Park, which had no dentist.

His entire career in Iowa Park has been in the 300 block of North Wall. His first office was at 305, right next to the old post office and is now part of O.N. Newman's law office.

His current office, at 315, was constructed in 1969.

Carver has paid his dues as a citizen of Iowa Park, besides serving his patients. He has been president of

the Chamber of Commerce, secretary of the school board, president of the P-TA, head of the North Texas Boy Scout Council, a member of the city's planning commission, president of the Wichita Dental Society, and was president of the Iowa Park Industrial Development Council at the time that organization was successful in attracting Cryovac to locate here.

Born in Albuquerque, N. M., his family lived in various other towns in that state before moving to the Texas county of Swisher, settling in the rural community of Vigo Park.

Following graduation from Tulia High School, he joined the Air Corps in 1943, and went through basic training at Sheppard AFB.

Carver began his training as a pilot, and after several moves in his training was about to graduate, but World War II ended, and he was discharged from military duty.

Following his discharge Carver returned to Albuquerque and later to Tulia, where he met and married his late wife, Gloria, in 1947.

He worked at several jobs at

Tulia, including selling radio advertising, a clothing store and last at a furniture store where he was trained as an appliance repairman.

But Carver realized his future in those fields were not what he wanted to provide for his family, and, due to the fact that virtually all his relatives were in the health care field, decided

Sewer service project delayed for Bell Road

The long sought-after sewer service to residents at the northern end of Bell Road was temporarily put on hold Monday night.

As the city council was about to accept a bid to have the project constructed by a contractor, an objection was raised by one property owner.

Developer David Parkey, who is spokesman for a group which plans to develop the George Estate property, told the council he was unable to pay his part of the cost.

The city had originally planned to install a smaller gravity-flow pipeline to serve the residents along the east side of Bell.

During discussions on the project, Parkey proposed a larger line and lift station be included which would serve his development which is on the west side of Bell, and that he would pay the difference in the cost.

The city engaged an engineer to draw up the plans to include the larger system, and the project was advertised for contractors to bid on.

The lowest of two bids on the project was \$98,730, with Parkey's portion set at \$15,780.

Parkey explained that figure was greater than he had anticipated, and would add too much to the per-lot cost of his project. He asked that it be deleted.

Mayor Tim Hunter explained that, since the project was advertised for bids, the city is legally unable to negotiate or deviate from the plan's specifications. Any part of the project being changed would necessitate a new call for bids, he said.

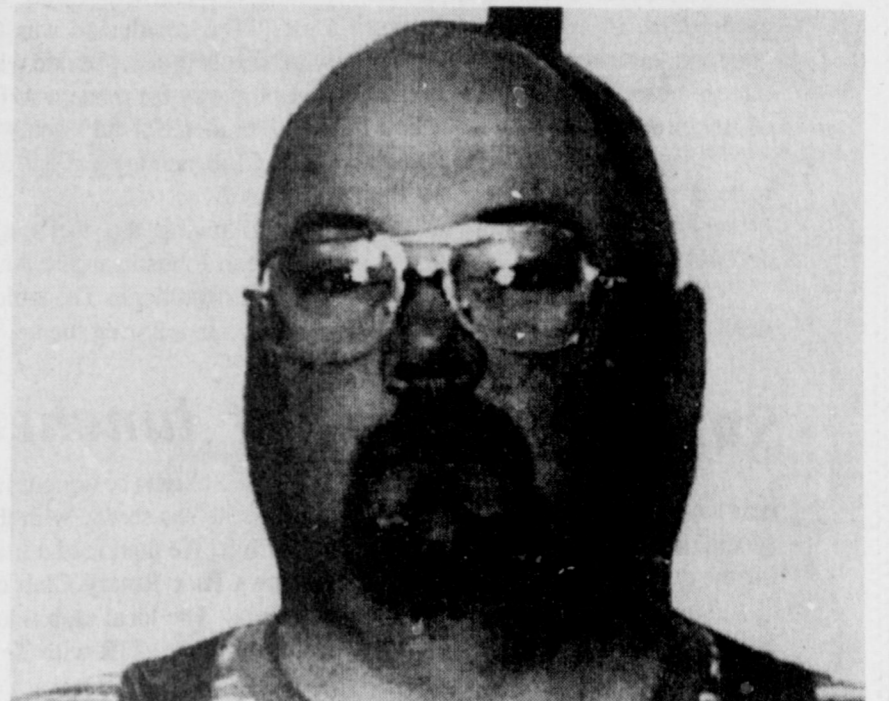
The council then voted to delay any action on the bid until its next meeting.

In other action, the council approved the mayor's appointments to two boards, held a public hearing on a grant application, and approved a

request to allow the city hall park be used as a rest stop for a bicycle race.

The mayor re-appointed Ray Zimmerer and E.E. "Buddy" Wiggins

to new terms on the Planning and Zoning Commission, and Doug Hill to succeed Dale Cox as utility representative on the Electrical Board.

Local man arrested on sexual charges

An Iowa Park man is being held in Wichita County jail facing charges of aggravated sexual assault of a child.

Eddie Keith Edge, 41, reportedly has admitted to sexually assaulting four females, ages eight to 12 years, and is being held under two \$100,000 bonds.

Police first received information concerning Edge's activities Thursday morning. Following investigation, he was taken into custody Saturday afternoon, and transported that evening to jail.

Local officers also used a warrant Tuesday to search his residence in the 400 block of North Park, and reportedly uncovered some pornographic evidence.

When in the police station to be interrogated, Edge reportedly stated that he "knew he had done wrong and wanted to get it off his chest."

Some of the offenses had been committed over the past 12 months.

Edge has apparently resided in Iowa Park five or more years.

Bomb find prompts investigation

When Wichita County Sheriff's deputies found a gate open at John Ray Enterprises, they had no idea they would find incendiary devices

on investigation.

But they did.

At around 2 p.m. Sunday, deputies were making routine patrol

checks when they noticed a gate was open at the trucking company on Rifle Range Rd, just north of the Old Iowa Park Road. After checking the gate, deputies found that one of the bay doors was also open and checked inside.

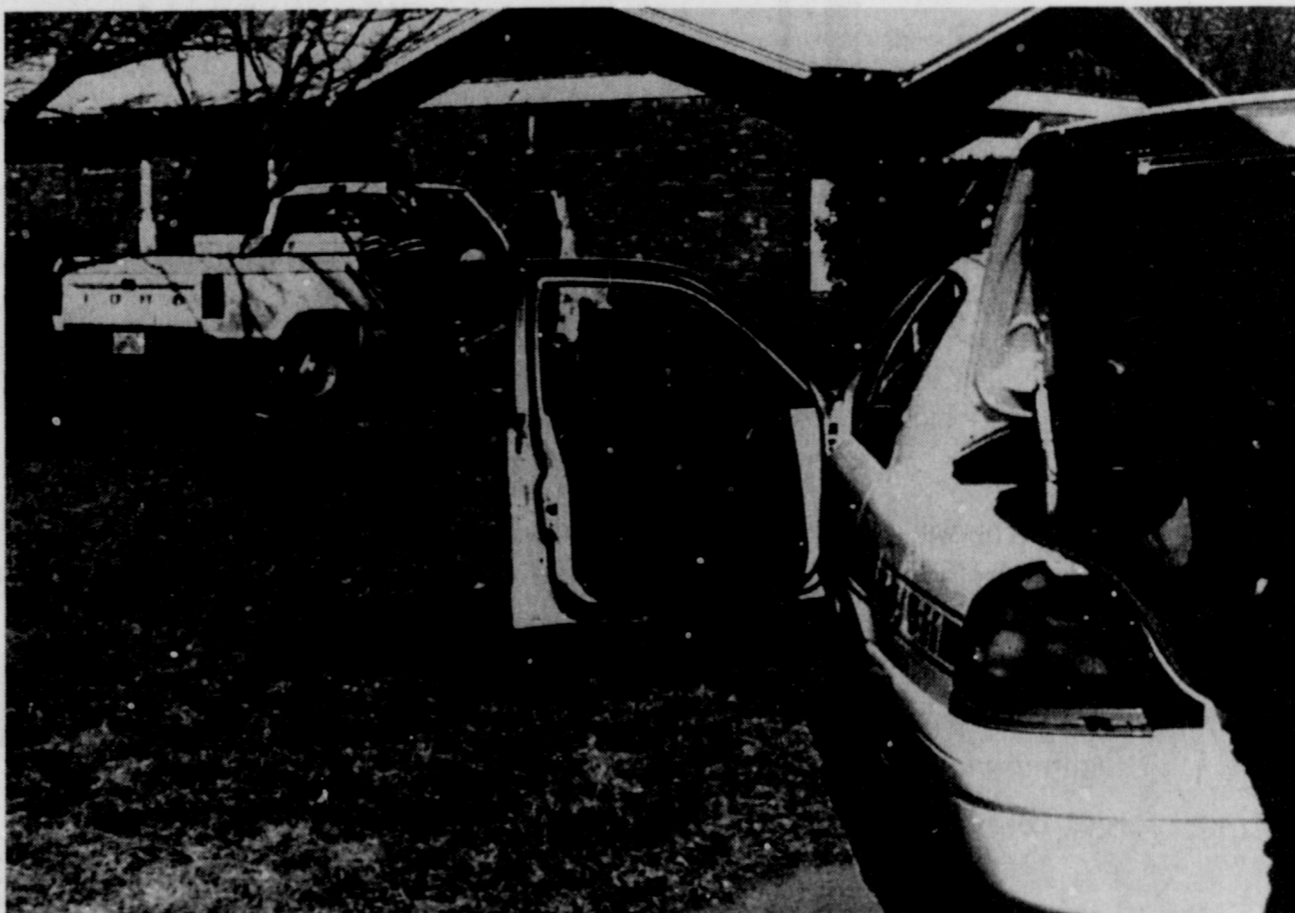
Once inside, they discovered three devices they considered to be unusual, and called for Sgt. David Duke and George Robinson, fire/arson investigators for the sheriff's department.

Robinson and Duke examined the devices and requested assistance from the Explosive Ordinance Disposal (EOD), a bomb disposal unit from Fort Sill, OK. Two EOD soldiers, along with Duke and Robinson, inspected the devices, separated the components to make them safe, and removed them from the building.

According to Lt. Cecil Yoder, they were incendiary devices, put together more to create a fire than an explosion.

It took a total of seven hours to secure the area.

Yoder said that the Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms were notified and two agents were in Wichita Falls Wednesday to assist with the investigation.



A CITY PICKUP was struck in the side Tuesday morning at the intersection of West Highway and Third Street, sending it skidding into a resident's yard. The driver, Stephen William Permar, 31, was not injured. Driver of the other vehicle, John Shannon Sims, 17, was exiting the Sonic driveway when his car hit the west-bound pickup. According to police, Sims not only did not have a drivers license or vehicle insurance when asked by the investigator, but he had only a few minutes earlier been in municipal court, answering charges of driving without a license and failure to provide financial responsibility from an earlier event.

City, school candidates file

Two candidates for alderman have filed for places on the city's ballot and one candidate for trustee on the school's ballot, as of presstime Wednesday.

Incumbents Tracy Fears and Bob Hamilton both filed this week for another term on the city council.

Randy Brown filed for trustee Place Six, a position which has been held by Randy Catlin.

The city has one other position without a candidate, that being held by Bud Mercer.

The other trustee incumbent whose term expires this spring, Keith Fisher, also has not yet filed.

Both the city and school elections will be held on May 1.

Candidates wishing to file in either election have until Wednesday, Mar. 17, to have their names on the ballots.

Applications to fill in the school election can be obtained either at the administration office or school tax office, while city council applications are available at city hall.

Preserving family history stressed at club meeting

Lindie Dwyer of Burkburnett, presented a program for the Twenty-three Study Club on preserving family histories in such a way that it can be passed down from generation to generation.

She stated that in this age of disposable items, it is very important that families preserve their histories, and since women are the primary collectors and preservers of family records and histories, they need to know the correct way to go about the task.

She emphasized "journalizing" and "documentation" of family memorabilia, including photographs, which is one way to relive memories and preserve the family history.

She urged members not only to identify and correctly display family photographs, but to write down stories about each. This serves a number of purposes. It enriches the present, builds self-esteem in children, inspires hope for the future, and connects the generations, in addition to making good economic sense, as photographs often represent a considerable amount of money spent over a period of time.

She told members the correct materials to be used for the protective preservation of photographs, both old and new.

Following the program, President Margaret Soell presided over

the business meeting, during which Mary Frances Farris was welcomed as a new member.

Mrs. Soell also reemphasized the libraries 2000 project of GFWC, and urged each member to make a book donation to the local library in the name of GFWC.

Federation Counselor's report was given by Frances Park, who read the winning poem from TFWC's poetry contest for grades one through three. She also read a letter from Texas Women's University advising that this year's TWU Founders Award will be presented to the Texas Federation of GFWC for their efforts in promoting award and one of which all members of the Texas Federation can be justly proud.

Shirley Hicks read the quotation for the day, "Motivation is what gets you started. Habit is what keeps you going."

Bonnie Medlinger gave the meditation entitled "Who Travels Best?" The conclusion was that he who travels best is the one who prepares the way for those who follow.

The theme of the Twenty-Three Study Club meeting was "Women in the Arts."

Following the meeting, hostesses Jean Johnson and Jo Ann Hale served refreshments. The tables were decorated in a Spring theme.

Smith is a 1998 graduate of Iowa Park High School and is employed with the City of Iowa Park.

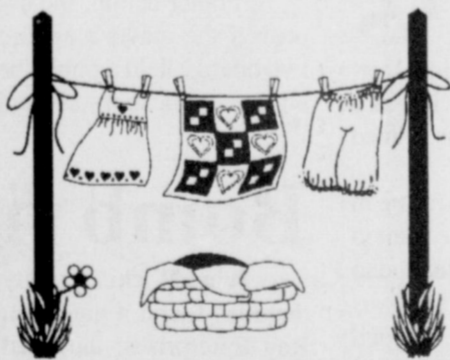

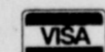

NEWS OF THE IOWA PARK GENEALOGICAL & HISTORICAL SOCIETY

For anyone who thinks family history and genealogy is dull, working on your family tree will change your mind.

Most of our ancestors were ordinary people and while they may not be mentioned in history books, many times they were written of in city and or county histories. If they were pioneers of a region, this can give a great deal of information on your family history. These histories often include collateral families with names and other data on children, occupations as well as membership in organizations, and military service.

There are many sources of information available to the family genealogist but of primary importance is writing down all you know on such topics as ethnic background, religion preference, date of immigration to America and to the various places they lived after immigration.

It helps to know our ancestors' social status, their occupation - whether farmers, merchants, teachers, ministers, miners, politicians, etc. Some came as indentured servants and worked to pay for their boat passage. All this history makes your family tree more interesting. It's not necessary to make a long story, sometimes a few words will make a better picture of your ancestors.

Genealogy is a mixture of history and geography as well as names, dates and relationship. What events were taking place in the world, in America at the time your ancestors decided to immigrate? Imagine leaving a homeland, relatives and young children behind, with space on ships limited, what provisions, food and other possessions were needed for the long voyage in a sailing ship and also what implements were

needed to start life in the new world. Social history of the times also helps paint the whole picture. Some social history might include what houses were like. Did your ancestors live in a grand house or perhaps in "soddy" on the plains? Don't forget to mention dress styles, food and maybe superstitions, education and the many other facts of their lives.

Don't forget to fill out "family group sheets" and bring them to the next meeting. Forms are available at the library.

Even if you aren't that interested in family genealogy we need your help to preserve the history of Iowa Park for future generations.

SMART VEGETABLE RECIPES



Sesame Broccoli

1 lb. fresh broccoli (or 10 oz. pkg. frozen broccoli)
1 Tbsp. salad oil
1 Tbsp. vinegar
1 Tbsp. soy sauce
4 tps. sugar
1 Tbsp. sesame seed, toasted

Cook broccoli in small amount of boiling water about 15 minutes or until tender; drain. In a small saucepan, combine oil, vinegar, soy sauce, sugar and sesame seed. Heat to boiling. Pour sauce over hot broccoli, turning spears to coat. Serve immediately.

Copper Carrot Pennies

2 lbs. carrots, sliced
1 small green pepper, sliced into rings
1 med. onion, thinly sliced
1 can tomato soup
1 cup sugar (or less)
3/4 cup vinegar
1 tsp. prepared mustard
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
Salt and pepper to taste

Cook carrots in slightly salted water until tender. Cool. Alternate layers of carrots, green pepper rings and onion slices in dish. Combine the remaining ingredients. Stir until well-blended. Pour over vegetables and refrigerate at least 24 hours.

Spicy Hominy

2 large cans hominy, white or yellow
3 Tbsps. grated onion
1 1/2 cups Monterey Jack cheese
2 cans diced green chiles
1 1/2 cups sour cream
Salt to taste
1/2 cup buttered crumbs

Mix ingredients and put in greased casserole and sprinkle buttered crumbs over top. Bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

Sweet Potatoes Hawaiian

4 cups (2 cans) sweet potatoes, cooked and mashed
1 cup drained crushed pineapple
1/2 cup packed brown sugar
3 Tbsps. butter or margarine
Dash ground cloves

Combine all ingredients and pour into 1 1/2 quart casserole. Bake in 350 degree oven 25 minutes or until bubbly hot.

Wild Rice Casserole

1 box long grain and wild rice
Chicken broth
2 small cans sliced mushrooms
1 cup pecans
1/2 cup butter

Prepare rice according to package directions, using chicken broth instead of the water called for. Saute mushrooms and pecans in butter and mix in with the cooked rice, reserving enough for topping. Pour mixture into casserole and bake at 375 degrees until hot throughout and top is nicely browned.

Triple Casserole

Sauce:
2 cups mayonnaise
4 tps. olive oil
1 med. onion, grated
Few drops Tabasco
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Mix ingredients together and chill 48 hours.

Cook, according to package directions:

1 - 10 oz. pkg. frozen green peas
1 - 10 oz. pkg. frozen lima beans
1 - 10 oz. pkg. frozen green beans, French style
4 hard-boiled eggs

Drain well and add sauce. Top with grated hard-boiled eggs and serve.

Zucchini Pie

4 cups sliced unpeeled zucchini
1 cup coarsely chopped onion
1/4 cup butter
1/2 cup chopped fresh parsley
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. ground pepper
1/4 tsp. sweet basil leaves
2 eggs, well beaten
8 ozs. Mozzarella cheese
1 - 8 oz. can crescent dinner rolls
2 tps. Dijon mustard

Pre-heat oven to 375 degrees. In 10-inch skillet, cook zucchini and onion in butter until tender, about 10 minutes. Stir in parsley and seasonings. In large bowl, blend eggs and cheese. Stir in vegetable mixture.

Separate roll dough into eight triangles and press down into 10-inch pie plate to form a crust on the sides and bottom. Spread crust with mustard and pour vegetable mixture into crust. Bake 20 minutes and let stand 10 minutes before serving.

Brussels Sprouts Milanese

3 - 10 oz. pkgs. frozen Brussels sprouts, cooked
3/4 cup (3 ozs.) Swiss cheese, grated
1/2 cup (3 ozs.) Parmesan cheese, grated
2 Tps. butter, melted
1/4 tsp. salt
Dash pepper
1 tsp. lemon juice

Place Brussels sprouts in buttered 1-quart baking dish; sprinkle with cheese. Blend butter with salt, pepper and lemon juice and pour over sprouts. Bake in a 350 degree oven 20 minutes or until lightly browned.

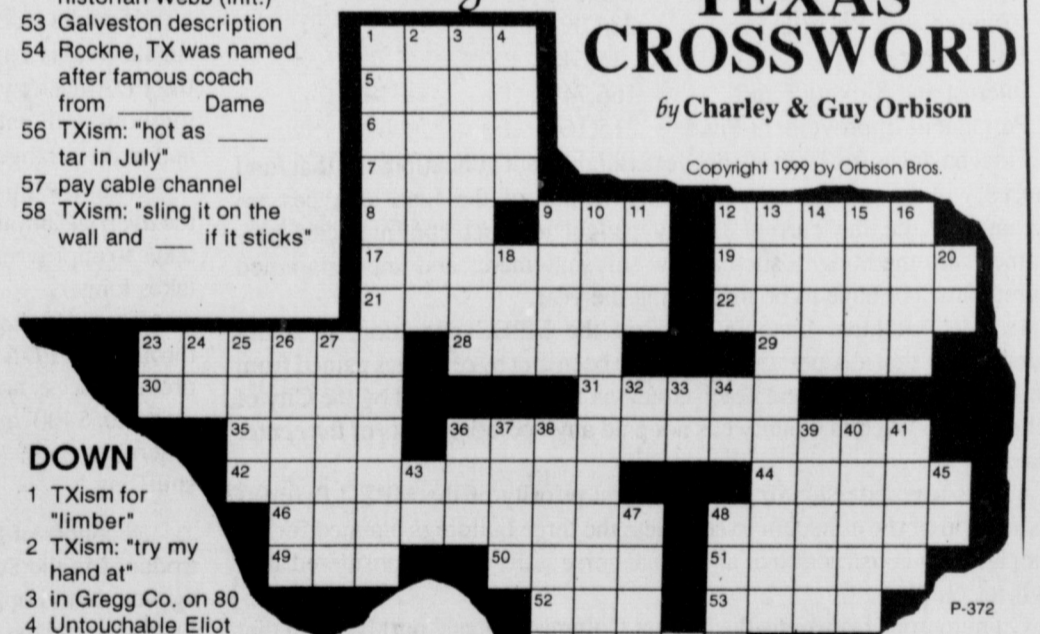

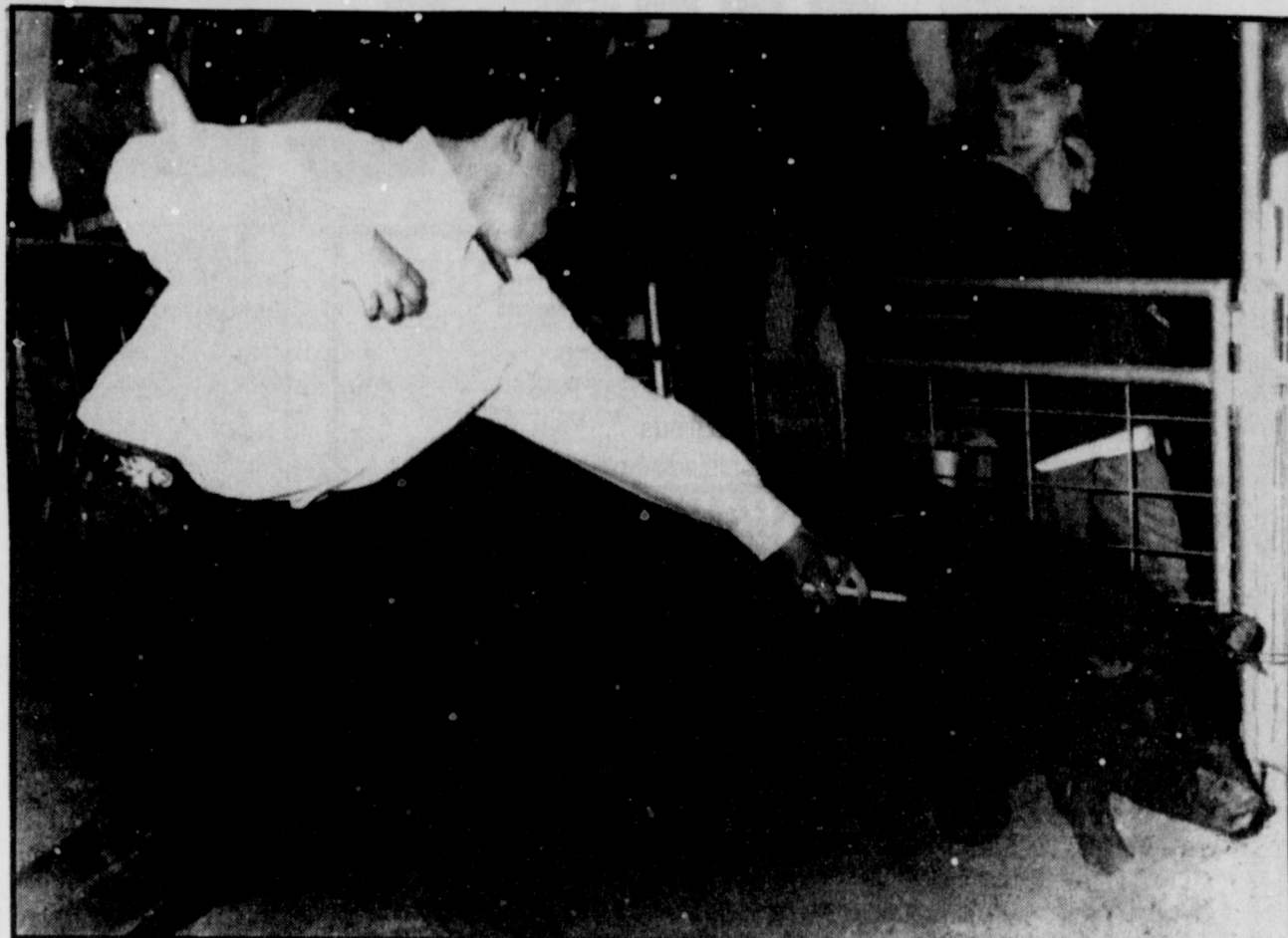

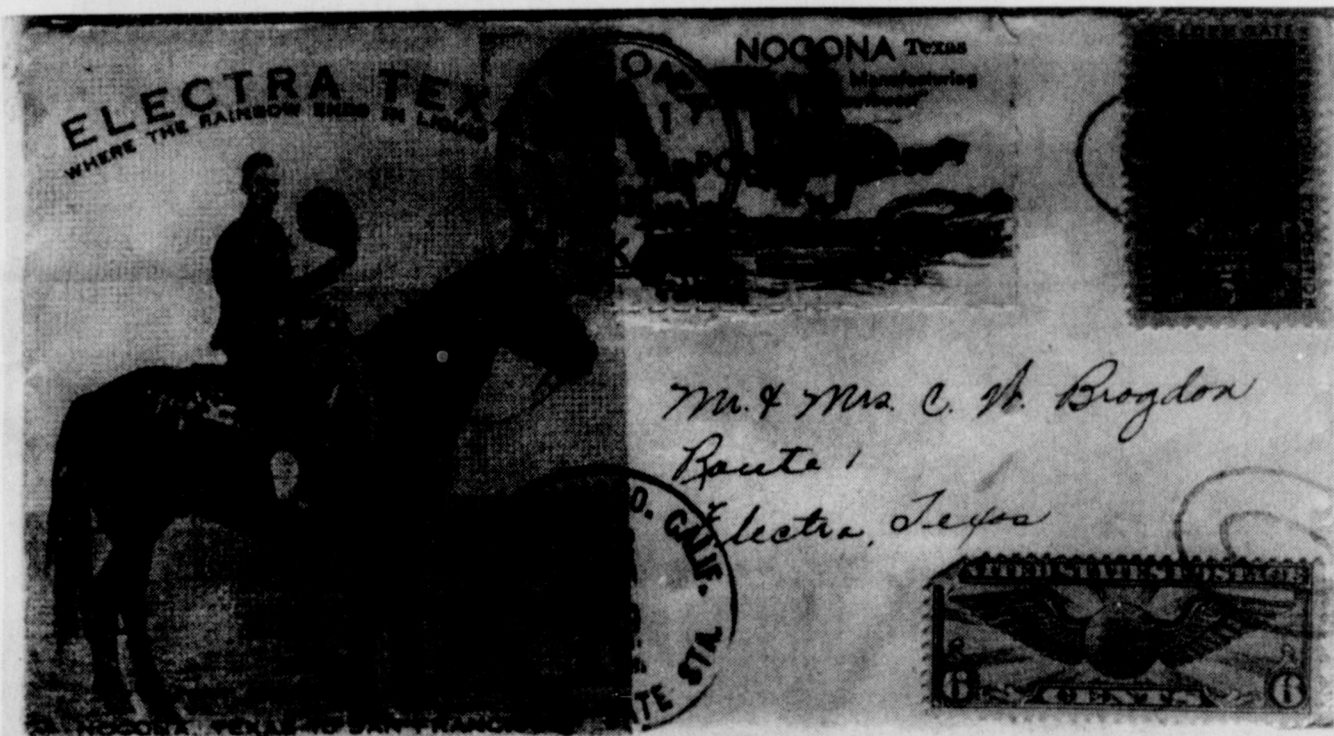
