# School board studying uniforms

Several parents appeared before the school board last Thursday night asking them to consider the possibility of school uniforms.

Michelle and David Archer and Karen Foster told trustees that they visited Zundelowitz (Zundy) Junior High School in Wichita Falls to see if the use of school uniforms on that campus has been successful.

Mrs. Archer said that with the school tragedies that have been occuring, everyone is concerned with school safety. At Zundy, she found the students to be very orderly. She feels that uniforms level the playing field, takes the focus off of clothing and back to academics, and increases school spirit.

Mrs. Foster noted that the students at Zundy come to school with a mindset to perform. She said another benefit is that the uniforms cost less than half of regular back-to-school

Regarding school safety, Mrs. Foster said there should be closer monitoring of students' use of the internet E-mail. She was told that this issue was a concern and had been addressed.

David Archer told the board that when he visited the middle school, the kids in the hallways were acting rambunctious and some were not adhering to the dress code. He felt that school uniforms would eliminate these problems.

Board President Keith Fisher told the group that presently the topic of uniforms is more of an exploratory thing and the board would see what input it gets from the community.

A letter is being sent to parents asking for their opinion on the use of school uniforms. The letter states that "recent research seems to indicate that the use of school uniforms improves student academic success as well as behavior, creating a safe learning environment." In defining a school uniform, "an attractive polo-style knit shirt, khaki or navy pants, skirts, walking shorts, and related attire,"

A self-addressed postcard has been enclosed with the letter in order for the parents to respond.

In discussing school safety, Supt. Mike Caplinger said that several precautionary steps had been taken to improve security. Video cameras have been placed in the high school, back doors have been locked on many campuses, centralized entry and exits have been arranged, and vehicles prevented from parking near school buildings.

Caplinger thanked Iowa Park Police Chief Lynn Collins for putting officers and the drug detection dog at high school following the shootings

Collins said that preventative type meastures were all that was needed on the campuses at this time. He suggested letting parents be a part of the solution.

Collins is working on a letter to send parents, showing how they can help stop violence in the schools. It will include warning signs and things to watch for. He will present the letter to the school board for approval before sending it out.

The oath of office was administered to trustees Keith Fisher and Randy Brown. The trustees election, scheduled for May 1, was cancelled because both men ran unopposed.

The board held an election of officers with Fisher being re-elected president, Wendall House, vice president, and Martha Dudley, secretary.

The school's architect, Michael Marrs, told trustees that he would finish the design work on new construction and renovations that will take place in the district in about two months. He said the work would be going on concurrently at all campuses and should be finished by August of 2000. Marrs has been visiting with personnel on each campus concerning facility additions.

Supt. Caplinger told the board that the time has come to reinstate a policy to reimburse teachers who complete college hours toward a master's degree.

Two years ago the policy was temporarily abandoned because of the drastic budget cuts that were required.

## City receives tax rebate

The City of Iowa Park received a sales tax rebate check this month for \$37,859.61, which is an increase of 20.33 percent when compared with the rebate received in May of 1998.

This month's rebate includes local sales taxes collected in March and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in April, and quarterly returns for the first three months of the year.

Thus far this year, \$136,372.25 has been rebated to the city, and that is 13 percent more than the first five months of last year, according to the comptroller's office.


Wichita Falls is up 4.17 percent for the year and Burkburnett's increase is 3.13 percent.

But Electra, which increased its sales tax to two percent, is showing a 68.37-percent increase, having received \$97,938.35 this far in 1999.

Like all the cities in Archer County, except Lakeside City, Holliday is below last year's rebate total, by a disappointing minus 30.74 percent.

I'm going to doubt that the meet will ever be moved from Austin, however. There's just too much at stake, like the economics, importance of student recruitment, and tradition.


By the way, I was extremely proud and impressed with the effort of our relay team. They did an outstanding job representing their school and community.



## Depression often linked to hormonal changes

There are three times in a women's life when she is at higher risk for depression.

"The greatest risk for depression occurs a week-to -10 days before the period starts, after birth of a child, and one to two years before menopause. In general, women's depression falls between the ages of 22 and 45," said Dr. Lucy Puryear, director of The Women's Clinic at Baylor College of Medicine's Department of Psychia-

Premenstrual dysphoric disorder (PMDD) can occur each month before a woman's menstrual period. It affects six-to eight percent of women and can be severely disabling.

"PMDD shouldn't be confused with the common PMS symptoms of slight tearfulness and irritability," she said. " Women with PMDD cannot function during the week to 10 days before their period."

Symptoms include an inability to work or go to school, excessive crying, and relationship problems. Once the period begins, the women's functioning returns to normal.

Treatment with anti-depressants provides immediate relief of the symptons. "Other types of depression need three to six weeks for the medication to take effect. It is not clear why PMDD responds differently," Puryear said.

Women with PMDD have the same hormone levels as other women, but women with PMDD may be more vulnerable to hormonal changes before their period.

Post- Partum depression occurs in one out of 10 women and can last for six months to a year if left untreated. Not to be confused with the "Baby Blues" which can last for a couple of weeks, women with postpartum depression feel extreme sadness and guilt and are unable to function and to enjoy caring for their

"Post-partum depression interrupts the bonding between a mother and child," Puryear said. "The newer anti-depressants allow mothers to continue breast feeding while being treated."

# AG AGENT'S REPORT

By JOE RAFF, Wichita County Agriculture Agent

### Fire Ants

The last few rains have been nice. It has perked up the native grasses, wheat is in good shape, and most important, I have not had to water my new landscape!

Now if we can get beef and grain prices up to at least a break even point, things will be much better.

The last couple of weeks I have noticed fire ants are becoming more active. And, I have started receiving calls on their control. So, here is the run down on what we have available to use on fire ants.

There are many ways to manage fire ant problems. You can manage fire ants by pouring hot water on the mound, using insecticide mound drenches, spreading insecticide granules approved for fire ants on the mound and watering them in, and using bait-formulated insecticides.

Pouring 2-3 gallons of very hot (boiling) water on the mound will kill mounds about 60% of the time. Otherwise, the ants will probably just move to another location. Remember one thing about this method: very hot or boiling water will kill the grass or surrounding vegetation that it is poured upon. Other natural, or "organic" method include mound drench products that contain pyrethrins and diatomaceous earth, or silicon diox-

Using individual mound treatments can have good and bad results. Individual mound treatments allow treatment of only one mound at a time, therefore isolating insecticides in one place. In the case of mound drenches, follow the label directions to assure the proper amount of insecticide is applied.

When using granular insecticides on individual ;mounds, be sure to water the granules into the mound after application as directed. Failure to water in the granules does a poor job to kill the ants, and more important, will contaminate runoff water after a rain because the granules will be washed away and end up in sensitive areas like creeks, streams, and drinking water.

**ADDITIONAL** 

Average control time for this method is from six to eight weeks, depending on environmental condi-

Bait formulated insecticides are another method of controlling fire ants. These baits come in the form of defatted corn grit soaked in soybean oil to attract the ants. The active ingredient is dissolved in the soybean

Generally, these baits are collected by foraging worker ants and taken back to the colony where they are distributed. The bait is fed to the queen, from which she dies or is prevented from producing viable eggs. In general, baits are slower acting, but provide 80%-90% suppression for 12-18 months.

Be sure to sue fresh bait because ants are not attracted to spoiled or old bait. One advantage of using baits is their low application rate and extremely low amount of active ingredient. The amount of active ingredient is some baits applied per acre equals the weight of a nickel down to less than a dime.

The benefits to the environment are much greater, and baits provide the same suppression as drenches and other individual mound treatments.

Based on result demonstrations and research, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service recommends the

two-step approach. First, chose a bait such as Amdro, Logic, Award, Combat or Johnson Fire Ant Bait. Follow the directions on the label and apply the bait over the entire property. The best time to do this is when temperates are hotter than 65 degrees and no hotter than 95 degrees. So one spring and one fall application would be the best.

After this application, wait three to five weeks and then treat individual mounds that were missed or survived the first application. This same treatment can be used if you chose Orthene, Diazinon or Dursban.

A new fire ant bait, Extinguish, has recently been labeled for use on a wide range of sites, including pastures, hay fields and crop land. Re-

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search at the Fire Ant Program at Texas A&M has shown that control with Extinguish is similar to that of Logic/Award but Extinguish is a little slower to suppress the number of ant

Studies have also shown that a reduced rates of Logic (3/4 lb./acre) in combination with Amdro (at 3/4 lb./acre) provide the benefits of the rapid kill characteristic of Amdroplus the longer control achieved by Logic.

Research is underway to determine if a combination of Amdro and Extinguish, each at a reduced rate, provides this benefits. Reduced rates, although not supported by the manufacturer's warranty, could reduce grower costs if control is appli-

It is very important that you follow all the directions when using these compounds. Some say that if you apply sub-lethal amounts to mounds. the ants will not feed on that type of bait again.

So, if you are not getting the control you hoped for, and you're using the same bait, you may switch

I also want to mention that there are a number of compounds that are labeled for fire ant control and these that are listed are just a few. And if some were omitted, it does not mean that they don't work.

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
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# GARDENING HINTS

### By MAPK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

the country. I mow my lawn every five days. Is this too often to cut the lawn? How high should I cut St. Augustine turf?

A. Mowing every five days is perfectly fine. As a matter of fact, if you mulch your lawn when mowing then you really do need to mow on a five-day schedule.

St. Augustine should be kept at a height of about two inches. You never want to remove any more than one third of the leaf blade at any one

Q. We live out in the Turkey Ranch Road area of Wichita County. We have several Silver Maples planted in our landscape. Two of the trees have bark splitting off of the trunks. What could cause this bark to split off of the trunks of these trees? I have not hit the trees with a mower or weed eater.

A. Severe bark splitting can result from other factors beyond mechanical damage. There is the possibility that the cause of this damage was due to sun scald.

Young, newly planted trees will often have thin bark which is susceptible to sun and heat damage. Young Oaks and Maples are often damaged. The trees will recover and heal if given proper care now and into

It may be a good idea to wrap the trunks with a tree guard wrap available at most garden centers. These wraps will help protect tender, young

Q. We have three large Pecan trees in our landscape in Iowa Park. Two of the trees have all of these strange growths on the leaves and on some branches. What is the problem? Is this a fungus or disease we need to

A. The cause of those unusual looking growth formations on your Pecan trees is an insect.

The insect is called Pecan Phylloxera and the damage is often called

Q. I just moved into town from Phylloxera gall. These insects deposit eggs into the developing galls right at bud break when the leaves first emerge in very early spring. The galls serve as a protective covering for the developing insects.

The actual cause of the gall is due to a chemical reaction in the leaf and other tissue when the insects attack foliage.

The good news is that these galls will rarely result in any major tree damage. By mid-summer you will not even be able to detect any more

If you wish to reduce the gall problem next year, then you will have to apply an insect control product right at bud break when leaves first begin growth. There is no control option at this stage of growth.



That's exactly what happened to the Iowa Park 1600M Relay team of Malcom Wise, Jeff Duerson, Dustin Shierry and Tommy Duerson.

The four earned a trip to Austin to run in the State Track Meet and entered the Meet with the fifth fastest time, knowing that a first place finish was going to be very hard to come by.

The individual splits for the four were some of their best of the season as well. Wise was clocked at 50.1, Jeff Duerson at 50.7, Shierry at 49.6 and Tommy Duerson at 49.0.

Vernon finished in fifth place but was later disqualified for handing off outside the exchange zone.

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

AUSTIN — The Texas House last week voted to lower the legal intoxication threshold to a bloodalcohol level of .08.

Advocates of the legislation, SB 114 by Sen. Mario Gallegos, D-Houston, point to the fact that in 1997 Texas led the nation in alcohol-related traffic deaths with 1,748. Of those deaths, 379 involved drivers with blood-alcohol levels under the present legal limit of .10.

The alcoholic beverage industry has argued that lowering the blood-alcohol standard will penalize social drinkers and that instead, more should be done to curb drunken driving, not drinking and driving.

Rep. Scott Hochberg said, however, that lowering the limit is not aimed at the social drinker. "It is not a glass of wine with dinner," he said. "It is a significant amount of alcohol."

If Texas lowers its blood-alcohol standard to .08, the state stands to receive \$12 million in federal highway grants.

But money does not seem to be at issue. Hochberg, who sponsored SB 114 in the House, said, "If it wasn't the right thing to do, I don't think we should have done it for the money."

### Cornyn Sues Payday Lenders

Attorney General John Cornyn last week announced the filing of lawsuits against "payday" lenders.

Defendants include EZ Cash and Quick Cash of the Rio Grande Valley, and Cash Today, which has stores statewide.

"Businesses that break the law will not be tolerated — especially those that prey upon people most in need of help," Cornyn said.

Texas law caps the interest rate that may be charged on small, short-term loans at 10 percent, unless made by a licensed lender.

Payday loans are short-term loans made by unlicensed lenders for up to several hundred dollars at extremely high annual percentage rates ranging from 650 percent to 850 percent.

Payday loan businesses typically lend to consumers who live paycheck-to-paycheck or those who may not qualify for main-

### stream forms of credit. Tobacco Money: How to Use It

Senators are showing they want to make sure that Texas' \$17.3 billion settlement with the tobacco industry is put to good use, according to a Senate news release.

The Senate last week approved Sen. Bill Ratliff's committee substitute for HB 1678, which would set aside \$500 million of the settlement into a permanent fund.

Earnings from the fund could be used to pay for tobacco education and enforcement, public health programs, emergency medical services, trauma care and rural health facilities.

### Other Highlights

According to a report published by the Austin American-Statesman last week, records released by the Texas Education Agency show that school districts can't account for about 55,700

- Former prisoners of war from Texas, including recently released soldier Steven Gonzales, would get a free public college or university education under legislation sponsored by Sen. Eddie Lucio Jr., D-Brownsville.
- Dallas investor Tom Hicks and San Antonio attorney Tom Loeffler resigned last week as members of the University of Texas board of regents. Replacing them are Houston attorney Patrick Oxford and Houston businessman Charles Miller.
- The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs has approved more than \$15 million in grants to build Texas state veterans homes in

Temple and Floresville. The longterm care facilities are for Texas veterans needing skilled nursing attention.


- Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, pulled down her bill requiring background checks for the sale of semiautomatic weapons at a flea market after Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, attached an amendment that would have expanded the definition of flea market to include gun shows.
- The House last week approved legislation that would require Texas minors to receive permission from their parents before getting their body parts — other than their earlobes — pierced.
- Abortion-related bills were up for consideration last week. One would allow girls to notify an adult relative before undergoing the medical procedure; another would allow girls to bypass their parents if they receive approval from a judge.
- Last Friday, May 14, was the deadline for legislation to clear either the House or the Senate.
