# Water use restrictions expected Monday night

The city council is expected to implement a drought response measure, when aldermen meet Monday night.

The meeting is to get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

In the council's meeting in late October, they adopted a drought contingency plan which establishes guidelines to minimize the effects of water shortages and water supply emergency conditions.

The plan to be considered Monday seeks to reduce the city's water demand by 15 percent. It includes:

\* Restricting outdoor irrigation to between the hours of 8:00 p.m. and 10:00 a.m.;

\* Prohibiting all vehicle washing, other than at commercial businesses, except between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 10 a.m., and 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., and,

\* All wholesale water customers will be required to lower their water purchases from the city by 10 percent less than the previous month.

Additionally, flushing of the city's water transmission system will only be performed in conjunction with repairs made to broken mains.

According to City Administrator Mike Price, Lake Buffalo, the city's main source of water supply, stands at 1032.50 above sea level.

Once that level drops below 1032.00, the city will enter into its fourth stage of the drought contingency plan.

Monday's meeting will be the only one scheduled by the council this month, due to the Christmas holidays, aldermen decided recently.

OTHER BUSINESS A public hearing will be held to consider whether a structure at 414 West Pecan should be classified as dangerous or substandard, followed by a decision whether to demolish it.

Aldermen will consider authorizing the city administrator to purchase a police cruiser from Lipscombe Auto Center in Bowie, resulting from advertisement for bids.

Five resolutions will be considered by the council, including:

\* authorizing water funds to pay for dredging part of Lake Buffalo;
\* amending the 1999-2000 op-

\* consider accepting the audit of

erating budget;

the 1998-1999 budget; \* act on a request to purchase a

water meter bench test machine;

\* consider establishing rules and regulations regarding the use of excessive force during nonviolent civil rights demonstrations, including physically barring entrance to a facility or location which is subject to such a demonstration, and providing for penalties.

The meeting's agenda calls for an executive session with the city's attorney, concerning threatened litigation.

### **Teacher pleads guilty of theft**

Former Kidwell Elementary teacher Kimberly Dawn Mogg, who admitted stealing more than \$8,000 from the Kidwell PTA treasury, was sentenced to one year in jail, suspended, and four years probation during court proceedings Friday morning in 78th District Court.

Mogg was a coach at Kidwell Elementary, and also served as treasurer of the school's PTA.

After hearing from PTA officials, Mrs. Mogg and her friends and family members, Judge Keith Nelson handed down the sentence.

In addition, Mogg paid full restitution to the PTA in the amount of \$8,006.55.

PTA President Mary Biddy was present at the proceedings and read a prepared statement when she took the stand. It read:

"Kimberly Mogg acted in a fiduciary capacity as Treasurer of the Kidwell Elementary PTA from May 1998 to September 1999. During this time, Ms. Mogg took money from the students at Kidwell Elementary as well as their parents and their friends - the community of Iowa Park. Ms. Mogg consistently took cash from individual envelopes returned by each child (only the checks were deposited). The money was collected from PTA dues, party money and cookie dough sales, and, also, from the services provided from the children such as Santa Shop and the Book Store.

"During that time, Ms. Mogg forged a check with my name on it (I was in the building at the time). She also sorted mail for the school secretary and "intercepted" PTA pastdue invoices which totaled \$5,251. 47 as of Sept. 1, 1999. We believe these were two actions taken to prevent someone else from discovering the theft.

"I mentioned to Ms. Mogg in July, 1999, that we were going to have an audit soon. She took mony after that even through she knew about the pending audit. Therefore, it is the opinion of the Kidwell PTA that Ms. Mogg took the money deliberately and intentionally and went to great lengths to conceal her actions.

"Your Honor, Ms. Mogg's breach of trust has adversely affected the relationships between parents, educators and the general public in Iowa Park. Many people now have a lack of confidence in Kidwell PTA and this could potentially hurt other PTA programs outside the Iowa Park community.

"Ultimately, the children of Iowa Park are the ones that suffer. The funds have not been available to complete approved projects. Our fundraising efforts have been crippled as a direct result of Ms. Mogg's actions. This is evidenced by the decline in cookie dough sales this fall at both Kidwlel Elementary and Bradford Elementary, more than thirty percent combined.

"For an organization that has worked for many years to raise the standard of home life and teach the children of this country the importance of values, what example do Ms. Mogg's actions set for all of the children affected by her breach?

"The Kidwell Elementary PTA respectfully requests a felony conviction and not deferred adjudication for Ms. Mogg. We feel that Ms. Mogg is capable of doing this again and that other communities and organizations should be on alert in an effort to prevent this from happening to other children. Thank you."

Mogg tendered her resignation in mid-September, shortly after the missing funds were confirmed.

She then, during an interview with Iowa Park Police, issued a voluntary hand-written statement admitting she had taken in excess of \$5,000 by failing to make deposits of cash money received by the PTA.

Since the discovery of the missing funds, numerous safeguards have been put in place for both the

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Finalizing plans for holiday activities and a program on health were highlights of Tuesday night's meeting of Epsilon Eta chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha, held in the Fritz Building in Wichita Falls.

Essie Johnson and Judy Ricketts served as hostesses.

Final plans were made for the ARC Christmas party to be held at the Elks Lodge. Cups filled with goodies are being made to hand out to approximately 130 people, and members are making cookies to be served with punch. Santa Claus will make an appearance and hand out sacks of candy and fruit prepared by the Elks, and the Elk Clowns will be on hand to entertain the guests. Holley Ann Mobley will play Christmas music as guests and members sing carols.

Epsilon Eta members are planning to make a Christmas basket for a young mother with two small children for the holidays. They will also provide toys for the children.

The chapter voted to assist the Wichita Falls Art Association and Arts Council with First Art Expo for first through sixth graders, to be held at The Place, formerly known as the Women's YMCA. Booths will be set up for the children to work on their art. Epsilon Eta members will be dressed as clowns and work with the children.

The program, "You Can Beat Your Health Risk Factors," was presented by Johnson and Ricketts.

They reported the following statistics: Women have a one in two chance of dying from cardiovascular disease; one in eight chance of getting breast cancer; one in 13 chance of dying from a stroke; one in 18 chance of getting colon cancer; and one in 57 chance of getting ovarian cancer.

They found that for most of these illnesses, the risk remains low for younger women. At age 39, a woman's schance of getting breast cancer is one in 231, but the risk of getting breast that you do have choices in the caring cancer between your 40th and 59th birthday is one in 25. "To beat the odds," they said, "don't wait to take action. Start now, whatever your age."

year - more than five times as many as die from breast cancer. A family history of heart disease raises the risk, as does high blood pressure. diabetes, obesity, smoking, inactivity, stress and depression.

The classic chest-crushing pain that is the hallmark of a heart attack is mainly a male sympton. Women's heart attacks tend to show up as shortness of breath, fatigue and jaw pain, stretched out over hours rather than a few minutes.

Strokes - more than 96,000 women die from this condition each year in the U.S., which accounts for 61 percent of stroke deaths. Strokes are the leading cause of serious disability.

Colon cancer - each year, an estimated 51,700 women develop colon cancer,, and 24,900 women die from the disease, making it the third leading cause of cancer deaths. Early detection of colon cancer increases the chances of survival significantly.

Lung Cancer - is the leading cause of cancer deaths among women, even higher than breast cancer. 77,600 women will be diagnosed with, and 68,000 will die from the disease. The cause for 87 percent of the cases is smoking.

Ovarian cancer - an estimated 25,200 new cases of ovarian cancer will be diagnosed and an estimated 14,500 will die of the disease. Ovarian cancer often has no early warming signs.

The speakers offered the following lifesaving strategies: Check your family history of the diseases and find out who the experts are in that field and where they practice. Seek second opinions - find a doctor with no ties to the first. Doctors who practice together may hesitate to disagree with each other. Drink at least eight glasses of water a day. Caffeinated drinks like tea and coffee don't count, they are diuretics.

The main thing to be aware of, is for your own body.


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I don't know who among you was complaining about the weather not being Christmas-like, but you were sure successful.



of Health nor the Texas Board of Medical Examiners keeps track of deaths attributed to "medical errors" that could include misdiagnosis or misprescribed drugs.

Texas health officials reacted to the report, however, saying physician- and facility-licensing procedures help to ensure patient safety.

"Our system has worked well, and physicians that don't meet our requirements are disciplined," Dr. Bruce Levy, executive director of the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners, told The Dallas Morning News.

"If a medical provider represents an imminent threat to the public, we can suspend their state license, and we now do that about a dozen times a year," Levy said.

In Texas, physicians do not have to be re-examined once they are licensed, but they must take at least 24 hours of continuing medical education each year.

More than 900 Texas physicians have been disciplined in the last six years for violating state rules and requirements.

Disciplinary actions ranged from license revocations and suspensions to public reprimands and fines, Levy told The News.

Ninety-nine physicians have been disciplined for malpractice or other infractions in 1999, including nine who lost their licenses to practice in Texas.

Licenses of 43 doctors have been suspended and 18 doctors have had restrictions put on their licenses, Levy said.

Texas hospitals are required to report any abuse, neglect or exploitation of patients to the Department of Health, said Nance Stearman, director of the Health Facility Licensing and Compliance Division at the Texas Department of Health.

### AG AGENT'S REPORT

#### By JOE RAFF, Wichita County Agriculture Agent

#### **Fire Ants**

I think I have had more phone calls about fire ants than ever before. This month alone I have taken 25 calls.

Let's answer the first question that everyone has, No.

No, there is not a way to eradicate fire ants. No is also the answer to question two. One application of fire ant bait, insecticide, or any home remedy is not enough to kill a fire ant mount.

And No, is also the answer to question three. There is not a statewide effort to eradicate the fire ant. Again, it is highly improbable to ever eradicate fire ants.

I understand everyone's plight with the fire ant. I have my fair share and I hate the little boogers as much as anyone.

The best advice I can give to everyone is to work together. The only way you will suppress fire ants is if you and your neighbors work collectively. It even works better if you can get your city block to join in.

This idea has worked in larger cities such as San Antonio and Houston. Each city block or group of neighbors get together and buy fire ant bait or any insecticide the group wants to use. They appoint one or two persons who will make sure that all the yards receive an application at the same time, and make spot treatments as needed.

This way you are driving the fire ant out of your neighborhood and not just out of your yard. And, here's some ways you can control the fire ant.

There are many ways to manage fire ant problems. You can manage fire ants by pouring hot water on the mound, using insecticide mound drenches, spreading insecticide granules approved for fire ants on the mound and watering them in, and using bait-formulated insecticides.

Pouring 2-3 gallons of very hot (boiling) water on the mound will kill mounds about 60% of the time. Otherwise, the ants will probably just

move to another location. Remember one thing about this method: very hot or boiling water will kill the grass or surrounding vegetation that it is poured on.

Other natural or "organic" methods include mound drench products that contain pyrethrin and diatomaceous earth or silicon diox-

Using individual mound treatments can have good and bad results. Individual mound treatments allow treatment of only one mound at a time, therefore isolating insecticides in one place.

In the case of mound drenches. follow the label directions to assure the proper amount of insecticide is applied.

When using granular insecticide on individual mounds, be sure to water the granules into the mound after application as directed. Failure to water in the granules does a poor job to kill the ants, and more important, will contaminate runoff water after a rain because the granules will be washed away and end up in sensitive areas like creeks, streams, and drinking water.

Average control time for this method is from 6 to 8 weeks, depending on environmental conditions.

Bait formulated insecticides are another method of controlling fire ants. These baits come in the form of defatted corn soaked in soybean oil to attract the ants.

The active ingredient is dissolved in the soybean oil. Generally, these baits are collected by foraging worker ants and taken back to the colony where they are distributed.

The bait is fed to the queen, she dies or is prevented from producing viable eggs. In general baits are slower acting, but provide 80%-90% suppression for 12-18 months.

Be sure to use fresh bait because ants are not attracted to spoiled or old bait. One advantage of using baits is their low application rate and extremely low amount of active ingredient

The amount of active ingredient is some baits applied per acre equals the weight of a nickel down to less than a dime. The benefits to the environment are much greater, and baits provide the same suppression as drenches or other individual mound treatments.

Based on result demonstrations and research, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service recommends the two-step approach.

First, choose a bait such as Amdro, Logie, Award, Combat or Johnson Fire Ant Bait. Follow the directions on the label and apply the bait over the entire property. The best time to do this is when temperatures are hotter than 65 degrees and no hotter than 95 degrees.

After the first application (in the spring), wait three to five weeks and then treat individual mounds that were missed or survived the first application. This same treatment can be used if you chose Orthene, Diazinon or Dursban.

It is very important that you follow all the directions when using these compounds. Some say that if you apply sub-lethal amounts on mounds, the ants will not feed on that type of bait again.

So, if you are not getting the control you hoped for, and you're using the same bait, you may switch to a different one.

I also want to mention that there are a number of compounds that are labeled for fire ant controls and these that are listed are just a few. I some were omitted, it does not mean that they don't work.

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
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## Hawks dominate All-District honors


Damon Fox and Shane Dunn were both named to the First Team with Fox going as the Center and Dunn as an Offensive Lineman.

"I thought we played alright," said head coach Tim Clark. "We're still trying to get used to all the new players out there, but all the kids hustled well and got after them."


Justin Penn led Iowa Park in scoring with 16 points, followed by Zac Miller with 12 and Chris Simmons with 11.






