IPHS graduation is Friday night

Commencement exercises for Iowa Park High School's Class of '99 will be held at 8 p.m. in Hawk Stadium.

As in the past, the event will be moved into the school's auditorium should weather not permit it to be held out of doors.

There are 141 candidates for graduation this year.

Class Valedictorian Christine Baka is to give the farewell address. This is the first time in a number of years the Valedictorian has spoken during the ceremony.

Salutatorian Lydia Adams is to give the welcoming address.

Principal Alan Seay will present the class to Superintendent Mike Caplinger, and Keith Fisher, President of the school board, will present the diplomas.

The traditional presentation of the symbolic school key will be made

by Senior Class Co-Presidents Alisha Clements and Dustin Hicks, to Lacy Wells, next year's Student Council President.

The school song will be sung by Danielle Grant, Bryan Lyons and Lacey Slack, and the pledge of allegiance given by Kelly Williamson, Cari Hogan and Kim Elder.

Ross Dillard will deliver the invocation, and Jon Thomas the benediction.

The Hawk Band is to play both the processional and recessional music.

After a brief period during which the graduates will turn in their caps and gowns, as well as visit with well-wishers in the high school, they and their guests will be voluntarily locked up in the building for the night.

They will entertain themselves with games, movies and treats, under the supervision of volunteers and event coordinator Carole Venhaus.

The lock-in will conclude early Saturday with the awarding of prizes earned during the night, and a breakfast prepared and served by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners.

Swim pool opens Saturday

Saturday will be "splash day" at the Iowa Park Bicentennial Swimming Pool, when the facility opens for the season.

Pool hours will be as follows: 12-6 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday; 1-7 p.m. Sunday, and 12-8 Tuesday and Thursday, according to Mike Price, city administrator.

General admission will be \$3, with special \$1 days on Wednesdays

and Sundays. Memberships for the entire family are \$70, and individual memberships are \$35.

Day care memberships are set at \$15 each, with the day care purchasing a \$5 permit.

The pool is available for parties at a fee of \$75 per event, and each lifeguard will be paid \$10 per hour.

The pool is located on the west side of Iowa Park High School.

Parkfest evaluated

Plans are already underway for next year's Parkfest, which is coordinated by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

Chamber President Ken Via told his board of directors Monday that the inaugural event not only was a success, but that all the committee members have asked to serve again, and they have additional ideas.

Windy weather caused two events to be cancelled, Via said. They were the planned hot air balloon takeoff and the skydiving team.

Already being considered for addition next year are events extending into the evening, more activities relating to Lake Gordon, and a cookoff of some type.

Mrs. Lehman recalls her life in Iowa Park

As Mrs. Ida Stowe Lehman tells of her life in Iowa Park she speaks of some hard times, but mostly of good times.

Mrs. Lehman tells of the hot dry winds and high heat that burned the crops and vegetation to a crisp and dried creeks, rivers, lakes and stock tanks, were the scene when she and her family moved to Iowa Park in 1934.

Ida Stowe, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Stowe, and four siblings moved to the Iowa Park area in 1934. Her father took a job on the J. Lindsey farm. In 1940 her parents bought a farm northeast of Iowa Park.

She recalls it was difficult on her two sisters and brother to start Iowa Park School, because their school and Iowa Park were rivals in school activities.

They had moved here from Thrift, located north west of Burkburnett. They attended the Fairview School.

She recalls in the early days Iowa Park was not much larger than a country village. It was a quite clean town with three doctors, a drug store, two dentists, five churches, a feed store, meat market, three big food stores, three full service filling stations, two lumber yards, two gins, a train depot, ice house, two dry good stores, a hamburger stand, restaurant,

car sales and garage, oil business, two dress shops, a picture show, the county fair, and a good football team. Also schools, social activities and clubs.

Mrs. Lehman took a job keeping books for the school trustees and when the fall term began she was transferred to the high school as librarian and substitute teacher.

Before the Spring semester ended Mrs. Lehman resigned from the school district to take a job with the Work Progress Administration (W.P.A.)

Many people lived North of Iowa Park in oil boom homes. They were suffering from the oil industry collapse and no place to go for employment, as the entire nation had been swallowed up by the great depression.

She said the men would come to W.P.A. office to get help. She listened to their conversations, about their needs and the condition of our country, and about how or when they could supply food and clothing for their families, when they came in for help or to pick up their checks.

Mrs. Lehman said the oil boom community had a school but no place to worship. The school was Weeth School. It was a nice brick building and had a large auditorium.

She began to ask questions, to see how many were interested in and

if it would be possible to have a Sunday evening worship in the

school's auditorium.

Mrs. Lehman's husband Rex, her

father W. A. Stowe, and a Mr. Beavers were on the Weeth School trustee board when the school was sold to Iowa Park School District and added to the W.F. George Middle School.

Soon permission was obtained. Though many said it could not happen there were about 100 in attendance for the first meeting. A young preacher from Iowa Park Church of Christ worked with them.

This is where Ida met her husband in 1935.

She described him as the community idol. She says he was loved by the old and youngsters down to the small ones.

In June 1936, Rex and Ida eloped and were married in Jacksboro.

She explained the reason they eloped was at W.P.A. a married woman with a strong husband was not allowed to work. She said she had to work because her father wasn't physically able to work and she had a family of seven to help care for.

Ida finally took her problem to a friend, Mr. Tom Corridon, and he helped her solve the problem. In the fall of 1936 she resigned from the W.P.A. and became a fulltime homemaker and teaching private book-keeping.

She and Rex sold milk, eggs, turkeys, chickens, and hogs. She added they were blessed with plenty of food to share with widows, the sick

and needy folks in their community.

Mrs. Lehman recalls that in those days most of the sick was cared for at home. Neighbors and friends took time about to sit up nights with the sick. Before and after she and Rex were married they too set up nights with the ill, took food, and helped with chores or where they were needed. They also visited with shut-in's. She added even when employment increased there were still people in need.

As time passed they became more involved with the youth.

Mrs. Lehman says there wasn't much for the youth to do other than go to the movie. She added they would have to stand in long lines waiting for someone to leave so they could have a seat.

A couple had wanted to put in a bowling alley, but it meet so much opposition, the older people felt a bowling alley wasn't a decent place for youth. So, the youngsters didn't get a bowling alley.

She and her husband entertained the youth with parties, picnics, hay rides, egg hunts and other activities.

On Sunday evenings they would take a car load of youth to church at the Weeth School.

With a smile she recalls one of their trips to church had an eventful

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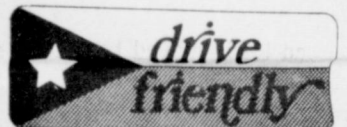
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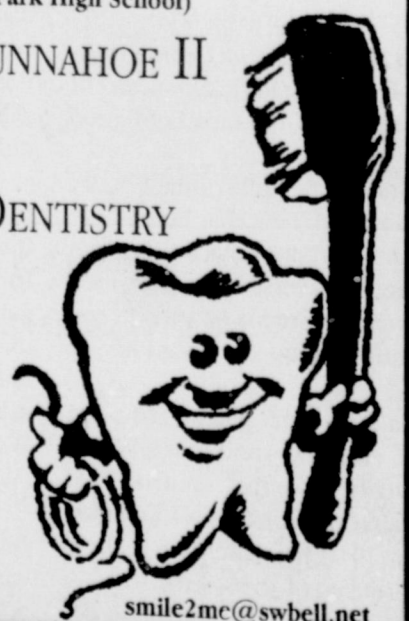
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COOK of the WEEK

This week, Rosie Flanigan will be completing her first year as director of the Texoma Education Center Coop, located in Iowa Park.

The center, that opened last fall, provides an Alternate Education Program (AEP) for eligible at-risk students in the Iowa Park, Holliday, Electra, and City View school districts.

Rosie, who seems to have a special gift for working with youth, gets along just as well with adults. Those in Iowa Park who have had the opportunity to meet her during the past year feel they have gained a special friend.

Rosie was born and grew up in Grambling, La. Her family moved to Wichita Falls when she was in the eighth grade, and she graduated from Booker T. Washington.

Rosie went back to Louisiana to attend Grambling State University where she received her bachelor's degree in math. She then returned to Wichita Falls to teach and earn a master's degree in math at Midwestern State University. She also holds a management degree from MSU.

Before becoming director of the AEP coop, Rosie was employed 30 years by the Wichita Falls ISD in teaching and administration.

Rosie met her husband, Roosevelt, at Grambling toward the end of her sophomore year, and they were married after her junior year. During his senior year, Roosevelt entered the Army and was sent to Vietnam and Rosie moved back to

Wichita Falls. When he returned from his tour of duty, Roosevelt and Rosie decided to remain in Wichita Falls, where he is employed at Delphi.

Canning food, cooking out and entertaining are other activities Rosie mentioned. Included with her favorite recipes is one for canned beans which she says are delicious.

Fig Bread

- 3 cups flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tps. cinnamon
- 1 1/2 cup oil
- 3 large eggs
- 1 Tbsp. vanilla
- 1 pint fig preserves
- 1 cup nuts

Mix and bake 1 hour and 10 minutes at 350 degrees.

Canned Beans

- 1 gal. green beans
- 3 qts. cold water
- 1/4 cup salt
- 1/2 cup cider vinegar

Mix water, salt and vinegar in pan. Add beans and boil 30 minutes. Put in jars and seal.

Sweet & Sour Yams and Pineapple

- 1 20-oz. can pineapple slices
- 1 Tbsp. cornstarch
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 3 Tbsps. vinegar
- 2 - 16 oz. cans yams, drained
- 4 green onions, diagonally sliced
- 1/2 cup diagonally sliced celery
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 Tbsp. oil

Drain pineapple, reserving juice. Combine reserved juice, cornstarch and salt in saucepan; mix well. Cook until sauce boils and thickens, stirring frequently. Stir in vinegar. Add yams and pineapple slices; cover and simmer. Stir fry onions, celery and green peppers for 4 minutes. Combine with yams and pineapple. Serve immediately.

Buttermilk Pie

- 3 cups sugar
- 2 sticks butter
- 6 eggs
- 1 Tbsp. vanilla
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/2 cup coconut (optional)

Mix 1/4 cup sugar with 1/2 cup of flour first. Gradually add remaining sugar and salt. Add one egg at a time, then buttermilk. Melt butter; cool; then add to mixture. Beat real well till buttermilk foams. Add coconut and beat some more. Beat well. Pour into 2 unbaked pie shells. Place pies on bottom rack of oven and bake 40-45 minutes at 350 degrees.

Chicken Enchiladas

- 1 chicken, cooked and boned
- 2 cans cream of mushroom soup (or 1 can cream of mushroom and 1 can cream of chicken)
- 1 large can Pet milk
- 2 cans green chilies
- 1 med. onion chopped
- 1 lb. Longhorn cheese
- 1 pkg. tortillas (Doritos)

Combine soup and chicken and heat. If too thick, add broth. Place in layers starting with tortillas. Add chicken, chilies, onion, and grated cheese; then repeat. Add milk just before last layer of cheese. Bake 30-45 minutes at 350 degrees.

On Sunday, police arrested John Paul Houston, 24, after determining he had an outstanding warrant for speeding. He was later released after promising to appear in municipal court.

She has also received many awards. To name a few, she was awarded Outstanding Senior Citizen by Chamber of Commerce, honored by Altrusa Club as an outstanding citizen of Wichita County, many trophies for 4-H, and the awards of Pearls and Gold Clover.

She also co-authored a book titled "Our Family, Buffalo River Valley."

Mrs. Lehman says she just stumbled into most of her hobbies, such as collecting stamps.

She explained that when Garland was little, her sister got him started collecting stamps. Later when he laid them a side, she took up the hobby.

She also stumbled into collecting decorative plates representing each state. When she worked at the hospital her supervisor gave a Christmas party and served the refreshments on state plates, because most of the women's husbands were stationed at Sheppard Air Base and were from different states. This gave Ida the idea to serve refreshments for her 4-H club on state plates. Before she knew it she had over 100 plates. One she really prizes was given by Mr. Pickens, the best man at her parents' wedding.

She says, really, some of her hobbies are more a collection than a hobby.

She also has a bowl given to her parents as a wedding gift by their grocery man, and a counter pin made by her grandmother.

Her grandmother had sheered the sheep, wove the wool into thread, dyed the thread, red, white and blue. On each corner there is a slave on a horse.

She said she has a number of small things that have been passed down generation after generation. However she lost a number of things when their home was hit by a tornado June 3, 1954.

Ida said her mother called her a pack rat.

Mrs. Ida Stowe Lehman is ninety years young, and still very active.

She's proud of her age and her abilities to keep up with house work, walk a mile a day, sew, read, correspond and just enjoy day to day life.

Mrs. Lehman is still active in many hobbies.

She says on outings she likes to take pictures of unusual mail boxes

Council delays taking action

The city council tabled action on a request to cover a sidewalk and install handrails onto the city's right-of-way at the Church of Christ, during Monday night's regularly-scheduled meeting.

ending.

While they were at church a big rain came and on the way home they found the creek on a rise and could not drive the car through it. So, Rex told the girls to close their eyes and he took off his pants and waded the creek so he could get to their tractor at home.

He returned with the tractor and pulled the car through the creek and home. The weather was so bad that Rex said, "Kids you all are going to have to spend the night." Ida made pallets in the kitchen floor for the boys and put the girls in their spare bedroom. She added it was not unusual for them to have a sleep over for the youth.

At times they moved their living room furniture out so there would be room for the kids to have a dance or party.

Mrs. Lehman said if the youth needed or wanted a place to visit, or needed a place to stay, a place to play, they always had room for them.

They took youth to camps in Oklahoma and Colorado. Ida took girls to A & M University for short courses in agriculture and horticulture. They also took youth to the fair.

Their day-to-day chores took the rest of their time.

Ida said being a farmer and rancher's wife, her days were filled with routine chores and she was happy being a wife and mother and never inspired being in the limelight.

Their community life was filled with helping each other.

When the neighbor men exchanged work, the women would cook the noon meal and quilt or do needle work and visit. She added quilting bees were popular.

The Spring and Fall round-up were special days. While the men worked cattle the women would cook meals and quilt.

The neighbors would gather their vegetables and each would help snap beans and hull peas. The women would go home and can.

At social gatherings they took pride in showing off their pretty jars of vegetables and fruit.

In 1944 they had no telephones or electricity in the rural areas. The men tried to get rural electricity, but they refused until a co-op installed a pole at the Lawrence home. Texas Electric got busy and installed electricity in the rural areas.

The men worked together and installed telephone lines.

They hauled their water from town. She said sometime when they got the water hauled, they would have a water fight. With a laugh she said, "We hauled water but then wasted it having a water fight."

Mrs. Lehman stated, the city used irrigation water and it was hard and salty. She added that it tasted really bad. "Really there are no words to describe how bad it tasted," she said.

Ida and Rex took their niece, Lynda, into their home when she was four months old to raise.

In 1944, what Ida describes as their greatest joy arrived. They were blessed with a son of their own, Garland.

Mrs. Lehman recalls Rex saying, "We thought we were enjoying life, but when our son came along our joy was multiplied by trillions."

Their work with youth continued with more enthusiasm and love since they had two assets to build and mold into future citizens.

Ida stated that she and Rex had helped raise six children before Garland was born.

Garland was born with triple club feet. Ida said he wore a cast and braces, and went through a lot of treatments the first seven years of his

life.

She added that the youth from the churches adopted him as their "sunshine child." They played with Garland, helped care for him and did all they could do to help make things easier on Garland and his parents. Ida said the adults were also there for them.

Their activities with youth continued and expanded.

As Garland was growing up the Lehmans began giving children from the Tipton Home vacations.

In 1951 Lynda and another niece, Sonja, came home from school enthused about a 4-H meeting they attended. They wanted a 4-H club, but a leader was needed. Ida said she was "captured."

Mrs. Lehman was enthused about 4-H. She put her heart into the club as she did everything she was involved in.

The programs that Ida planned for the 4-H club included each member.

She had handicap students in the club and they too were included in the programs and not left to stand by and watch. Ida said, "What a joy I had listing and watching them perform." She added she had local, county, district, and state winners in 4-H and Farmers Union.

Garland and Lynda both grew up being very involved in 4-H.

Mrs. Lehman says that Garland's family has carried on with 4-H.

He and his wife Sandra have one daughter, Kellie and two sons Tracy and Dustin, a grandson and two granddaughters. Mrs. Lehman calls Sandra her "wonderful guardian angel."

Lynda has three sons, four grandchildren.

In 1953 the Lehman's dream of building a new home became reality. As always they had youth in mind when they made the plans for their dream home. They built the home large enough to entertain the youth.

The new home had a shadow though. Rex's health began to fail. At that time he was working for the county and he had to retire due to his failing health.

Mrs. Lehman says that she and Rex had entertainment for the youth right up until Rex's death. Their last party was just three months before he passed away.

In 1954 Mrs. Lehman went to work for Wichita General Hospital. She worked in various areas of record and bookkeeping during her 20 years there.

During her years at the hospital she met a lot of people and was told she had made a difference in their lives. She recalls as one man was being dismissed he stated that because of her smile she had made his stay at the hospital more pleasant. With a big smile she stated, "If a smile makes a difference, they don't cost a thing and I can smile."

She retired in 1974 to care for Rex and her father, whose health was also failing. She also had 100 head of steers to tend to.

Mrs. Lehman was reluctant to talk about her accomplishments in life.

She said she and Rex did not do the things they did for the awards, but for "God's Glory."

She said she had much rather talk about "her students" and all the boys and girls that she has been associated with over the years.

However she did tell me a few of her accomplishments and some of her hobbies.

Mrs. Lehman was awarded a partial scholarship from Federal School of Commercial Designing with grading of 93 percent, in 1928, a certificate for courses in credit manage-

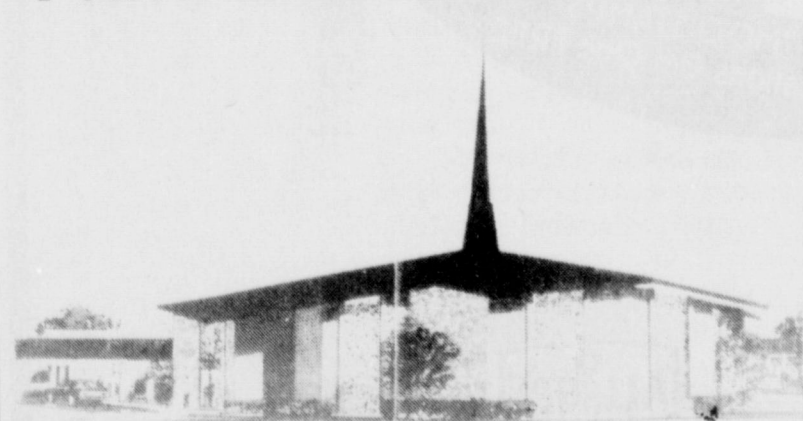

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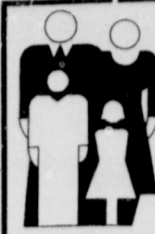

WHAT DOES GOD SAY?

By Ross Saunders

About His grace and man's salvation? Please open your Bible with me. In John 1:17, the inspired Word of God says, "For the law came by Moses, but grace and truth came by Jesus Christ." Augustin (354-430 AD) is credited with the doctrine of inherited sin of Adam, affirming that when Adam sinned, we all became guilty of his one sin. Thus the conclusion that salvation had to be by "cheap grace," that is, grace without man's obedience. He could not conceive of conditional salvation by grace. His monergistic view of salvation by grace alone gave birth to other false doctrines: that babies are born totally depraved, that God has already chosen specific individuals to be saved and all others lost, and that once saved once can never be lost no matter how many sins or how evil.

True, one is saved by grace, but can God's "salvation by grace" be separated from obedience to God's truth? The fact that one is saved by obeying Christ (Hebrews 5:8-9) does not nullify God's grace, but answers to it. Neither can obedience to God be equated with "earning salvation." Grace is God's reason for sending His Son to die (Ephesians 1:7), His reason for mercy (Titus 3:5), and salvation (Ephesians 2:8-9). Truth reveals God's teaching and method of administering salvation (Titus 2:11-12). Grace and truth are inseparable. "And the Word has made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). Truth informs us of the conditions of freedom from sin, which were given by God's grace. Grace will not save those who do not obey Christ. "But unto them that are contentious, and do not obey the truth, but obey unrighteousness, indignation and wrath..." (Romans 2:8). "Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ;" (2 Corinthians 10:5).

The Bible nowhere says we "inherit" Adam's sin. God says each is accountable for his own sins. "The soul that sinneth, it shall die. The son shall not bear the iniquity of the father, neither shall the father bear the iniquity of the son." (Ezekiel 18:20). "So then every one of us shall give account of himself to God" (Romans 14:12; 2 Corinthians 5:10). Man did not lose his free moral agency in Adam (Romans 6:15-18). God has not predestined some individuals to be saved and other lost, for He is "no respecter of persons" (Acts 10:34). Salvation is by man's choice. "Whosoever will, let him take of the water of life freely" (Revelation 22:17). "And that he died for all, that they which live should not henceforth live for themselves, but unto him who died for them, and rose again" (2 Corinthians 5:15). Obedience is required by the word of God's grace.

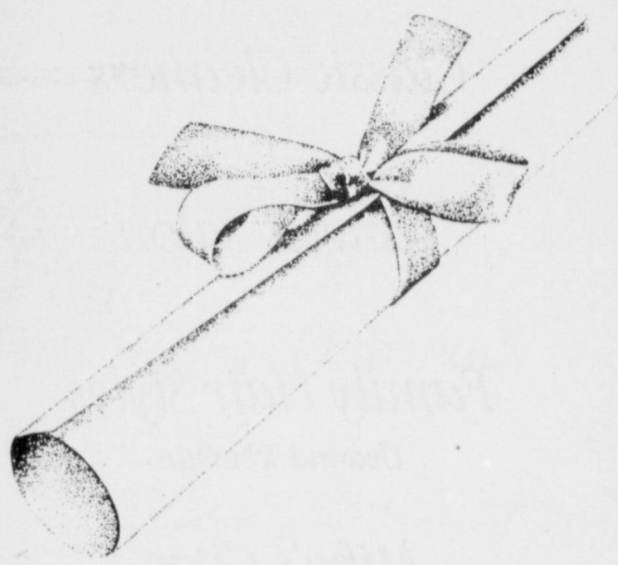
