

This increase is for a 4 year period immediately following aerial spray-

The above studies were made on upland range sites in Shackelford and Throckmorton Counties, which are similar to local rangelands. The sites were deferred for a 3-month period immeditely following spraying. This deferment permits the grasses to effectively use the additional moisture normally used by the mesquite.

In addition to having adequate moisture to insure at least 30 days of growth prior to spraying, aerial spraying should be delayed until the soil temperature has reached 75 degrees or higher at the time of spraying. The soil temperature should be taken at a depth of 12-14 inches on the coldest significant soil in the pasture to be sprayed.




