Student uniforms out, block scheduling in

Wearing of school uniforms will not be required in the Iowa Park school district - at least not in the immediate future, but changes are in store at the high school where block scheduling will go into effect next year.

These decisions were made last Thursday at the school board's regular monthly meeting.

Steve Moody, principal of the middle school, who chaired a committee to study the issue of school uniforms, reported on a survey sent to the parents Iowa Park students.

Out of 1210 ballots, only 729 were returned, with 418 votes against uniforms and 311 in favor. The parents of elementary students at Kidwell and Bradford were the only ones with a majority in favor of uniforms.

The votes by campus included, Kidwell, 81 for, 60 against; Bradford, 68 for, 59 against; middle school, 81 for, 104 against; and high school, 81 for and 195 against.

Moody said the uniform issue is something the board might want to look at again in the future, perhaps starting with the lower grades.

High school principal Alan Seay received the board's approval of a modified block schedule, proposed by himself and members of the high school campus team, Darla Biddy, Bruce Merrell, George Brandt, Deborah Moody, and Sally Banks.

The new schedule calls for 90 minutes classes on alternating days, Monday through Thursday, and an eight period day on Friday.

Seay said the new scheduling, which would require three additional staff people, has received 90 percent positive reaction from the teaching staff.

Cheerleader sponsors Donna Wells and Kimberly Jordan asked the trustees to consider more funding be budgeted for cheerleader needs, and help with the current financial needs of the cheerleader account.

The board asked Superintendent Mike Caplinger and high school principal Alan Seay to work with the

sponsors and bring a revised budget to the next board meeting. They also asked Caplinger to evaluate the current cheerleader account and compensate the current financial needs as he sees appropriate.

The board also approved the Iowa Park High School Cheerleader Constitution and Athletic Conduct and Discipline Policy.

Leon Stepp, who is foreman over the facility construction projects reported that a temporary road had been completed for use at Kidwell Elementary, and they would start the dirt work at that campus on Monday. Also, he said concrete work at the high school and middle school would begin next week.

Contracts of the district's paraprofessional employees were approved for the 2000-2001 school year.

- * solicit proposals for upgrade on high school track.

Early voting underway in city, school elections

Early voting in the May 6 city and school elections got underway yesterday, and will conclude May 2.

Casting early ballots in the city's election will be at the city hall, from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m., and in the school election at the school tax office, 1303 North Fourth, during the same hours.

There will be one less day for early voting in the school election, however. This Friday is San Jacinto Day, a state holiday, and that office will be closed in observance.

There actually will be two issues on the city's ballots this year, the three unchallenged council seats, and whether to allow the city to sell up to 35 acres of dedicated park land for residential development.

That residential development would be, if approved, mostly of land recently purchased by the city where a golf course would be developed.

The proposed golf course, to be developed by Keith Rusk, includes the undeveloped land between Lake Iowa Park and US 287, and also on the west side of the lake.

Rusk explained that revenue from the residential development would assist him in financing the golf course. He and the city have agreed to a 99-year lease on land the golf course would occupy.

Under the agreement, Rusk will build the street for the housing, and also install all the utilities, which would be dedicated back to the city once completed.

The city's only financial responsibility for the project would be to lay a pipeline from the sewer treatment plant to the course area,

where the effluent would be used for irrigation purposes.

Rusk, 43, is a lifetime resident of Iowa Park. He said he has others "coming in to help put the (project) together.

Because none of the three council members drew an opponent, the city initially believed that portion of the election would not be necessary.

However, City Secretary Janice Newman said she learned that if any other city voting were taking place

on the same day, then it was required.

Unopposed for re-election are Mayor Tim Hunter, Joe Ward, Precinct Two alderman, and Joe Singer, Precinct Four alderman.

Only one seat is being challenged on the school board's election this year. Trustee Wendall House is being challenged by Meria Gillespie MD for Place Three.

Unopposed are Martha Dudley, Place One, and Larry Dutton, Place Two.

ParkFest plans developing

Plans for activities associated with the second annual ParkFest continue to be finalized by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce.

The event will be held on Saturday, May 12, around Lake Gordon.

Details of events were explained during Monday's monthly meeting of the Chamber's board of directors, by Ken Via, who is leading the coordinating effort.

Chamber Secretary Susan Dillard said 26 organizations have already reserved spaces for booths. She said she expected more non-profit organizations to make reservations, at least matching the 30 booths that operated last year.

New events planned include a Fish and Hushpuppy Cookoff, shows of new cars and tractors, and the first annual "Cruise The Park" that will cap the day's activities.

The catfish and hushpuppy cookoff was injected in place of a barbecue cookoff that had originally

been slated. Via said that was because an event slated the same weekend in Electra already had a barbecue cooking event.

Registration is already underway for three-man teams to compete in the competition of cooking catfish and hushpuppies. An entry fee of \$25 will be charged, and winners will be competing for cash prizes.

The Chamber will provide the catfish fillets, but contestants will provide their own hushpuppy ingredients.

The public will be doing the judging. For a \$5 fee, people will be allowed to sample each of the cooking booths' products, and then cast one or all of their ballots at boxes that will be located at each booth.

Prizes include \$100 for the Peoples Choice winner; and three placings in both the catfish and hushpuppy booths, including \$100 for first place, \$50 for second, and \$25 for third.

Entry forms for contesting cooks are available at the Chamber, Hughes Pharmacy and Parkway TrueValue.

Events of the day will be scheduled all around Lake Gordon. The car and tractor shows will be located on the east side.

Entertainment will be provided throughout the day.

To cap off the day will be the Cruise The Park event, which will be from 8 to 10 p.m. along West and

East Highway, inside the city.

Participants will cruise the route during the designated hours. Headquarters for information, as well as the area to congregate that evening is R&R Restoration, 612 W. Highway.

Students arrested on drug charges

Two students at Iowa Park High School were arrested Thursday on drug charges, according to the police blotter.

Officers responded to investigate tip that a student had marijuana. Joseph Brandon Bernstein, 18, was found to have less than two ounces of the drug in his pant's pocket.

He was taken into custody, and later transported to the county jail.

Because of that finding, officers decided to hold a search of vehicles in the parking lot by the department's drug dog.

The K-9 alerted on a vehicle, in which drug paraphernalia was found, and Toby John Duck, 19, was charged with the offense.

Duck was later released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court on the charge.

To assist the sheriff's department, officers responded to a reported car fire at Johnson Road and Van Horn Road, at 1:54 a.m. Monday.

They located the occupant, Paul Taylor, 37, and held him for officers

Council to meet Monday

Problems concerning electrical service in the city will be discussed during Monday night's council meeting.

A representative of TXU Electric is to make an appearance to discuss recent "brown outs" or power surges that have been occurring in the city, and possible solutions.

Another personal appearance is included on the meeting's tentative agenda.

Bruce Holder is to request water service to property he has purchased on West Chestnut.

City Administrator Mike Price is to discuss preliminary plans on a

drainage project on Texowa St., and ask permission to advertise for bids to have the work done.

The council also is to consider whether to continue participation in the state's sales tax holiday in August. Initiated last year, certain items bought for student clothing and school supplies were exempt from sales taxes for a three-day period.

Aldermen will consider a request for a variance from the city's "stage four" drought response measures, to allow limited use of the city's vehicle washing facility.

The meeting is to get underway at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

Storm brings needed moisture

The storm that blew in Saturday evening produced .56 of an inch precipitation, according to Virgil Woodfin.

Wind gusts in excess of 40 MPH accompanied the storm.

The area had been placed in a tornado watch that evening by the National Weather Bureau. However

that failed to materialize.

An electrical problem some 12 hours earlier caused a lot of residents concern, when a "blip" in service set off the tornado alert sirens.

That problem, which is being studied by TU Electric, did not effect the entire city, however, but only the northwestern part of the city.

City receives sales tax rebate

The City of Iowa Park benefitted considerably from business conducted here during February, according to a report by the state comptroller's office.

Iowa Park received a sales tax rebate check for \$26,059.66, collected by businesses that month and reported in March to the comptroller.

The amount was a 22.34-percent increase over the same month in 1999.

Thus far this year, the City has

received \$117,537.87 in tax rebate, and that is 19.31 percent greater than was reported this month last year.

The year's increase is the largest of all the other cities in Wichita County. Electra is a plus 14.40 percent for the year, Wichita Falls 8.33 and Burkburnett 0.89 percent.

Holiday also is enjoying a vast improvement for the year, when compared with 1999. That city has received \$28,988.63.

The club will also donate \$25 to Project Graduation.

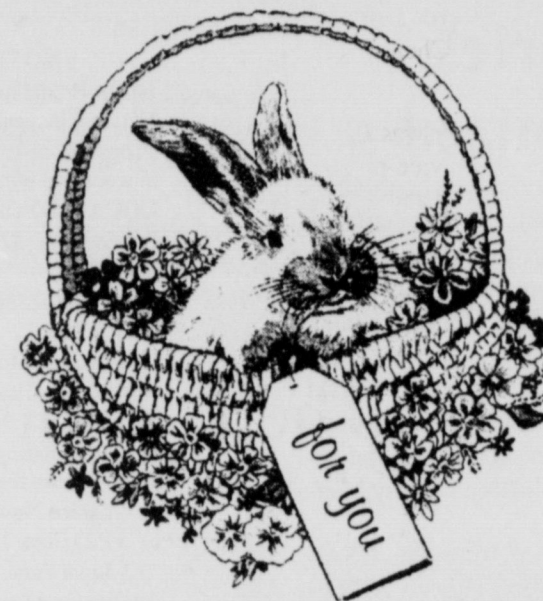
For the program, Kathy Price instructed the group in making an Easter bunny with craft foam and a box of candy.

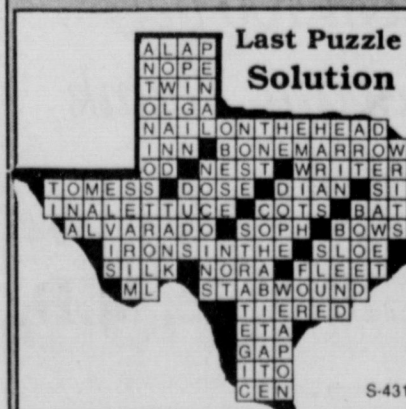

IPHS TAAS scores show improvement

Iowa Park High School continues to show improvement on the state's TAAS test.

The Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) is given each year to high school sophomores throughout the state. One of the requirements for graduation from any Texas high school is passing this test.

The state reports the results of the TAAS each year on a school-wide basis.

The number of students passing all three sections of the TAAS have increased steadily since 1994. The percentage of students passing all three sections of the TAAS has improved from 67% in 1994 to 83% in 2000. In the individual tests, 93% passed reading, 86% passed math, and 96% passed the writing portion of the test.

"We are extremely excited about the scores this year," said principal Alan Seay. "Each year we make important gains in the percentage of students passing. The teachers and the students are to be congratulated on their effort."

Hospice celebrates 15th year

Hospice of Wichita Falls marks a milestone in 2000, as it enters its 16th year of service to the people of North Texas.

Says Jan Banta, Hospice's executive director, "It is difficult to believe that 15 years could go by so quickly. I feel so blessed to have been a part of this organization from the beginning, and to have helped introduce the people of North Texas to the living care and support that Hospice can offer during a critical time in peoples' lives."

Hospice of Wichita Falls developed as an outgrowth of a 1982 conversation between local women who had cared for dying friends. Both women felt that hospice care would have benefited their friends, but such care was not available in 1982 in Wichita Falls.

These women began reading extensively about hospice, visiting other hospice programs and attending hospice conventions and workshops. Their efforts ultimately led to the chartering of Hospice of Wichita Falls, and the hiring of its first, and only, executive director, Jan Banta.

When Hospice initially began providing care in 1985, its services were limited to the city of Wichita Falls. But as word spread about Hospice, the demand for the care, hope and support it offered grew, prompting the organization to expand its service area in 1988 to include Iowa Park and Burkburnett.

Hospice took two other important steps later that same year. First, it became a licensed Medicare hospice. And secondly, Hospice opened its services to all patients with life-threatening illnesses, not just those with cancer.

Demand for its services caused Hospice to expand its service area once again in 1990, this time to include all Texas communities within 30 miles of Wichita Falls. In 1991, Hospice of Wichita Falls received its license as a Medicaid Hospice provider.

Requests for Hospice care from Olney and Seymour prompted Hos-

pice to expand its services to those communities in 1993. Just one year later, another service area expansion was approved which allowed Hospice to offer its services to all Texas communities within 50 miles of Wichita Falls.

Hospice began planning for the construction of an inpatient center in 1994, after receiving a grant from the W. Erle and Emma White Foundation and conducting a community-wide capital campaign in early 1995.

While this was taking place, other aspects of the Hospice program were growing and changing as well. Hospice began its Living and Hope program in 1994, in response to the community's need for care and support from the point a life-threatening illness is diagnosed.

A number of ongoing support groups are a part of this program, including Alive with Cancer, a support group for those living and coping with a cancer diagnosis, and Caregivers Support, for those caring for someone with a life-threatening illness.

The Hospice Center opened in 1997. Since then, nearly 600 patients have received part of all or their hospice care in the facility.

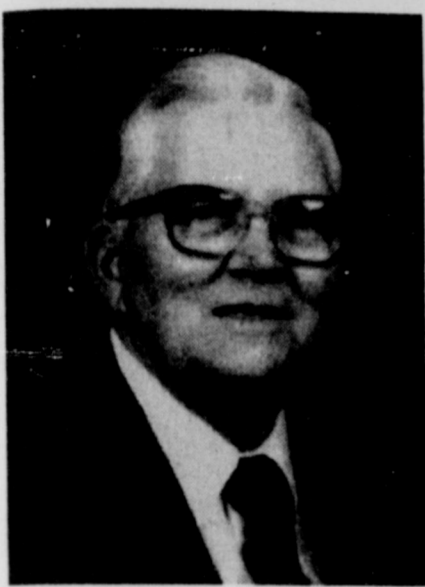

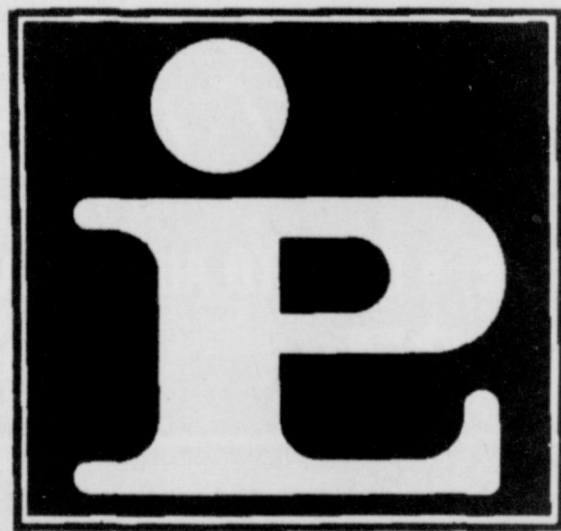

AG AGENT'S REPORT

By JOE RAFF, Wichita County Agriculture Agent

Scorpions/Wheat Tour

The Crops Committee met last week to set the date for the 2000 Wheat Tour. The tour will take place on May 2, starting at 8:30 a.m. with registration.

Like always it will be at David Kearney Farm, which is located north of Iowa Park.

The cost of the tour will be \$5 per person, and we will have a catered meal for lunch.

In addition to looking at the test plots, we will have speakers on no-till, marketing, weed control, wheat and triticale varieties. I have not heard back from some of the speakers, so I will update everyone next week on the full agenda.

To get a head count for the meal, we are asking everyone to RSVP if you plan to attend. Please call the Extension office at 716-5580.

I have been real surprised to see scorpions out and about this early. I killed a couple this weekend in my garage, and received a couple of calls last week. So here's what we know about them, and how to control them.

First, scorpions are arachnids, close relatives of ticks, mites, and spiders. They have two eyes on the top of the head, and usually two to five pairs of eyes along the front corners of the head.

They do not see well, however, and must rely on the sense of touch, using their pectines and other organs for navigation and detecting prey.

There are about 90 species of scorpions that have been identified in the United States. Texas has 18 species and only one species, *Centruroides vittatus* (striped bark scorpion), occur throughout the state. The species has a gestation of about eight months, and litter size varies from 13 to 47, and lives about four years.

When handled or disturbed, scorpions can inflict a painful sting using the poison gland at the end of the tail. Avoiding their habitats helps prevent stings.

The stings from Texas scorpions produce only moderate reactions in most people because the poison has little effect on the nervous system. However, a person who is stung by a scorpion should be watched closely for adverse reactions.

An ice pack applied to the affected area will relieve some pain. If swelling and/or pain persists, or if breathing difficulties occur, immediate medical attention is necessary.

Scorpions are difficult to control with insecticides along. Therefore, the first control strategy is to modify the area surrounding a house: Remove all trash, logs, boards, stones, bricks and other objects from around the house . . . Keep grass closely mown near the home . . . Store garbage containers in a frame that allows them to rest above the ground . . . Plug weep holes in brick veneer homes with steel wool, pieces of nylon scouring pad or small squares of screen wire.

To control scorpions with chemicals, use insecticides products that contain any of the following active ingredients: permethrin, cyfluthrin, cypermethrin, lambda-cyhalothrin, deltamethrin, propoxur, diazinon, chlorpyrifos, malathion or synergized pyrethrins.

Apply pesticides around the foundation of the house and up to one foot above ground level on the exterior walls. Also apply pesticides around doors, window eaves and other potential points of entry.

Follow directions on the package for dosage, mixing and application methods.

Soil, water week slated

Keeping community waters clean and plentiful is a common goal all Americans should embrace, according to organizers of the 2000 Soil and Water Stewardship Week, set for April 30 through May 7th. The focus of this year's national observance is on the total watershed management approach to natural resources conservation, and the theme is "Community Waters."

"Developing a positive stewardship attitude is important as we work together to maintain an adequate supply of clean water." Said Fred Dwyer, chairman of the Wichita Soil and Water Conservation District, sponsors of this year's Stewardship Week. "Our local district would like to help take the leadership to bring all interested groups and individuals together to discuss how to improve the health of our own watersheds," Dwyer added.

The abundance of good, clean water is not guaranteed as some kind

of right. Rather, it is a resource that must be replenished as time passes and conditions change. With recent drought, it is even more apparent that water conservation efforts should never be abandoned. Modern conservation efforts are now focused on ways to keep our natural water supply clean, helping to keep down water treatment costs. Farmers are currently installing and maintaining permanently grassed waterways and filter strips along the edges of cropland fields and streams to prevent soil and nutrients from being washed into major streams and water supplies. Similar practices are being installed around construction sites and parking lots in suburban and urban areas.

exceeding \$1,000,000. Monies are used solely for scholarships and leadership activities to benefit young people. Applications must be in the hands of a Wichita Falls Area Cattlemen member by May 15.

Wichita Falls Area Cattlemen is comprised of 65 members from nine counties who work to support and promote the beef cattle industry.

Highlights of the presentation included an arcing demonstration, procedures for handling electricity in a potentially dangerous situation, and sharing facts about what electricians really do.

They told students that most homes use 122 to 240 volts of elec-

tricity and that it only takes one milliamp to stop the heart.

They told the audience that if they ever saw a downed line, they should call 9-1-1, or TXU.

They also gave a description of the job of an electrician, and demonstrated safe procedures to practice regularly.

And no, electricity cannot be seen, heard or smelled.



Hawks nail down place in playoffs

The Iowa Park Hawks reached one of the goals that they set to start the 2000 season, to make the playoffs.

Iowa Park clinched a playoff spot Monday with an 11-1 run-rule victory over Henrietta. Earlier in the week, the Hawks defeated Graham 8-4, which was probably the game they

had to win to win the district title. That could come on Tuesday when the Hawks play host to Bowie, the only team in district 5-3A to beat Iowa Park.

Iowa Park, now 21-5 overall and 7-1 in district play, will travel to Childress (0-8) in district play today, then get the re-match with Bowie at

home on Tuesday. Currently the standings have Iowa Park alone at the top, with Bowie and Graham tied for second and third with two losses. Graham's two losses were to Iowa Park while Bowie's two setbacks were to Graham.

The district champion receives a bye while the other two teams will

have to play a first-round playoff game.

On Friday, Iowa Park jumped on top of Graham 2-0 in the first inning before Graham came back with two runs in the bottom of the second to tie the score at 2-2. The Steers took the lead at 4-2 on a two run home run in the bottom of the fourth.

But that lead was short lived as the Hawks fought back in the top of the fifth inning, hanging a four spot on the board to regain the lead at 6-4. The Hawks then added a pair of insurance runs in the top of the seventh to make the final 8-4.

Ryan Bess came on in relief of Scotty Mitchell in the fourth inning to pick up the win, improving to 4-1 for the season.

Chase Wright led the Hawks at the plate with a 4x4 evening including 3 runs scored and a pair of RBI. Brandon Willeford finished 2x3 with 3 runs scored and a pair of runs knocked in. Tyler Pulley also finished 2x3.

"We hit the ball well against Graham and never seemed to get down even when we fell behind," said head coach David Fuhrman. "We kept our

cool and stayed focused. Bess came in and really shut them down, which was a big plus for us. We also did another good job of running the bases. We stole five bases and didn't have anyone thrown out."

Against Henrietta, Iowa Park led 2-1 after the first inning, then from that point on it was all Iowa Park as the Hawks and Wright held the Bearcats scoreless the next five innings. Iowa Park scored three runs in the fourth, fifth and sixth to force the run rule and make the final 11-1.

Wright improved to 6-0 for the season with the win allowing only three hits in his six innings of work.

Justin Phillips led the Hawks at the plate finishing 2x2 with 3 runs scored and a RBI. Mason Adams finished 2x3 with a run scored and Willeford finished 2x4 with a run scored.

"One of the big things we got

out of the Henrietta game was the way Chase threw his change-up," Fuhrman stated. "Instead of striking out a lot of batters we were getting lazy fly balls and lazy ground balls which gave our defense a chance to work. This was also the second game in a row where we didn't make any errors and for a high school baseball team that's pretty good."

"Tuesday's game against Bowie is a game the kids have been looking forward to since they beat us earlier this year," Fuhrman added. "Beating Graham and Henrietta and already having clinched a playoff spot takes some of the pressure off, but it should be a good game. We're getting better every time we take the field and that's what you want to be doing this time of the year."

Both games, today's in Childress and Tuesday's regular season finale, will start at 5 p.m.
