wind, but all the participants appeared to enjoy themselves. Leading the parade was an impressive delegation from Sheppard AFB, including the honor guard, flags from every state behind the stars and stripes, and numerous marching airmen.

Huge voter turnout is indicated locally

The two local elections being held here May 1 could possibly draw more voters than ever before, on a non-presidential election year.

As of noon Wednesday, 70 ballots had been cast by early voters in the school bond issue, and 44 in the city council election.

Next Tuesday is the deadline for early voting in person.

Leading voter interest is the proposed \$5.2-million school improvement bond election. If approved,

major improvements, including additional classrooms, will be made at each of the district's four campuses.

A school trustee election also was to have been held May 1, but that was cancelled when neither candidate, incumbent Keith Fisher and newcomer Randy Brown drew an opponent.

Election of three city aldermen also is attracting an unusually large

Parkfest is meeting topic

A called meeting of Chamber of Commerce directors will be held at noon Monday, for the purpose of finalizing plans for the Parkfest event, which will be held May 15.

Among the key events of Parkfest, which will be held at Lake Gordon, is to allow local residents and non-profit organizations to have booth spaces to sell merchandise.

According to President Ken Via, some of those booth spaces remain available, "for people who didn't sell all their merchandise at the recent City-Wide Garage Sale."

A limited number of booth spaces, which will be 15x20 feet in size, can be rented for \$20, by con-

tacting the Chamber office.

Non-profit organizations also are being contacted to have booths similar to those they have during Whoop-Do, for games and foods.

Also expected to be featured attractions during Parkfest are displays of new automobiles, motor cycles and boats, Via added.

Because such an unusually large crowd is expected to attend this first-such event, Via said a shuttle bus will be utilized to assist people who can not find parking space around the lake.

Parking space away from the lake will be announced next week, after Monday's Chamber meeting, Via said.

Police report five arrests

City meeting set Monday

The city council will hear a report from Administrator Mike Price Monday night, concerning the city's participation in the May 15 Parkfest, which will be held at Lake Gordon.

Parkfest is an event being coordinated by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, which is expected to attract an unusually large crowd.

Monday's meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Price also will seek authorization from the council to purchase long-term investments for the general fund and water and sewer fund, according to the tentative agenda.

A public hearing will be held to

consider the city's application for funds for real estate improvements through state funding.

Three resolutions also are listed on the agenda, including:

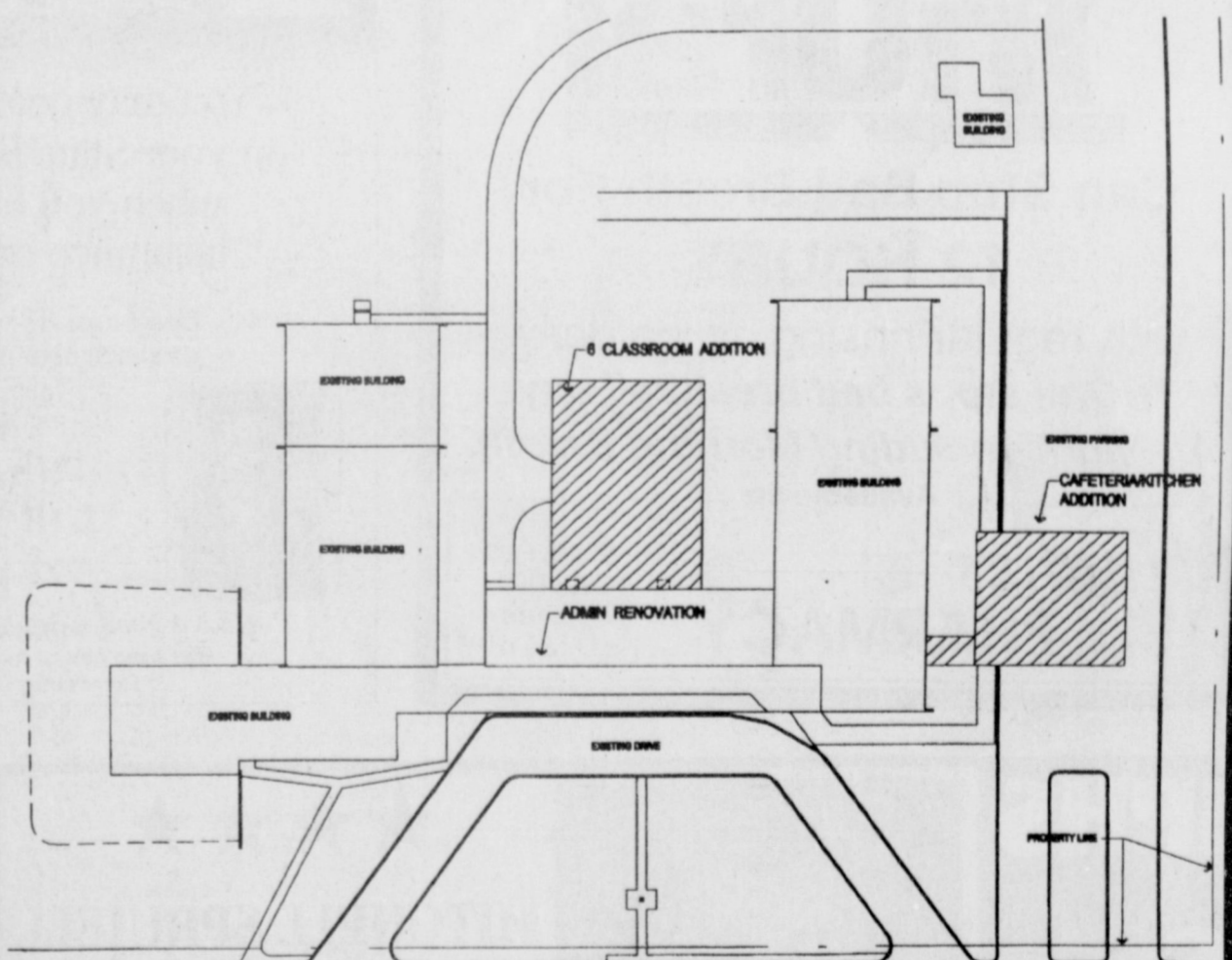
- * approving application of funding through that state program;

- * authorizing the administrator to execute a contract for financial services on the purchase of a truck and trailer; and,

- * authorizing the administrator to sell city-owned surplus property to the highest bidders, as well as the destruction of three firearms on which no bids were received during a recent auction.

Proposed Kidwell Elementary construction



Kidwell Elementary proposed renovations, additions explained

Depending on the passage of a \$5.2-million bond issue on May 1, six new classrooms and additional restrooms will be added to Kidwell Elementary School.

New construction on this campus also includes expansion of the main office and renovation of the kitchen. The boiler and electrical system will be upgraded, along with renovation of the library and improvements in the parking areas.

The portable buildings will

most likely be moved from that campus. According to Superintendent Mike Caplinger, "Currently it appears that the portables would have to be moved because either the academic wing or the kitchen/cafe area expansion would extend into the area where they are located."

New kitchen equipment is also included in the \$920,000 budgeted for this campus in the bond proposal.

Over the last two weeks, school trustees, along with

Caplinger, have met with different groups to explain school needs and answer questions.

Early voting began April 14, and will continue through April 27. Early votes may be cast from 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. at the City/School Tax Office, 1303 N. 4th St.

Regular voting will be held on Saturday, May 1, with polling places located at Kidwell and Bradford Elementary Schools and West Wichita Special Education Coop in Kamay.

Following the ceremony, a reception in honor of the couple was held at the Eagles Lodge in Wichita Falls.

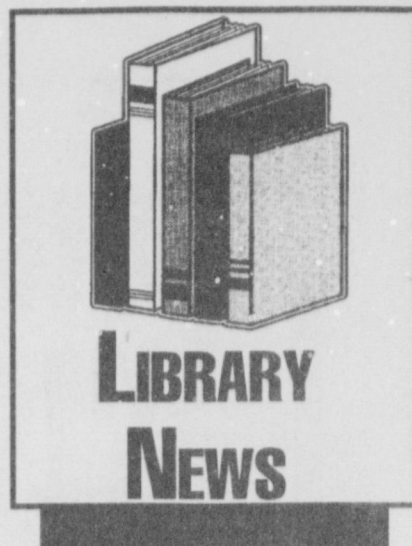
The bride's cake was a four-tiered confection, and the groom's cake was a two-tiered chocolate cake decorated with strawberries.

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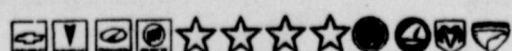

COOK of the WEEK

Angie has been employed at First American Bank in Iowa Park three years, and is also a full time junior student at Midwestern State University, majoring in finance.

During her free time, Angie enjoys working in their yard, doing various crafts, and playing her collection of musical instruments, which include a keyboard, clarinet, piano and a dulcimer.

Angie was in band throughout junior high and high school, where she played the clarinet. During her four years in high school, she also played keyboard in the jazz band.

The dulcimer was a gift from her husband. Before they were married, she had taken a trip to Branson, Mo. and saw the dulcimer. When she returned from the trip, she told him about the instrument. To her surprise, he found and ordered her one.

Angie said these recipes are the ones she has used the most since getting married.

1/4 cup grated parmesan cheese
1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted
1/2 tsp. garlic powder to taste
1 tsp. parsley flakes

Stir together the baking mix, milk and cheese until a soft dough forms; beat vigorously for 30 seconds.

Drop dough by spoonfuls onto greased cookie sheet.
Bake about 10 minutes at 450 degrees or until lightly browned.

Mix butter, garlic powder and parsley and brush over warm biscuits before removing from the cookie sheet.

Makes about a dozen biscuits.

Chicken and Broccoli Braid

2 cups cooked chicken, chopped
1 cup broccoli, chopped
1/2 cup chopped red bell pepper
1 cup (4 ounces) shredded sharp cheddar cheese
1 garlic clove, pressed
1/2 cup mayonnaise
2 tsp. all purpose dill mix or 1 tsp. dried dill weed
1/4 tsp. salt

2 pkgs. (8 ounces each) refrigerated crescent rolls
1 egg white, lightly beaten
2Tbsp. slivered almonds
Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Chop chicken and broccoli. Place in batter bowl. Add bell pepper and cheese.

Press garlic over vegetable mixture. Add mayonnaise, dill mix, and salt.

Unroll one package of crescent dough, do not separate. Arrange longest sides of dough across width. Repeat with remaining package of dough.

Roll the dough to the edges of baking stone.

On longest side of stone, cut dough into strips 1 1/2 inches apart. spread filling evenly over middle of dough.

Braid the dough across the top. Brush egg white over dough.

Sprinkle with almonds.
Bake 25-28 minutes. Serves 10.

Banana Pudding

1/2 cup flour
2/3 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt

Mix together and add 2 1/2 cups milk and put in double boiler. When hot, add 1/2 cup milk and three beaten egg yolks.

Stir with wire whisk occasionally over heat for 15 minutes until thick.

Remove from heat. Add 2 teaspoon butter and 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Layer vanilla wafers, bananas and custard two times.

Top with cool whip.

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Melissa Marrs is recognized as Golden Rule Award winner

Melissa Marrs, a senior at Iowa Park High School, was honored as a Golden Rule Award winner in the youth category sponsored by the Junior League of Wichita Falls, Inc. and J.C. Penney.

In a ceremony on Tuesday, Melissa was recognized for her community service to the Wichita County Teen Court as a teen attorney.

Since the program's establishment in October, 1997, she has participated in approximately 60 trials and has assisted in training new teen volunteers as attorneys, court clerks and bailiffs.

The award includes a \$500 donation to the Teen Court program, and a \$500 scholarship for Miss Marrs, who plans to attend college and study to become a lawyer.

Wichita County Teen Court is a focus project of the Junior League of Wichita Falls, Inc. and is adminis-

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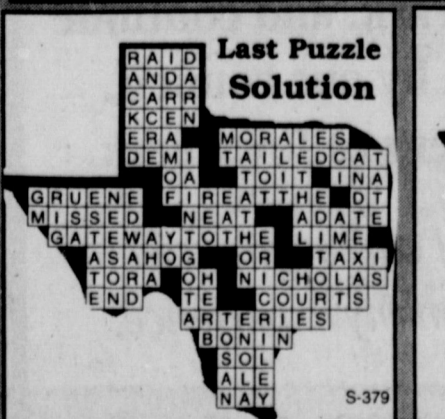
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As I See It... By Bob Hamilton

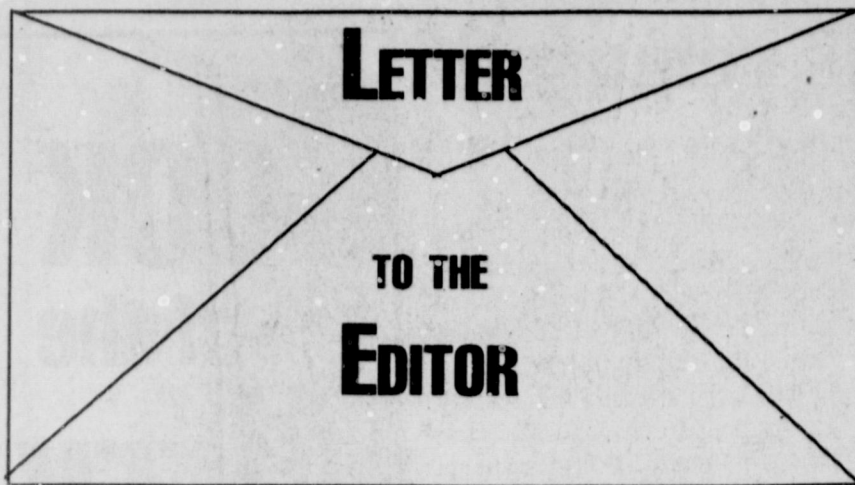



AG AGENT'S REPORT

By JOE RAFF, Wichita County Agriculture Agent

1999 Wheat Tour

Well, we got another rain. I checked my rain gage and we got a little over one inch. Just right to start putting in some hay grazer, Bermuda grass or other forages.

Soil temperatures are ranging from 65 to 69 so we are just about right to start full steam ahead.

We had some high wind associated with this storm, and I hope that our wheat was not damaged. I haven't heard anyone say they received any damage, so I hope this means it was minimal.

The 1999 Wheat Tour agenda was finalized by the Wichita County Crops Committee. I would like to think all these producers helping me get this event off it's feet.

The tour will be on May 4. We will meet at David Kearney's Farm at 8:30 a.m. for registration. David's farm is located about one mile north of US 287 on Burnett Ranch Road. The cost of the tour will be \$10 per person.

The meeting will start with Kearney and Judge Woody Gosson giving the welcome and introduction of guests. John Calmer, Southwestern Region Manager for Cargill Grain Division, will be the first speaker. Mr. Calmer will talk about marketing this year's wheat crop.

Stan Bevers, Extension Economist in Vernon, will be the next speaker. He always has a great presentation, and he will give an update on the current economic situation for small grains.

Greg Fuselier, American Cyanamide, will be the next speaker. He

will be discussing new genetic engineered wheat varieties.

And, Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist from Vernon, will round out the morning speakers. He has monitored wheat fields across the Rolling Plains all year and will be giving an update on the insect population.

The morning meetings should last until 10:30 a.m., then the group will go into the field and look at the test plots.

Dr. David Worrell, Small Grains Breeder, TAEX from Vernon, will be going over his experimental wheat varieties, and the Triticale test plots.

Dr. Todd Baughman, Extension Entomologist from Vernon, will be discussing the 1999 variety test plots. And Dr. Travis Miller, Extension Agronomist College Station, will be giving an overview of the phosphorus demonstrations.

At noon there will be a catered lunch from the Branding Iron.

After lunch the group will travel (on their own) to Fred Dwyer's Farm. There, the group will get an opportunity to evaluate the cool season grass test plot. Mike Isbell will be talking to the group about the different varieties, and which one has done the best.

At the conclusion of the cool season grass plots, each participant will receive three continuing education units that will be applied to their private applicators license.

We will have a full day of great speakers and demonstrations, so don't miss this tour!

Gordon K. Sherman, an assistant professor of art at Fort Hays State Univ. in Hays, Kan., claimed third place and \$50 with his work.

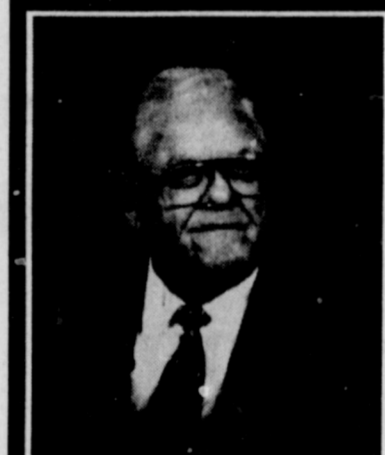
Cash awards were provided by the MSC Foundation.

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Q. I am in the process of starting a vegetable garden for the first time in years. I need to know what varieties of tomato plants will do the best in Wichita Falls?

A. We have had the best performance of Celebrity tomatoes over the past five years of testing. Under proper management you can expect up to 25 pounds of fruit per plant if weather cooperates! Celebrity is a large fruited cultivar that produces high quality tomatoes that are excellent for use as a slicing tomato.

Right behind Celebrity is a variety named Carnival which is very close to the qualities described above for Celebrity. Carnival is actually an improved Celebrity.

You can also try some of the smaller fruited cherry tomatoes which are super tough and tend to produce fruit even under adverse weather conditions. Cherry Grande, Small Fry, and Sweet 100 are good selections for cherry tomato plantings.

It is time to get started planting. The Wichita County Extension office has complete lists of all recommended vegetable varieties if you need a listing.

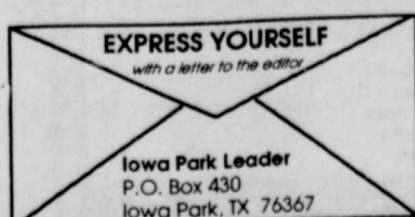
Q. I live in Wichita Falls and would like to know if it is time to begin grafting pecan trees?

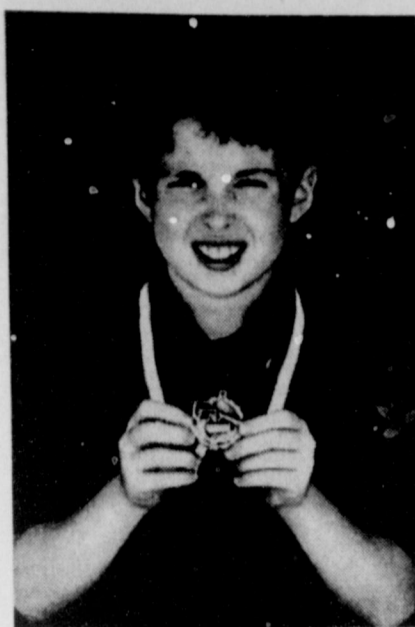
A. We begin grafting pecan trees when the bark starts to slip. This simply means that the bark peels easily from the tree to facilitate attaching a graft successfully. Normally, the time to begin grafting is about mid-April.

You may want to try to attend the Charlie Pecan and Peach Field day held every spring at the J.B. Young Orchard. We will let you know when they have a date set. We usually have pecan grafting demonstrations at this event.

Q. I live in Wichita Falls and have several Altheas in my landscape. These Altheas are showing signs of iron deficiency. Should I treat the plants with an iron fertilizer?

A. Altheas, which are often called Rose of Sharon are a hardy hibiscus

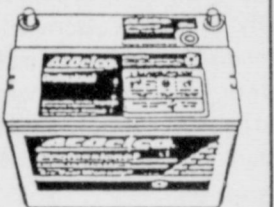

Voting deadline today

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs reminds cotton producers voting in the Northern Rolling Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone referendum that their ballots must be postmarked by today to be counted.

Results of the referendum will determine whether or not to establish a boll weevil eradication program in the 14-county Northern Rolling Plains zone and set a maximum assessment.

Eligible voters should have received an official ballot by mail. A

postage-paid return envelope was included.

To officially establish an eradication program in the zone and set an assessment, the proposition must be approved by a two-thirds vote, or those voting in favor must farm more than 50 percent of the zone's acreage.

In addition to deciding if a program should begin in the zone, voters will elect a board member from the zone to serve on the state-wide board of directors of Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Inc.

The department received three nominations for that position before the March 23 filing deadline.

The names of John Inman, Marion E. Posey and Weldon Tabor appear on the ballot.

Inman is a cotton producer who has farmed in Childress County 22 years. Posey has grown cotton 50 years in Hall County, and Tabor has farmed in Hardeman County 35 years.

Inman currently serves on the foundation board as an appointed director for the zone.

Because a woman's identity was usually that of her husband, we need to seek other ways to discover who our foremothers were. Since women did interact in the government legal system in some ways, we must think of how this could occur.

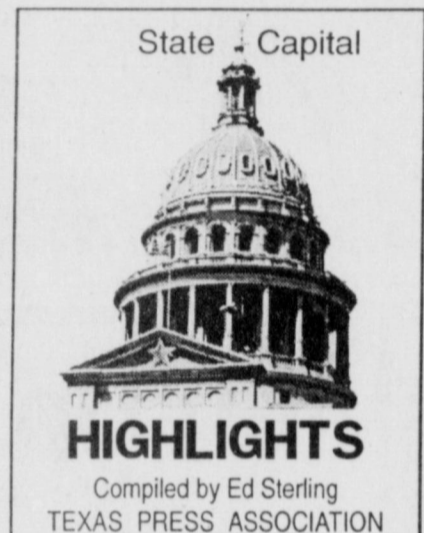
Early American women greatly contributed to the settling of our country as school teachers and especially in the Western Movement. Women took up homesteads on their own or held on after their husband died or otherwise left her on her own. Many times she had no choice but to struggle on.

In 1907, if a female American citizen married an alien, she lost her citizenship and took her husband's nationality.

Although the law was repealed in 1922 it wasn't enacted until 1936. After her husband either died or there was a divorce, she could apply for restoration or reinstatement of American citizenship and she would have naturalization papers.

Women were dealt with in special ways in government records.

It provides information on how and where to find records of our foremothers.



AUSTIN — A \$97 billion state budget proposed to cover the next two years gained approval on a voice vote in the Texas House last week.

If the legislation passes in the Senate and earns the signature of Gov. George W. Bush, spending will increase nearly 10 percent over the present 1998-99 budget.

The budget proposed for 2000-2001, however, does not take into account the \$5.6 billion revenue surplus that remains a bone of contention. Some want it to be spent on teacher salary increases and education and others want it, or at least part of it, to pay for property tax relief.

The House spending bill proposes to cut 1,400 state jobs and to increase education funding by 13.4 percent. It also earmarks:

- \$80 million for child care for families enrolled in welfare-to-work programs;
- \$67 million to retire the debt

■ \$11 million for improvements in the attorney general's child support enforcement division.

The Senate Finance Committee earlier approved a \$98 billion budget that includes the \$2 billion cut in school property taxes — \$500 million more than the school property tax cut proposed last year by Gov. Bush.

Now that the House has finalized its version of the budget, the lower chamber can turn its attention to the towering heap of other bills that have been on hold.

Internet Alcohol Sales Draw Heat

The comptroller's office estimates Texas is losing as much as \$300 million a year in state sales taxes over alcoholic beverages shipped direct to Texas consumers from out of state.

Opponents of this form of interstate commerce argue that minors and dry county residents could place orders via the Internet.

Sen. David Sibley has filed legislation that would increase the \$500 maximum fine to a \$10,000 fine and jail time to shippers who get caught.

"It's like a traffic ticket," Sibley, R-Waco, said of the present maximum fine.

Deatherage receives national certification

Greg Deatherage of Iowa Park recently passed the National Opticianry Competency Exam (NCOE) and the Contact Lens Registry Examination (CLRE).

The announcement was made by the American Board of Opticianry and the National Contact Lens Examiners.

The NOCE and CLRE are job-related exams, administered twice a year, which accurately measure technical optical dispensing knowledge. Both exams are psychometrically developed under the supervision of the Professional Examination Service. Of the 21 states that license opticianry, 18 states use the exams as the written part of their licensing standards.

Certifications by the ABO and NCLRE are the only nationally recognized voluntary credentials for ophthalmic dispensers.

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

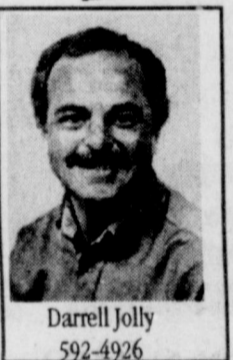

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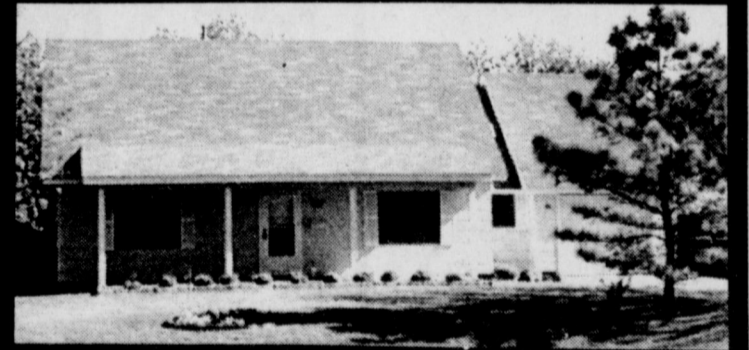
