Council okays funding for track's completion

The city council Monday night approved funds to finance completion of the walking track around Lake Gordon.

The estimated cost to finalize the project was \$62,500.

Included in the budgeting were concrete walking path, bridge bracing, bridge reconstruction and decking, boardwalk framing and decking, decking screws, concrete and guard rail posts, which amounted to \$56,800.

The additional funds approved were \$5,700 for contingency expenses.

Also approved was a request by Mrs. Pat O'Callaghan, who requested a waiver of setback requirements to allow penning of small livestock at her home on the corner of Magnolia and Third Street.

She told the council all requirements of the city's ordinance concerning livestock have been met, including permission from neighbors.

Mrs. O'Callaghan told the council she wants to keep goats in the long-established pen area, both for her children to have as projects and also to keep the area clean, reducing a rodent problem.

As president of the Chamber of Commerce, Kenneth Via requested permission to use the Lake Gordon area for an event he identified as "Parkfest," on May 15.

He said the event should attract people, both local and outside the city, to the lake and exposing all the

walking track and other work the city is doing to make the area attractive and appealing.

Aldermen readily approved Via's request.

Also approved was a resolution approving the city's application for funding through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs Texas Capital Fund Real Estate Development Program.

If approved by the state agency, that funding would be used to allow Kathy Hicks, owner of Kathy's Kakes, to relocate in the Dudley's Deli building on West Park.

Two ordinances also were approved, both relating to annexations of land into the city. Included were a 4.962-acre tract of Park Place Addition, and a 10-acre tract on the east side of Bell Road.

Heavy rainfall hits city Tuesday night

That noisy storm that moved over Iowa Park shortly after midnight Tuesday brought with it some desirable moisture, but also caused many city workers to lose some sleep.

Virgil Woodfin said he measured 2.15 inches at his residence.

Iowa Park and the entire area were placed under a flash flood watch by the U.S. Weather Bureau, and there indeed was some high water in the city.

Municipal crews were called out to place barriers in streets in several areas of the city, and numerous rural roadways also had water running over them as late as 8 a.m. Wednesday.

However, no homes were reported as being flooded, unlike some unfortunate residents of Wichita Falls.

A large tree in front of a residence in the 700 block of East Cash was split by lightning which accompanied the storm.

School election slated for bonds, not trustees

For the second consecutive year, the school board election has been canceled.

During their regular meeting last Thursday night, members of the school board issued an order to cancel the trustee election, slated for May 1, because Randy Brown was the only candidate to file for Place 6, being vacated by Randy Catlin, and incumbent Keith Fisher drew no opposition for Place 7.

If only one candidate files for each position and there are no written candidates by the deadline, the board of trustees may cancel the election.

Brown and Fisher will be sworn in after the election date of May 1.

Also, in regard to the upcoming election, Dorothy Ward was approved as election judge, and Maxine Gregg as alternate election judge of Precinct 34 and 09. They will preside over the May 1 voting at West Wichita County Coop at Kamay.

During his report, Allen Shewmake, Director of Transportation, showed a video from one of the cameras that have been installed on four of the district's school buses.

The video shows time, date,

speed, and other information as well as providing a clear picture of events taking place on the bus. Shewmake asked the board to consider equipping more buses with the cameras.

A request by Shewmake to upgrade the computer system in the tax office for an estimated cost of \$17,021, was approved by the board.

He told the trustees that the current tax collections system would not operate in the year 2000 without being upgraded. The cost includes hardware, software, installation, and support training.

Action to be taken on the high school cheerleader constitution was tabled until the next meeting, giving Principal Alan Seay time to look over the proposed constitution.

The re-employment of Teresa Jameson, tax office secretary, and Elizabeth Merk, assistant food service director, was approved for the next school year.

Early voting is underway

Early voting was begun for two elections which will be held May 1, including the \$5.2-million school bond proposal and choosing between six candidates for three city council positions.

Early balloting in the school bond election is being held at the school tax office, 1303 North Fourth St., and the city's poll is at city hall.

Tuesday, April 27, is the final day early voting will conclude in both elections.

Hours when early voting in the school bond issue are 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. on week days, and 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. weekdays in the city election.

In the city council race, all three incumbents have drawn opponents, including: Place One, incumbent Tracy Fears and Johnny Crawford; Place Three, incumbent Bob Hamilton and Wayne House, and Place Five, Floyd Williams and incumbent Bud Mercer.

No election was necessary for the school board, because only two candidates filed for the two positions with terms expiring.

The only two candidates for the board are incumbent Keith Fisher and Randy Brown, who succeeds Randy Catlin, who did not choose to seek re-election.

Plans for 'Parkfest' are key to Chamber

Details of a special new event, "Parkfest", are still being worked on by the sponsoring Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

The event, which is expected to attract an unusually large crowd on Saturday, May 15, will be staged around Lake Gordon.

Among the features will be numerous arts and crafts booths, food and game booths, entertainment, a fishing event for kids, and displays of cars, motorcycles and boats, according to Kenneth Via, Chamber president.

The booths will be placed along the new walking track.

Via pointed out during Monday's meeting of the Chamber board members, that there are some presently unfunded costs involved, and he called for all Chamber members to volunteer to work that day.

A special meeting of the board will be held in two weeks to work on final details of the event, Via said.

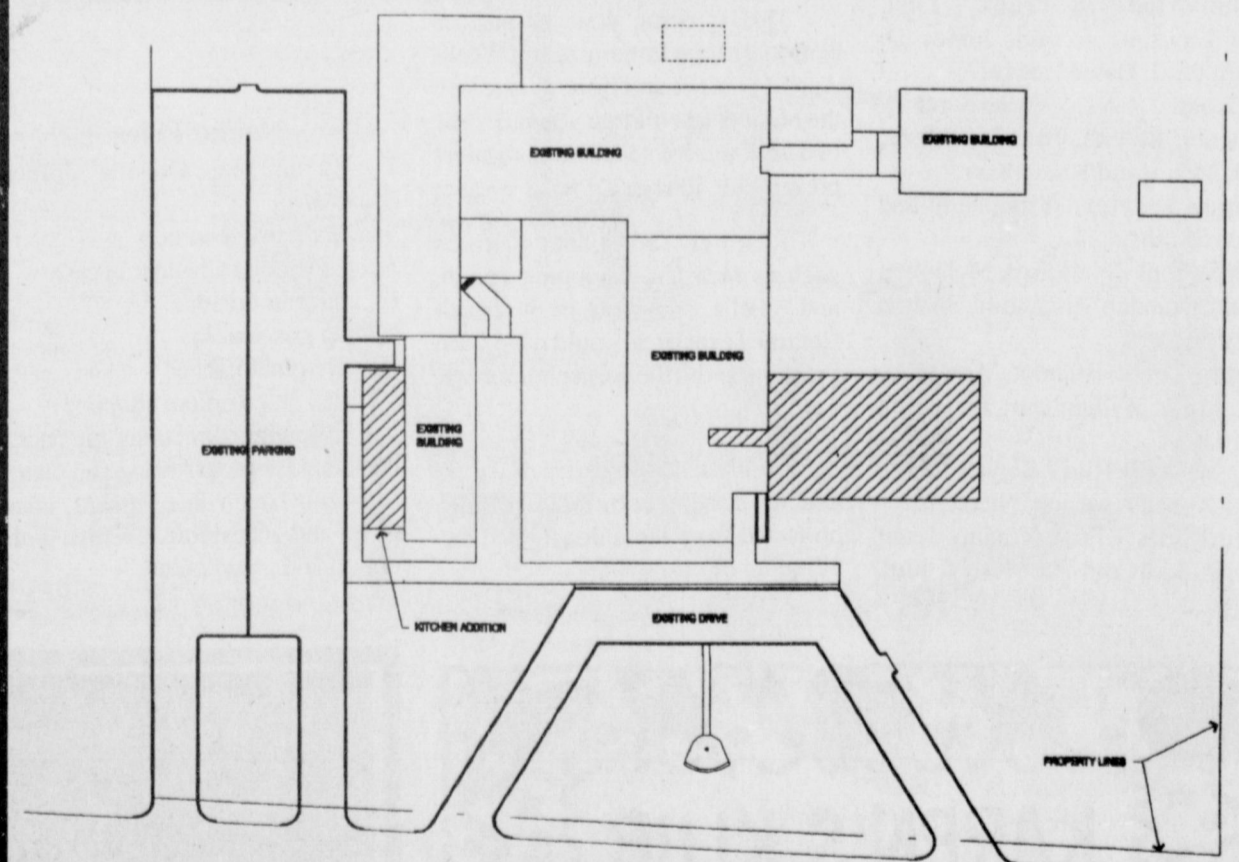
Other events which are sponsored by the Chamber which are upcoming include the City-Wide Clean-Up project which is currently underway and will conclude this weekend, the annual spring City-Wide Garage Sale this Saturday, and the annual All-Iowa Park Golf Tournament on Friday, June 4.

An important event to the community, the \$5.2-million school bond issue on May 1, was explained in detail to board members by Keith Fisher, president of the school board, and Mike Caplinger, superintendent.

Also discussed was a project of the Chamber's membership committee, when chairman Robert Palmer said the group is working on identifying potential members and a program to provide incentives to belong.

Proposed Bradford Elementary construction



Bradford construction plans told

\$965,000 in new construction and renovation work is earmarked for Bradford Elementary School if the bond issue is approved by voters on May 1.

Six new classrooms and additional restrooms will be built, and the administration offices and kitchen will be expanded. Renovations include enlarging the computer room, ductwork installed in eight classrooms, installation of canopies and improvements in the parking areas.

Funds are also included for kitchen equipment and furniture.

Building and renovation needs on each campus were determined after a lengthy study

by members of the facility task force and the school board.

The upcoming bond election is a result of overcrowding on all campuses, more requirements from Austin, and state and federal mandates, with less funding from the government.

Voters in the Iowa Park school district will determine the outcome on Saturday, May 1, with polling places located at Kidwell and Bradford Elementary Schools and West Wichita Special Education Coop in Kamay.

Early voting began April 14, and will continue through April 27. Early votes may be cast from

8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. at the City/School Tax Office.

School board members and Supt. Mike Caplinger have been speaking with different groups, explaining the bond issue and answering questions. They will continue the presentations throughout this month.

Free immunizations offered for infants

No appointment is necessary. All parents need to do is bring in their child, with a copy of their shot record, and they will update their vaccinations at no charge.

This is being done as part of National Infant Immunization Week, April 18-24, in an effort to increase the number of children younger than two who receive vaccinations against preventable illnesses.

Research shows that diseases such as measles, whooping cough, and rubella, occurring in the North Central Texas area, could have been prevented with the proper immunization.

Children need a series of vaccinations, starting at birth, to be fully protected from these deadly and debilitating diseases.

Roasted Garlic Chicken Fingers with Ranch-Style Dressing

4 skinned and boned chicken breast halves, cut into 1/2-inch strips

1/2 cup Kikkoman Roasted Garlic Teriyaki Marinade & Sauce

3/4 cup yellow cornmeal

3 Tbsps. all-purpose flour

1/2 tsp. pepper

3 Tbsps. vegetable oil

1 large egg, lightly beaten

Ranch-style dressing

Garnish: fresh parsley sprig

Combine chicken and roasted garlic teriyaki sauce in a bowl. Chill, stirring occasionally, 20 minutes.

Stir together cornmeal, flour, and pepper in a shallow dish. Pour oil into

a 15x10-inch jellyroll pan, tilting pan to cover bottom.

Dip chicken in egg; dredge in cornmeal mixture. Place in a single layer in oiled pan.

Bake at 425 degrees 5 minutes. Turn chicken over, and bake 8 more minutes or until chicken is done. Serve with Ranch-style dressing. Garnish, if desired. Makes 6 servings.

Cheddar Potato Topped Meatloaf

Meatloaf:

1 1/2 lbs. lean ground beef

3/4 cup frozen Ore-Ida Chopped onions

1/3 cup saltine cracker crumbs

1 egg, slightly beaten

3 Tbsps. milk

1 tsp. dried thyme leaves, crushed

3/4 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

Cheddar Potato Topping:

1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen Ore-Ida mashed potatoes

1 1/2 cups milk

1 pkg. (10 oz.) frozen peas and carrots

3/4 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

1/2 cup Cheddar cheese, shredded

Heat oven to 375 degrees. In large bowl combine meatloaf ingredients, mixing lightly but thoroughly.

Press beef mixture into bottom of 9-

inch square baking pan. Bake 20-25 minutes or until no longer pink and juices run clear. Pour off drippings.

Meanwhile in a 2-quart microwave-safe dish, combine all potato topping ingredients except cheese. Microwave on High 11 to 12 minutes, stirring once halfway.

Spread potatoes over beef mixture to edge of pan; sprinkle with cheese. Broil 3 to 4 inches from heat 5 to 7 minutes or until top is lightly browned.

To serve, cut meatloaf into six rectangular pieces.

Southwestern Kabobs

4 boneless top loin pork chops, cut into 1-inch cubes

4 Tbsps. taco or fajita seasoning

1/2 green bell pepper, seeded and cut into 1-inch pieces

1/2 large onion peeled & cut into 1-inch pieces

In a plastic bag or shallow bowl, toss together pork cubes with desired seasoning until pork is evenly coated.

Thread pork cubes, alternating with pepper and onion pieces, onto skewers. Grill over a medium-hot fire, turning occasionally, until pork is nicely browned.

If using wooden skewers, soak in water 20 minutes before using.

FORT GREELY, Alaska - Getting all four military services together on the same sheet of music for a training exercise is difficult. Throw in a peace enforcement situation carried out under U.N. guidelines and the training becomes even more difficult.

But, for the son of an Iowa Park couple, training amid this Alaskan wilderness in temperatures as low as 30 degrees below zero was enough to test even the most hardened soldier.

Army Spec. Travis S. Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Wilson, 1946 Johnson Road, was one of over 10,000 service members who took part in the joint service exercise "Northern Edge '99."

The extreme cold-weather training focused on both current and future warfare, with traditional combat maneuvers combined with peace enforcement operations.

All services worked together with cargo planes hauling airborne troops among a background of field artillery, attack helicopters, naval operations, even medical pararescue efforts.

Soldiers even found themselves in a peace enforcement environment, separating warring factions and providing humanitarian relief. Live fire exercises added even more realism to the training.

During the exercise, Wilson was an airborne medic for the 1st Battalion, 501st Infantry Regiment. "My job is the senior line medic for the 2nd Platoon. I make sure all the soldiers are keeping warm, and I treat any physical ailments that they might have."

"During missions, I follow the platoon sergeant or platoon leader and wait for the call for a medic. I also set up a command post where injured soldiers can be brought to me," explained Wilson.

Training for soldiers stationed in Alaska is anything but routine. With temperatures that can plummet to over 60 degrees below zero, soldiers can do permanent damage to themselves in minutes, without the proper safety measures.

"The cold weather environment and Mother Nature are nothing to joke about. As a medic, I saw three frostbite cases on the second night here. When you're outside, you have to stay moving to stay warm. Most soldiers remember the word COLDF... wear 'C'lean clothing, avoid 'O'verheating, wear loose 'L'ayers of clothes and stay 'D'ry. If you follow that, you should be alright."

For soldiers from the "lower 48," life in Alaska is normally a dramatic change from their hometown. Most either love or hate their tour here.

"Living in Alaska has its benefits. It's the prettiest state I've been in, and the coldest. There are many things to do, like hiking or going to see one of the various glaciers. My wife, Julie, thinks she's ready to go back to the lower 48, but I think she needs to stick around for a while. There are many things to do in the city, like professional hockey games, shopping and too many other things to list. It's a lot of fun," he said.

You said the Sears catalog had its start when small towns didn't offer similar products, as if they now do. There are at least a dozen web sites that offer a Sony Mavica Digital Camera (MCVFD-51) at \$650.00. Any in Iowa Park at a comparable price? Any current (hard-back) best sellers at 40% off list? Any computers at rock bottom prices? Any Ink Jet Printers/Any Zip Drives. Any Software wholesalers/Automobiles/Antelope jerky/Any NY Yankee programs/1938 Robert Johnson records/Any parts for a '49 Henry J?

AARP has offered prescription drugs by mail for years. Some people use that service while others may pay a higher price for personal service, smaller quantities, delivery, credit, and a smile. Web shopping is no different. In many situations personal service will win out over price. High

ticket, low service, specialty items that would have a long, long shelf life in a small town will be sold quicker, cheaper, and better on the Internet.

In the limited time you said you watch television you could be using the net to browse the NY Times, The Washington Post, or check the best track times in the Star-Telegram, without as many commercials. You could then send a letter (E-mail) to your children in Omaha (instantly and free), search for an old Army buddy in a national phone book, or check Charlton Heston's latest NRA speech. For that next press convention in Brady, Texas you could clock on www.bradytx.com and find they have a 90 hole golf course that plays like 18, complete with a layout map of the course and a picture of the 9th green. You would also find that 11,300 people have visited Brady this year via the Internet and looked at their best features complete with color pictures. Seems to me that would be good for a community.

Bob, I understand about 1/2 of 1% about the Internet but in terms of access to information and knowledge that puts me 100 times in front of someone that knows nothing. There are many 10 year old kids that are light years ahead of me. Remember some define an education as "Knowing how and where to find the things you don't know".

The most frequently traveled paths become trails. The most important trails become roads. The most prosperous roads become highways. The highways that link the major cities become Interstate Highways. Today the farther you are from an Interstate, the more difficult it is to build a commercial base (resort location excluded). The INFORMATION SUPER HIGHWAY is the same, the farther you are from it, the more difficult it will be to grow.

It is unfortunate, but with progress there are some skills, trades and products that are casualties, because they simply are passed by. On the other hand the second "T" in AT&T probably doesn't have much to do with Telegraph anymore and I doubt they miss it. General Electric will sell you a freezer, finance a home, present a new network television show, repair a jet engine, or write an auto insurance agency. A long way

from a light bulb. Radio Shack, 6,900 stores, had its beginning in 1919 when two friends, Hinckley and Tandy formed a leather company. Anyone remember Mr. Hinckley? New methods offer new opportunities, the only casualties are those that will not change. Old dogs that will not learn new tricks are found covered with skid marks, littering the Information Highway.

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GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Q. When can we put down our first lawn fertilizer application on St. Augustine? We live in Iowa Park.

A. You can apply the first round of fertilizer to your St. Augustine lawn in mid-April. Check now and get your fertilizer from local garden centers and do-it-yourself pest control outlets.

Make sure your spreader is in top condition for the season. You will be ready to go in mid-April.

For your information, the fertilizer to use is a quality, slow-release nitrogen lawn food with a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio. Fertilizers such as 21-7-14, 16-4-8, or 15-5-10 are prime examples of 3-1-2 and 4-1-2 ratio fertilizers. These fertilizers are easily applied with a broadcast type spreader.

Q. I live in Wichita Falls and have a seven year old Redbud in my landscape. This tree is in bloom, but some of the limbs appear to have dead growth at the tips. I noticed that the tree was rather thin last year. What do you think is causing the problem? A nursery professional recommended that I contact you.

A. Redbuds are susceptible to borer infestations at this age. These insects destroy the conductive tissue within a tree causing limb dieback and thinning of the tree canopy.

Check the main trunk area between the soil line and the first set of side limbs on the tree for small holes randomly occurring. Many times you will also find sap leakage from these wounds. These are prime symptoms of borer damage.

Treat the trunk region of the tree from the ground line to the first set of side limbs once per month with Dursban. Good coverage of the entire trunk area is important to prevent

future borer problems.

You can continue this preventative spray program from April through September (the main growing season).

Q. I live outside Wichita Falls in the county, and I've found some wild onions on my property. Can I eat these onions?

A. Wild onions were once used by Indians to season wild game and other foods. They are edible assuming that the plant you have identified as wild onions is indeed, and if no chemicals have been applied to the onions that would render the plant non-edible.

Q. I am finding grubs in my compost heap in Wichita Falls. Is this going to be damaging to put the compost into my garden?

A. Compost heaps will generally heat up to 100 degrees plus if

they are properly maintained in the summer. This will kill any weed seeds, pathogens, or insects that are in the pile.

If the grubs you have found are very large they may be what entomologists call a scarab, which is of no major harm. These large grub-like insects simply feed on the decaying organic matter. Only a few of the smaller grubs should not pose any

great threat to your garden crops.

Plain and simple, the value of good compost outweighs any risk. Grub problems in a garden can be controlled with control products if

necessary, but we rarely see any grub infestations of any concern in the garden. St. Augustine lawns seem to be their favorite target. Keep composting.

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

Professional, Christian counseling is now available to resident of Iowa Park through Faith Baptist Church.

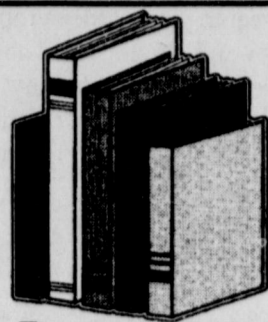

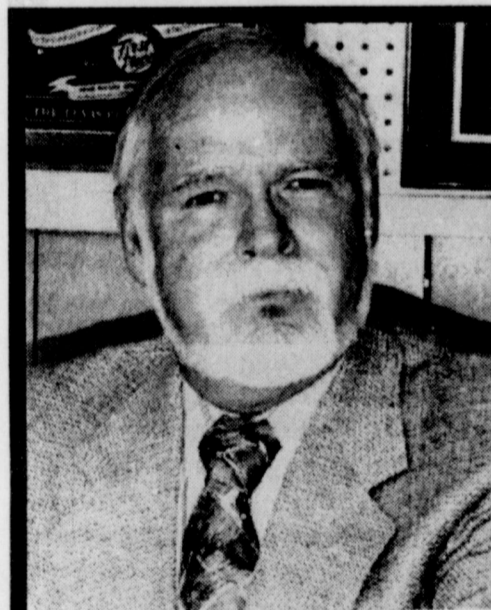

High School TAAS scores up from last year

Iowa Park High School Principal received a preliminary record of IPHS student's 1999 TAAS test, taken in February.

The results show that 91 percent of the students passed the reading portion of the test, with 69 percent of those earning Academic Recognition in that area.

Further, 81 percent of the students passed the math portion of the exam, with 34 percent of those achieving academic recognition.

Scores for the writing portion of the test have not yet been reported.

Scores above 80 percent passing in each section of the TAAS are one part of the qualification for a school to receive the Recognized label. For the first time, the scores of all students who took the test are included in this calculation. In years past, only scores of those students not in special education classes have been included.

Seay said, "We are very pleased with the result of on this year's TAAS. Our percentages are up from last year, even with the addition of the special education students' scores."

Iowa Park places 3rd at District UIL

Final team scores from the District 5-AAA Academic UIL competition show the Iowa Park High School UIL team finished in third place.

First and second place finishers after the One Act Play results were included were Vernon with 359 points, and Bowie with 231 points. Iowa Park had 205 points total.

Sixteen Iowa Park students will represent the District at Regional competition in Odessa on April 24.

February good month for local businesses

Business in Iowa Park picked up considerably in February, when compared with the same month last year, according to a report on sales tax collections filed by the state comptroller's office.

The City of Iowa Park received a sales tax rebate check for \$21,300.90, which was a 24.9-percent increase over last year's rebate.

This month's rebate includes local sales taxes collected in February and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in March.

For the year, \$98,512.64 in tax

rebates have been returned to Iowa Park, and that's a 10.41-percent increase over this time in 1998, according to the report.

Electra is the only other city in Wichita County with a larger increase for the year, 63.04 percent. Wichita Falls is up 2.98 percent and Burkburnett 2.13 percent.

Holiday's tax rebates are running 36.81 percent below 1998. In fact, Lakeside City is the only community in Archer County that is not below last year, the comptroller's office reports.

Relay teams break records

The Iowa Park Hawks broke a pair of school records in the relays this weekend at the Texasville Relays in Archer City en route to their second-place finish overall.

The Hawks finished with 90.3 points overall, and in doing so broke the old mark of 43.40 seconds in the 400M Relay, which has been in place since 1960. The previous mark was set by the State Champion Track team from Iowa Park that season.

Jimmy Wilson, Tommy Duerson, Jessy Robertson and Malcom Wise crossed the finish line with a time of 43.06 to finish in second just behind Holliday.

In the 1600M Relay, Iowa Park had broken the school record last week, but before the paint could dry on the mark set in the Boomtown Relays, Wise, Jeff Duerson, Dustin Shierry and Tommy Duerson had shaved the mark even more, finishing in first place with a time of 3:23.20.

The JV boys also had a good meet, bringing home the first-place trophy with a total of 146 points.

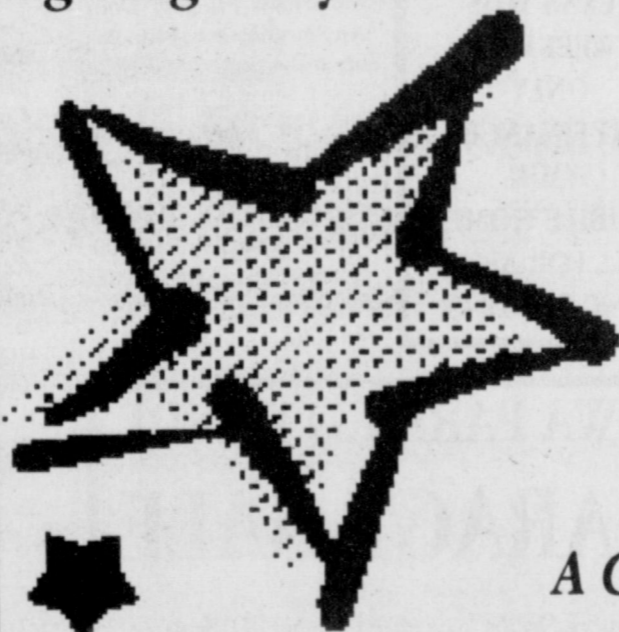
