## BAIRD WESTERN WEEK BEGINS APRIL 30 WITH SQUARE DANCE

BAIRD — Many weeks of preparations have come to an end for the celebration of the Silver Anniversary of the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo. Many hours of work have been put into the events, planned for Western Week, April 30 through May 5th.

During the past few weeks Sheriff's Posse officials have advertised their annual rodeo with bumper stickers, placards and advertisement in the newspaper promoting the 25th year of rodeos here in Baird. They are in hopes for an outstanding year, and urge you to attend all or at least part of the events scheduled for your Western pleasure.

To kick off the week, on Old Fashioned Square Dance will be staged in the 2nd block of Market Street in downtown Baird. Ralph McMullen of Baird will be the caller to square dancers, who have been invited from the surrounding areas. To participate Monday night, April 30, at 8 p. m.

Western Week will continue at 5 p. m. Thursday afternoon as the parade passes in review down Market Street. Many area bands, riding clubs, cowboys, cowgirls, floats, and many other entries that make up a good parade are expected to be on hand.

Thursday night, at 8 p. m., the first performance of the 25th Annual Rodeo will get underway, under the direction of Walt Alsaugh, of Alamosa, Colo., who has produced many shows for fans in this area.

Bud Townsend of Lubbock, will also be among the familiar faces in the press box to perform the duties of announcer. He has done a fine job in many of the 25 years that the rodeo has been staged in Baird.

Specialty acts during the rodeo will feature 19-year-old Ada Clark, with her poodles, Prince Charles and Saint Paul. The dogs will do various tricks such as shine shoes, jump thru hoops, dance, jump ropes, and barrel race. This barrel race consists of one of the dogs riding on the back of the other in a dog saddle. Brenda started training dogs at the age of five, beginning with simple tricks, and as she grew older, more difficult tricks. She is a freshman student at Conner State College

in Warner, Okla.

Playing the roles of clowns this year will be Gene and Bobby Clark, brothers, from Bakersfield, Calif., who entered the profession some nine years ago. They have perfected the art of Brahman bullfighting to a fine art of precision timing and classic footwork, and comic antics and remarks for rodeo audiences. In addition to their outstanding ability in bullfighting, the Clark Brothers have three comic feature acts that are guaranteed crowd pleasers. They also compete in the contest side of rodeos. Bobby is a competent calf roper and Gene competes in roping and steer wrestling.

Thursday night has more entertainment after the show is over. A dance will be held at the American Legion, featuring Bill Skinner and his Western Heirs, with guest star, Pat Sadler and his fiddle. The dance will also be held Friday and Saturday nights, beginning at 8 p. m. each night.

The Queen of the 25 Anniversary Rodeo will be crowned at

the Thursday night performance. Two young ladies from Baird on one from Clyde have become candidates for this honor. They are Shelia Day and Carla Lambert, of Baird, and Gretta Yawn of Clyde.

The girls who have served as queen in past years have been invited to ride in the parade and grand entry in observance of this anniversary. Miss Becky Griggs, 1972 Queen, is scheduled to crown the new queen of 1973. Sheriff's Posse officials will have souvenir program on sale during the three nights of rodeo. The program will consist of past presidents, who have served one or more years, Queens for each year since the honor was given. Various other pictures and stories of the history of the 25 rodeos held in Baird. It will be a nice keepsake for those who have an interest in the Sheriff's Posse. Support from business firms here and in the surrounding area have made it possible for the Posse to present the program this year.

BAIRD — Billy Charles Hatchett will represent Baird High School at the State Track Meet in Austin May 4 & 5. Hatchett set a new record in the pole vault at the Region meet held recently in Lubbock, vaulting 13 feet, 4½ inches, and broke the 1970 record of 13 feet, 3¾ inches.

Hatchett is a senior at Baird High School, and the son of Mr.

and Mrs. Jimmy R. Hatchett. He also won 6th place in the high hurdles with a time of 15.2. The Baird team tied for 5th place at regional with 23 points.

Billy Charles, one of the outstanding Baird Bears who helped take the team to Class A Regional Finals, will represent his home town well as he competes in Austin. He is among the four Class A vaulters who have cleared 13 feet.

Other results of the Regional meet were: Jimmy Meador, 3rd place in discus with 139'3", and 6th place in the shot put with a throw of 47'6". We will be seeing more of this fellow next year, not only in track but back for a good job in football.

Butch Barron placed 4th in the shot put with 48'¾", and 4th in the discus with 136'¾". This senior student will be missed next year, but all his fans will be watching at McMurtry College for this young man.

Russell Van Der Linden placed 5th in high jump with a jump of 5'10". This young man is consistent at this height and has cleared 6 feet on several occasions. He will be back next year.

Placing in the top three all year in the 330 Intermediate hurdles, but did not place in the regional finals was Mitchell Atkinson with a 42.7.

# SOIL MAP OF TEXAS AVAILABLE AT LOCAL SCS OFFICE

A multi-colored general soil map of Texas has now been published and is available for sale to the public, a local conservation official said this week.

Les Ethetton, district conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Baird, said the beautiful 36x45 inch map can be seen in his office. It shows soil information compiled from years of detailed soil survey work by the Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Ethetton said the map lists basic soil information which should be useful to teachers, planners, conservationists, contractors, engineers, developers, realtors, farmers, ranchers, researchers, and others.

The map gives color delineations of the 73 major soil associations (containing 161 separate soil series) in the state and their extent. It also lists special limitations of the soils that affect their use.

Inset maps show rainfall, temperature, and length of growing season across the state. Current and potential urban and rural uses by soil associations are also listed.

Published cooperatively by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Soil Conservation Service, the map is available in two sheets or printed front and back. Printed front and back, the map costs \$3.00.

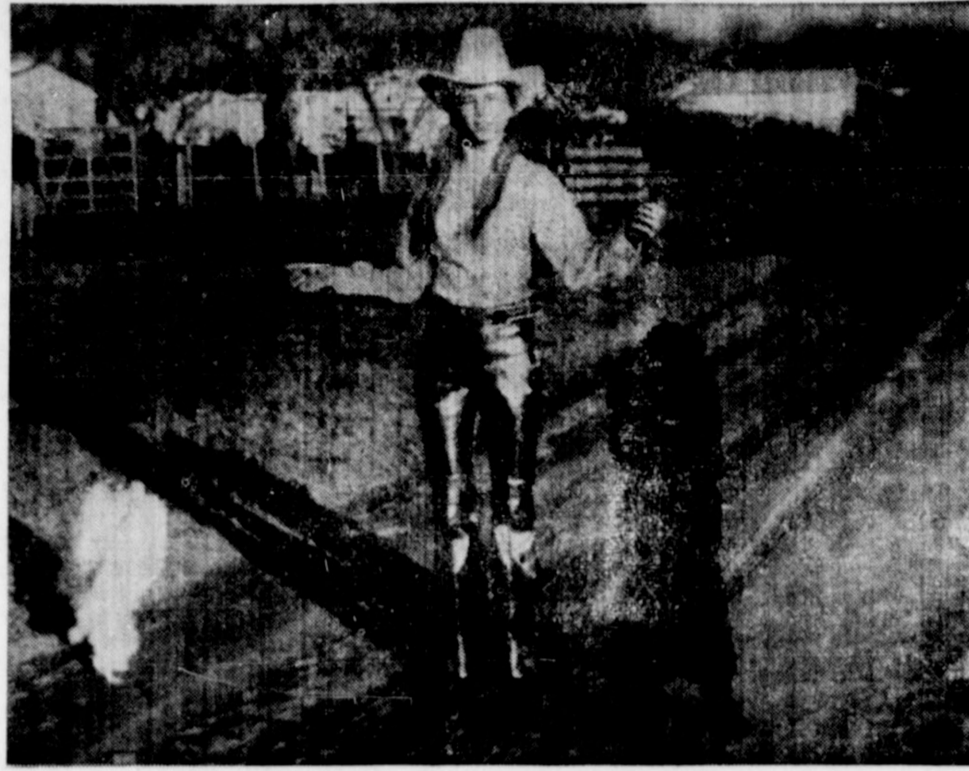
